

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Preface

The DFSORT Panels Guide is a complete introduction to DFSORT (Data Facility Sort) Panels including customization, tutorial and reference information. You should read this guide if you are new to DFSORT Panels or use it for reference if you are an experienced user.

The chapters in the book assume that you have used job control language (JCL) and understand how to work with data sets. You should also know what data sets are available at your job site.

This book provides you with a detailed tutorial on how to use DFSORT panels to create sort, merge, and copy jobs.

Chapter 1. Introduction to DFSORT Panels

This chapter provides an overview of DFSORT and the panels interface.

What is DFSORT?

DFSORT is a member of IBM*'s Data Facility family of products. The DFSORT licensed program is a high-performance data arranger developed by IBM for MVS/ESA* and MVS/XA* users.

With DFSORT, you can sort, merge, and copy data sets. You can use DFSORT to do simple tasks such as alphabetizing a list of names, or you can use it to aid complex tasks such as taking inventory or running a billing system. You can also use DFSORT's record-level editing capability to perform data management tasks.

The information you manipulate with DFSORT is contained in *data sets*. The term *data set* refers to a file that contains one or more records. Any named group of records is called a *data set*. The terms *data set* and *file* are synonymous; however, for the sake of consistency, this book refers only to data sets.

A data set contains the information that you want to sort, copy, or merge. For most of the processing done by DFSORT, the whole data set is affected. However, some forms of DFSORT processing involve only certain individual records in that data set.

Data sets can be *cataloged*, which permits the data set to be referred to by name without specifying where the data set is stored. A cataloged data set should not be confused with a cataloged *procedure*. A cataloged procedure is a named collection of JCL stored in a data set, and a cataloged data set is a data set whose name is recorded by the system.

Throughout this book, the term *record* refers to a collection of related information used as a unit, such as one item in a data base or personnel data about one member of a department. The term *field* refers to a specific portion of a record used for a particular category of data. A field is the smallest addressable unit of data in a data set.

Sorting Data Sets

You can use DFSORT to rearrange the records in your data sets. *Sorting* is arranging records in either ascending or descending order within a file. The following figure shows a sample data set of names, first sorted in ascending order, then in descending order.

You can sort data in several different formats. This list shows the most common data formats and the codes you use to specify them.

Code	Data Format
СН	Character (EBCDIC)
BI	Binary (Numeric)
ZD	Zoned Decimal (Numeric)

Merging Data Sets

You can also use DFSORT to merge data sets. DFSORT *merges* data sets by combining two or more files of sorted records to form a single data set of sorted records.




Figure 2. DFSORT Merges Two Lists to One List

The data sets you merge must be previously sorted into the same order (ascending or descending).

Copying Data Sets

DFSORT can also copy data sets without any sorting or merging taking place. You copy data sets in much the same way that you sort or merge them.




Figure 3. DFSORT Can Copy Your Data Sets

What Else Can You Do with DFSORT?

While sorting, merging, or copying data sets, you can also:

- Select a subset of records from an input data set. You can include or omit records that meet specified criteria. For example, when sorting an input data set containing records of course books from many different school departments, you can sort the books for only one department.
- Reformat records, add or delete fields, and insert blanks, constants, or binary zeros. For example, you can make a report more legible by inserting blank characters to separate fields.
- Sum the values in selected records while sorting or merging (but not while copying). In the example of a data set containing records of course books, you can use DFSORT to add up the dollar amounts of books for one school department.
- Alter the collating sequence when sorting or merging records (but not while copying). For example, you can have the lowercase letters collate after the uppercase letters.
- Sort, merge, or copy Japanese data if the IBM Double Byte Character Set Ordering Support (DBCS Ordering) (5665-360 Licensed Program, Release 2.0 or an equivalent product) is used with DFSORT to process the records.

What is the panels interface?

A *panel* is a preformatted screen of information presented on a display terminal. The panels shown in this book are representations of those you see on your terminal. The panels shown here might look different from what you see because of a difference in terminals. In addition, your system programmer might have customized some of the panels, or some of the options might have been changed at installation time from the supplied defaults.

If your site has installed DFSORT Panels under the Interactive System Productivity Facility (ISPF) or the Interactive Storage Management Facility (ISMF), you can perform many DFSORT tasks using interactive panels. You can use DFSORT Panels to sort, copy, and merge files in an online environment that lets you concentrate on performing the task without spending time in coding job control or program control statements.

You can access the DFSORT program in either foreground or background mode, depending on which environment best fits your task at the moment. With foreground processing, you submit your DFSORT job for immediate processing under TSO. With background processing, you can submit your job for batch processing while you perform other tasks, or you can save the completed application in a data set to edit or run later. The advantages of using DFSORT in panel mode are:

- You can create a job without coding JCL and DFSORT command syntax. You
 provide information about your application on the appropriate panels, and the
 panels build your DFSORT job automatically.
- You can allocate a new output data set without coding JCL or TSO commands.
 You only have to provide SPACE information for your new output data set (or
 use a Storage Management Subsystem (SMS) construct), and DFSORT Panels
 builds the necessary JCL or TSO commands to allocate your new output data
 set when your application runs.

- You can use the online HELP facility to get information about DFSORT functions and options during your terminal session. HELP is keyed to individual DFSORT panels, so you can also use it as a tutorial. You can get explanations and examples of the panels while you work through them.
- The panels prime your entry fields with last-used values or with defaults, and you can create new jobs with similar control statements by simply paging through the panels. To change an existing value, type over it. To reset to a default, type over it with blanks.

With DFSORT Panels, occasional users can process data sets effectively with minimal preparation. Experienced users can access DFSORT functions and options more quickly and efficiently. Chapter 2, "Using DFSORT Panels" on page 9 introduces both DFSORT and the interactive panels in a step-by-step format with illustrations and complete examples.

Types of Panels

There are several different types of panels:

Selection panels (or menus)

display a list of options to choose.

Data entry panels

display labeled fields where you can enter information or accept default values.

Review panels

display information you have entered so you can verify that the information is correct.

Online HELP panels

give you immediate online reference information to help you complete DFSORT Panels. (For more information on using HELP, see "Getting Help" on page 11.)

Before You Begin

This section discusses some things that you need to know before starting the tutorials in this book.

Using the Sample Data Set

Before you begin, turn to Appendix B, "The Sample Bookstore Data Set" on page 115. Many of the examples in this book refer to the sample bookstore data set as the input data set, so you should become familiar with it. The input data set contains the data that you want arranged or sorted. You must specify an input data set for every DFSORT job you run. The sample bookstore data set is in an input data set named **SORT.SAMPIN**.

Each record in the bookstore data set has 12 fields (book title, author's last name, and so on). A record can be represented by one horizontal row on the page. A field can be represented by one vertical column on the page.

To sort a data set, you choose one or more fields that you want to use to order the records (arrange in ascending or descending order). These fields are called *control fields* (or, in COBOL, *keys*).

As you work through the exercises on the following pages, remember that each *entire* record is sorted, not just the control field. However, for the sake of simplicity, the figures in the text show only the control fields being discussed. The sorted records actually contain all the fields, but one page is not wide enough to show them. Appendix B, "The Sample Bookstore Data Set," is printed to show all the fields in each record. It is also arranged with headings and numbers that show the byte positions of each field. The numeric fields are in binary format and, therefore, will not appear on terminals as they do in this book. These methods of arranging and viewing the data are explained in the chapters on DFSORT functions that follow.

Figure 4 shows an example of sorted fields. Notice the line of numbers above the sorted fields. These numbers represent the byte positions of those fields. You use byte positions to identify fields to DFSORT. The examples show the byte positions to help you while you are learning to use DFSORT and DFSORT Panels. The byte positions do not actually appear in any of your processed data sets.

In Figure 4, the first two records, which show nothing in the course department fields, are general purpose books not required for a particular course. For this example, the control field is the Course Department field.

Also notice that records in Figure 4 with *equal control fields* (in this case, the same department) appear in their original order. For example, within the Computer Science department (COMP), the title *Video Game Design* still appears before *Computers: An Introduction*.

You can control whether records with equal control fields appear in their original order or whether DFSORT orders them randomly. The system programmer sets defaults at installation time that you can change with some DFSORT options at run

time. The examples in this book assume that the default is for records with equal control fields to appear in their original order.

Note: The examples used in this book are for fixed-length records only. For information on processing variable-length records, see the *Application Programming Guide*.

Your Sample Input and Output Data Sets

The sample bookstore data set is the input data set you will use for most of the examples in this book. The system programmer created this data set when verifying the DFSORT Panels installation. If this data set is no longer available, ask your system programmer to run the SAMPJCL job, SAMPDATA, to create the sample data set, SORT.SAMPIN. The SAMPDATA job also creates a data set, SORT.SAMPOUT, which is used in many of the following examples as the DFSORT output data set. You must copy SORT.SAMPIN and SORT.SAMPOUT to your user ID before trying the examples that use them in this book.

For information on how to copy the sample data sets to your user ID, see Appendix A, "Using the DFSORT Sample Data Sets" on page 113.

Panels Considerations

You can use DFSORT Panels to specify most DFSORT functions and options directly by entering information in specific fields or by selecting codes on various panels. In some situations, you might want to create a DFSORT job with features that the panels do not directly support. For example, you might want to use:

- · Tape input or output data sets
- Additional work data sets
- Specific DFSORT subparameters that do not appear in the panels (such as DEBUG ABEND)
- Nonstandard DFSORT control statements or keywords
- · Data types unique to your system
- Data sets not cataloged or allocated on the system from which you access DFSORT Panels
- · Other programs that invoke DFSORT

DFSORT Panels provides several solutions to these problems by letting you customize your jobs and enabling you to change the way you create them.

- You can use free form panels to insert control statements into your jobs exactly
 as you have coded them. If your application requires a DFSORT feature not
 listed in a panel, you can simply code the statement yourself, and direct
 DFSORT Panels to use it in your job.
- You can save your completed job in a data set and edit or add statements later
 without going through the interactive panels. Using both the text editor and
 DFSORT Panels to build jobs, you can choose the most efficient way to accomplish your tasks.
- You can create DFSORT DD and control statements for use by another program (such as COBOL) that invokes DFSORT. Just save the completed DFSORT job in a data set and copy the required statements to the other job.
- You can suppress some automatic procedures by changing the settings on the panels (for instance, building a job that uses uncataloged or unallocated data set names).

Your system programmers can also tailor DFSORT Panels to your needs by adding or substituting their own panels for user-defined control statements with the User-Defined Panels Interface (UDPI). With UDPI, they can insert additional panels that let you create DFSORT jobs with specialized control statements unique to your needs. Appendix G, "Customizing DFSORT Panels with the User-Defined Panels Interface" on page 147 contains specific information on customizing DFSORT Panels with the User-Defined Panels Interface.

Before You Begin

Chapter 2. Using DFSORT Panels

This chapter introduces you to DFSORT Panels, an interactive tool that helps you create and submit DFSORT jobs. How you invoke DFSORT Panels depends on how it was installed at your site. DFSORT Panels might be installed as an option on one or more of the following menus:

- The ISPF Master Application Menu or submenu
- The ISPF/PDF Primary Option Menu or submenu
- · The ISMF Primary Option Menu

Or, your site might use the command ICEPANEL to invoke DFSORT Panels directly from TSO. If you do not know how to invoke DFSORT Panels at your site, ask someone in your information systems center.

You can use DFSORT Panels' interactive HELP facility at any time while you are using DFSORT Panels. As you work through the tutorials in the following chapters, you might find it useful to refer to the HELP panels in addition to using this book. See "Getting Help" on page 11 for information on using the HELP facility.

If the Interactive Storage Management Facility (ISMF) is available at your site, then the SORTREC line operator might also be available through the ISMF Data Set Application to do a quick and simple sort on a data set. For information on how to use SORTREC, see "Sorting in ISMF Using SORTREC" on page 108.

Getting Around

A panel is a formatted screen of information presented on a display terminal. Some panels provide information to you on request, while others require you to enter information. What you enter determines which panel you see next or which function is performed. Arrows mark the fields where you can enter information or specify choices, as shown in Figure 5.

Instructions on the panels tell you what keys and commands to use to get the results you want, as shown in Figure 6.

The following commands control panel flow. Some commands are inactive in panels for which they are not appropriate. Most of these commands do not apply

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to the HELP panels. See "Getting Help" on page 11 for information on the commands to use when using HELP.

ENTER key On some panels, the **ENTER** key saves your new values and takes

you to the next panel. On others, the **ENTER** key verifies that your panel input is correct. If you are using HELP, use **ENTER** to

display the next sequential pages.

END On some panels, END saves your new values and exits to the pre-

vious panel. On others, **END** cancels your new values and exits to the previous panel. If you are using HELP, the **END** command takes you back to the panel from which you invoked HELP.

HELP Takes you to a HELP panel. HELP panels give you more informa-

tion about a particular panel or function. HELP can also give you

an explanation of DFSORT Panels messages.

RETURN Terminates the application you are currently performing and returns

you to the DFSORT Primary Option Menu.

UP Scrolls the fields on the panel backward by the specified number of

lines or takes you to the previous panel in a series.

DOWN Scrolls the fields forward by the specified number of lines or takes

you to the next panel in a series.

CANCEL Exits the displayed panel without saving any changes.

REINIT Reinitializes all pages of a panel with default entries or blanks in all

the fields. Use this command to start over again with all new

entries.

BROWSE Displays the control statement you generated or entered exactly as

it would be passed to DFSORT. Enter the command from the SORT or MERGE Control Fields Entry panels or from the SORT or MERGE Free Form Statement Entry panels. Use **BROWSE** to verify that the control statement does what you intended so that you can correct any errors in your panel entries. You can also enter the **B** BROWSE STATEMENT select code on the Control Statements Selection panel to display control statements in the form in which

they would be passed to the DFSORT program.

PROFILE Displays a menu that lets you view or update your DFSORT user

profile. The profile controls the way DFSORT Panels constructs your applications. For information on what options are available and when you might want to change them, see the section Appendix F, "Setting Up or Changing Your Profile" on page 141. You can enter the **PROFILE** command from any SORT, COPY, or MERGE panel. You see the same panels by entering **0** on the

DFSORT Primary Option Menu.

You can display the current PF key settings at the bottom of the screen by entering the command **PFSHOW**. PFSHOW remains in effect even if you exit DFSORT and later return to the panels. To remove the PF key display, enter **PFSHOW OFF**. For information on customizing PF keys, see *ISPF Dialog Management Guide*.

Primed Values on Panels

DFSORT saves the values that you enter on the data entry panels between each use of the panels, and from one session to the next. When you begin a DFSORT session and move through the panels, the panels appear with values filled in from the last time you used the function. This is called *priming*.

You can usually accept the primed values by pressing **ENTER**. However, on panels that direct you to USE END TO SAVE AND EXIT, you must use the **END** command to accept the primed values. To change the primed values, simply enter new values in any of the fields you want to change. The next time you display the panel, the new values appear. Note that DFSORT retains separate primed values for the sort, copy, and merge functions.

Also, on panels that direct you to USE END TO SAVE AND EXIT, you can reset some fields to their default values by using the **REINIT** command or by typing a space (blank) over the fields. If the default for the field is a blank, **REINIT** blanks the field.

What Your User Profile Provides to DFSORT Panels

DFSORT Panels maintains its own User Profile in which it stores information that determines the way your DFSORT Panels jobs are processed and run. A User Profile is created for each user ID on the system when DFSORT is installed. After your profile has been set up, you usually need not change any of the values that have been entered to run your normal sort, merge, and copy jobs.

The DFSORT Panels User Profile controls items such as:

- · Logging of trace information
- The way DFSORT Panels recovers from abnormal terminations (abends)
- Diagnostic messages

The User Profile also contains information to control the processing of DFSORT jobs:

- JCL JOB statements used to run DFSORT jobs
- JCL EXEC statements used to run DFSORT jobs

For more information on the DFSORT Panels User Profile, see Appendix F, "Setting Up or Changing Your Profile" on page 141.

Getting Help

At any time while using DFSORT Panels, you can take advantage of the online help facility. Help panels provide immediate online reference information to help you complete panels. There are also help panels for informational or error messages, as well as an online help index.

Getting Help Online

You can display the help panel for a DFSORT panel by entering **HELP** on the command line, or by pressing the corresponding PF key.

Figure 7 on page 12 is the help panel DFSORT displays for the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.

The first help panel that DFSORT displays is a list of topics available for help with the SORT Statement Data Entry panel. From this panel you can choose topics and subtopics such as an overview of how the panel works, descriptions of how the control fields work, examples of using the SORT Statement Data Entry panel, and descriptions of how to use line commands.

For example, if you enter a 2 on the command line, DFSORT displays a help panel that describes what control fields are and how to use them.

HELP------BORT STATEMENT: CONTROL FIELDS (PAGE 1 OF 2)------HELP COMMAND ===>

DFSORT sorts your input records according to one or more control fields that you select. Each control field must be described in terms of its POSITION and LENGTH in the input records, its FORMAT (for example, EBCDIC character, ISCII/ASCII character, decimal, or binary), and its ORDER (ascending or descending).

Conceptually, DFSORT orders the records by doing a comparison on each control field in turn. So, if the first control field in two records is the same, DFSORT compares the second control field, and so on until a difference is found. (If no difference is found, the records are considered to be equal and are ordered together.) Therefore, you must specify your control fields in order of importance, with the most important control field first.

Use ENTER to continue, END to return to Sort Entry Panel.

Help Panels for Messages

DFSORT Panels uses a three-level message scheme, providing detailed information about a message at each level:

- · Short error or informational messages
- Long error or informational messages
- Message help panels

Short Error or Informational Messages

DFSORT displays short error or informational messages in the upper right corner of the panel, as appropriate.

Informational messages are displayed for a variety of reasons. For example, they tell you whether your foreground job was successful or unsuccessful.

Whenever DFSORT determines that there is an error, it displays a short error message. For example, if you typed in the name of a noncataloged data set in the OUTPUT DSN field, you might receive the error message shown in the upper right corner of Figure 9 on page 14.

Long Error or Informational Messages

If you need more information than the short message provides, you can use the HELP command to display a longer message just below the command line (actual location might vary depending on how your User Profile is set). For example, if you want to see more information regarding the "DATA SET NOT CATALOGED" message, enter **HELP** on the command line to display the long message shown under the command line in Figure 10 on page 15.

Message Help Panel

If you need more help than the short message or long message provides, use the **HELP** command once again to display a message help panel. The message help panel displays both the short and long messages with an explanation, and offers suggestions on how to correct any problems, or suggests what action you should take (in the case of informational messages, sometimes there is no suggested action). Figure 11 on page 16 shows the Help Message Panel for the "DATA SET NOT CATALOGED" example.

After viewing the message help panel, you can return to the functional panel by using the END command, or continue to the regular online help for that functional panel by pressing **ENTER**.

Note that the regular online help cannot be accessed directly while a short error or informational message is being displayed. You must first display the long message and the message help panel (by using the **HELP** command twice) before pressing **ENTER** to access the online help.

DFSORT Help Panels Index

To display the DFSORT help index, enter INDEX or I on the command line of any DFSORT help panel.

The first index panel (see Figure 12) is a special Application Selection panel. Enter **S**, **C**, or **M** to use the index for SORT, COPY, or MERGE, respectively. Each index includes common information on general topics, as well as specific information for the application selected. You can also enter **H** to see an overview of the DFSORT Panels help index.

If you specify **S**, for instance, you see the beginning of an alphabetic listing of all help topics in the SORT index (see Figure 13 on page 18).

To see the help panel for any topic on an index panel, enter its two- or three-letter select code on the command line. If you choose **A2**, for example, on the SORT HELP INDEX: A TO B panel, you see the following panel.

Use **END** to return to the functional panel from which you first requested help. Press **ENTER** to return to the previous index panel (in this example, SORT HELP INDEX: A TO B).

To see the help panel for a topic not on the currently displayed index panel, enter the first letter of that topic in the command line and press **ENTER**. DFSORT displays the index panel for that topic, and you can select the appropriate two- or three-letter select code. For example, to see the help panel for the REINIT command, enter **R**, to get to the appropriate index panel, and **R9** to get the help screen for REINIT. You can also page through the index panels alphabetically by pressing **ENTER**.

Overview of Sort, Merge, and Copy Jobs

This section presents an overview of how you use the panels to sort, merge, and copy data sets. The remaining chapters in this book describe, step by step, how to:

- · Sort, merge, and copy data sets
- · Select records from the input data set
- Sum values in records
- · Reformat records in data sets

Invoking DFSORT Panels

To start a DFSORT Panels session, you must display the DFSORT Primary Option Menu. As mentioned earlier in this section, how you invoke DFSORT Panels depends on how it was installed at your site. Your information center can tell you the correct method. When you enter DFSORT Panels, the Primary Option Menu panel appears.

Selecting Your Task

Select the task you want from the DFSORT Primary Option Menu (see Figure 15 on page 20). You can choose to sort, merge, or copy data sets, or you can view or change the DFSORT User Profile.

When you complete all of the panels for a particular task, DFSORT returns you to this panel. You can select another task, or select **X** to exit DFSORT Panels.

Designing Your Job

After you select SORT, MERGE, or COPY from the DFSORT Primary Option Menu, DFSORT Panels takes you through a series of panels that build and then either submit or save your DFSORT job for you. While going through the panels, you specify input and output data sets, build DFSORT control statements, and decide how to submit your job.

Selecting Data Sets for Processing

When you select SORT, MERGE, or COPY, DFSORT displays one or more data entry panels. On these panels, you select the data sets you want to work with and choose what to do with them.

On page 1 of the SORT, COPY, or MERGE Entry Panel, you specify one or more input data sets. You can sort or copy records from up to 12 data sets, or you can merge records from up to 16 data sets. Remember that your own system will prime the data entry panel with previously used values. Therefore, the sample data set name (DSN) in Figure 16 might be replaced with some other name on your system.

You also use this panel to specify whether or not to verify the input DSN:

Options for Processing Your Job

On the second page of the SORT, COPY, or MERGE Entry Panel (see Figure 17), you have various options to choose from:

- Which output data set to use
- · Whether to process your job in foreground or background mode
- How much space to reserve for your work data sets
- What panels to use as you process your job

First, you must specify a new or existing output data set. Each step to do this is detailed in "Options for Processing Jobs" on page 32.

You decide between foreground or background execution of your job on this panel. Foreground and background execution are discussed in detail in "Selecting Your Execution Mode" on page 25, so for now just be aware that you can choose:

- Foreground execution, which submits your job immediately to TSO (this occupies your terminal until the job is completed)
- Background execution, which either submits your job in batch mode or saves it in a data set. The saved jobs can later be edited or submitted for processing.

You can also choose the amount of space for the work data set DFSORT uses to sort your records. For detailed information on work data sets, see the Application Programming Guide.

The remaining three items on page 2 of the SORT Entry Panel are discussed in detail on page 46. For now, just be aware that you can use them to adjust the path that you take through the panels as you specify your sort, merge, or copy job.

Arranging Records in SORT and MERGE Jobs




Figure 18. Arranging the Records on the SORT Statement Data Entry Panel

Your next step in sorting or merging records (but not copying) is to specify how you want to arrange the records. Do this on the SORT or MERGE Statement Data Entry panel (see Figure 18). The SORT or MERGE Statement Data Entry panel generates the SORT or MERGE control statements. (For the Copy application, DFSORT Panels automatically generates the OPTION COPY control statement.)

The information you enter on this panel determines how the records will be arranged in the output data set. You can specify up to 100 control fields that DFSORT uses to arrange records within the output data set. For each control field, you specify the starting position of the field, the length of the field, the data format, and the order in which you want the records arranged, descending or ascending.

Choosing Additional Control Statements

Next, DFSORT displays the Control Statements Selection panel for your job. Depending on your job, you might want to build additional DFSORT control statements besides the SORT, MERGE, or OPTION COPY control statement. For example, you might want to select only certain records from the input data set, for which you must create an INCLUDE statement. These additional DFSORT control statements are selected on the Control Statements Selection panel (see Figure 19).

You choose to build additional control statements by selecting from the list on the Control Statements Selection panel shown in Figure 19. Enter a Y next to the name of each control statement you want to create or update.

For each control statement you select, DFSORT displays one or more panels where you create that statement. Examples of some commonly used control statements are explained in Chapters 10 through 14. Appendix E, "Control Statements Selection Panel" on page 129 contains detailed reference information on all of the DFSORT control statements you can specify using the Control Statements Selection Panel. Keep in mind that the online help facility has easily accessed information on each of these statements that you can refer to as you work through the panel.

Reviewing Control Statements




Figure 20. Reviewing the Control Statements

The Review Control Statements panel displays your SORT, MERGE, or OPTION COPY control statement, as well as any additional control statements you selected (see Figure 20 on page 25). You see the Review Control Statements panel just before you submit your job for DFSORT processing.

This panel gives you a chance to check the accuracy of the DFSORT control statements before DFSORT Panels submits or saves your job. If you notice that your control statement is incorrect, you can go back to the appropriate panel and correct the statement before you submit the job.

When you press **ENTER**, your job will be processed. If you chose foreground execution on the second page of the SORT, MERGE, or COPY Entry Panel, your job is processed immediately. If you chose background execution, the next panel is the DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel (see Figure 21 on page 26).

Backing Up and Starting Over

You can return to the original SORT, MERGE, or COPY Entry panels at any point during input by pressing **END** repeatedly, until you reach the panel you want to work with.

Selecting Your Execution Mode

When using DFSORT Panels to process DFSORT jobs, you can choose to:

- Immediately submit any job for processing under TSO
- Submit your job for batch processing or save your DFSORT job stream in a data set where you can edit or submit it as needed

You choose the method of processing on the SORT, MERGE, or COPY Entry panels. The following sections explain the differences between these methods of processing DFSORT jobs.

Running Your Job in Foreground

If you specified foreground execution, DFSORT runs your job under TSO immediately after you have reviewed the control statements. You will not be able to use your terminal until the job is processed, so keep this in mind for long-running jobs. As your job is running, you see TSO execution messages and DFSORT program messages.

Submitting or Saving Jobs

If you selected background execution, DFSORT Panels displays the DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel after you review the control statements (see Figure 21).

On the DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel, you must select either **1** to SUBMIT JOB for background processing or **2** to SAVE GENERATED JOB IN A DATA SET for later processing or editing.

If you select to save your job in a data set, you must specify the name of the data set to save the job in.

Do not confuse the saved data set with the sort, merge, or copy output data set. The output data set contains your sorted, merged, or copied records, whereas the saved data set contains your job statement. The saved data set must be preallocated and cataloged with either fixed format or fixed-block format and a logical record length of 80.

The DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel also displays the current job control language (JCL) JOB statements specified in your User Profile. The JOB statements

are used to process your job. You can verify and accept them as is, or you can change them if needed. See *Getting Started* or the *Application Programming Guide* for more information on the JOB statement. (Remember that DFSORT primes input fields with previously used values. The input you see on your own panel might differ from the printed example.)

Note: Any changes you make to the JCL statements on the DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel are used to update the DFSORT User Profile when the job is submitted or saved. These changes are not saved if you decide not to submit or save your job.

If you enter an **N** in the VIEW OR CHANGE EXECUTE STATEMENTS FROM PROFILE field, when you press **ENTER** your job is saved or submitted immediately.

To see or change the JCL EXEC statements, enter a **Y** in the VIEW OR CHANGE EXECUTE STATEMENTS FROM PROFILE field on the DFSORT Job Submission Entry Panel. DFSORT Panels displays the Execute Statement Entry Panel (see Figure 22).

The DFSORT Execute Statement Entry Panel shows the current JCL EXEC statements as specified in your User Profile. The EXEC statements are used to process your job. You can verify and accept them as is, or you can change them if needed. See *Getting Started* or the *Application Programming Guide* for more information on the JCL required to process DFSORT jobs.

Press ENTER to submit or save your job.

Note: Any changes you make to the EXEC statements on the DFSORT Execute Statement Entry Panel are used to update the DFSORT User Profile when the job is submitted or saved. These changes are not saved if you decide not to submit or save your job.

Selecting Your Execution Mode

For more information on how to prepare the EXEC and other JCL statements, see the *Application Programming Guide*.

Chapter 3. Sorting, Merging, and Copying Data Sets

This chapter shows you how to sort, merge, and copy data sets using DFSORT Panels. The first section explains how to sort data sets by walking you step by step through the panels necessary to perform a simple sort. You will also learn how to sort using multiple control fields, and how to set up your sort job faster by bypassing some panels.

Finally, you merge and copy data sets, following a path similar to the one you used to sort.

You might want to refer to Appendix D, "Map of DFSORT Panels" on page 121 to see how the three main DFSORT Panels functions relate to each other.

Sorting Data Sets

This section describes how to use DFSORT Panels to sort a data set. You will step through sorting the sample bookstore data set records by course department in ascending order (as shown in Figure 23).

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


Figure 24. Overview of Panels Used for a Simple Sort

Selecting Tasks




Figure 25. DFSORT Primary Option Menu

The first panel that appears when you invoke DFSORT Panels is the DFSORT Primary Option Menu, as shown in Figure 25.

From the DFSORT Primary Option Menu you can choose to sort, copy, or merge a data set(s), go to the profile panels (to change the way your DFSORT sessions normally run), or exit DFSORT.

To sort a data set:

- 1. Select SORT by entering a 1 after ENTER SELECTION OR COMMAND on the panel.
- 2. Press ENTER.

DFSORT displays the SORT Entry Panel, shown in Figure 26.

Designing Jobs

The SORT Entry Panel consists of two separate "pages" or panels.

On the first page, you can either enter the input data set name or accept the data set name displayed in the INPUT DSN 1 field.

On the second page, you can specify the output data set name, choose your execution environment, and choose whether or not to view some optional panels.

Selecting Data Sets for Processing

On the first page of the SORT Entry Panel:

1. After INPUT DSN 1, enter the first input data set name.

The input data set might already be primed with the last input data set you used. The other input data set name fields, INPUT DSN 2-12, are optional (use them to sort additional data sets). For this example, enter an input data set name of **SORT.SAMPIN**, as shown in Figure 26.

2. Leave the VERIFY INPUT DSN field set to the default value of Y.

When this field is set to Y, DFSORT checks the input data set name you entered on the panel to verify that the data set is cataloged and allocated.

If the data set name you entered is not cataloged and allocated, DFSORT displays an error message on the panel, asking you to enter a valid data set name. By setting the VERIFY INPUT DSN field to Y, you can keep from using data sets that might cause your job to fail.

To continue to page 2 of the panel, press ENTER. DFSORT displays the SORT Entry Panel, Page 2 (see Figure 27).

Options for Processing Jobs

On the second page of the SORT Entry Panel:

1. After OUTPUT DSN, enter the name of the *output* data set in which you want the sorted records to be placed. The output data set name might already be primed with the last output data set you used.

For this example, enter an output data set name of **SORT.SAMPOUT**, as shown in Figure 27.

2. Leave the ALLOCATE NEW OUTPUT DATA SET field set to the default value of

When this field is set to N, DFSORT uses the existing output data set specified in the OUTPUT DSN field.

3. Leave the VERIFY OUTPUT DSN field set to the default value of Y.

When this field is set to Y, DFSORT checks the output data set name you entered on the panel to verify that the data set is cataloged and allocated. 4. Leave the SPECIFY EXECUTION ENVIRONMENT field set to the default value of 1 for foreground execution.

You can choose either foreground or background execution. Using foreground execution, you run your job under TSO to sort your records immediately. Using background execution, you choose to submit the job for batch execution or save the job in a data set for later editing or batch submission.

5. After SPECIFY WORK DATA SET SPACE, specify the amount of space to allocate for the work data set that DFSORT needs to process your job. For now, leave these fields set to their default values of 5 and 5.

Note: You can allow dynamic allocation of work data sets by specifying the DYNALLOC option on the Option Statement Data Entry (SORT) panel. See the discussion of the DYNALLOC parameter in *Application Programming Guide* for details on using the DYNALLOC parameter.

6. For this example, make sure the last three fields are set to following default values (if they are not, change them as shown):

The last three fields on the SORT Entry Panel define which series of panels you will work with as you specify your job. These options are explained later in this chapter.

7. Press **ENTER** to continue.

Arranging the Records

DFSORT uses the information you enter on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel to build a SORT control statement. If the panel is not primed with values from a previous session, it shows four unused *sort control fields* (you can enter up to 100 sort fields).

You must enter the following information for at least one sort field to continue.

POSITION The starting byte position of the field by which you are going to

sort (in relation to the beginning of the record).

LENGTH The length, in bytes, of the field by which you are sorting.

FORMAT A code for the data format. The most common formats are:

CH EBCDIC character
Bl Binary (numeric)

ZD Zoned decimal (numeric)PD Packed decimal (numeric)

The default for FORMAT is **CH**, the format code for character type.

SORT ORDER The sorting order (ascending or descending) in which you want

your records arranged. The SORT ORDER default is **A**, the code

for ascending order.

In addition, you might need to modify the control fields by using *line commands*. Line commands are letters or numbers that represent commands that modify lists of control fields. You enter these commands in the LINE COMMAND field at the left of the screen and press **ENTER** to process the command. For a list of valid line commands, see Figure 29. Use line commands to save time by adding, deleting, or rearranging control fields without having to retype the entire list.

To sort the sample data set by course department in ascending order, fill in the SORT Statement Data Entry panel as follows:

- 1. The COURSE DEPARTMENT field begins at byte 110, so enter **110** after POSITION
- 2. The COURSE DEPARTMENT field is 5 bytes long, so enter 5 after LENGTH
- 3. The COURSE DEPARTMENT field contains character data. The FORMAT field defaults to **CH**, so you do not have to enter any changes in this field.
- 4. Arrange the records in ascending order. The SORT ORDER field has the default value of **A**, for ascending order, already displayed, so you do not have to enter any changes in this field.

After completing the fields on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel, the screen looks like Figure 30 on page 36.

DFSORT Panels uses only the control fields for which you have specified POSITION and LENGTH. So in this example, DFSORT will arrange the input data set using SORT FIELD NO. 1 as the only sort field. SORT FIELD NO.s 2, 3, and 4, are not used.

5. To verify the input you entered on the panel, press **ENTER** once.

DFSORT checks your input for any errors, and re-displays the screen. If DFSORT finds any errors, it displays a message at the top of the panel. If you do receive an error message, read the message, check your input closely, and correct any input errors.

If there are no errors, DFSORT displays an informational message at the top of the panel.

6. To continue without any further input (entering anything else), press ENTER.

If you make any input changes (such as changing the sort order to **D** for descending), you must press **ENTER** to process the changes and re-display the SORT Statement Data Entry panel. Press **ENTER** again to continue to the next screen.

DFSORT displays the screen shown in Figure 31 on page 37.

Choosing Additional Control Statements

You might want to build DFSORT control statements in addition to the SORT, MERGE, or OPTION COPY control statement. For example, if you want to select only certain records from the input data set, you need an INCLUDE statement.

- 2. Press ENTER to continue.

Running Sort Jobs





Figure 33. Review Control Statements Panel

On the Review Control Statements panel (Figure 33), DFSORT Panels displays the control statement it built from the information you entered.

For this example, DFSORT Panels built the following SORT statement:



Ascending order

- On the Review Control Statements panel, you can examine the control statement before you execute the sort.
- 2. If the control statement looks correct, press ENTER to perform the sort.

Because you selected foreground execution on page 2 of the SORT Entry Panel, DFSORT displays TSO messages and DFSORT program messages as your job runs.

If the control statement is incorrect, use the **END** command to return to the previous panels.

So Far

So far, you have covered the procedure for creating a simple sort. Next, you can learn more advanced sorting tasks.

Sorting by Multiple Control Fields

In the first example, you sorted the sample data set by a single control field, the course department. You can also sort records by specifying more than one control field. When you specify more than one control field, you enter them from highest to lowest priority.

Note: Control fields can overlap or be contained within other control fields.

In this case, sort the sample data set in this order:

- 1. Course department
- 2. Course number
- 3. Instructor's last name
- 4. Instructor's initials
- 5. Book title

If two records have the same course department, they are sorted by course number. If they also have the same course number, they are sorted by the instructor's last name. If they also have the same last name, they are sorted by the instructor's initials. Finally, if they also have the same initials, they are sorted by title.

To accomplish this sort, follow the same path you used to sort the records by course department.

1. On the SORT Statement Data Entry panel, specify the POSITION, LENGTH, FORMAT, and SORT ORDER for the five control fields.

Figure 34 shows how to specify the first four control fields on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.

You must specify one more sort control field to sort the records by book title. Because there are no more open sort control fields on the panel, use a line

- command to insert additional lines to enter more sort control fields (see Figure 29 on page 34 for a list of all line commands).
- 2. Under LINE COMMAND, enter an I, for insert, on the bottom line of the panel, as shown in Figure 35.

Note: If you want to add more than one sort control field, enter **I**x, where x is the number of lines you want to insert. Instead of using I, you can use R, to repeat a line, and change the control field in the repeated line to a new control field.




Figure 37. Adding an Extra Sort Control Field to Sort by Book Title

4. On the new line, enter the POSITION, LENGTH, and FORMAT for the fifth field, as shown in Figure 37.

- 5. To check your input for errors, press **ENTER**.
- 6. If there are no errors, press ENTER again without entering anything else to continue.
 - DFSORT displays the Control Statements Selection (SORT) panel.
- 7. Because you are sorting without adding any other control statements, press **ENTER** to continue to the Review Control Statements panel.
- 8. To perform the sort, press **ENTER** on the Review Control Statements (SORT) panel.

Specifying Fields Together

When fields are next to each other in the input data set, and they have the same data format, you can specify them together as one field on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.

Look at the sample bookstore data set in Appendix B, "The Sample Bookstore Data Set" on page 115. Notice that the COURSE DEPARTMENT and the COURSE NUMBER fields are located next to each other and have the same data format, character (CH). Also, the INSTRUCTOR'S LAST NAME and the INSTRUCTOR'S INITIALS fields are next to each other and have the same data format.

You can specify the department and course number together as one field, and the instructor's last name and instructor's initials together as one field, on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.

- Delete the line for COURSE NUMBER (#2) and the line for INSTRUCTOR'S INITIALS (#4) by typing the line command **D** on their respective lines under the LINE COMMAND heading. You can enter the line command anywhere in the correct area.
- 2. When the two lines have been deleted, and only three lines are left, change the length of area sorted for lines #1 and #2 from 5 and 15 to 10 and 17, respectively (see Figure 39 on page 44).

Changing the Default Sort Order

So far, you have sorted records in ascending order. Sorting records in descending order instead of ascending order is easy. Rather than an A, enter a D after SORT ORDER on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.

You can sort some control fields in ascending order and others in descending order. For example, to sort the course departments in ascending order and the prices in descending order (within each course department), complete the SORT Statement Data Entry panel as shown in Figure 40.

The next few sections discuss how you can use those fields to reduce the number of panels you go through to create a job.

Bypassing the Control Statements Selection Panel

The VIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS SELECTION PANEL field shown in Figure 42 is usually set to its default value of **Y**. When set to this value, DFSORT displays the Control Statements Selection panel, where you can choose to create additional control statements.

If you do not want to change any of the additional control statements, after VIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS SELECTION PANEL field, type ${\bf N}$, for NO.

If you set this field to \mathbf{N} , DFSORT bypasses the Control Statement Selection panel as you set up your job.

Bypassing the Review Control Statements Panel

You can also choose not to display the Review Control Statements panel, the last panel you see before you perform a foreground sort. On the Review panel you can check the control statement(s) that DFSORT built for you before you actually sort the records. This gives you a chance to see and correct any mistakes you might have made on the entry panels. Using this panel is recommended.

However, you can choose not to see this panel if, on page 2 of the SORT, MERGE, or COPY Entry Panels, you type $\bf N$ after REVIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS BEFORE EXECUTION.

─ So Far -

So far, you have covered the basics of sorting data sets using DFSORT Panels:

- · Completing a simple sort
- · Sorting with multiple control fields
- · Changing the default sort order
- Setting up your sort job faster.

Now you will cover the basics of merging data sets with DFSORT Panels.

Merging Data Sets

With DFSORT you can also merge previously sorted data sets into one data set.

For example, consider the sample bookstore data set. Assume that the bookstore data set is already sorted by course department and book title, as shown in Figure 43.

You can update the original bookstore data set by merging it with the new data set that contains the five new records.

Whenever you merge data sets, you must make sure that the records have the same format and that they have *previously* been sorted by the same control fields in the same order (ascending or descending). You can merge up to 16 data sets at a time.




Figure 45. Overview of Panels Used for a Merge

Using the panels to merge data sets is similar to using the panels to sort data sets. Figure 45 shows the path you will take through the panels for the merge tutorial.

 Go to the DFSORT Primary Option Menu. To select MERGE, enter a 3 after ENTER SELECTION OR COMMAND.




Figure 46. Selecting MERGE on the Primary Option Menu

- Figure 47 shows the first of two pages in the MERGE Entry Panel. Just as on the SORT Entry Panel, you use the first page of the MERGE Entry Panel to enter the names of the input data sets you want to merge. The input data set names might be primed with the last input data sets you used.
- Enter the names of the data sets you are going to merge. Enter the names consecutively. Do not leave an open line between two data set names. In this example, you merge two data sets, MERGE.MASTER and NEWREC.FIVE.
- 4. Press ENTER.

On the second page of the MERGE Entry Panel:

- 1. After OUTPUT DSN, enter the name of the data set in which you want the merged records to be placed. The output data set name might be primed with the last output data set you used.
 - In this sample, you enter a new output data set with the name **SORT.PDS** with the member name **JOB1**.
- 2. Set the ALLOCATE NEW OUTPUT DATA SET field to Y. Y tells DFSORT you want to allocate SORT.PDS as a new partitioned output data set.
- 3. Leave the VERIFY OUTPUT DSN field set to the default of Y.

If the DFSORT panels detect an error in the syntax of your output data set name, a message will be displayed until you correct the error. Syntax verification is provided whether VERIFY OUTPUT DSN is set to $\bf Y$ or $\bf N$.

If the VERIFY OUTPUT DSN field is set to Y and the ALLOCATE NEW OUTPUT DATA SET field is set to Y, additional data set verification, such as ensuring that

your data set is cataloged and allocated, is done after the New Output Data Set Entry Panel is displayed.

- 4. Leave the SPECIFY EXECUTION ENVIRONMENT field set to the default value of 1. You can choose either foreground or background execution. Using foreground execution, you run your job under TSO to merge your records immediately. Using background execution, you choose to submit the job for batch execution or save the job in a data set for later editing or batch submission.
- 5. The last three items on the MERGE Entry Panel determine the panels you will work with as you specify your job. For this example, make sure these items are set to the following default values (if they are not, change them as shown):

On the New Output Data Set Entry Panel:

- 1. For this example, leave the MANAGEMENT CLASS, STORAGE CLASS, and DATA CLASS fields blank, so that the defaults will be used.
- 2. Leave the SPACE UNITS field set to the default value of **CYLS**, and leave the PRIMARY QUANTITY, SECONDARY QUANTITY, and DIRECTORY BLOCKS fields set to their default values of **5**. These values tell DFSORT how to allocate space for your new output data set.
- 3. Leave the DATA SET NAME TYPE field blank, so a PDS will be allocated.

4. If you made any input changes, you must press ENTER to process the changes and re-display the New Output Data Set Entry panel. Press ENTER again to continue to the MERGE Statement Data Entry panel.




Figure 50. MERGE Statement Data Entry Panel, Before You Fill It In

- 2. To have DFSORT verify the information you entered, press **ENTER**.
- 3. Press **ENTER** again without any further input changes. DFSORT displays the Control Statements Selection (MERGE) panel.
- 4. In this case, you do not want to create any other control statements, so press **ENTER** to continue.

DFSORT displays the Review Control Statements panel.

The Review Control Statements panel displays the MERGE control statement that DFSORT built for you from the information you entered on the panels.




Figure 52. Review Control Statements Panel

5. To process the merge, press ENTER. Because you selected foreground execution, when you press ENTER you see TSO messages and DFSORT program messages as your merge job runs.

Copying Data Sets

With DFSORT Panels, you can copy the records of your data sets directly without performing a sorting or merging operation.

You can copy records as they are, or you can edit the data sets by selecting and reformatting the specific records you want to copy. Later chapters show you how to edit data sets. For now, the copied data sets look the same as the original data sets.




Figure 54. Overview of Panels Used for a Copy Application

Figure 54 on page 56 shows the path you take through the panels for the copy tutorial.

On the second page of the COPY Entry Panel:

 In the OUTPUT DSN FIELD, enter the name of the data set in which you want the copied records placed. The OUTPUT DSN field might be primed with the name of the last output data set you used.

In this example, the output data set name is **SORT.SAMPOUT**.

Leave the ALLOCATE NEW OUTPUT DATA SET field set to the default value of N.

N tells DFSORT to use the existing output data set specified in the OUTPUT DSN field.

3. Leave the VERIFY OUTPUT DSN field set to the default value of Y.

When this field is set to Y, DFSORT checks the output data set name you entered on the panel to verify that the data set is cataloged and allocated.

- 4. Leave the SPECIFY EXECUTION ENVIRONMENT field set to the default value of 1 for foreground execution. Using foreground execution, you run your job under TSO to copy your records immediately.
- 5. The last two items on the COPY Entry Panel define which panels you will work with as you specify your job. For this example, make sure these items are set to the following default values (if they are not, change them as shown):

REVIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS BEFORE EXECUTION - Y
```

These options are explained in detail on page 46.

6. To continue, press **ENTER**.

DFSORT displays the Control Statements Selection (COPY) panel. In this case, you do not want to display any other control statements, so press **ENTER** again to continue.




Figure 58. Review Control Statements Panel

DFSORT displays the Review Control Statements panel shown in Figure 58 on page 59.

7. To process the copy, press **ENTER**. Because you selected foreground execution, DFSORT displays TSO messages and DFSORT program messages as your job runs.

The result is identical to the original data set in Figure 55 on page 56.

Task Summary -

This chapter guided you through a simple tutorial for each of the three main DFSORT Panels' functions: sort, merge, and copy. All of the other control statements, covered later, use one of these three main applications. In the next chapter, you learn how to tailor your input data sets.

Copying Data Sets

Chapter 4. Tailoring Input Data Sets with INCLUDE and OMIT

For many DFSORT applications, you might need only a portion of the records in the input data set. This chapter shows you how to use DFSORT Panels to create INCLUDE or OMIT control statements. The tutorials in this chapter build on the previous chapters. You must understand the information in the previous chapters before attempting the tutorials in this chapter.

Including and Excluding Records from the Input Data Set

Selecting a subset of the records in the input data set increases the speed of the sort. The fewer the records, the less time it takes to sort them.

You select records from an input data set by either:

- Specifying the records you want included on the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel.
- Specifying the records you want omitted on the OMIT Statement Data Entry panel.

Choose INCLUDE or OMIT based on which is easier and more efficient for a given application. *You cannot use both statements together.*

You select the records you want included or omitted by comparing the contents of a field with either:

- **Another field**. For example, you can select records for which the author's last name is the same as the instructor's last name.
- A constant. The constant can be a character string, a decimal number, or a
 hexadecimal string. For example, you can select records that have the character string HIST in the department field.

You can also combine two conditions with logical ANDs or ORs. For example, you can select records that have either HIST or PSYCH in the department field.

Including Records: Creating INCLUDE Statements

In this section, you learn how to select records from the input data set by creating an INCLUDE statement using the panels. You can use the INCLUDE statement in sort, merge, and copy jobs. For this example, you will use the data set shown in Appendix B, "The Sample Bookstore Data Set" on page 115.

Suppose that it is the end of the year and you want to sort, by title, *only the books you need to reorder for the coming year*. If the number of copies sold this year for a particular book is greater than the number in stock, you can assume that you need to order more copies.

Use the panels to:

- Create an INCLUDE statement that will select from the input data set the books that meet this criterion.
- · Sort these selected records in the order you want.




Figure 59. Overview of Panels Used for INCLUDE

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Figure 59 shows the path that you will take through the panels as you complete your tutorial for INCLUDE.

Designing Your Job

Start by displaying the DFSORT Primary Option Menu:

- 1. To perform a sort application, enter 1 and press ENTER.
 - (Examples of the Primary Option Menu and the next two panels discussed are shown in Chapter 3, "Sorting, Merging, and Copying Data Sets" on page 29. To save space, they are not shown here.) DFSORT displays the two-page SORT Entry Panel.
- 2. On the SORT Entry Panel, Page 1, enter the name of the input data set that contains the records. For this example, you should use SORT.SAMPIN. Press ENTER.
- 3. On the SORT Entry Panel, Page 2, enter the name of the output data set in which you will place the sorted records. For this example, use **SORT.SAMPOUT** as the output data set. Press **ENTER**.
- 4. DFSORT displays the SORT Statement Data Entry panel. On this panel, specify how you want the selected records to be sorted and in what order. To sort the books by title in ascending order, complete the panel as shown in Figure 60 on page 63.

Now, select only those books whose number sold is greater than the number in stock.

To create an INCLUDE statement to select these records, complete the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel:

- Specify the location, length, and data format of the NUMBER SOLD YEAR TO DATE field.
 - After POSITION 1, enter the location (byte position number) of the NUMBER SOLD YEAR TO DATE field, which is 166.
 - After LENGTH 1, enter the length of the NUMBER SOLD YEAR TO DATE field, which is 4.

Note: The INCLUDE statement now displays a YES in the ACTIVE column, indicating that INCLUDE is active and will be passed to DFSORT for processing. The statement remains active for the next use of the panels. If you do not want to use INCLUDE, enter the **N** select code in the column to the right of the arrow. This deactivates the statement. To reactivate the statement or to make changes to the statement, specify the **Y** select code again.

6. To continue to the Review Control Statements panel, press **ENTER**.

Reviewing and Submitting Your Job




Figure 66. Review Control Statements Panel

DFSORT built both an INCLUDE and a SORT statement from the information you entered on the panels. (See Figure 66.)

DFSORT processes the INCLUDE statement first, selecting only those records from the input data set that meet the criterion you specified (NUMBER SOLD field greater than NUMBER IN STOCK field). After DFSORT selects this subset of records from the input data set, it sorts only these records by book title in ascending order. The sorted records appear in Figure 67.

So Far

This section explained how to select only the specific records that you need from an input data set by using an INCLUDE control statement. Next, you will learn an even more selective method of extracting records by using a logical AND with your INCLUDE statement.

Designing a Job Using Logical ANDs

In the last example, you selected only those records where the number of books sold was greater than the number currently in stock. To extract records for only the books you must order from COR Publishers, two conditions must be true:

- The NUMBER SOLD field is greater than the NUMBER IN STOCK field.
- · The book is published by COR Publishers.

To add this second condition, expand the INCLUDE statement you created for the last example by:

- Adding a logical AND
- Comparing the contents of the PUBLISHER field to the character string COR.

To complete the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel to expand the INCLUDE statement:

- 1. Complete page 1 of the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel as you did in the last exercise (Figure 64 on page 65). Doing so, you specify the first of the two conditions (the number sold is greater than the number in stock).
- To specify the second condition (only books published by COR), display the second page of the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel. Use the **DOWN** command to display the second page of the INCLUDE panel.

To select only books published by COR, use page 2 of the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel to build a logical AND condition:

- After the AND or OR field, enter AND.
- After POSITION 1, enter the byte position number of the PUBLISHER Field, which is 106.
- After LENGTH 1, enter the length of the PUBLISHER Field, which is 4.
- After FORMAT 1, enter CH for character data.
- After COMPARISON, enter EQ, the comparison code for equals.
- After CONSTANT, enter C'COR', to specify the publisher COR.

This section showed you how logical ANDs and ORs can further narrow the scope of an INCLUDE statement. Next, you use the OMIT statement to omit certain records from the input data set.

Omitting Records: Creating OMIT Statements

Sometimes, it can be easier to select records from an input data set by telling DFSORT to exclude certain records. You exclude records from the input data set with an **OMIT** statement.

The following figure shows the path that you will take through the panels during the tutorial for OMIT.




Figure 73. Overview of Panels Used for OMIT

Designing Your Job

DFSORT's OMIT Statement Data Entry panel is similar to the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel. Use it to specify records to be omitted from the input data set.

- 1. To display the OMIT Statement Data Entry panel, enter Y after the arrow next to OMIT on the Control Statements Selection (SORT) panel.
- 2. Press ENTER.

Omitting Records Using the OMIT Statement Data Entry Panel

Suppose that you want to sort, by title, all the books used for courses, but not those for general reading (not required for a particular course). An easy way to do this is to create an OMIT statement that excludes records that have a blank in the COURSE DEPARTMENT field.

To exclude the general reading books:

- 1. After POSITION 1, enter the location of the COURSE DEPARTMENT field, 110.
- 2. After LENGTH 1, enter the length of the COURSE DEPARTMENT field, 5.
- 3. After FORMAT 1, enter the data format code for character data, CH.
- 4. After COMPARISON, enter the code for equals, **EQ**.
- 5. After CONSTANT, specify a constant of blank characters with C' '.

Allowable Comparisons and Constants

When using INCLUDE and OMIT, you must follow certain standards for allowable comparisons and certain formats for writing constants. Valid comparison operators are:

EQ Equal to

NE Not equal to

GT Greater than

GE Greater than or equal to

LT Less than

LE Less than or equal to

The correct formats for constant strings are:

Decimal number format: [±]n

Character string format: C'xx...x'

Hexadecimal string format: X'xx...x'

See Appendix E, "Control Statements Selection Panel" on page 129 for a discussion of the comparison operators and constants you can use with INCLUDE and OMIT.

Allowable Comparisons and Constants

Chapter 5. Summing Values in Records

You can also sum values in records when sorting or merging. This chapter shows you:

- · How to sum numeric fields
- · What formats are allowed for summing
- · How to suppress records with duplicate control fields

You can sum one or more numeric fields whose records have the same (equal) control fields. You can sum numeric fields that are in binary, packed decimal, or zoned decimal format. The SUM statement can be used with SORT or MERGE, but not with COPY.

When you sum records, keep in mind that two types of fields are involved:

- Control fields, which you specify on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel
- · Summary fields, which you specify on the SUM Statement Data Entry panel

The contents of the summary fields are summed *only* when the contents of the control fields are equal.

Summing Values: Creating the SUM Statement

Suppose the English department wants to know the total price of books for all its courses. To do this, you must create, in order:

- A SORT statement that will sort the job by the DEPARTMENT field
- An INCLUDE statement for the department field to select only English department books (ENGL)
- · A SUM statement to total the price field

DFSORT processes the INCLUDE statement first, using it to narrow the job down to just the records with ENGL in the DEPARTMENT field. DFSORT then sorts those records as you specify (ascending or descending) and sums all records with equal control fields. DFSORT places the sum in the first record and deletes all other records with equal control fields. Because the INCLUDE statement selected only English department books for this job, DFSORT creates an output data set that includes a single record with the sum of all the English department books.

The following figure shows the path that you will take through the panels for this tutorial.

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


Figure 77. Overview of Panels Used for Summing

For a flowchart showing the order in which the INCLUDE, SUM, and SORT statements are processed, see *Getting Started*.

Designing Your Job

To sum the prices for the English department's books, start at the DFSORT Primary Option Menu panel, and select SORT by entering 1.

- On the first page of the SORT Entry Panel, enter the name of the input data set.
- 2. On the second page of the SORT Entry panel, enter the name of the output data set.
 - DFSORT displays SORT Statement Data Entry Panel shown in Figure 78 on page 79.
- 3. To sort the COURSE DEPARTMENT field, complete the panel as follows:
 - Enter the location and length of the COURSE DEPARTMENT field in the POSITION and LENGTH items on the panel.
 - Accept the defaults for the FORMAT and SORT ORDER fields (**CH** for character data and **A** for ascending order).

To sum the price:

- Accept the default value of 1 to SUMMARIZE RECORDS WITH DUPLICATE KEYS.
- 2. Under POSITION, type **170** for the byte position of the PRICE field.
- 3. Under LENGTH, type 4 for the length of the PRICE field.
- 4. Under FORMAT, type **BI** to specify binary data format.

When you run the job with these SORT, INCLUDE, and SUM statements, DFSORT sums the prices and places the sum in the PRICE field of one record (book), and deletes the other records (books). Figure 83 shows the results.

The record that will be kept is determined by a default set at installation time. This example assumes that the site default specifies that records with equal control fields appear in the order they are shown in the bookstore data set.

Notice that some fields in your summation record might not be meaningful, such as the book title field in Figure 83. As you learned in the last chapter, you can omit the fields that are not meaningful.

So Far

So far, this chapter explained how to sum a single value. Next, you learn how to create jobs with a result of two summary fields.

Designing a Job with Two Summary Fields

Assume that, for inventory purposes, you want to sum separately the number of books in stock and the number sold for each publisher.

1. Specify the PUBLISHER as the control field on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel.




Figure 84. The SORT Statement Data Entry Panel, Sorting by Publisher

2. Specify the NUMBER IN STOCK and NUMBER SOLD as summary fields on the SUM Statement Data Entry panel.

3. You do not want to use the INCLUDE statement, so if it is active type **N** over the **Y** to deactivate it.

When you run the job, DFSORT returns four records, each one showing the total number of books in stock and books sold for a single publisher.

Suppressing Records with Duplicate Control Fields

Apart from summing values, you can also use SUM to delete records with duplicate control fields.

For example, you might want to list the publishers in ascending order, but you want each publisher in the list to appear only once. If you used only the SORT statement, the publisher named COR would appear seven times in the list, FERN would appear four times, VALD five times, and WETH four times. This time:

1. Complete the SORT Statement Data Entry panel just as you did before to sort the records by publisher (see Figure 84 on page 83).

 Specify option 2 on the SUM Statement Data Entry panel. When you specify option 2, no sum fields will be used, and when you process the job, DFSORT eliminates records that have duplicate (equal) control fields, producing one record per publisher.




Figure 87. The SUM Statement Data Entry Panel, Deleting Records with Duplicate Control Fields

Handling Summation Overflow

When a sum becomes larger than the space available for it, overflow occurs; both *Getting Started* and the *Application Programming Guide* describe methods of preventing overflow. You may also wish to refer to "Preventing Overflow When Summing Values" on page 103 for additional information.

Chapter 6. Reformatting Records

With DFSORT Panels, you can reformat records that you sort, merge, or copy.

You can use INREC or OUTREC with SORT, COPY, or MERGE to:

- · Delete fields
- · Reorder fields
- Insert separators (blanks, zeros, or constants)

The difference between the two DFSORT control statements is that OUTREC reformats records *after* they are sorted, copied, or merged, whereas INREC reformats records *before* they are sorted, copied, or merged. This has an effect on other control statements. See "Creating Other Statements with INREC" on page 100 for information about how INREC affects other control statements.

INREC and OUTREC perform the same functions. When deciding which to use, remember their processing order. In general:

- If you are deleting fields, try to use INREC because shorter records take less time to sort, merge, or copy (INREC reformats the records before they are processed).
- If you are going to insert separators, use OUTREC because OUTREC inserts the separators into the records after they are processed.
- If you are reordering fields, it does not matter which control statement you use because reordering fields does not affect the record length.

Note: If you use OUTREC or INREC to change the record length (by deleting fields or inserting blanks), be sure that you allocate your output data set with the appropriate record length. See *Getting Started* or the *Application Programming Guide* for more details.

Reformatting Records Using the OUTREC Statement

The following figure shows the pathway you will take through the panels during the OUTREC tutorial.

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


Figure 89. Overview of Panels Used for OUTREC

Suppressing Unnecessary Fields

In the last chapter, one example output data set shows the sums, for each publisher, of the number of books in stock and the number of books sold year-to-date. The record for each publisher also contains the book title field, which, for this application, was meaningless.

Using the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel, you can delete fields you do not want to appear in the output data set, such as the book title field that appeared in the result of the last application. You can use OUTREC to shorten the record to include only the following fields:

- Publisher
- · Number of books in stock
- · Number of books sold

Doing this reduces the output record length to 12 bytes.

Start by displaying the DFSORT Primary Option Menu panel and selecting the SORT application.

- 1. On the SORT Entry panels, specify the input and output data set names.
- 2. To sort the records by publisher in ascending order, complete the SORT Statement Data Entry panel as shown in Figure 90.

Using the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel, you specify which fields from the input data set you want placed in the output data set. Any fields you do not specify on the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel are deleted.

Notice that each OUTREC field line actually takes up two physical lines on the screen starting with the in the line command field and ending with the SEPARATION field. To make the output data set consist of only the PUBLISHER, NUMBER IN STOCK, and NUMBER SOLD fields, specify the position and length of each of these fields under INPUT POSITION and INPUT LENGTH on OUTREC field lines 1, 2, and 3, respectively on the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel. Notice that you do **NOT** specify the data format on the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel.




Figure 94. OUTREC Panel, After You Fill It In

Because the NUMBER IN STOCK and NUMBER SOLD fields are next to each other in the input data set, you can specify them together as one field (they do not have to be the same data format).




Figure 95. OUTREC Statement Data Entry Panel, Specifying Two Fields Together

8. Fill out the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel to specify these two fields as one field, as shown in Figure 95 on page 92.




Figure 97. OUTREC Panel, Reordering the Fields

The fields always appear in the order that you specify them. If you want the NUMBER SOLD field to come before the NUMBER IN STOCK field, complete the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel as displayed in Figure 97 on page 93.

Inserting Binary Zeros

Assume that you want to reformat the records to include a new 4-byte binary field after the NUMBER IN STOCK field (beginning at byte 13). In this case, you can insert binary zeros as place holders for the new field (to be filled in with data at a later date).

To add a new 4-byte field of binary zeros field after the NUMBER IN STOCK field, enter **4Z** in the SEPARATION field of OUTREC field line 3 on the panel, where:

- 4 is the *length* of the separation field
- **Z** is the *type* of separation field. (Z is for binary zeros, and X is for blanks. You learn about this in the next section.)

You can insert binary zeros before, between, or after input fields or other separation fields.

Inserting Blanks

You can use the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel to separate fields with blanks or to create margins, improving the appearance of printed data sets.

For example, suppose you want to print just the PUBLISHER and BOOK TITLE fields, and you want the publishers' names to appear first. Most of the publishers' names fill up the entire 4-byte PUBLISHER field. If you do not separate the PUBLISHER and BOOK TITLE fields with blanks, the publishers' names will run into the titles. Also, without a margin, the publishers' names will begin at the edge of the paper.

The printout can be made more legible by separating the fields with 10 blanks and creating a left margin of 20 blanks.

To insert these blanks, complete the SORT Statement Data Entry panel to sort the records by book title in ascending order (see Figure 60 on page 63 for an example).

Note: If a separation field immediately follows an input field, the separation field can be specified on the same OUTREC field line as the input field. So for this example, you will use three OUTREC field lines for four fields.

On the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel:

- In the SEPARATION field on OUTREC field line 1, enter 20X to make the first field a 20-byte blank field.
- 2. Specify the PUBLISHER and BOOK TITLE fields on OUTREC field lines 2 and 3, respectively.
- 3. Insert spaces between the PUBLISHER and BOOK TITLE fields by entering 10X in the SEPARATION field on OUTREC field line 2, which already has POSITION=106 and LENGTH=4. This method of entering the separation field on the same OUTREC field line as the input field saves you space on the panel.

Inserting Constants

In addition to making a printout more legible, you can also use the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel to set up a report format by inserting character or hexadecimal constants. The formats for writing constants are shown below.

Character Strings

The format for writing a character string is:

C'x...x'

where *x* is an EBCDIC character. For example, C'FERN'.

The format for writing character string repetition is:

nC'x...x'

where n can be from 1 to 4095; n repetitions of the character string constant (C'x...x') are inserted into the reformatted input records. If n is omitted, 1 is used instead.

If you want to include a single apostrophe in the string, you must specify it as two single apostrophes. For example, *O'NEILL* must be specified as C'O''NEILL'.

Hexadecimal Strings

The format for writing a hexadecimal string is:

X'yy...yy'

where yy is a pair of hexadecimal digits. For example, X'7FB0'.

The format for writing hexadecimal string separation is:

nX'yy...yy'

where n can be from 1 to 4095. n repetitions of the hexadecimal string constant (X'yy...yy') are inserted in the reformatted input records. If n is omitted, 1 is used.

Suppose you want to produce an unsorted report of the publisher's names and author's names from the bookstore data set. You can use OUTREC to put in "Publisher is" and "Author is" as character separators. Since you want an unsorted report, you can use a Copy Application to produce it. Display the DFSORT Primary Option menu and enter a 2 to select a copy application. Then fill in the Copy Entry panel Pages 1 and 2 specifying SORT.SAMPIN as the input data set and SORT.SAMPOUT as the output data set. Select OUTREC on the Control Statements Selection (COPY) panel.

On the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel:

- Under OUTPUT COLUMN on OUTREC field line 1, enter 11 as the column you
 want your report to start in. Blanks are automatically inserted before this
 column in the report.
- 2. In the SEPARATION field on OUTREC field line 1, enter **C'Publisher is '**. This constant is printed starting at column 11.
- 3. Specify the PUBLISHER field on OUTREC field line 2 so that the publisher's name appears after the first character constant.
- 4. Under OUTPUT COLUMN on OUTREC field line 3, enter **31** as the column you want your report to continue in. Blanks are automatically inserted between the end of the publisher's name and the start of this column.
- 5. In the SEPARATION field on OUTREC field line 3, enter **C'Author is '**. This constant is printed starting at column 31.
- 6. Specify the AUTHOR'S FIRST NAME field on OUTREC field line 4 so that the first name appears after the second character constant.
- 7. In the SEPARATION field on OUTREC field line 4, enter **X** to insert a space between the author's first name and last name.
- 8. Enter **i** in the line command field of OUTREC field line 4 to create OUTREC field line 5. Then specify the AUTHOR'S LAST NAME field on OUTREC field line 5 so that the last name appears separated from the first name by a blank.

Reformatting Records Using the INREC Statement

To reformat data sets before they are sorted, copied, or merged, you complete information on the INREC Statement Data Entry panel. The INREC Statement Data Entry panel works the same as the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel.

The following figure shows the pathway through the panels for INREC. Notice that it is the same as the pathway taken for OUTREC.




Figure 105. Overview of Panels Used for INREC

Creating Other Statements with INREC

Use the same example discussed in "Reformatting Records Using the OUTREC Statement" on page 87. You want to reformat the data sets to include only the following fields in the output data set:

- Publisher
- Number of books in stock
- Number of books sold

Just as you did with OUTREC, you can delete all fields you do not want to appear in the result from the input data set by specifying on the INREC Statement Data Entry panel only those fields that you want to include.

To include only those fields listed above for the output data set, complete the INREC Statement Data Entry panel as shown in Figure 106.

Creating Other Statements with INREC

When you use OUTREC, the affected records are reformatted *after* being sorted or merged. Therefore, the SORT, MERGE, and SUM statements refer to the original positions of the records in the input data set.

Because the INREC control statement reformats the records *before* they are sorted or merged, the SORT, MERGE, and SUM statements must refer to the *reformatted* records rather than the original records.

In this example, DFSORT first processes the INREC statement and reformats the input records to be just 12 bytes long, containing only the three fields specified (see Figure 107).




Figure 108. Sorting by Publisher, Using the Reformatted Record Positions

The INREC statement is processed before SORT, MERGE, SUM, and OUTREC, but after INCLUDE and OMIT. Therefore, when you create an INREC statement, SORT, MERGE, SUM, and OUTREC must refer to the reformatted records, and INCLUDE and OMIT must refer to the original records. Figure 111 summarizes the control statements and the corresponding record positions to refer to when using INREC.

You can review the flowchart in Getting Started to see the order in which the DFSORT control statements are processed.

Preventing Overflow When Summing Values

In some cases, you can prevent overflow by using INREC to pad summary fields with zeros. However, you cannot use this method for negative fixed-point binary data, because padding with zeros rather than with ones changes the sign.

If the summary fields in the last example were overflowing, you could pad each of them on the *left* with four bytes (binary fields must be 2, 4, or 8 bytes long), as shown in Figure 112.




Figure 113. Padding Summary Fields Using INREC




Figure 114. Summing the New Fields

Use the SORT and MERGE Statement Free Form Entry panels to write your own control statements with the same coding conventions you use when writing a DFSORT application without the panels.

The panel contains 15 lines into which you can enter DFSORT control statements. DFSORT ignores any lines you leave blank. Sorting in ISMF Using SORTREC

If your site has Interactive Storage Management Facility (ISMF) installed as an option under ISPF, and DFSORT Panels is installed under ISMF, you can use the ISMF line operator SORTREC to do a quick and simple sort.

- 1. Select the ISMF Data Set Application option from the ISMF Primary Option Menu. The Data Set Selection Entry Panel will appear.
- 2. To get a complete listing of data sets cataloged under your TSO user ID:
 - Enter two asterisks (**) in the line requesting the name of your data set.
 - Select 2 GENERATE LIST FROM CATALOG.
 - Press ENTER (see Figure 120).

The format of the SORTREC Entry Panel differs somewhat depending on what type of input data set you are processing: a physical sequential data set, a member of a partitioned data set, or a VSAM data set. In this example, SORT.SAMPIN is a physical sequential data set.

4. To use the SORTREC Entry Panel (as seen in Figure 122 on page 110), in the OUTPUT DSN field specify the name of the output data set in which you want the sorted records to be placed. The OUTPUT DSN field might already be primed with the name of the last output data set you used.

The SORTREC line operator allows up to four sort control fields. You complete the sort control fields on the SORTREC Entry panel just as for the SORT Statement Data Entry panel; that is, by specifying the record position of the field you want to sort by, its length in bytes, a code for its data format, and whether you want it arranged in ascending or descending order.

Arranging the Records

DFSORT uses the information you enter on the SORT Statement Data Entry panel to build a SORT control statement. If the panel is not primed with values from a previous session, it shows four unused sort control fields.

You must enter the following information for at least one sort field to continue.

POSITION	The starting byte position of the field by which you are going sort (in relation to the beginning of the record).							
LENGTH	The le	The length, in bytes, of the field by which you are sorting.						
FORMAT	A code	e for the data format. The most common formats are:

The default for FORMAT is **CH**, the format code for character type.

SORT ORDER The sorting order (ascending or descending) in which you want your records arranged. The SORT ORDER default is A, the code for ascending order.

Sorting in ISMF Using SORTREC

To verify your input and perform the sort, press ENTER. Only foreground execution under TSO is available with the SORTREC line operator, so the job occupies your terminal until it completes.

Appendix A. Using the DFSORT Sample Data Sets

The DFSORT product tape includes a sample job, SAMPDATA, which creates the data sets SORT.SAMPIN and SORT.SAMPOUT. You can use these data sets in many of the panels examples in the tutorial chapters of this book, if you follow these steps using your own user ID wherever "userid" is indicated:

- 1. Make sure SORT.SAMPIN and SORT.SAMPOUT are available at your site.
- 2. Allocate userid.SORT.SAMPIN as a fixed-length data set with a record length of 173 bytes.
- 3. Copy SORT.SAMPIN to userid.SORT.SAMPIN.
- 4. Allocate userid.SORT.SAMPOUT as a fixed-length data set with a record length of 173 bytes.

Now, you can specify SORT.SAMPIN or SORT.SAMPOUT in DFSORT Panels and TSO will supply your userid.

Using the DFSORT Sample Data Sets

Appendix B. The Sample Bookstore Data Set

Assume that the data set is used at a college bookstore to keep information about the books it sells. Each horizontal line represents a record, and each column represents a record field. For the sake of illustration, the data set has only 20 records, each 173 bytes long. The data set has also been arranged with headings and numbers to show the byte postions of each field. Neither of these appear in the actual data set. The fields that are in binary format will not appear on your terminal as they do in this book. The methods used to arrange and present that data set as you see it here are explained in the chapters detailing the DFSORT functions.

The first nine fields of each record contain character data and the last three fields contain binary data (binary data is shown in its character representation). Note that because binary data cannot contain decimal points, the prices are shown in cents rather than dollars.

Blanks in the course field indicate that the book is not required for any class.

The sample file contained in this appendix is also on the back cover, as a foldout page.

Although you can write the statements in any order, DFSORT always processes the statements in the order shown below.




Figure 123. Processing Order of Control Statements




Figure 124. Map of the DFSORT Profile Panels




Figure 125 (Part 1 of 2). Map of the DFSORT SORT Panels




Figure 125 (Part 2 of 2). Map of the DFSORT SORT Panels




Figure 126 (Part 1 of 2). Map of the DFSORT COPY Panels




Figure 126 (Part 2 of 2). Map of the DFSORT COPY Panels




Figure 127 (Part 1 of 2). Map of the DFSORT MERGE Panels




Figure 127 (Part 2 of 2). Map of the DFSORT MERGE Panels

Appendix E. Control Statements Selection Panel

Examples of some commonly used DFSORT control statements are explained in Chapters 3 through 6. This appendix contains detailed reference information for all of the control statements you can specify using the Control Statements Selection Panel. You see the Control Statements Selection panel only if you entered **Y** on the VIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS SELECTION PANEL field on the second page of the SORT, COPY, or MERGE Entry Panel. Use the Control Statements Selection panel to select additional DFSORT control statements such as OPTION, INCLUDE, INREC, and SUM.

Activating Control Statements

Available control statements are listed on the left side of the panel, with their descriptions to the right. Only those control statements with "YES" in the column headed "ACTIVE" are activated for your job. Statements with "NO" in the column are not inserted into your job but can be activated by typing **Y** into the blank space to the right of the arrow. You deactivate control statements the same way by typing **N**. By turning control statements on or off, you create different applications using different combinations of statements. Deactivated statements are not erased between sessions and can be inserted into any application by reactivating them.

Figure 128 illustrates the Control Statements Selection (SORT) panel filled out to use the INCLUDE control statement without modification, to activate the SUM and INREC control statements for modification and use, to deactivate the MODS control statement, and to browse the control statements created by the General Statement Free Form Entry panel if you had previously entered information in it.

Editing Control Statements

Each control statement has one or more panels to direct the function of the statement in your application. When you press ENTER after specifying Y select codes on the Control Statements Selection panel, you see the panels for each statement you specified, one after the other. You can modify them or retain. If you do not modify them, they will be unchanged when retained. After you inspect all specified panels you return to the Control Statements Selection panel and can continue constructing your job.

Note: Control statement panels must have entries in the fields to remain activated. For example, if you delete all the entries on a panel and then exit with the END command (which saves the blank panel), DFSORT Panels deactivates the statement automatically.

You can also type **B** (BROWSE STATEMENT) instead of **Y** or **N** to display any statement as DFSORT Panels would create it based on the current settings of its control statement panel. Use this option for a quick look at the statement in final format to decide if you want to use or modify it.

Editing Control Statements

With DFSORT Panels, you can use control statements to perform the same operations on your data sets that you perform when you create and submit DFSORT jobs in non-panel mode. Each control statement has one or more data entry panels where you specify necessary parameters, relational conditions, or other values. You decide how you want the control statement to function, and the panels create the statement for you in correct format.

Press ENTER to verify your entries. Use END to save changes and go to the next control statement panel that you specified (or return to the Control Statements Selection panel if no further statements were selected).

If you decide not to use a particular control statement in your job after you are within the data entry panel, you can exit the panel with either the END or the CANCEL command. Exiting with END saves the changes you have made to the panel. Exiting with CANCEL erases any changes you have made. The END or the CANCEL commands take you either to the next data entry panel (if you selected any other control statements on the Control Statement Selection panel) or back to the Control Statements Selection panel. When you return to the Control Statements Selection panel, enter the N select code in the field next to any control statements that you decided not to use, and press ENTER to deactivate them.

You can use **REINIT** from the command line of a data entry panel to reinitialize all the pages with default entries or blanks in all the fields. Use REINIT to start over with all new entries.

The control statements in DFSORT Panels work the same way that they do in directly invoked DFSORT applications. See the Application Programming Guide for information on how control statements operate and which parameters are available to you in each of them. The following discussions explain only those features unique to using control statements in DFSORT Panels.

ALTSEQ Statement

The ALTSEQ statement lets you change the EBCDIC collating sequence for any control fields you specify with format AQ. If CHALT is in effect, your alternate collating sequence is also used for any control fields you specify with format CH. Your ALTSEQ statement overrides the default alternate collating sequence set during DFSORT installation at your site.

The two pages of the panel give you two different ways to define your alternate collating sequences. You can use either technique (or both) to indicate which EBCDIC characters to collate differently. The EBCDIC sequence is still used for any characters you do not change.

Use the ALTSEQ Statement Data Entry panel to set up your alternate sequence by entering one or more pairs of hexadecimal values which represent:

- · The original collating position for the EBCDIC character
- The new collating position for the EBCDIC character

For example, if you want @ (hexadecimal 7C) to collate after Z (hexadecimal E9), enter the following values and press **ENTER**:

The values are accepted and blanked out so that you can enter more values. @ now collates after Z.

If you next want # (hexadecimal 7B) to collate after @ (now at hexadecimal EA), type the following values and press **ENTER**:

The values are again accepted and blanked out so that you can enter more. @ now collates after Z, and # collates after @.

The ALTSEQ Code Table on the next page of the panel can show you all of the changes you made for your alternate sequence. You can also change the collating sequence directly from the table. The headings 0 through F for the rows and columns of the table correspond to the first and second hexadecimal digits, respectively, of the old EBCDIC characters. To change a collating position for any EBCDIC character, locate the blank corresponding to its first and second hexadecimal digits, and enter the new collating position in the blank.

The ALTSEQ Code Table displays the current alternate collating settings whenever you enter it.

For more information about the ALTSEQ statement, see the Application Programming Guide.

DEBUG Statement

Use the Debug Statement Data Entry panel to select various debugging options for your application. Normally, you do not need to use these options, but they might be useful when you try to isolate or bypass a problem in the DFSORT program. Use these options only if necessary as their use can degrade performance.

The Debug Statement Data Entry panels for SORT, COPY, and MERGE are similar, but only those options which are relevant to each application appear on the corresponding panels. To select a DEBUG option for inclusion in your job, enter an **S** in the corresponding field.

See the Application Programming Guide for detailed information about what these options do and when you might want to use them:

- BSAM
- BUFFERS
- EQUCOUNT
- NOASSIST

INCLUDE Statement

Use the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel to limit the records in your output data set to those for which a logical expression you specify is true. You can specify up to two relational conditions combined with a logical AND or OR operator to compare fields to fields or fields to constants. (You can also limit the records in your input data sets by omitting, instead of including, those records for which a logical expression is true. See the following section describing the OMIT statement.)

For a field-to-field comparison, describe the POSITION, LENGTH and FORMAT of the first and second control fields in the entry fields marked with a 1, and a 2, respectively. Remember that the Record Descriptor Word (RDW) occupies bytes 1-4 in variable-length records. Valid format codes are listed on the panel and are explained in the Application Programming Guide.

If you want to compare the first control field with a constant, instead of another control field, enter the constant in the CONSTANT field. The correct formats for constant strings are identical to those you use in non-panel mode.

See the Application Programming Guide for more information about constants and comparisons.

Note that if you specify a character constant string, you must ensure that you enter uppercase and lowercase characters appropriately between the quotation marks. DFSORT Panels passes text within the character constant string to the program exactly as you enter it on the panel; it cannot determine whether the case is correct.

On the second page of the panel, a second relational condition can be described in the same fashion as the first. Direct DFSORT to combine the two conditions into a single logical expression by specifying the AND or OR operator on the second page of the panel. If your expression requires more than two relational conditions,

use the General Statement Free Form Entry panel to specify your INCLUDE statement.

For more information about the INCLUDE statement, see the *Application Programming Guide*.

OMIT Statement

The OMIT statement, like the INCLUDE statement, is used to select the records for your output data set. With OMIT, you specify a logical expression that, if true, excludes a record from your output data set. The two pages of the OMIT Statement Data Entry panel work in the same way as the INCLUDE Statement Data Entry panel; see the discussion of that panel for details.

Use either the INCLUDE or the OMIT statement to filter your records, depending upon whichever is more convenient for you. You cannot specify both within the same job.

See the Application Programming Guide for more information about using OMIT.

INREC and OUTREC Statements

The panels you use to create INREC and OUTREC control statements are similar, and you specify information in the fields in similar ways.

Use the INREC Statement Data Entry panel to reformat records prior to further processing during DFSORT processing. You can delete or reorder fields and insert blanks, zeros, character strings, or hexadecimal strings. DFSORT processes the INREC statement before SORT, COPY, MERGE, SUM, OUTREC, and the E35 user exit, but after INCLUDE, OMIT, and the E15 user exit. When using INREC, remember that SORT, COPY, MERGE, SUM, OUTREC and the E35 user exit always refer to the positions and lengths of *reformatted* records. INCLUDE, OMIT, and the E15 user exit refer to the *original* records.

Use the OUTREC Statement Data Entry panel to reformat records after all other processing but before the records are written. You construct the OUTREC statement from the panel in the same way that you construct the INREC statement. As with INREC, you can delete or reorder fields and insert blanks, zeros or strings. You can use INREC and OUTREC statements in the same job to reformat records both before and after other processing.

Both the INREC and OUTREC Statement Data Entry panels initially contain four unused fields, but you can work with up to 100 by adding fields with line commands (see Figure 29 on page 34).

Each INREC or OUTREC field can be used to supply two related types of information. *Input fields* describe the position and length of the fields in the input record to be placed in the reformatted record. Input fields are placed contiguously in the reformatted record unless you use *output separators* to change that. You can specify a particular output column or output boundary for the input field or insert blanks, zeros or strings before, between, or after input fields.

Use the OUTPUT COLUMN field to indicate the column in which you would like your input field or separation field to start, relative to the start of the reformatted input record. Valid OUTPUT COLUMN values are 1 to 32000.

Editing Control Statements

Type the position of the first byte of your first input field (the first position in the record is byte 1) into the INPUT POSITION field and its length in bytes into the INPUT LENGTH field. For variable-length records, the first input field must consist of or include the Record Descriptor Word (RDW) in bytes 1-4.

If you want to alter the alignment of the input fields within your reformatted records, you can do so with the OUTPUT BOUNDARY field on the panel.

The OUTPUT BOUNDARY values you can use are **H** (Halfword aligned), **F** (Fullword aligned), and **D** (Doubleword aligned). If you specify an output boundary value for an input field, you must also specify the position and length.

SEPARATION fields specify where blanks, binary zeros, or strings are to be placed in the reformatted record. Separation fields can be placed before, between, or after input fields or other separation fields. Valid separators are nX, nZ, nX'string', or nC'string'. n can range from 1 to 4095.

For variable-length records:

- Separation fields cannot come before the first input field (the Record Descriptor Word) in bytes 1-4.
- Separation fields cannot come after the last input field if the length is omitted (that is, if the last field is for the variable part of the record).

A SEPARATION field can be specified without also specifying values in the INPUT POSITION, INPUT LENGTH, or OUTPUT BOUNDARY fields.

You can save time by using line commands to add, delete, or rearrange entries in the INREC or OUTREC panels. The line commands in the INREC and OUTREC panels work in the same way as those in the SORT and MERGE Statement Data Entry panels (see Figure 29 on page 34).

Because processing is quicker with shorter records, you can save time if you use INREC to delete fields and OUTREC to insert blanks or zeros. Rearranging the order of fields does not change total record length, so neither statement gives you slower processing after reordering fields. Both statements have these functions so that you can choose whichever is more convenient for you.

If processing time is not an issue, you can simplify working with your control fields by editing your records with OUTREC. Using OUTREC lets you specify positions and lengths in other control fields as they appear in your input data sets, while INREC requires that you specify positions and lengths in some of the other control statements as they appear in the reformatted records. However, INREC can improve performance when you use it to make your records significantly shorter.

For more detailed information about the INREC and OUTREC statements, see the Application Programming Guide.

MODS Statement

Use the MODS Statement Data Entry panel to direct DFSORT calls to user exit routines which you supply. The MODS panel lets you specify:

- · Which exit routines to call
- Where the exit routines are located
- · Approximately how much main storage each routine uses

Whether certain exit routines are written in COBOL

The panel lists the exits you can use. Not all exits apply to all applications, so the list differs depending upon whether you want to sort, copy, or merge data sets. See the *Application Programming Guide* for complete details about each of these exits as well as restrictions that apply to the MODS statement.

When you want DFSORT to call an exit routine, type the 1- to 8-character member name of that routine in the appropriate MEMBER NAME field. For example, if you link-edit an E31 routine into 'SYSTEM1.EXITS(SPOPEN)' and an E35 routine into 'SYSTEM2.EXITS(ADDZIP)', the E31 and E35 member names would be SPOPEN and ADDZIP, respectively.

You can use any valid operating system name for a routine. You can also keep several alternative routines with different names in the same library (for example, E35A, and E35B) and select the one that you want to call for a given application by its name.

When you enter an exit routine in the MEMBER NAME field, you must also specify values in the corresponding MAIN STORAGE, SEARCH EXIT ROUTINE LIBRARY and COBOL ROUTINE fields.

Enter the approximate amount of bytes of main storage that the routine requires in the corresponding MAIN STORAGE field. The value that you specify must be the approximate sum of:

- · The storage required for the load module of the routine
- The storage that the routine obtains using system services such as GETMAIN and OPEN
- The storage required to load the COBOL library routine (if the routine is written in COBOL)

Use the SEARCH EXIT ROUTINE LIBRARY field to tell DFSORT which libraries to search for the exit routine you entered in the corresponding MEMBER NAME field. If you would like the libraries specified in the EXIT DSN fields to be searched for the exit routine specified in the MEMBER NAME field, enter **Y** in the SEARCH EXIT ROUTINE LIBRARY field. DFSORT searches the EXIT DSN 1 library first, the EXIT DSN 2 library second, and so on.

If you would like DFSORT to search the libraries identified by the STEPLIB DD statement, JOBLIB DD statement (if there is no STEPLIB DD statement), or the link library, respectively, then enter $\bf N$ in the SEARCH EXIT ROUTINE LIBRARY field.

If you specify an E15 or E35 user exit routine, indicate whether or not your routine is written in COBOL by typing **Y** or **N**, respectively, in the COBOL ROUTINE field.

Enter the names of the libraries (that is, the partitioned data sets containing the exit routines) in the EXIT DSN fields. You can use from one to eight library names for sorting and from one to four data set names for merging and copying, but you must specify a library name in one of the EXIT DSN fields if any SEARCH EXIT ROUTINE LIBRARY field is set to **Y** with a corresponding member name specified. If the same library contains two or more members, you need to specify the library name only once. Note that the order in which you specify library names in the EXIT DSN fields

Editing Control Statements

determines the search order used to locate them. DFSORT ignores any blank EXIT DSN fields.

Use the VERIFY EXIT DSN field to check that your library names are valid. If you enter a Y in the field, you will receive an error message on the panel when you press ENTER if any of the library names you specified are invalid. Type N to suppress validation messages. Incorrect syntax in your library names always results in an error message no matter what the VERIFY EXIT DSN setting is.

If you know that your library names are invalid (as when you construct and save a job prior to allocating the libraries to which it refers), the VERIFY EXIT DSN field must be set to **N** to continue. You cannot submit the job from the panels this way, but you can save it in a data set for later use. This way you can construct and save jobs that you can edit for use on systems in which your libraries are cataloged.

For more information about the MODS control statement, see the Application Programming Guide.

OPTION Statement

Use the OPTION Statement Data Entry panel to select various DFSORT program options for your application. Only the options relevant to a particular sort, copy, or merge application appear on the corresponding OPTION panel, so some of the following options might not apply to a given task. In general, these options let you override DFSORT defaults set during installation by your system programmers, and to request optional information for your application. What you type into the entry fields depends upon the particular option. You might specify Y or N, a number, or simply **S** to activate a selection. The necessary values are listed opposite the option entry field.

For more information about the Option control statement, see the Application Programming Guide.

RECORD Statement

To process your records, DFSORT must work with their format and length. Under certain conditions, this information is unavailable to the program from the system control blocks and must be supplied from the Record Statement Data Entry panel. The panels for SORT, COPY, and MERGE applications are basically similar and are not discussed separately here. Because MERGE applications do not use the E15 user exit routine, references to that exit do not apply to the Record Statement Data Entry (MERGE) panel.

You must specify record type when:

- You work with VSAM input and VSAM output data sets.
- You use an E15 user exit to provide all of your input records.
- The system has no record type information about your input data sets.

Indicate your record type in the RECORD TYPE field:

- F Fixed-length records
- Variable-length records
- D ISCII/ASCII variable-length records

You must specify maximum input record length when:

- You use an E15 routine to provide all your input records.
- The system has no record length information about your input data sets.

Indicate the length in the RECORD LENGTH L1 field. For variable-length records, the L1 value you enter must be at least as large as the length of your longest input record.

If you use an E15 user exit routine that changes your input record length (for example, to eliminate fields within your input records), you must indicate the *maximum record length after invoking the E15*. Enter the number in the RECORD LENGTH L2 field. For variable-length records, the L2 value that you enter must be at least as large as the length of the longest record you pass to DFSORT from your exit routine.

You must specify *output record length* when it differs from your input record length, *and* the system has no record length information about your output data set. Enter your output record length in the RECORD LENGTH L3 field. For variable-length records, the L3 value that you enter must be at least as large as the length of your longest output record.

For more information about the RECORD statement, see the *Application Programming Guide*.

SUM Statement

Use the SUM Statement Data Entry panel to handle processing of input records with equal control fields; that is, those records with duplicate keys. With SUM, you choose to keep only one record from a group of input records with duplicate keys. You can also choose whether to sum one or more numeric fields from those records. (Select EQUALS on the OPTION Statement Data Entry panel to direct DFSORT to retain the *first* record with each unique control field. See the *Application Programming Guide* for details on EQUALS).

To retain only one input record from the set and sum numeric fields, select **1** (SUM-MARIZE RECORDS WITH DUPLICATE KEYS) in the SELECT ONE OF THE FOLLOWING field. If you choose this option, you must also indicate which of the numeric fields (the *summary fields*) you want to sum.

To retain only one input record from the set without summing any numeric fields, specify 2 (ELIMINATE RECORDS WITH DUPLICATE KEYS) in the same entry field. If you choose this option, you do not need to enter further information on the panel. Any existing summary fields on the panel are saved but otherwise ignored.

The other entry fields on the panel let you describe which numeric summary fields to sum during DFSORT processing. The panel initially displays four unused summary fields but you can work with up to 100 by adding fields with line commands. See Figure 29 on page 34 for an explanation of the line commands you can use. Type the position of the first byte of each summary field (the first position in the record is byte 1) into the POSITION field, and the length in bytes into the LENGTH field. Indicate the data format in the FORMAT field. Remember that the RDW occupies bytes 1-4 in variable-length records. Valid format codes are explained in the *Application Programming Guide*. Summary fields can be located anywhere within the first 4092 bytes of your input records as long as they do not overlap control fields, other summary fields, or the RDW.

For more information about the SUM statement, see the Application Programming Guide.

General Free Form Statement

Use the General Statement Free Form Entry panel to insert complete DFSORT program control statements into your job. The General Free Form panel works like the SORT and MERGE Statement Free Form panels. You can enter up to 30 lines containing DFSORT control statements. Specify a comment statement by typing an asterisk (*) in column 1. Blank lines are ignored, but any entries you make on the Free Form panel are passed to DFSORT exactly as you type them. Free form entries are *not* verified automatically, so you must use correct syntax.

If you enter a control statement (for example, INCLUDE) in the General Statement Free Form Entry panel and also use the corresponding data entry panel for that statement, both statements are passed to DFSORT. However, because DFSORT Panels places the free form statement before the data entry statement, DFSORT ignores the data entry statement as a duplicate.

Note: You can use the General Statement Free Form Entry panel to insert non-DFSORT control statements to be processed through DFSORT's Extended Function Support interface. See the Application Programming Guide for details.

Your Work.Inspecting Your Work: Review Control Statements Panel

After you enter all required information describing your DFSORT sort, copy, or merge application, you can inspect the completed program control statements before saving or submitting the job. You see only the Review Control Statements panel if you specified Y in the REVIEW CONTROL STATEMENTS BEFORE EXE-CUTION field on the second page of the SORT, COPY, or MERGE Entry Panel. The panel displays all active control statements as they would be passed to DFSORT.




Figure 129. Review Control Statements Panel

Use the Review Control Statements panel (see Figure 129 on page 139) to check whether you activated the correct control statements and that they are appropriate for your application. If you used free form entry to write some or all of the control statements for your job, you can check them here for errors and proper syntax. Any program control statements created using DFSORT control statements entry panels are already in correct format and syntax. Free form entries are not verified automatically.

If the statements are incorrect or are not appropriate to your task, use the END command one or more times to return to earlier panels that you can use to alter them. Activate or deactivate control statements by using the Control Statements Selection panel; modify control statements by using the control statement data entry panels.

If you are satisfied with the way your statements appear, press **ENTER** to continue. If you specified foreground processing for the job, DFSORT Panels processes your job under TSO. If you specified background processing, DFSORT Panels takes you on to the panels from which you can submit the job or save the application in a data set for future use.

The DFSORT Panels can generate DFSORT control statements and options in two different formats: compact or expanded. See the *Application Programming Guide* for more information.

Inspecting

Appendix F. Setting Up or Changing Your Profile

The information that DFSORT stores in your User Profile controls the processing of jobs you have built with DFSORT Panels. You can change:

- Logging and abend control
- · Job statement information
- DFSORT execute statement information
- DFSORT control

To set up your profile or change it, select the DFSORT PROFILE option on the DFSORT Primary Option Menu. DFSORT displays the DFSORT Profile Option Menu, shown in Figure 130. You can also go to the Profile Option Menu by using the **PROFILE** command on any DFSORT functional panel.

The four options on the Profile Option Menu each display a panel where you can specify or change information in your user profile.

Note: If you have DFSORT Panels installed under ISMF, an interface exists between the ISMF and DFSORT profiles so that if you make changes to the logging/abend control or job statement variables in the DFSORT profile you will also make the same changes in the ISMF profile, and vice versa.

Logging and ABEND Control

Choose this option to go to the Logging/ABEND Control Entry Panel, where you can set up or change values that control standard log information that DFSORT will keep track of (see Figure 131 on page 142). You can:

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 Specify whether to log inter-module trace data, which gives you a record for every module that executes.

Enter Y after LOG INTER-MODULE TRACE to record the trace data in the ISPF log data set. If you specify N, the trace data is not logged. For better performance of DFSORT Panels, set this field to the default of N.

 Determine how DFSORT responds to abnormal termination (ABEND) conditions, and whether a DFSORT Panels dump from the time of failure should be placed in the ISPF log.

Enter Y after RECOVER FROM ABENDS to direct DFSORT Panels to attempt recovery from DFSORT Panels abends, and to record the results of a DFSORT Panels dump in the ISPF log data set. Specify N if you want DFSORT Panels to cancel an operation without a DFSORT Panels dump when an abend occurs.

To save your changes, press ENTER, and to exit the panel, use the END command. If you use **END** without first pressing **ENTER**, your User Profile is not changed.

Job Statement Information

DFSORT uses the JOB statements stored in your User Profile to prime the Job Submission Entry Panel each time you choose background execution of your job. When you see the Job Submission Entry Panel in the course of submitting your job in background, you can either accept the JOB statements as they are (taken from your profile), or change them.

To set up or change the JOB statements in your User Profile, select the JOB STATEMENT INFORMATION option (2) on the DFSORT Profile Option Menu. DFSORT then displays the Job Statement Entry Panel.

Use this panel to specify up to seven lines of JCL to be added to the beginning of background jobs that you submit or save. If you are not familiar with JCL, you might want to have someone in the information center at your site alter your profile for you.

To save your changes, press **ENTER**, and to exit the panel, use the **END** command. If you use **END** without first pressing **ENTER**, your User Profile is not changed.

DFSORT Execute Statement Information

DFSORT uses the EXECUTE statement stored in your profile to prime the DFSORT Execute Statement Entry Panel. Again, as you submit a background execution job, you can choose to accept the EXECUTE statement as specified in your profile, or change it. You must enter a **Y** in the VIEW OR CHANGE EXECUTE STATEMENTS FROM PROFILE field on the Job Submission Entry Panel to change the EXECUTE statement.

To set up or change the EXECUTE statement in your User Profile, select the DFSORT EXECUTE STATEMENT INFORMATION option (3) on the DFSORT Profile Option Menu. DFSORT then displays the DFSORT Execute Statement Data Entry Panel.

Use this panel to specify up to 10 lines of JCL for background jobs. You can add parameters to the EXEC statement and additional related JCL statements. Again, if you are not familiar with JCL, you might want to have someone alter your profile for you. Then, for most standard sort, merge, or copy jobs, you can just accept the statements and run your job.

To save your changes, press ENTER, and to exit the panel, use the END command. If you use END without first pressing ENTER, your User Profile is not changed.

DFSORT Control

The DFSORT CONTROL option on the DFSORT Profile Menu displays the DFSORT Control Entry panel.

Leave the ISSUE DFSORT DIAGNOSTIC MESSAGES field set to the default value of ${\bf N}$ if you do not want DFSORT to issue diagnostic messages. Enter ${\bf Y}$ in this field if you want DFSORT to issue diagnostic messages.

Leave the CONVERT FREE FORM ENTRY TO UPPERCASE field set to the default value of \mathbf{Y} if you want lowercase input to be changed to uppercase input on free form entry panels. Enter \mathbf{N} in this field if you do not want lowercase input to be changed to uppercase input on free form entry panels.

Leave the GENERATE CONTROL STATEMENTS IN EXPANDED FORMAT field set to the default value of ${\bf N}$ if you want the DFSORT panels to code control statements in as few lines as possible. Enter ${\bf Y}$ in this field if you want the DFSORT panels to code control statements in an easy to read and edit format using as many lines as necessary.

You must press **ENTER** to save your changes, and use **END** to exit the panel. If you use **END** without first pressing **ENTER**, your User Profile is not changed.

Exiting from the Profile

After specifying or changing the items through the DFSORT Profile Option Menu panel, select X EXIT, RETURN TO DFSORT PRIMARY OPTION MENU, to exit your profile. To permanently save your changes to the profile, you must successfully exit from the DFSORT Primary Option Menu. If your session terminates abnormally before you exit, your changes might be lost.

Note: If you have DFSORT Panels installed under ISMF, an interface exists between the ISMF and DFSORT profiles so that changes you make to the logging/abend control or job statement variables in the DFSORT profile are also made to the ISMF profile, and vice versa.

Exiting from the Profile

Appendix G. Customizing DFSORT Panels with the User-Defined Panels Interface

DFSORT Panels is delivered with a complete set of interactive panels that help you build a DFSORT job. With the User-Defined Panels Interface (UDPI), you can add to and replace the original panels with your own customized versions. You can customize the control statement selection panels to access different combinations of DFSORT and user-defined control statements and create data entry panels that collect information for your user-defined control statements. You can even create special control statements that need no data entry panels or routines.

For example, you might create specialized SORT and MERGE control statements with user-defined data types or user-defined collating sequences by replacing the existing SORT and MERGE Statement Data Entry panels with new user-defined panels.

As your needs change, you can continue to modify the interface to work most efficiently for you.

Getting Ready to Customize DFSORT Panels

Before you modify any panels, you should be thoroughly familiar with DFSORT and DFSORT Panels. Because two UDPI tools — data entry routines and statement coder routines — are ISPF functions that you must write yourself, you must be thoroughly acquainted with ISPF and its dialog management services. For information on ISPF dialogs and the ISPF SELECT service, see the *ISPF Dialog Management Guide*.

You might also want to review the previous chapters on using DFSORT Panels.

Before attempting to work with the User-Defined Panels Interface, you should read this chapter thoroughly and try out the examples described in "A Sample Customized DFSORT Application" on page 167.

Some Important Precautions

DFSORT Panels consists of several ISPF libraries (such as the ISPPLIB panel definition library and the ISPMLIB message definition library) and one CLIST procedure library (SYSPROC). The best way to make and test additions or changes to a DFSORT Panels library is to copy the member you want to add or modify into a personal library. Add your library to the beginning of the existing concatenation that you or your site uses. This ensures that you can safely make changes without affecting the other libraries in the concatenation.

After you have tested your changes, redo the concatenation to make the added or modified part available to a larger group of people, such as a single department. Note any changes in the comment section at the beginning of the modified member.

Do not delete or rename any of the parts of DFSORT. Deleting or renaming a part could severely affect the way DFSORT works, and can cause errors or cause DFSORT to fail.

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Overview: UDPI

Before you change anything you should make a backup copy of DFSORT. Keep this unmodified version of the product for diagnostic purposes. IBM support and maintenance is provided for only the unmodified version of DFSORT.

Restrictions to Customizing

DFSORT is copyrighted. Under the IBM licensing agreement, you may modify DFSORT for your own use. You may not modify it for commercial resale.

A User-Defined Panels Interface Overview

This section is a brief look at the structure of a DFSORT Panels application. All DFSORT Panels applications, whether standard or customized (user-defined), are based on a sort, merge, or copy. Each application takes you through a series of screens:

- 1. **DFSORT Primary Option Menu**, where you choose which application you wish to perform.
- 2. A SORT/MERGE/COPY Entry Panel where you specify the input data set name(s), the output data set name, and a number of processing options.
- 3. A SORT/MERGE Statement Data Entry Panel, where you specify selection criteria.
- 4. A Control Statements Selection (SORT/MERGE/COPY) Panel, where you choose additional DFSORT control statements. For each control statement you select, there is a corresponding panel where you specify processing criteria.
- 5. Review and Processing screens.

With UDPI, you can customize:

- The DFSORT Primary Option Menu by adding new applications or revising existing ones.
- The SORT/MERGE Statement Data Entry Panel to fit the needs of your new or revised applications.
- The Control Statements Selection (SORT/MERGE/COPY) Panel by adding new control statements or revising existing ones.
- Individual control statements by providing them with new functions of your own design,

using these four tools:

- The ICESPRIM definition of the DFSORT Primary Option Menu
- The internal profile panel definition (IPPD), which controls the SORT/MERGE/COPY Entry Panels and the Control Statements Selection (SORT/MERGE/COPY) panels
- Data entry routines, which collect user data for control statements (regular or user-defined)
- · Statement coder routines, which generate the control statements that are passed to DFSORT at run time.

It is especially important to understand the relationship between the data entry and statement coder routines, both of which you must provide to make any new or revised panels work correctly with DFSORT. The data entry routine displays

panels that collect control statement information, and the statement coder routine retrieves that information and codes control statements appropriately. Both routines use ISPF services.

You may also need to supply an Extended Function Support (EFS) program to allow your user-defined control statements to be processed by the DFSORT program. See the Extended Function Support chapter in the *Application Programming Guide* for details on EFS programs.

The following sections explain each of these tools in detail.

Customizing the DFSORT Primary Option Menu




Figure 135. Sample User-Defined DFSORT Primary Option Menu (ICESPRIM)

The first step in creating a new application is to alter the DFSORT Primary Option Menu to invoke the panels you create for your application. As an example, if you added User Sort, User Copy, and User Merge to the DFSORT Primary Option Menu (ICESPRIM), the Primary Option Menu could look as shown in Figure 135.

To create the Primary Option Menu shown above, you alter the ICESPRIM panel definition as shown in Figure 136 on page 150.

See the "Menus" section in the *ISPF Dialog Management Guide* for a detailed description of selection panels such as the DFSORT Primary Option Menu.

DFSORT can display screens with a maximum of 24 lines (due to limitations in ISPF/ISMF). So, even if you use terminals that can display larger panels, you should be careful not to increase the number of lines in the)BODY section beyond 24. If the)BODY section is larger than 24 lines, the panel display will fail.

The PARM keyword must have the following format:

```
PARM(&GDRBPARM.<internal profile panel id>.)

The <internal profile panel id> must be an eight-character string. It is the name of the internal profile panel definition (IPPD) of the new application. If the name is fewer than eight characters, pad the name with blanks on the right, followed by a period. You can define up to six DFSORT Panels applications. The NEWAPPL keyword in the selection strings must have a value of ICE1, ICE2, ICE3, ICE4, ICE5, or ICE6. Each selection string must have a unique NEWAPPL value—for example, ICE1 can be used in only one selection string.

Customizing the Entry and Control Statements Panels with IPPD

In DFSORT Panels, there are three main applications: sort, merge, and copy. All control statements — whether they are standard DFSORT applications or your own user-defined applications — are built with one of these three main applications, to which the individual control statements are added. These three applications are built from an internal profile panel definition (IPPD), a file of control information that tells DFSORT what is in the application. When a DFSORT Panels' user selects an application from the DFSORT Primary Option Menu, DFSORT Panels processes the information in the IPPD to display the appropriate Entry Panel and Control Statements Selection panel. The IPPD also controls:

- The number of active pages of the Control Statements Selection panel
- The additional control statements (up to 36) available through the Control Statements Selection panel

It is important to note that, although the Control Statements Selection panel is defined by the IPPD and thus has no displayable panel definition, the panels for each individual control statement have separate, displayable panel definitions.

For your user-defined panels, you may be creating new applications that need new IPPDs, or you may only need to change the current IPPDs to call the new individual panel definitions for new control statements.

A Sample Sort Application IPPD

The regular sort, copy, and merge applications use the ICEPSORT, ICEPCOPY, and ICEPMERG IPPDs, respectively. Figure 137 shows the ICEPSORT IPPD.

The &APPLCODE and &CSSPAGES Variables

The **&APPLCODE** variable contains a one-character code defining the type of application (sort, copy, or merge). Use one of the following codes:

- **S** Sort application (regular or user-defined)
- **C** Copy application (regular or user-defined)
- M Merge application (regular or user-defined)

These codes are required for both regular and user-defined applications. The default for &APPLCODE is S for sort applications.

The &CSSPAGES variable indicates the number of pages of the Control Statements Selection panel you will see for your application. &CSSPAGES can be set to 0, 1, 2, or 3. If &CSSPAGES is set to zero, the Control Statements Selection panel will not be displayed for the application.

If &CSSPAGES is not specified, it defaults to 1. The Control Statements Selection panel and &CSSPAGES are further described in "How IPPD Affects Control Statements Selection Panels" on page 157.

The &STxx Variables

In the following descriptions of the variables in the internal profile panel definition, &STxx refers to a set of:

- One &STxxTYPE variable
- One &STxxVERB variable
- One &STxxDESC variable
- One &STxxNMBR variable
- One &STxxDEPM variable
- One &STxxSCPM variable

The xx can be MC or any number from 1 to 36. The MC in &STMCTYPE indicates that the set of variables define the main control statement. These variables are explained in "How IPPD Information Affects Control Statements" on page 156.

The **&STxxTYPE** variable is a one-character code indicating the type of control statement assigned to the **&STxx** set. The code must be one of the following:

- R Regular control statement. The statement is a standard DFSORT control statement (SORT, MERGE, OPTION, INCLUDE, OMIT, SUM, INREC, OUTREC, ALTSEQ, MODS, RECORD, or DEBUG) or represents the General Statement Free Form Entry panel (FREEFORM).
- **U** User-defined control statement. The statement is defined by the user and is processed by the Extended Function Support program supplied by the user.
- **N** Not defined/unused. When &STxxTYPE is set to N, the area reserved for that &STxx set in the Control Statements Selection Panel will be left blank.

If &STxxTYPE is not specified, &STxxTYPE defaults to N.

The **&STxxVERB** variable contains the verb of the control statement. The valid statement verbs are:

• For regular DFSORT control statements (&STxxTYPE is set to R), &STxxVERB must be one of the following verbs:

SORT	MERGE	OPTION	OPTIONCP	INCLUDE
OMIT	SUM	INREC	OUTREC	ALTSEQ
MODS	RECORD	DEBUG	FREEFORM	

FREEFORM represents the General Statement Free Form Entry panel. SORT, MERGE, and OPTIONCP can be assigned only to &STMCVERB as main control statement verbs, while the other verbs can be assigned only to &STyyTYPE, where yy is 01 to 36.

 For user-defined control statements (&STxxTYPE is set to U), &STxxVERB can be any 1-to-8 character verb that can be used with EFS. You must use EBCDIC characters.

&STxxVERB is ignored (and so, normally set to &Z for null) when &STxxTYPE is set to N.

The **&STxxDESC** variable can contain up to 49 characters of a string briefly describing the purpose/function of the control statement. You can use EBCDIC or double-byte character set (DBCS) characters. The **&STxxDESC** string is the line of text that will appear on the right-hand side of the Control Statements Selection Panel, across from the control statement verb.

&STxxDESC is ignored (and so, normally set to &Z for null) when &STxxTYPE is set to N.

The **&STxxNMBR** variable applies only to user-defined control statements. It contains a unique number between 1 and 100. This number is used to permanently assign an internal set of one data indicator and one activity indicator (there are 100 such sets) to the user-defined control statement.

The data indicator tells DFSORT Panels if the user-defined statement has sufficient data saved through its data entry panel to code a complete statement for processing by EFS (if applicable). The activity indicator tells DFSORT Panels if the statement is active and controls the YES/NO setting of the ACTIVE column on the Control Statements Selection panel.

The number assigned to &STxxNMBR for the specific user-defined statement verb should not be changed if the statement is later switched to another &STxx set. For example, suppose you set &ST05VERB to the user-defined statement verb 'REPORT' and set &ST05NMBR to 34. If you later decide to relocate the 'REPORT' verb to &ST24VERB, then &ST24NMBR should be set to 34, which is the old &ST05NMBR value. &ST05NMBR should no longer be set to 34.

&STxxNMBR is ignored (and so, normally set to &Z for zero) when &STxxTYPE is set to R or N. If &STxxNMBR is not specified, it defaults to zero. No two &STxxNMBR variables, when used for user-defined control statements, can have the same value. &STxxNMBR is not applicable to the main control statement of the application.

The **&STxxDEPM** variable, applicable only to user-defined control statements, contains the ISPF SELECT service parameters necessary to invoke the Data Entry function you wrote to go with your control statement. The string assigned to &STxxDEPM can be up to 50 characters long. The string, if non-blank, is passed as a buffer to the ISPF SELECT service when needed.

If &STxxDEPM is set to &Z or blanks for a user-defined control statement, DFSORT Panels assumes that the user-defined control statement does not require a data entry panel. No ISPF SELECT service call for a data entry routine is attempted in this case. DFSORT Panels simply sets the statement's activity indicator to YES (see &STxxNMBR variable description).

&STxxDEPM is ignored (and so, normally set to &Z for null) when &STxxTYPE is set to R or N. See "Invoking Your Data Entry Routine" on page 161 for further details on &STxxDEPM.

The **&STxxSCPM** variable, applicable only to user-defined control statements, contains the ISPF SELECT service parameters necessary to invoke the statement coder function you wrote to go with your control statement. The string assigned to &STxxSCPM can be up to 50 characters long. The string, if non-blank, is passed as a buffer to the ISPF SELECT service when needed.

If &STxxSCPM is set to &Z or blanks for a user-defined control statement, DFSORT Panels automatically codes the control statement using only the control statement verb defined by &STxxVERB, and no ISPF SELECT service call for a Statement Coder routine is attempted.

&STxxSCPM is ignored (and so, normally set to &Z for null) when &STxxTYPE is set to R or N. See "Invoking Your Statement Coder Routine" on page 164 for further details on &STxxSCPM.

How IPPD Information Affects Control Statements

The &STMCTYPE, &STMCVERB, &STMCDEPM, and &STMCSCPM variables define the main control statement of the application and, if applicable, the associated data entry panel. As mentioned previously, the MC stands for main control.

The data entry panel for the regular SORT control statement is the SORT Statement Data Entry panel, while the regular MERGE control statement uses the MERGE Statement Data Entry panel. For the regular Copy Application, 'OPTIONCP' is assigned to &STMCVERB, to indicate that the 'OPTION COPY' control statement should be automatically coded if the regular OPTION control statement is not active.

If a user-supplied data entry panel is to replace the regular SORT/MERGE Statement Data Entry panel, &STMCTYPE can be set to 'U' and &STMCVERB (which can still be SORT or MERGE), &STMCDEPM, and &STMCSCPM can be set to the appropriate values for your application.

For the Copy Application, if the 'OPTION COPY' statement is to be replaced by a user-defined statement, code &STMCTYPE, &STMCVERB, &STMCDEPM, and &STMCSCPM appropriately for your application.

If no main control statement is to be provided, set &STMCTYPE to 'N'. For sort/merge applications, the SORT/MERGE Statement Free Form Entry panel will still be accessible, but the SORT/MERGE Statement Data Entry panel will not be displayed.

How IPPD Affects Control Statements Selection Panels

The main statement selection panel for both regular DFSORT control statements and user-defined control statements is the Control Statements Selection panel, whose three pages allow for up to 36 (regular or user-defined) control statements. You define and activate these three pages through the internal profile panel definition (IPPD).

For regular sort, copy, and merge applications, only the first page of the selection panel is active, and no user-defined control statements are present.

For user-defined applications, up to three pages of the Control Statements Selection panel can be activated, depending on what setting you choose for the &CSSPAGES variable in the IPPD. The Control Statements Selection panel is created and displayed based on the settings in the internal profile panel definition. The formats of these three pages are shown by the following three figures.

Page 1 of the Control Statements Selection panel (ICEDACS1), as shown in Figure 138 on page 158, is displayed for the user only when the &CSSPAGES variable in the IPPD is set to 1, 2, or 3.

The statement 1 verb <verb01> is defined by the &ST01VERB variable in the IPPD for the application, <description01> is defined by &ST01DESC, <verb02> by &ST02VERB, <description02> by &ST02DESC, and so on.

Statements 1 to 12 defined in the IPPD appear on Page 1 of the Control Statements Selection Panel. Statements 13 to 24 appear on page 2, and statements 25 to 36 are assigned to page 3.

Each statement line

The <appl.> in the title line is SORT, COPY, or MERGE, depending on the application in effect.

If &CSSPAGES is set to 1, 'Page 1 of n' and 'USE DOWN COMMAND FOR ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS' do not appear.

If &CSSPAGES is set to 2 or 3, 'Page 1 of n' (where n is the &CSSPAGES value of 2 or 3) and 'USE DOWN COMMAND FOR ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS' do appear.

Page 2 of the Control Statements Selection panel (ICEDACS2), as shown in Figure 139 on page 159, is displayed for the user only if &CSSPAGES is set to 2 or 3. This page shows statements 13 to 24 as defined in the IPPD.

If &CSSPAGES is set to 2, the <n> in 'Page 2 of <n>' is set to 2, and 'USE UP COMMAND FOR ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS.' appears. If &CSSPAGES is set to 3, the <n> in 'Page 2 of <n>' is set to 3, and 'USE UP/DOWN COMMAND FOR ADDITIONAL STATEMENTS.' appears.

Customizing Control Fields Entry Panels with Data Entry Routines

If a special data entry panel is needed for a user-defined control statement, then you must also supply a data entry routine. The routine must be a valid ISPF function, which you can code either as a CLIST command procedure or write in a programming language supported by ISPF, such as PL/I, COBOL, FORTRAN, or Pascal. The function must do the following:

- Display (using ISPF services) the panels needed to collect sufficient data for the control statement, such that a complete statement can be coded for processing by DFSORT. The function (along with the associated panel definitions) is responsible for doing any necessary verification of values, panel command execution, and other necessary panel processing.
- 2. Retrieve from or save in the application profile pool the data collected through the panels. The retrieve is done before the display of these panels, and the save is done after the user exits from the display.

A data entry routine is *not* required in the special case of permanently fixed control statements with no varying parameters, because permanently fixed control statements do not require a special data entry panel. An example of a fixed control statement is a control statement that can be coded using only its verb (such as the DFSORT END statement, which is not regularly supplied by DFSORT Panels).

See *ISPF Dialog Management Guide* for a complete description of a valid ISPF function.

Invoking Your Data Entry Routine

The user-supplied data entry routine is invoked when appropriate by DFSORT Panels using the ISPF SELECT service, so the SELECT service parameters for the data entry routine must be defined to DFSORT Panels.

You define the SELECT service parameters through the **&STxxDEPM** variables of the IPPD for the user-defined DFSORT Panels application. Up to 50 characters of SELECT service parameters can be assigned to the **&STxxDEPM** variable associated with the control statement for which the data entry routine is being supplied. See the description of the SELECT service in the *ISPF Dialog Management Guide* for a complete description of valid SELECT service parameters.

The NEWAPPL parameter *must not* be used because the data entry routine cannot be invoked as a new ISPF application. The routine must run in the same application as the DFSORT Panels application. In addition, the PANEL and OPT parameters cannot be used. DFSORT Panels will not validate the &STxxDEPM assignments, and specifying such parameters will cause the User-Defined Panels Interface to work incorrectly.

The NEWPOOL parameter can be used to specify that a new shared variable pool is to be created without specifying a new application.

The value of the &APPLCODE variable in the application profile pool can be retrieved using the VGET service to determine the type of application: S for sort, C for copy, or M for merge.

Examples of &STxxDEPM variable assignments are:

For example, a CLIST procedure named DEREPORT is the user-supplied data entry routine for the user-defined REPORT control statement. This statement is assigned to the &ST13 set of variables in the IPPD. The &ST13 variable assignments could be as follows:

Conventions for Data Entry Panels

Certain conventions and commands are used by the regular data entry panels (such as SORT Statement Data Entry and OPTION Statement Data Entry panels). For simplicity of use, any user-supplied data entry panels should follow the same conventions and commands as the regular data entry panels.

Customizing Control Fields

The commands used by the regular data entry panels selected through the Control Statements Selection panel are as follows:

Command	Description			
ENTER key	Used to perform verification of values.			
END	Used to save changes in the application profile pool and exit the panel. If verification errors are present, END should be ignored.			
CANCEL	Used to exit the panel without saving changes. Any verification errors are ignored.			
REINIT	Used to delete all existing values on the panel. Any verification errors are ignored.			
UP	Used to scroll to the previous page of a multi-page panel. The command action of the UP command is dynamically specified through the &SCRVERT dialog variable. All user-written data entry panel definitions should have the statement '&SCRVERT=PASSTHRU' in the)INIT section. All table display panels, processed by the TBDISPL service, should have '&SCRVERT=SETVERB'.			
DOWN	Used to scroll to the next page of a multi-page panel. The command action of the DOWN command is also dynamically specified through the &SCRVERT dialog variable; see the UP command description above for further details.			
PROFILE	Used to invoke the Profile Application. If verification errors are present, PROFILE is ignored.			

Basically, for data entry panels entered from the Control Statements Selection panel, ENTER should be used to perform verification and redisplay the data entry panel. END should be used to perform verification and, if no errors are present, to save the data entry panel values in the application profile pool (using the VPUT service with the PROFILE parameter) and terminate the display of the data entry panel.

The data entry panels for the main control statement of the application, such as the SORT Statement Data Entry panel (ICETSRCF) and the SORT Statement Free Form Entry panel (ICEDSRFF), follow the same conventions as the data entry panels selected through the Control Statements Selection panel. But, ENTER has an additional function: when there are no verification errors, then ENTER also saves changes and exits the data entry panel, continuing to the next panel.

ENTER has the same effect as the END command on the SORT/MERGE Statement Data Entry panel (ICETSRCF) and SORT/MERGE Statement Free Form Entry panels (ICEDSRFF and ICEDMGFF) only when ENTER is pressed without any further input changes. The user might want to use this convention in the usersupplied data entry panel, particularly if it is scrollable, to help prevent ENTER from causing premature exit from the panel.

Executing the PROFILE Command

The user-supplied data entry routine must allow the execution of the **PROFILE** command by including appropriate code to invoke the Profile Application. For data entry routines that are CLIST command procedures, the following code can be used:

Restrictions for ISPF Variables Used in Data Entry Routines

Any ISPF variables defined by the user-supplied data entry routine and saved in the application profile pool using the VPUT service must start with the letter U, to avoid conflicts with variables used by DFSORT Panels. If the NEWPOOL parameter is *not* specified in the &STxxDEPM variable for the routine, then the U-letter restriction also applies to variables saved in the shared variable pool.

Required Return Codes for Data Entry Routines

The following return codes must be set by the user-supplied data entry routine:

Code Description

- **END** or **RETURN** was used to exit from the data entry panel, and sufficient data was saved through the data entry panel such that a valid control statement can be coded.
- **END** or **RETURN** was used to exit from the data entry panel, but insufficient data was saved through the data entry panel (this normally means that all panel input fields were blank) such that a valid control statement *cannot* be coded.
- **8 CANCEL** was used to exit from the data entry panel without saving any changes.

For those main control statement data entry panels that use **ENTER** (as well as **END** and **RETURN**) to save changes and exit from the panel, the following *additional* return codes apply. They are *invalid* for data entry routines selected through the Control Statements Selection panel, but are *required* for the main control statement data entry panels, so that DFSORT Panels goes forward to the next panel or back to the previous panel correctly.

Code Description

- 1 ENTER was used to exit from the data entry panel, and sufficient data was saved through the data entry panel such that a valid control statement can be coded.
- **ENTER** was used to exit from the data entry panel, but insufficient data was saved through the data entry panel (this normally means that all panel input fields were blank) such that a valid control statement *cannot* be coded.

Any invalid return code returned by a user-supplied data entry routine causes DFSORT Panels to terminate the user-defined application.

Customizing Individual Control Statements with Statement Coder Routines

Normally, you must supply a statement coder routine for each user-defined control statement. The routine must be a valid ISPF function, which you can either code as a CLIST command procedure or write in a programming language supported by ISPF, such as PL/I, COBOL, FORTRAN, or Pascal. The function must do the fol-

- 1. Retrieve (using ISPF services) the control statement data from the application profile pool.
- 2. Code the control statement and save the control statement in the existing temporary ISPF table, 'STMTTABL', provided the data is sufficient to build a valid control statement.

In the special case of fixed control statements with no varying parameters, which do not require a data entry routine, the sole function of the statement coder routine is to save the complete fixed control statement in the 'STMTTABL' table. However, if the complete control statement consists only of the statement verb, then the statement coder routine is not required and DFSORT Panels automatically codes the statement using the verb.

See ISPF Dialog Management Guide for a complete description of a valid ISPF function.

Invoking Your Statement Coder Routine

The user-supplied statement coder routine is invoked, when appropriate, by DFSORT Panels using the ISPF SELECT service. To use the ISPF SELECT Service, the SELECT service parameters for the statement coder routine must be defined to DFSORT Panels.

You define the SELECT service parameters through the &STxxSCPM variables of the IPPD. Up to 50 characters of SELECT service parameters can be assigned to the &STxxSCPM variable associated with the control statement for which the statement coder routine is being supplied. See the description of the SELECT service in the ISPF Dialog Management Guide for a complete description of valid SELECT service parameters.

The NEWAPPL parameter *must not* be used because the statement coder routine cannot be invoked as a new ISPF application. The routine must run in the same application as the DFSORT Panels application. In addition, the PANEL and OPT parameters cannot be used. DFSORT Panels will not, however, validate the &STxxSCPM assignments. Specifying such parameters will cause the User-Defined Panels Interface not to work properly.

The NEWPOOL parameter can be used to specify that a new shared variable pool is to be created without specifying a new application.

The value of the &APPLCODE variable in the application profile pool can be retrieved using the VGET service to determine the type of application: S for sort, C for copy, or M for merge.

Examples of &STxxSCPM variable assignments are:

```
&ST05SCPM = 'CMD(%USERCDSR)'
&ST07SCPM = 'PGM(USERCDOP) PARM(OPTIONS)'
&ST24SCPM = 'PGM(USERCDAQ) NEWPOOL'
&ST32SCPM = 'CMD(%REPTSTMT) PARM(CODE) NEWPOOL'
```

For example, a CLIST procedure named CDREPORT is the user-supplied statement coder routine for the user-defined REPORT control statement. This statement is assigned to the &ST13 set of variables in the internal profile panel definition. The &ST13 variable assignments could be as follows:

```
&ST13TYPE = U
&ST13VERB = REPORT
&ST13DESC = '(Report control statement)'
&ST13NMBR = 23
&ST13DEPM = 'CMD(%DEREPORT)'
&ST13SCPM = 'CMD(%CDREPORT)'
```

Conventions for Statement Coder Routines

The user-supplied statement coder routines must code the control statements according to the DFSORT control statement general coding rules described in the DFSORT Application Programming Guide.

Using the ISPF TBADD service, each 80-character line of each coded statement is added to the 'STMTTABL' ISPF table (which is opened and initialized by DFSORT Panels) through the 'CODELINE' variable.

CODELINE is an 80-character variable (defined to ISPF by DFSORT Panels) which the statement coder routine can use to build each line of the control statement. The routine can then invoke the TBADD service to add each completed CODELINE line to STMTTABL.

Statement coder routines that are program modules must first use the ISPF VDEFINE service to establish addressability to the ISPF CODELINE parameter by using the following statement:

```
CALL ISPLINK ('VDEFINE', 'CODELINE', CODELINE, 'CHAR', 80);
```

The ISPF VDELETE service must be used to release CODELINE after the statement coder routine completes its coding of the control statement.

Restrictions for ISPF Variables Used in Statement Coder Routines

Any ISPF variables defined by the user-supplied statement coder routine and saved in the application profile pool using the VPUT service must start with the letter U, to avoid conflicts with variables used by DFSORT Panels. If the NEWPOOL parameter is *not* specified in the &STxxSCPM variable for the routine, then the U-letter restriction also applies to variables saved in the shared variable pool.

Required Return Code for Statement Coder Routines

All user-supplied statement coder routines must specifically set a return code of zero. Any non-zero return code can be an indication of routine failure and will cause DFSORT Panels to terminate the user-defined application.

How Are Control Statements Generated?

When the Review Control Statements panel step is entered, even if the Review Control Statements panel is not displayed, all active control statements are generated and saved in a temporary ISPF table in preparation for entry to the foreground execution facility or the submit facility. The following sections describe the order in which each individual control statement is generated for each application (the same order in which they appear in the completed job).

Sort Applications

For a sort application, the active control statements are ordered as follows:

- Any statements entered on the General Statement Free Form Entry panel, if the regular FREEFORM statement is active on the Control Statements Selection panel.
- The main control statement of the application or, if free form entry of the SORT statement was requested, the statements on the SORT Statement Free Form Entry panel.
- 3. All remaining active control statements selected through the Control Statements Selection panel, in the order in which they appear on the Control Statements Selection panel. This step does not include the regular FREEFORM statement, which, if active, is generated in step 1.

Copy Applications

For a copy application, the active control statements are ordered as follows:

- The statements entered on the General Statement Free Form Entry panel, if the regular FREEFORM statement is active on the Control Statements Selection panel.
- 2. The main control statement of the application. If the main control statement is the regular OPTIONCP statement (which generates 'OPTION COPY') and the regular OPTION statement is active on the Control Statements Selection panel, then the selected OPTION keywords accompany the COPY keyword.
- 3. All remaining active control statements selected through the Control Statements Selection panel, in the order in which they appear on the Control Statements Selection panel. This step does not include the regular FREEFORM statement, which, if active, is generated in step 1.

Merge Applications

For a merge application, the active control statements are ordered as follows:

- Any statements entered on the General Statement Free Form Entry panel, if the regular FREEFORM statement is active on the Control Statements Selection panel.
- The main control statement of the application or, if free form entry of the MERGE statement was requested, the statements on the MERGE Statement Free Form Entry panel.
- 3. All remaining active control statements selected through the Control Statements Selection panel, in the order in which they appear on the Control Statements Selection panel. This step does not include the regular FREEFORM statement, which, if active, is generated in step 1.

A Sample Customized DFSORT Application

A set of sample files is shipped with DFSORT to help you set up a sample userdefined DFSORT Panels application and to assist you in defining your own DFSORT Panels application with the User-Defined Panels Interface. The sample files consist of four panel definitions and seven CLIST command procedures.

The sample panel definitions are:

ICEUSORT Internal profile panel definition for sample user-defined sort

application

ICEUSRTP Data entry panel for sample user-defined SORT control state-

men

ICEUICLP Data entry panel for sample user-defined INCLUDE control

statement

ICEURPTP Data entry panel for sample user-defined REPORT control

statement.

The sample CLIST command procedures are:

ICEUSRTD Sample data entry routine for user-defined SORT statement

ICEUSRTC Sample statement coder routine for user-defined SORT state-

ment

ICEUICLD Sample data entry routine for user-defined INCLUDE statement

ICEUICLC Sample statement coder routine for user-defined INCLUDE

statement

ICEUDBGC Sample statement coder routine for user-defined DEBUG state-

ment

ICEURPTD Sample data entry routine for user-defined REPORT statement

ICEURPTC Sample statement coder routine for user-defined REPORT

statement.

To activate the sample user-defined sort application, you must modify the DFSORT Primary Option Menu to add a selection string containing the 'ICEUSORT' internal profile panel definition name (see "Customizing the DFSORT Primary Option Menu" on page 149).

Sample Sort Application

The ICEUSORT internal profile panel definition defines a user-defined sort application, with the regular OPTION, OMIT, FREEFORM, SUM, INREC, OUTREC, and ALTSEQ control statements and the user-defined SORT, INCLUDE, REPORT, DEBUG, and END control statements. The regular RECORD and MODS control statements are not used by the user sort application.

Data entry and statement coder routines are supplied by the user for the SORT, INCLUDE, and REPORT control statements. The END control statement is a verbonly control statement, requiring no data entry or statement coder routines. DFSORT Panels automatically codes verb-only statements, when appropriate, using only their verbs.

Sample Customized Application

The only valid syntax for the user-defined DEBUG statement is 'DEBUG BSAM'. This means that DEBUG does not require a data entry routine, but it does require a statement coder routine to code the 'DEBUG BSAM' statement. (Note that while the regular DEBUG Statement Data Entry panel is available, the user-defined DEBUG BSAM statement is presented here strictly as an example of a fixed control statement with no varying parameters.)

The SORT control statement is the main control statement of the user sort application. The OPTION, INCLUDE, OMIT, and FREEFORM statements appear on Page 1 of the Control Statements Selection panel. The REPORT, SUM, INREC, and OUTREC statements appear on Page 2 of the selection panel, while ALTSEQ, DEBUG, and END appear on Page 3.

The syntax of the user-defined SORT control statement, with user-defined collating types <format>, is:

```
SORT FIELDS=(<position>,<length>,<format>,<order>)
```

The syntax of the user-defined INCLUDE control statement, with user-defined data types <format 1> and <format 2>, is:

```
INCLUDE COND=(<position 1>,<length 1>,<format 1>,<comparison>,
             <position 2>,<length 2>,<format 2>)
```

The syntax of the user-defined REPORT control statement is:

```
REPORT < PAGES = n>
        <, FORMAT=<NEW | REP | GML>>
        <, HEADER | , NOHEADER>
```

You still need to supply an Extended Function Support (EFS) program to process the SORT statement with user-defined collating types, the INCLUDE statement with user-defined data types, and the REPORT statement.

The following steps allow the invocation of your EFS program with the DFSORT program through the DFSORT Panels.

- For foreground execution, the foreground execution CLIST command procedure that invokes the DFSORT Program (ICEQFG04) should be modified to add the PARM EFS=programname parameter to the DFSORT Program call statement.
- For background execution, users should update the DFSORT Execute Statement Entry panel, either in the Profile Application or in the Submit Facility, to include the PARM EFS=programname parameter on the EXEC statement.
