Safety Instructions

Please read this section carefully and observe the instructions for your own safety and correct use of the device.

This chapter also contains information on approval and interference suppression of your KISS-Stor 1.

Please observe the warnings and instructions on the device and in the manual. The device has been built and tested by Kontron Embedded Computers in accordance with EN 60950/VDE 0805 and left the company in a perfectly safe condition.

In order to maintain this condition and ensure safe operation, the user must observe the instructions and warnings contained in this manual.

- The KISS-Stor 1 is designed to be built into a system. The integration into the system has to be done such, that the system complies with the IEC/EN 60950 safety rules.
- □ The device must be used in accordance with the instructions for use.
- □ The electrical installations in the room must correspond to the requirements of the respective regulations.
- Only devices and components which fulfill the requirements of a SELV circuit (Safety Extra Low Voltage) in accordance with EN 60950 may be connected to the interfaces of the system.
- □ The device is designed to be used in horizontal position.
- Repairs may only be carried out by a person authorized by Kontron Embedded Computers.
- Maintenance or repair on the open device may only be carried out by qualified personnel authorized by Kontron Embedded Computers which is aware of with the associated dangers.

Computer System Requirements

In order to install the KISS-Stor 1 subsystem into a working system is required a computer system with following hardware requirements:

- with free on-board (motherboard or SBC, depending on the computer configuration) SATA port or a serial host bus adapter card
- □ with one free connector (4-pin) of the power supply at least
- □ case with two half-height 5 ¼" drive bays with frontal access

System Requirements Option for use of the KSView Management Software

The KSView Management Software is applicable for a computer system configuration:

with a free expansion slot to implement the RS232 serial interface (the included bracket with 9-pin D-SUB serial connector of the serial 3-pin cable connector) and a free external accessible serial port configured as RS232. The KSView Management Software uses the serial port (COM) for RAID monitoring.

or

with on-board SATA controller (the installed motherboard or SBC should be equipped with an Intel® ICH5, ICH6, ICH7 SouthBridge). The KSView Management Software uses the SATA port for RAID monitoring.

Introduction to RAID Level

The KISS-Stor 1 can support the RAID levels 1.

RAID 1

RAID 1 is commonly referred to as Disk Mirroring, Disk Shadowing or Disk Duplexing as all data is duplicated across both disks. RAID 1 can only be performed with two hard drives. As data is identical on both disks, storage capacity is that of the smaller disk. RAID 1 has poor performance for write operations but very high performance for read intensive operations.

The storage capacity is determined by the smaller drive in the array. That capacity is then applied to format all other drives in the array. If using a 40 GB and 60 GB drive in a RAID 1 array, your system will see one drive of 40 GB [(1 disks x 40 GB) = 40 GB].

Product Description

The KISS-Stor 1 RAID (Redundant Array of Independent/Inexpensive Disks) subsystem mirrors data to the other disk drive simultaneously, and delivers optimized performance. If one drive fails, data is secured by the other drive and alarm sounds to alert you. RAID 1 configuration is ideal for data redundancy.

Featuring intelligent recovery, KISS-Stor 1 let you hot swap a failed drive and it automatically rebuilds the data to the new drive without any system down time. KISS-Stor 1 features a user-friendly design that lets you easily that lets you easily install two drives and replace a drive that fails. Each hard drive carrier supports a one-inch high 3.5 inch for factor disk drive. Additional data security is provided by a key-locking system, that prevents unauthorized access to each disk drive during operation.

The KISS-Stor 1 comes with two drive carriers accessed from the front. The front of the two drive carriers are equipped with disk activity LED indicators (green, yellow and red) and a drive carrier lock.

Each side of the RAID subsystem features a rail channel and holes for the mounting screws. These allow you to secure the RAID 1 subsystem inside of a computer case.

The jumpers (*no jumper setting is needed*) and connectors are located on the rear side of the unit.

The KISS-Stor 1 is delivered with installed firmware and the ordered RAID 1 level configuration (*no jumper setting is needed!*).

Features

The KISS-Stor 1 supports the following features:

- □ Support two SATA I or II disk channels (but run in SATA I)
- □ Support one SATA I host channel
- Support RAID level 1
- No driver needed
- Drives are hot swappable (RAID 1)
- □ Fan cooler (Ball bearing type)
- Let Key locking to prevent unauthorized access to the disk drives
- □ Audible alarm on drive failure
- □ Automatic drive failure detection
- Battery backup for disk rebuild status

Hard Drive Hot Swapping for RAID 1 Configuration

Hot Swapping allows the removal and installation of hard disk drives without powering down the system.

Automatic Drive Rebuilding for RAID 1 Array

If a member drive in a RAID 1 array is replaced, the KISS-Stor 1 will automatically start to rebuild data to the new drive.

RAID Failure audible Alarm

In the event that a drive fails, the corresponding red indicators (disk activity LED and hard disk status) turn on and an alarm sounds. You can turn off the alarm by unlocking the drive carrier.

Front View

Each drive carrier can hold a one-inch high 3.5-inch form factor SATA disk drive. This makes it easy to hot swap a drive in the event of a failure, without affecting the status of the remaining drives.

Disk Activity LED-Indicators

The disk activity LED indicators show the status of each individual disk drive (refer to *fig. 4a*).

| Red | Disk drive is not present, is not properly installed, is unlocked, or disk has failed |

In the event that a drive fails, the red indicator turns on and an alarm sounds. You can turn off the alarm by unlocking the drive carrier.

Hard Disk Status / Rebuild Indicators

The upper indicator represents the top drive carrier, the lower indicator represents the bottom drive carrier (refer to *fig. 4, pos. 4* and *pos. 5* and *fig. 5*). If a drive fails, the appropriate LED indicator turns on, red and an audible alarm sounds. You can turn off the audible alarm by unlocking the drive carrier.

The red indicator of the target drive carrier will light up and blink while rebuilding (refer to "Disk Activity LED-Indicators" chapter).

Rebuilding Activity / Error Message Indicators

Rebuilding Activity

This row of eight indicators shows disks rebuilding activity. In normal operation, a green light scans across the bank of indicators. If you are using the recovery feature to rebuild a drive, all the indicators will turn on at the same time. The left-side indicator blinks and then turns off when 12.5% of the data has been mirrored. Then the next indicator blinks and turns off when 25% of the data has been mirrored, and so on.

Error Messages

The chart offers the all-possible error messages, and can help you to identify certain problems.

LED Error Status Display

Disk fail (replace the failed disk with another disk)

Drive Carrier Lock

The drive carrier lock acts as an On/Off switch for the drives and provides security by preventing non-key holders from accessing the drives.

To lock each carrier, insert the key and turn it in a clockwise direction. To unlock a carrier, turn the key in a counterclockwise direction.



The drive carriers must be locked by the supplied key during the operation.

The keys should be kept somewhere to be not accessible to unauthorized person.

In the event that a drive fails, the red LED indicators turn on and an alarm sounds. You can turn off the alarm by unlocking the drive carrier.

SATA Interface Connector

This connector allows you to connect the RAID subsystem to the SATA interface of the computer via the supplied SATA cable. The SATA cable is the route used for reading and writing to the array.

Power Connectors

The power connectors allows you to connect the RAID subsystem to the power supply of the computer. In order to provide stable power, we recommend to connect both power connectors of the RAID subsystem to the power supply.

Cooling Fan

KISS-Stor 1 is equipped inside with a cooling fan. This provides air circulation for the disk drives.

To avoid overheating, KISS-Stor 1 should be installed in a wellventilated area and in such a way that sufficient airflow is maintained across the controller chips (rear side of the unit).

Serial RS232 Connector

This connector allows you to connect the RAID subsystem via the supplied serial cable to the computer. This connection is used for remote monitoring of KISS-Stor 1 if the KSView management software if installed.

The RS232 port is configured with DTE and PC compatible pin assignments.

There is a triangular symbol "••" on both serial 3-pin on PCB connector and the RS232 cable connector. Please make sure you connect in the right direction (both triangle symbols match each other). Refer to the RS-232 label located on the rear side of the KISS-Stor 1. To ensure a proper remote monitoring of the KISS-Stor 1 please use only the supplied serial 3-pin RS232 cable connector.

Connecting in wrong direction will not damage RAID controller, however the terminal or KSView will not work.



Please observe that the serial 9-pin D-SUB connector attached to the slot mounting bracket (of the supplied 3-pin serial RS232 cable) are not a complete serial port. Available signals: only Rx-, Tx- and GND (three wire).

Jumper Pins

Kontron delivers the KISS-Stor 1 in configured RAID 1 level



Components of the KISS-Stor 1

Drives Cage

The KISS-Stor 1 drives cage is designed to accommodate two 3.5 inch hard disk drives (each SATA-HDD is mounted into a corresponding drive carrier).

Holes for Mounting Screws

The holes for mounting screws allows you to mount the KISS-Stor 1 drives cage into the drive cage of the computer system by the supplied M3 metric screws.



Use only the supplied M3 metric screws (M3x5). Four screws on each side are sufficient for mounting the KISS-Stor 1 drives cage into the drive cage of the computer system.

Rail Channel

The rail channel (one on each side) allows you to attach the KISS-Stor 1 to a main rail system.

Guide Ribs for Drive Carriers

The guide ribs separate the cavity of the KISS-Stor 1 drives cage in three bays in order to accommodate the LED Insicators module (fix-mounted) and two hard disk drive carriers (top and bottom).

Docking Connectors for the Drive Carriers

Each of these two connectors allows you to dock one drive carrier to the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1.

SATA Removable Drive Carrier

The SATA removable drive carrier is used for internally mounting of a low-profile, 3.5-inch form factor hard disk drive into an undersized half-height, 5.25-inch peripheral bay of the KISS-Stor 1.

- 1 SATA removable drive carrier
- 2 Receiving frame for drive mounting
- 3 2x elongated holes on the right side for HDD mounting
- 4 3x elongated holes on the left side for HDD mounting
- 5 Serial ATA and power connector
- 6 PCB on the rear side of the drive carrier
- 7 Docking connector of the drive carrier

Serial ATA and Power Connector

This connector is the SATA device connection via a SATA 7-pin signal connector with a separate SATA 15-pin power connector.

Frame for Drive Mounting

The frame provides mechanical support for the SATA HDD drive. The drive will be mounted in the frame and will be held in place with four screws.

Elongated Holes for HDD Mounting

The elongated holes allow you to secure the SATA hard disk properly into the frame of the removable drive carrier by use of the supplied inch screws. The mounting holes are laterally accessible, and correspond to the laterally provided mounting holes of the SATA HDD.



Use only the inch screws supplied. Two screws on each side are sufficient to secure the SATA hard disk into the frame of the drive carrier.

Docking Connector of the Drive Carrier

This connector allows you to dock the drive carrier to the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1.

Installing the KISS-Stor 1

The KISS-Stor 1 is delivered with installed firmware and installed RAID1 level.

The KISS-Stor 1 can be installed inside a computer case. The hardware requirements are described in the "Computer System Requirements" chapter.

- Only trained and qualified personnel should be allowed to install or replace this equipment.
- Before attempting to install KISS-Stor 1, the computer must be powered-down and the power cord has to be disconnected from the power source.
- Please observe, that only the supplied M3x5 screws may be used for the mounting of the KISS-Stor 1 to the drive cage of the computer.

KISS-Stor 1 Physical Installation Procedure

Please follow these steps to install the KISS-Stor 1 into the case of a computer system:

- 1. Turn off your system and disconnect the power cord from power source.
- 2. Loosen and remove the cover and faceplates from the computer case (depends on the type of computer case). Retain the screws for later use.
- **3.** Loosen and remove the drive cage of the computer case (depends on the type of computer case). Retain the screws for later use.
- 4. Remove the metal expansion slot inserts, if you intend to install the supplied serial 3-pin cable connector (RS232) with a 9-pin D-SUB connector attached to a slot mounting bracket for using the KSView management software.
- **5.** Make sure that the SATA interface cable will reach the device in its intended location.
- **6.** Ensure that a the power cable from the power supply will reach the RAID subsystem in its intended location.
- 7. Unlock and remove the drive carriers from the KISS-Stor 1.

8. Slide the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1 into the removed drive cage of the computer. Align the front of the drives cage of the RAID subsystem with the front of the drive cage of the computer.



Make sure that you don't mount the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1 upside-down in its intended location (refer to the *fig. 7*). The KISS-Stor 1 is designed to be used in horizontal position.

- **9.** When the drives cage of the RAID subsystem is lined-up correctly, secure it to the drive cage of the computer using four of the M3 metric supplied screws. Check the alignment before you tighten the screws.
- **10.** Remount the drive cage into the computer case using the retained screws (refer to step 3). Check the alignment before you tighten the screws.
- Replace the system case cover by use of the retained screws, if the internal connection procedure is performed (refer to "KISS-Stor 1 Connection Procedure").
- Before replacing the case cover to your system, you should first become familiar with the unit and check that everything is connected properly. Following a proper cabling procedure will prevent a false poweron condition, which could result in unit operational failure. The KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem is not equipped with a power switch.

Please follow these steps to install the SATA HDD into the drive carrier:

- 1. Insert each of the Serial ATA (SATA) HDD into a drive carrier (refer to step 1). Make sure that you don't mount the drive upside-down or backwards.
- **2.** Gently push the SATA-HDD into the drive carrier until the drive connects to the connector on the rear of the drive carrier (refer to step 2 and step 2a).
- **3.** Secure the SATA HDD in place by using the screws that came with it. Do not over-tighten screws when installing the hard disk.



Please observe, that only the supplied inch screws may be used for the securing of the SATA drive to the drive carrier. Using long screws can penetrate deep inside the mechanism of the SATA drive and damage it.



Two screws on each side are sufficient to secure the SATA HDD into the drive carrier of the KISS-Stor 1.

Drives Cage Physical Assembling Procedure



Please observe that the drive carrier must be unlocked, in order to insert (completely) the drive carrier into the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1. The key-lock is unlocked if the key is in a vertical orientation. (refer to *fig. 13*)

- **1.** Turn the key-lock to the unlocked position.
- 2. Insert successively and slide each of the drive carrier into a corresponding bay of the drives cage (refer to *fig. 10, pos.5*).
- **3.** Gently push the drive carrier until it connects to corresponding receptacles on the rear of the drives cage of the KISS-Stor 1 (refer to *fig. 10, pos. 4*).
- **4.** Insert successively the key into each of the drive carrier lock, turn the key one quarter turn to the RIGHT, and make sure that the mechanical lock is ensured.

KISS-Stor 1 Connection Procedure

Before attempting to connect the KISS-Stor 1, the computer must be powered-down and the power cord has to be disconnected from the power source.

Serial ATA Cable Connection

Follow these steps to connect the SATA cable and the optional 3-pin serial cable connector:

- 1. Turn off the and disconnect the power cord from power source.
- Insert the SATA cable (not included) to the SATA port of the motherboard/Single Board Computer (SBC) of the computer (depending on the computer configuration).
- **3.** Connect the other end of the SATA cable to the SATA port of the KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem (refer to *fig. 14, pos. 2*).

The KISS-Stor 1 RAID monitoring can be performed via the SATA port, if the RAID subsystem is installed into a computer with on-board Intel® SATA controller (ICH5-ICH7).

Power Source Connection

Follow these steps to connect the power source:

1. Connect the power source connector/s to the corresponding connector/s located on the rear side of the RAID subsystem (refer to *fig. 14, pos. 3*).



In order to provide stable power, we recommend to connect both power connectors to the KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem.

Serial 3-Pin Cable Connection for RAID Monitoring

Kontron delivers a serial 3-pin cable connector, in order to use the tools of the KSView management software for RAID monitoring (refer to the chapter "System Requirements Option for use of the KSView Management Software"). The tools and features of this software allow you to access RAID monitoring data in an easy, intuitive manner.

Follow these steps to connect the serial 3-pin cable connector:

- Mount the bracket with the 9-pin D-SUB connector to the free slot of the computer (refer to the step 4 described in the "KISS-Stor 1 Physical Installation Procedure" chapter).
- 2. Connect the 3-pin connector of this cable to the 3-pin serial port of the KISS-Stor 1 (please observe the hints described in the "Rear View", "Serial RS232 Connector" chapter).
- Connect the serial port of RAID subsystem (refer to step 1) with the external serial port (RS232) of the computer via the supplied serial adapter cable (9-pin D-SUB, female on both ends).

Removing / Replacing a Drive

Swapping Drives

The hot swap function is available on the RAID 1 array and can be operated during run time. RAID 1 rebuilding will be processed automatically in the background and the KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem will record its progress. If the system is shut down or powered off abnormally, the KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem will continue the disk rebuilding process after power is turned on again.



A hard disk should not be replaced when the system is turned off. Doing so may leads to loss of data.

What if a Disk fails?

If a disk drive fails, or a key switch is turned off, the red Disk Activity LED Indicator of corresponding disk carrier and the corresponding Disk Status / Rebuild Indicator will light up (red) and the an alarm will sound (sound when only disk fails). When this happens, you can replace the failed SATA disk with a new one, then turn the key switch on.



When replacing a disk drive, the new disk drive must have the same capacity or larger, than the disk drive which is being replaced.

What when a RAID fails?

A RAID failure occures if two disk drives fails in a RAID 1 array.

If two disk drives fails in a RAID 1 array, all data on the array is lost and cannot be recovered. RAID failure results in all data on the array being lost. Please create a new RAID, or call your technical support.

Starting Up

The KISS-Stor 1 is delivered with installed firmware and installed RAID level 1. The KISS-Stor 1 is designed to be installed into a computer system.

The mirroring starts automatically once the computer with installed KISS-Stor 1, is powered-up. The system will detect the presence of

KISS-Stor 1 RAID subsystem. The first step performed by the KISS-Stor 1 is to check the status of the installed SATA hard drives.



When you lock the drives, the first drive to get locked is designated as the source drive and the other drive becomes the target drive.

Please observe the next subsections.

Prerequisite

The KISS-Stor 1 Raid subsystem must be installed in a workable computer as described in the "Installing the KISS-Stor 1" chapter.

Two SATA hard disks (not included) must be installed into the KISS-Stor 1 corresponding to the description in the "SATA Drive Physical Installation Procedure" and "Drives Cage Physical Assembling Procedure" chapter.

Create a RAID 1 Array

Follow these steps in order create a RAID 1 array (depending on the installed hard disks into your KISS-Stor 1) on your system:

Create the Array with two new Disk Drives (Identical or non-Identical)

- 1. Lock both drive carriers before attaching the system to a power source.
- 2. Attach the computer to a corresponding power source.
- 3. Power-up the system.



If the installed drives have different capacity, the controller will identify the smaller disk as source automatically.

4. The system is ready for use.

Create the Array with one Drive with Data (as Source) and one new Drive (Target)

R

The new disk drive (target) must have the same capacity or larger, than the drive with data (source).

1. Lock the drive with data (source) and leave the new drive (target) unlocked. This identifies the drive with data as the source drive.



When you lock the drives, the first drive to get locked is designated as the source drive and the other drive becomes the target drive.

- 2. Attach the computer to a corresponding power source.
- 3. Power-up the system.
- 4. Lock the new drive (target). This identifies the new drive as the target drive.
- 5. The system will immediately begin mirroring the data from the source drive to the target drive (will duplicate the data onto the new drive). Any old data on the target drive will be lost, and is overwritten with the mirror image of the source drive.



If system power is turned off midway through the mirroring process, the process will continue from the point of interruption when power returns.

KSView Management Software

KSView management software is designed to be used in conjunction with KISS-Stor 1 or KISS-Stor 0/5. KSView can be used to monitor a single host with up to four connected RAID subsystems. This software supports in-band (SATA) and out-band (RS-232) connection.

The graphical user interface (GUI) allows easy monitoring of the RAID subsystem status in an intuitive graphical format.

KSView can be accessed from any web-enabled terminal (remote monitoring).

E-mail and popup window event notification keeps the administrator informed of the status of the RAID controller (event notification).

The computer with integrated KISS-Stor 1 or 0/5 RAID subsystem can be installed as a standalone system or in a network environment.

The tools "E-mail alert" and "Remote Monitoring" of the KSView management software can be used only if the computer with the installed KISS-Stor 1 or 0/5 (target) is installed in a network connection with an other computer (host).

The Java Runtime Environment (JRE Version 1.5.0_03, jre-1_5_0_03-windows-i586-p.exe or later) has to be installed on both computers (target and host).

Software Installation

Install KSView

Follow the steps below to install the KSView Server:

- Insert the KSView User Kit CD into your computer's CD-ROM. The software install utility will auto appear.
- 2. Click the button to install KSView Single Host version. The **Welcome** screen will appear.
- 3. Click Next to continue with the setup.
- **4.** Read the license agreement carefully. Select Agree if you accept the terms of the agreement to continue the setup.
- The setup program will install KSView to the default location as C:\Program Files\Kontron\KS Utility\KSView\HTML. To install to a different location, either type in the new path or click Change and select a new location.
- 6. Once you have confirmed the setup location, click Next to continue.
- 7. The setup utility will add shortcut icons to the default folder as "KS Utility\KSView RAID Single-Host". If you do not want to use the default folder, you can either type a new name, or select an existing folder from the list.
- 8. Once you have confirmed the shortcut icon location, click Next to continue. Installation will commence.
- 9. Click Finish to complete the setup.

Configure KSView

- To launch KSView Server, go to Start > Programs > KS Utility > KSView RAID Single-Host > KSView Server.
- 2. The Detect Option dialog box will appear prompting you to scan the KISS-Stor 1 or 0/5 RAID subsystem. KSView supports in-band (SATA) and out-band (COM) connection.

KSView Server can obtain RAID subsystem (KISS-Stor 1 or KISS-Stor 0/5) information through the SATA disk connection or through the RS232 (COM port) connection. The system always checks first for the SATA connection, then the RS232 connection. If both connections are present, SATA is used.

 RAID detection will commence to obtain information from the RAID subsystem via SATA or RS232. The pop-up Detect Process window shows the progress of the system's detection of the RAID subsystem.

 Once the scan is finished, a RAID Information dialog box appears. This identifies the properties of the RAID subsystem detected and its current status.

RAID subsystem information includes:

Serial Number: the serial number of the installed RAID subsystem.

Product ID: the product ID of the installed RAID subsystem.

Type: the port that KSView software uses to communicate with the RAID subsystem, e.g. SATA, COM.

Port ID: specifying the port detected, e.g. COM1 or COM2.

Baud Rate: the number of times per second a signal in a communications channel changes, or makes a transition between states (for COM port only). After confirming the information, click **OK** to exit.

5. The KSView icon appears on the Task Bar at the bottom right of the desktop. You can double click left bottom for main window or single click right bottom for option menu.

Config Setup

The error screen "No RAID Box connected" appears if the corresponding RAID subsystem (the KS View software supports up to four RAID subsystems) are not installed (connected) into the computer.



The error screen "RAID Box disconnected" appears (at unpredictable times) if the COM connection is interrupted.
