Please read this manual before operating your phone, and keep it for future reference.



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# **Important Safety Precautions**

Please read these guidelines before using your wireless phone. Failure to comply with them may be dangerous or illegal.

#### Road Safety at All Times

Do not use a hand-held phone while driving; park the vehicle first.

### Switching Off When Refueling

Do not use the phone at a refueling point (service station) or near fuels or chemicals.

#### Switching Off in Aircraft

Wireless phones can cause interference. Using them in aircraft is both illegal and dangerous.

#### Switching Off in Hospitals

Switch your phone off near medical equipment. Follow any regulations or rules in force.

#### Interference

All wireless phones may be subject to interference, which could affect their performance.

#### **Special Regulations**

Follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger (for example, in a hospital).

#### Sensible Use

Use the phone only in the normal position (held to the ear).

#### **Emergency Call**

Ensure the phone is switched on and in service. Key in the emergency number for your present location, then press the key. You must deactivate any unnecessary features before you can make an emergency call. Give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Do not end the call until given permission to do so.

#### Water Resistance

Your phone is not water-resistant. Keep it dry.

#### Accessories and Batteries

Use only Samsung-approved accessories and batteries. Use of any unauthorized accessories could damage your phone and may be dangerous.

#### **Qualified Service**

Only qualified service personnel may repair your phone.

# **Getting Started**

## **Activating Your Phone**

When you subscribe to a cellular network, a plug-in SIM card is provided loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN and other optional services.

#### Removing the Battery

Note: You must unplug the travel adapter before removing the battery from the phone to avoid damage.

If necessary, power-off the phone by holding down the region key until the power-off image displays.

1. Slide the battery cover away from the phone and lift up to remove it.



2. Lift the battery out of the phone (bottom edge first).



#### Installing the SIM Card

**Important!** The plug-in SIM card and its contacts can be easily damaged by scratches or bending. Use caution when inserting or removing the card and keep all SIM cards out of reach of children.

Make sure the gold contacts of the SIM card face into the phone and the angled corner is at the outer right side, then slide the card into the socket.



#### Removing the SIM Card

To remove the SIM card, slide it out of the socket.



#### Installing the Battery

- 1. Align the top edge of the battery under the tabs at the top edge of the battery chamber.
- 2. Press the battery down until it is seated in the battery chamber. Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching on the phone.



3. With the battery in position in the phone, slide the cover back on the phone until it locks into position.



#### Charging the Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion (lithium ion) battery. Use the travel adapter to charge the battery, and use only Samsung approved batteries and chargers.

**Note:** Fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged battery recharges fully in approximately four hours. You can use the phone while the battery is charging, but this causes the phone to charge more slowly.

Note: For connection to an electrical supply not located in North America, you must use an adapter of the proper configuration for the power outlet. Use of the wrong adapter could damage your phone and void your warranty. 1. Plug the connector of the travel adapter into the jack on the left side of the phone.



- 2. Plug the adapter into a standard AC wall outlet. If the phone is off, both the front and main displays indicate that the phone is charging. If the phone is on, the bars in the battery icon flash to indicate charging.
- 3. When the phone is fully charged, the message "Fully Charged" appears on both the front and main displays. Unplug the adapter from the power outlet.
- 4. Disconnect the adapter from the phone by gently pulling the connector out of the jack.

**Note:** To avoid damaging the phone, you must unplug the adapter before removing the battery from the phone.

#### Low Battery Indication

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, a warning tone sounds, the "Battery Low" message repeats at regular intervals on the display and the empty battery icon c displays. The backlight turns off to conserve the remaining battery power. When the battery level becomes too low, the phone automatically turns off. Recharge the battery to restore phone operation.

## Switching the Phone On and Off

To switch the phone on:

- 1. Open the phone.
- 2. Press and hold the 💿 key until the phone switches on.
- If the phone prompts you to enter the phone password, enter the password and press the ● key. For further details, see "Lock Phone" on page 148.
- If the phone prompts you for a PIN, enter the PIN and press the key. For further details, see "Check PIN Code" on page 148.

The phone searches for your network and, after finding it, the Idle screen appears on the display. You can now make or receive a call.

The default display language setting is **Automatic**, which is dependent on the setting in the SIM provided by your service provider. For further details or to change the language, see "Language" on page 147.

To switch the phone off, press and hold the result in the power-off image is displayed.

# Your Phone

## Features of Your Phone

Your phone is lightweight, easy-to-use and offers many valuable features. The following list outlines a few of the features included in your phone.

- Digital camera and video recorder
- Instant messaging capability (IM)
- Text and multimedia messaging
- Multimedia capability (with included media player)
- Web browser
- Bluetooth wireless technology
- Speakerphone capability
- Applications such as alarms, calendar, calculator, audio recorder, converter, timer, stopwatch, and world time.

## Phone Layout

#### **Closed View of Your Phone**

The following illustration shows some of the main elements of your phone



- Power Interface Connector/Headset Jack: The power interface connector is used to connect the charging accessories and the headset cord.
- 2. Volume key: Allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode, mute the ringer when receiving a call and adjust the voice volume during a call. It can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through menu options. When the phone is closed, press and hold to toggle the display on or off. If you are using the Music Player to play music with the phone closed and the display off, press and hold this key to activate the Music Player Control Keys.
- Music Player Control Keys: This touch sensitive pad allows control of music being played while the phone is closed. These controls include: return to the previous file, pause/resume playback, and skip to the next file during playback. These controls are inactive when the Front LCD is off; press the Volume Key to reactivate them and the display.

- 4. Front LCD: Your phone has an LCD display on the front that indicates when you have an incoming call or message. It also displays time, reception, battery power, and any icons associated with alerts, such as message and alarm.
- 5. **Memory Card Slot:** Used to install an optional microSD<sup>™</sup> card for additional data storage.
- 6. Camera Lens: The camera lens is used to take photos.

### Open View of Your Phone

The following illustration shows the rest of the main elements of your phone:




- 1. **Display:** This screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
- Menu/Menu Confirm key: When navigating through a menu, it accepts the highlighted choice in the menu. While in Idle mode, it launches the main menu.
- 3. **Soft keys:** Perform the function indicated by text on the display directly above the key.
- 4. Music Player key: Opens the Rogers Music Player.
- Send key: Allows you to place or receive a call. In Idle mode, press the key once to access the Recent Call log. Press and hold the key to redial the most recent call.
- 6. Voicemail key: Press and hold the regime key to automatically dial your voicemail.
- 7. Alphanumeric keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and some special characters.
- Special Function keys: The we key enters the [\*] character for calling features. In text mode, press to change the character input type. The we key enters the pound [#] character for calling features. In text entry mode, press to enter a space between characters. Press and hold to place the phone in Silent mode.
- 9. **Microphone**: Converts your voice into an electrical signal during phone calls and voice recordings.
- Clear key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. When in a main menu, press to return to the previous menu.
- 11. Power On/Power Off/Menu Exit key: Ends a call. Press and hold for a few seconds to power your phone on or off. While in the main menu, it

returns the phone to standby mode and cancels any input. Rejects an incoming call.

- 12. **Camera key:** opens the camera menu, which lets you access Take Photo, Record Video, Camera Album and My Video Clips.
- 13. Navigation keys: In Menu mode, the navigation keys work as directional keys to scroll through menus and lists.

In Idle mode, the navigation keys work as shortcuts, allowing you to access other menus directly. The shortcuts are:



Press Up to access the Media menu.

Press **Down** to open the Contact List.


When entering text, the left and right navigation keys move the cursor left and right.

14. Earpiece/Speaker: used to listen to audio and music from your phone.

## Display

### **Display Layout**

The internal display has three main areas:



Area	Description
lcons	Displays various icons that indicate phone status.
Text and graphics area	Displays messages, instructions and any information that you enter, such as the number you are dialing.
Soft key function indicators	Shows the current functions assigned to the two soft keys.

Shows the level of your phone's battery. The more bars, the more power you have remaining.

## Selecting Functions and Options

### Soft Keys

The roles of the soft keys vary depending on the function you are currently using. The labels on the bottom line of the display just above each key indicate their current role.



Some functions of the Left soft key \_ are as follows.

- ◆ From the Idle screen, press to open the Menu screen.
- In a menu mode, press to select the highlighted menu item.

Some functions of the **Right soft key**  $\square$  are as follows.

- From the Idle screen, press to access the Internet. (For more information see "Internet" on page 51.)
- When using other features, such as the web browser, it performs a context-sensitive action such as displaying the **Back** option.

#### **Clear Key**

The **CLR** key  $\boxed{\ \ }$  is used to erase or clear numbers, text, or symbols from the display. You can also use it to return to a previous menu or to return to standby mode from any menu.

- If you enter an incorrect character, press 
  to backspace (and delete) the character.
- ♦ To erase an entire sentence, press and hold <u>c</u>.
- To back up one menu level, briefly press  $\boxed{\circlet}$ .

### End Key

The **End** key figsing is used to turn your phone on and off, disconnect calls, and return to the standby mode.

- Press and hold the End key to turn on your phone.
- Briefly press once to disconnect a call.
- Press to return to standby mode from any menu, or to cancel the last input.

#### Send Key

The **Send** key  $\frown$  is used to answer calls, dial calls, and to recall the last number(s) dialed, received, or missed.

- Press once to answer a call.
- Enter a number and briefly press to make a call.
- In standby mode, briefly press to display a list of recent calls to and from your phone.
- Press twice in standby mode to call the most recent number.
- Press to pick up a waiting call.

#### Speakerphone Key

During a call, press the 
key to enable the speakerphone. Use the volume keys (on the left side of the phone) to adjust the volume.

#### Camera

The embedded camera on the front of your phone is activated by pressing the **Camera** key imes and selecting Take Photo. The internal display shows the image captured by the camera lens. Press the **Camera** key or the ● key to record a photograph. See "Camera" on page 66 for further details.

## Memory Card

Your phone accepts a microSD (Secure Digital) memory card, which you can use to expand the phone's available memory space. This allows you to store more images, videos, music files, and voice data in your phone than the phone's internal memory can hold. You can also use a card to transfer files to and from your PC if your PC is equipped with a microSD card reader or SD card reader and microSD adapter.

**Note:** Before using a microSD card, it must be formatted with the FAT32 file system. Check the documentation that came with the memory card before using it with your phone and, if necessary, format the card.

#### Inserting a microSD Card

Note: Be sure to use only recommended memory cards (32MB to 2GB). Using nonrecommended memory cards could cause data loss and damage your phone.

Note: Make sure your battery is fully charged before using a microSD card. Your data may become damaged or unusable if the battery runs out while reading or writing to the microSD card.

To insert a microSD card into your phone:

1. Open the cover over the microSD card slot (on the right side of the phone).

 Holding the microSD card with the gold contacts facing down and toward the phone, gently insert the card into the slot. Push the card in until it is fully inserted and locked.



3. Replace the protective cover.

The MicroSD icon is displayed on the main screen to indicate that a microSD card is inserted in the phone.

Note: If this is the first time that the microSD card is inserted into your phone, the phone automatically creates a series of folders on it (Images, Videos, Music, Sounds, and Other files).

#### Removing a microSD Card

To remove a microSD card from your phone:

- 1. Open the microSD access cover located on the right side of the phone.
- 2. Use a thumbnail or fingernail to press and release the microSD card. The card will pop part way out to allow removal.
- 3. Pull the microSD card out of the phone.

**Warning!** Do not remove a microSD card while files are being accessed or transferred. You could cause data loss or damage the card.

#### Using the microSD Adapter

Available microSD adapters allow use of microSD cards in SD-compatible devices, including PC card readers. Some adapters connect to USB ports.

To insert a microSD card into a microSD adapter, hold the microSD card with the label side facing up and the gold contacts toward the adapter. Gently insert the card into the microSD adapter and slide it into the adapter until it is fully inserted.

To remove a microSD card from a microSD adapter, grasp the front edge of the microSD card and gently pull it out of the adapter.

### Reformatting a microSD Card

If you need to reformat a microSD card at any time:

- 1. Insert the card into the slot (see above).
- 2. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 4. Highlight Memory Card and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 5. Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Memory card Settings**, and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 6. Highlight Format Card and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 7. You may be prompted to confirm the loss of data on the memory card. Press the **Yes** soft key if you agree. The card is formatted.

# **Call Functions**

## Making a Call

From the Idle screen, enter the phone number (with area code, if necessary), then press the A

**Note:** When you activate the **Auto Redial** option, the phone automatically redials up to ten times when the call is not answered or someone is already on the phone. For carriers that automatically divert unanswered calls to voice mail, the Auto redial feature will not provide useful service. See "Auto Redial" on page 156 for further details.

#### Making an International Call

- 1. Press and hold the •+ key. The + character appears.
- 2. Enter the country code, area code and phone number then press the key.

#### Correcting a Dialed Number

- 1. To correct one or more digits in a dialed number:
  - ♦ To clear the last digit displayed, press the is key.
  - ◆ To clear another digit in the number, press the Left or Right navigation key until the cursor is immediately to the right of the digit to be cleared. Press the c key.
  - To enter a missing digit, press the Left or Right navigation key until the cursor is in position and enter the digit.
  - ◆ To clear the whole display, press and hold the \_\_\_\_ key.
- 2. Press the 🝙 key to return to the Idle screen.

#### Ending a Call

When you want to end your call, briefly press the for key.

#### Redialing a Recent Number

All incoming, outgoing and missed calls are listed in the Call History menu. If the number or caller is listed in your Contact List, the name associated with the number also displays.

To access the Call History menu:

- From the Idle Screen, press the Menu soft key or the key. Use the navigation keys to highlight Call History and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- Use the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll through the Call History options. Choose from All Calls, Missed Calls, Calls Made, or Calls Received and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll through the listed numbers until the number you want is highlighted.
- 4. Press 🝙 to dial the number.

You can also directly access the Call History screen:

- 1. From the Idle Screen, press the 
   key to display the Call History screen. The All Calls list is displayed; press the Left and Right navigation keys to scroll through the other lists (Missed Calls, Calls Made, and Calls Received).
- 2. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll through the numbers until the number you want is highlighted.
- 3. Press 🝙 to dial the number.

#### Making a Call from the Contact List

You can store the phone numbers that you use regularly in the SIM card or the phone's memory. These entries are collectively known as the **Contact List**. Once you have stored a number in the Contact List, you can dial it by pressing a few keys using the **Speed Dial** feature.

For further details, see "Contacts" on page 129.

## Adjusting the Volume

To adjust the earpiece volume during a call, use the Volume keys on the left side of the phone.

Press the  $\blacktriangle$  key to increase the volume level and the  $\blacktriangledown$  key to decrease the level.

In Idle mode, these keys adjust the ringer volume.

## Answering a Call

When a call is received, the phone rings and displays the caller's phone number. If the caller can be identified and their name is stored in your Contact List, the name is displayed.

#### To answer a call

1. If necessary, open the phone.

Note: When a headset is used, the phone does not need to be opened.

2. Press the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call.

If the **Any Key** option in the **Call Answer** menu is activated, you can press any key to answer a call except the result is key and the **Reject** soft key (see "Call Answer" on page 152 for more information).

If the **Flip Open** option in the **Call Answer** menu is activated, you can answer the call simply by opening the phone (see "Call Answer" on page 152 for more information).

3. End the call by pressing the results key.

Note: You can answer a call while using the Contact list or menu features. After ending the call, the phone returns to the function screen you were using.

## Missed Calls

Whenever you miss one or more calls, the number of calls missed is displayed on the Front LCD and on the Idle screen. If you only missed one call, the caller's number is displayed or, if the caller's name is stored in your Contact List, their name is displayed.

To view more than one missed call:

- 1. Open the phone.
- 2. Press the View soft key.
- 3. To scroll through the missed calls, press the Up or Down navigation key.
- 4. To call the highlighted number, press the  $\frown$  key.

Note: To view missed calls not displayed on the Idle screen, go to the Call History menu,

highlight Missed Calls, and press the Select soft key or the 💭 key.

#### Viewing the Details of Missed Calls

To view the details of a missed call:

1. Open the phone.

- 2. Press the View soft key.
- Using the Up or Down navigation key, highlight the call you want to view and press the ● key or press the Options soft key, highlight Details and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

#### Calling back a Missed Call

To call back a missed call number:

- 1. Press the View soft key.
- 2. Using the Up or Down navigation key, highlight the call you want to return and press the **Options** soft key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Call Back** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.

#### Sending a Message to a Missed Call

To send a text message or MMS to a missed call number:

- 1. Press the View soft key.
- 2. Using the Up or Down navigation key, highlight the call you want to return and press the **Options** soft key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Send Message** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Text Message or MMS and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

For more information on sending messages, see "Send Text Message" on page 109 or "Send MMS" on page 112.

#### **Deleting Missed Calls**

1. Press the View soft key.

- If you want to delete one call, press the Up or Down navigation key to highlight the number you wish to delete and press the **Options** soft key. If you want to delete all calls, press the **Options** soft key.
- 3. Press the Down navigation key to scroll to the **Delete** option and press the key or Right navigation key.
- 4. To delete one call, highlight Selected and press the Select soft key or
  ♦ key. To delete all calls, highlight All and press the Select soft key or
  ♦ key. Press Yes to confirm the deletion.

## Silent Mode

Silent mode is convenient when you want to stop the phone from making any sounds, such as when you are in a theater. Your phone provides a choice of two silent modes, Mute (the phone gives only visual indication on the screens when a call is received) or Vibration (the phone vibrates and provides visual indication). For instructions on setting the Silent Mode, see "Silent Mode" on page 143.

# **Options During a Call**

Your phone provides a number of features that you can use during a call.

## In Call Options

During a call, press the **Options** soft key to access the following:

- Hold: Places the call on hold.
- New Call: Places the current call on hold and allows you to enter and dial another number.
- Contact List: Accesses the Contact List information.
- Message: Allows you to access Create Text Message or messages saved in My Messages.
- Calendar: Launches the calendar and lets you create events while on a call.
- Mute Keypad Tone: Silences the key tones when on the call.
- Send DTMF: Sends DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones to the caller.

## Hold

You can place the current call on hold at any time. You can also make another call while you have a call in progress.

To put a call on hold:

- While on a call, press the **Options** soft key. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll to **Hold** and press the **Select** soft key. The call is placed on hold.
- 2. You can reactivate the call by pressing the **Resume** soft key.

#### To make a call while you have a call in progress:

- While on a call, press the Options soft key. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to scroll to New Call and press the Select soft key. The first call is placed on hold.
- 2. Enter the new number and press the 🕞 key to dial the second call.

When you have an active call and a call on hold, you may switch between the two calls, changing the one on hold to active and placing the other on hold, by pressing the **Swap** soft key. The current call is placed on hold and the call on hold is reactivated so that you can speak with that person.

3. To finish, end each call by pressing the 💿 key.

## Switching the Microphone Off (Mute)

You can temporarily switch your phone's microphone off so that the other person on the call cannot hear you. For example, you might wish to speak to another person in the room but do not want the person on the call to hear you.

#### To switch the microphone off temporarily:

Press the Mute soft key. The soft key indicator changes to Unmute and the other person on the call can no longer hear you.

To switch the microphone back on:

Press the Unmute soft key. The other person on the call can hear you again.

## Using the Speakerphone

Speakerphone lets several persons near the phone participate in a call at the same time by broadcasting the voice or voices of those on the other

end of the telephone line and using the microphone to capture the voices of everyone near the phone. To use the speakerphone function:

- 1. During a call, press the 
  key.
- 2. Use the volume keys (on the left side of the phone) to adjust the volume.

## Muting or Sending Key Tones

This option allow you to turn the key tones off or on. If the **Mute Keypad Tone** option is selected, your phone does not transmit the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones produced by the numeric keys during a call, which allows you to press keys to perform phone functions without hearing annoying key tones.

Note: To communicate with answering machines or computerized telephone systems, the Send Keys option must be selected.

## Sending a Sequence of DTMF Tones

You can choose to send DTMF tones after entering the entire number you need to send rather than as you press the numeric keys. This option is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.

#### To send the DTMF tones:

- 1. When you are connected to the teleservice system, press the **Options** soft key.
- 2. Press the Down key to highlight the Send DTMF option.
- 3. Press the Select soft key.
- 4. Enter the number you want to send and press the **OK** soft key. The tones are sent.

## Searching for a Number in the Contact List

You can search for a number in the Contact List during a call.

- 1. Press the **Options** soft key.
- Use the Down navigation key to scroll to Contact List and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Enter the first few letters of the name to display entries listed starting with the first entry matching your input.
- 4. Begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry that matches the entered letters is highlighted.

To select a different contact than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down Navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted.

5. Press the 
key to open the contact information.

For further information on using the Contact list feature, see "Contacts" on page 129.

## **Call Waiting**

The Call Waiting feature lets you answer an incoming call while you have a call in progress.

.To answer a call while you have a call in progress:

- Press the key or the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
- To switch between the two calls, press the Options soft key and select the Swap option.
- 3. To end a call on hold, press the **Options** soft key and highlight the **End Held Call** option. Press the key or the **Select** soft key.

Note: In order for Call Waiting to function, you must set the Call Waiting-Voice Calls status to Activate. For information on changing Call Waiting settings see "Call Waiting" on page 155.

# Access Codes

There are several access codes used by your phone and its SIM card. These codes help you protect the phone against unauthorized use.

When requested for any of the codes listed below, enter the appropriate code (displayed as asterisks) and press the **Select** soft key. If you make a mistake, press continue or more times until the incorrect digit is cleared and then continue entering the correct code.

Except for the PUK and PUK2 codes, access codes can be changed using the Security menu (see page 147 for details).

Important! Avoid using access codes that are similar to emergency numbers, such as 911, so that you do not accidentally dial an emergency number.

### Phone Password

### PIN

The Personal Identification Number or PIN (4 to 8 digits) protects your SIM card against unauthorized use. It is usually supplied with the SIM card.

If you enter an incorrect PIN three times in succession, the code is disabled and cannot be used until you re-enable it by entering the PUK (see below).

## PUK

The 8-digit PUK (PIN Unblocking Key) is required to change a disabled PIN. The PUK may be supplied with the SIM card. If not, or you have lost it, contact your service provider.

To re-enable your PIN:

- 1. Enter the PUK and press the **OK** soft key.
- 2. Enter a new PIN of your choice and press the OK soft key.
- 3. When the **Confirm New PIN** message displays, enter the same code again and press the **OK** soft key.

If you enter an incorrect PUK ten times in succession, the SIM card becomes invalid. Contact your service provider for a new card.

## PIN2

The PIN2 (4 to 8 digits), supplied with some SIM cards, is required to access specific functions, such as setting the maximum cost of a call. These functions are available if supported by your SIM card.

If you enter an incorrect PIN2 three times in succession, the code is disabled and you cannot access the functions until you re-enable it by entering the PUK2.

To change the PIN2, see page 150.

### PUK2

The 8-digit PUK2 (PIN Unblocking Key 2), supplied with some SIM cards, is required to change a disabled PIN2. If you lose the code, contact your service provider.

To re-enable your PIN2:

- 1. Enter the PUK2 and press the OK soft key.
- 2. Enter a new PIN2 of your choice and press the OK soft key.
- 3. When the **Confirm New PIN2** message displays, enter the same code again and press the **OK** soft key.

If you enter an incorrect PUK2 ten times in succession, you will not be able to access the functions requiring the PIN2. Contact your service provider for a new card.

# **Entering Text**

This section explains the various text input modes available for entering characters into your phone. It also describes how to use the T9 predictive text entry system to reduce the number of key strokes required for entering text.

Your phone has the following text input modes:

- ◆ T9 Input modes (T9 abc, T9 Abc, T9 ABC): These modes let you enter words with only one keystroke per letter. As you press one key on the keypad for each letter, your keystrokes are automatically compared with an internal linguistic dictionary to determine the correct word, thus requiring far fewer keystrokes than the traditional Alphabet mode.
- Alphabet modes (ABC, abc, Abc): These modes allow you to enter letters by pressing the key labeled with the letter you want multiple times until the desired character displays. You can select all upper case, all lower case, or initial capital format.
- Number mode: This mode allows you to enter series of numbers.
- Symbol mode: This mode allows you to enter various symbols and special characters.

## Changing the Text Input Mode

When you are in a field that allows characters to be entered, you will see the text input mode indicator near the top right corner of the display.

**Note:** To enter symbols, press the number key corresponding to the symbol you want to enter. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to scroll through the blocks of available symbols. Press the **OK** soft key to exit.

## Using T9 Mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode based on a built-in dictionary that allows you to key in characters using a single keystroke. Your phone selects the most likely word based on your keystroke combinations.

#### To enter a word in T9 mode:

 Start entering a word by pressing the numeric keys. Press each key only once for each letter.

Example: To enter "HELLO", press the

 $4_{\text{M}}$ ,  $3_{\text{M}}$ ,  $5_{\text{M}}$ ,  $5_{\text{M}}$  and  $6_{\text{M}}$  keys.

As you type, the characters on the screen change as the built-in dictionary matches your keystrokes to commonly used words. Enter all letters in the word without editing or deleting the keystrokes.

- If the word displayed is not the one you want, press the e+ key to display an alternative word choice. Continue until the correct word displays or proceed to spell the word and add it to the phone's dictionary (see below).
- 3. Insert a space by pressing the 💷 key and start entering the next word.

To add a new word to the T9 dictionary:

- 2. Enter the word you want using Alphabet mode.

To enter a punctuation mark (period, hyphen, colon, apostrophe, etc.), press the key multiple times until the required mark appears.

- To shift case, use the to toggle between Initial Capital, Capital Lock, Lower Case and Number modes.
- ♦ You can move the cursor using the Left and Right navigation keys. To delete letters, press the c key. Press and hold the c key to clear the display.
- 3. Press the **Add** soft key. The word is added to the T9 dictionary and becomes the first word for the associated key presses.

## Using Alphabet Mode

Use the 2 to 9 keys to enter your text.

- 1. Press the keys labeled with the letter you want:
  - Once to enter the first letter
  - Twice in quick succession for the second letter
  - Three times in quick succession for the third letter
  - Four times in quick succession for the fourth letter
- 2. Select the other letters in the same way.

**Note:** The cursor moves to the right when you press a different key. When entering the same letter twice or a different letter on the same key, wait a few seconds for the cursor to move to the right automatically and then select the next letter.

- ◆ To shift the case in Alphabet mode, use the we key.
- You can move the cursor using the Left and Right navigation keys.
- ◆ To delete letters, press . Press and hold \_ to clear the display.

### Using Number Mode

Number mode lets you enter numbers into a text message. Press the keys corresponding to the digits you want to enter.

## Using Symbol Mode

Symbol mode enables you to insert symbols into a text message. Press and hold the  $\textcircled{\state{state}}}}}}}}}} here a class a$

# Transferring Files to a PC

You can transfer music, pictures, video clips and other files between your phone and a personal computer in several ways, including:

- using a USB cable
- using Bluetooth
- using a microSD card reader

File transfer between your phone and a PC using a USB cable requires a PC with available USB port and installation of Samsung's PC Studio 3 software (included with your phone). You can also transfer files between a microSD card in your phone and a PC using a USB cable and Microsoft Windows.

File transfer between your phone and a PC using Bluetooth requires a PC with Bluetooth wireless capability and installation of Samsung's PC Studio 3 software (included with your phone).

Note: For more information on Samsung PC Studio 3, consult the online help provided with the PC Studio 3 software.

## Transferring Files via USB Cable

### Between Phone and PC

To transfer files between your phone and a PC using a USB cable:

 Start the PC Studio 3 software. Connect the USB cable to a USB port on your PC and to your phone. The status message at the bottom right of the PC Studio screen changes from Not Connected to SGH-A516 Connected. **Note:** The first time you start the PC Studio 3 software, a connection wizard appears that leads you through the process of setting up your phone connection. Do not plug the USB cable into a USB port on your PC until instructed to do so by the software.

Note: Your phone's USB Setting must be set to PC Studio or Ask on Connection (see "Select USB Mode" on page 151).

- If your phone's USB Setting is Ask on Connection, the Ask on Connection window appears on the phone. Highlight PC Studio and press the Save soft key.
- In the PC Studio program, select Manage Files. The Phone Explorer window appears. It displays the folders on your phone at the top left of the screen, folders on your PC at the bottom left and contents of the highlighted folder on the right side.
- Using Phone Explorer, navigate to the folder(s) containing the files you wish to transfer. You can drag and drop files between computer and phone folders.

**Note:** The Graphics, Videos, Music and Ringtones folders on your phone will only accept compatible file formats – for example, music (.mp3) files must be placed in the Music folder, photo (.jpg) files in the Graphics folder. The Other files folder accepts all file formats.

Note: MP3 files less than 300KB will be stored in the Ringtones folder and MP3 files above 300KB will be stored in the Music folder.

**Note:** Files transferred from the computer are stored in your phone's memory. You can transfer them from the phone's memory to a microSD card if necessary.

### Between microSD Card and PC

To transfer files between a microSD card in your phone and a PC using a USB cable:

- 1. Connect the USB cable to a USB port on your PC and to your phone.
- If your phone's USB Setting is Ask on Connection, the Ask on Connection window appears on the phone. Highlight Mass Storage and press the Save soft key or the ● key.

Note: Your phone's USB Setting must be set to Mass Storage or Ask on Connection (see "Select USB Mode" on page 151).

- When "Connected" is displayed on the phone, open My Computer on the PC. The list of contents will include a "Removable Disk" with the name of the microSD card in your phone (the default card name is Samsung).
- Double click the disk icon to view the contents of the card. You can drag and drop files between the computer and the folders on the card.

### Transferring Files via Bluetooth

To transfer files using Bluetooth:

- 1. Start the PC Studio 3 software.
- 2. Select Manage Files. The Phone Explorer window appears.
- On the File menu, select Connection to open the Connection Manager window.
- Select Bluetooth. If you do not have a Bluetooth connection established, follow the on-screen instructions to create your connection.

Note: To receive data via Bluetooth, your phone's Bluetooth feature must be active. For more information on activating Bluetooth on your phone, see "Activation" on page 169.

5. Phone Explorer displays the folders on your phone at the top left of the screen, folders on your PC at the bottom left and contents of the highlighted folder on the right side. Navigate to the folder(s) containing the files you wish to transfer. You can drag and drop files between the computer and folders on the phone.

## Transferring Files via microSD Card

You can directly transfer music and other files between your PC and a microSD card.

- Remove the microSD card from your phone and insert it into your PC's card reader. If you are using an SD-compatible reader, first insert it into a microSD adapter (see "Using the microSD Adapter" on page 21).
- 2. Open My Computer on the PC. The list of contents will include a "Removable Disk" with the name of the microSD card.
- Double click the disk icon to view the contents of the card. You can drag and drop files between the computer and the folders on the card.

Note: The first time that a microSD card is inserted into your phone, your phone automatically creates a series of folders on it for file storage (Images, Videos, Music, Sounds, and Other files).

# Menus

The navigation keys on your phone allow you to scroll through menus quickly and easily. The scroll bar at the right of the menu keeps track of your position in the menu at all times.

- To navigate through a menu, press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as **Settings**, you may also navigate to the next menu by pressing the navigation key left or right.
- ◆ As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. Select any numbered option by simply pressing the corresponding number on the phone's keypad. You may also select any item by highlighting it and pressing the Select soft key or the ● key.

Note: When you access a list of options, your phone highlights the current option. If, there are only two options, however, such as **On/Off** or **Enable/Disable**, your phone highlights the option that is not currently active so that you can select it directly.

#### Accessing a Menu Function

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode. From the Menu, do one of the following:
- Scroll using the navigation keys (Up, Down, Left and Right) to reach the main menu you require (Internet, Media, Games & Apps, Call History, Rogers Mall, Messages, Rogers Music Player, Contacts, or Settings). Press the Select soft key or the ● key to enter the highlighted menu.
- 3. If the menu contains sub-menus, you can access them by scrolling using the Up or Down key and pressing the **Select** soft key or the key. If the menu that you have selected contains further options, repeat this step.

 To scroll through the menus, press the Up or Down navigation key. Press the Volume key (located on the left side of your phone) to move to the top or bottom of the displayed list. Press the Select soft key, or the ● key to make your selection.

To return to the previous menu level, press the **Back** soft key or the  $\boxed{\circ}$  key.

To exit the menu and return to the Idle screen, press the 💿 key.

#### **Using Shortcuts**

Numbered menu items, such as menus, sub-menus, and options can be quickly accessed using shortcut numbers corresponding to their location on the screen. For example, to access the Language menu:

- 1. Press the **Menu** soft key or the **O** key.
- 2. Press the wey for Settings.
- 3. Press the 💵 key for Set Phone
- 4. Press the Im key for Language.

The available languages are displayed.

# Internet

This menu (**Menu 1**) allows you to view Internet sites, configure your Internet browser or clear your cache.

### Home

This menu (**Menu 1.1**) takes you to an online homepage provided by your service provider. Selecting this menu connects the phone to the network and loads the homepage of the Wireless Web service provider.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access the menu.
- 2. Using the navigation keys, scroll to Internet and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 3. Select **Home** and press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key.

#### Navigating the Internet Browser

- Using a bookmark item in the Favorites folder; use the Go to Favorites option on the browser menu list or the Favorites menu.

### Entering Text in the Internet Browser

When you are prompted to enter text, the current text input mode is indicated on the screen. See "Entering Text" on page 36 for more information.

### Selecting and Using Menu Options

Various menus are available when you are using the Browser to navigate the Wireless Web. To access a menu option, press the menu soft key. A menu list displays.

The following options are available:

- Go to Favorites: shows the bookmarks list. You can bookmark the current page or access previously bookmarked pages.
- Go to Messages: allows you to send text messages or access saved messages.
- ♦ Go to Media: lets you access Media menus where you can download ring tunes, graphics, videos, music, tools and other files.
- Home: takes you back to the homepage of the Wireless Web service provider.
- Back: returns you to the previous page.
- Show URL: displays the URL address of the page that is currently displayed. It also enables you to save the current site in Favorites.

• Reload: reloads the current page.

### Favorites

This menu (**Menu 1.2**) lets you create bookmarks for your favorite Internet sites to quickly and easily access them in the future. Favorites stores your favorite URL addresses.

#### **Using Favorites**

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu.
- Using the navigation keys, scroll to Internet and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Select Favorites and press the Select soft key or the level.
- Scroll to the desired Favorite and press the 
   key to open the page or the Options key for the following choices:
  - Go: to access the bookmarked page
  - ◆ View: to see the name and URL of the bookmarked page
  - Send via: lets you send the favorite to someone else in a text message or MMS
  - Delete: to remove the favorite or all favorites

#### Storing a Favorite

Use the following procedure to store the URL of a page you have accessed in Favorites:

- 1. Open the Web page (see Accessing an Internet Site above).
- 2. Press the Menu soft key.
- 3. Select Go to Favorites.

- Using the navigation keys, scroll to an Empty location and press the Add New soft key or the ● key.
- 5. Change the Name if you wish.
- Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key or the ● key.

### Deleting a Favorite

Use the following procedure to delete a Favorite you no longer want in your Favorites menu:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu.
- 2. Highlight Internet and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 3. Select **Favorites** and press the **Select** soft key or the **•** key.
- 4. Scroll to the Favorite to be deleted and press the Options key.
- 5. Highlight **Delete** and press the **Select** soft key or the **(b)** key.
- 6. Highlight Selected and press the Select soft key or the level.

### **Browser Profiles**

Using this menu (**Menu 1.3**) you can set up and choose different profiles for the Internet browser.

### **Current Profile**

To change your browser profile:

- From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key or the 
  key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Highlight Internet and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

- Highlight Browser Profiles and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 4. Select Current Profile and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- Scroll to the profile you want to use and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 6. Select the **Back** key to return to the Internet menu or the return to the Idle screen.

### **Profile Setting**

To change browser profile settings:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Highlight Internet and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 3. Highlight Profile Settings and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- Scroll to the profile you want to change and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

For each profile, the following options are available:

- Profile Name: enter the name to be assigned to the Browser profile.
- ◆ Home URL: lets you set the address of your startup homepage. When the default homepage displays, delete it using the c key and enter your own choice.
- Proxy Use: select Enable or Disable.
- GPRS Setting: the following sub options are available:

Proxy Address: enter the IP address of the proxy server.

Proxy Port: enter the port number of the proxy server.

**APN**: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network gateway.

Login ID: enter the User ID required to connect to the GPRS network.

**Password**: enter the password required to connect to the GPRS network.

## **Clear Cache**

Using this menu (**Menu 1.4**) you can clear the information stored in the cache, the phone's temporary memory that stores the most recently accessed Web pages.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Highlight Internet and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 3. Highlight Clear Cache and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 4. Press the **Yes** soft key or the **()** key to confirm the deletion.
- 5. Press the **Back** soft key to return to the Internet menu or the return to the Idle screen.

# Media

The Media menu (**Menu 2**) is used to manage your media files (ring tunes, graphics, videos, music, and other files) and other tools (Camera, Record Audio, Recorded Audio, Alarms, Calendar, Notes, Calculator, Tip Calculator, Converter, Timer, Stopwatch and World time).

## **Ring Tune**

This menu (**Menu 2.1**) allows you to download ring tunes using the Internet browser and manage your ring tunes.

### **Downloading Ring Tunes**

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key. Highlight Ring Tune and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

### Graphics

In this menu (**Menu 2.2**), you can download new wallpaper images, select a new wallpaper image from your collection of pre-provided and downloaded graphics, and work with photos you have taken using the internal camera.

### Tools

#### Camera

This menu option takes you directly to either the Camera (for taking still photos) or the Camcorder (for taking video clips), depending on the mode last used. To switch from Camera to Camcorder, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Record Video** and press the **Select** soft key. To switch from Camcorder to Camera, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Take Photo** and press the **Select** soft key.

Note: As well as using the Camera menu, you can access the camera directly from the Idle screen by pressing the Camera key. Zoom Sound: turns on and off the sound that plays when zooming.

While viewing the Recorded Audio list, you can access various options by pressing the **Options** soft key. To execute an option, highlight it and press the **Select** soft key or the  $\bullet$  key. The following options are available:

- Play: allows you to play the file.
- Send via: allows you to send your file to other people in an MMS or via Bluetooth.
- Set as Alarm Tone: allows you to set the recording as one of your alarm tones.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected file or multiple files.
- Rename: allows you to change the name of the file.

- Move to Memory Card: moves the file to a microSD card in the phone's card reader.
- Copy to Memory Card: copies the file to a microSD card in the phone's card reader.

- 6. If the Alarm status is **Off**, highlight **Alarm** and press the Right navigation key to set it to **On**.
- 7. Press the Down navigation key to select **Alarm Time**. Set a time for the alarm to sound using the numeric keypad.

Note: Your phone is preset to a 12-hour format. To change the time format, see "Set Time & Date" on page 146.

- If the AM/PM setting is incorrect, press the Down navigation key to select AM/PM and use the Left or Right navigation key to toggle the setting.
- 9. Press the Down Navigation key to select the Alarm Day panel. Press the key to open the selection menu. The menu choices are:
  - Every Day: the alarm sounds each day at the Alarm Time.
  - Once Only: the alarm sounds the first time the Alarm Time occurs.
  - Individual Days: the alarm sounds at the Alarm Time only on the selected day(s).

For each selection you want to make, highlight it and press the 
key to place a check mark in the selection box. When you are finished, press the **OK** soft key to return to the Alarm menu.

 Press the Down navigation key to select Alarm Tone. Press the ● key to open the menu. To play any of the five available tones, highlight the name. Highlight the tone you wish to use and press the Select soft key or the ● key to select the tone.

- 11. To change the Snooze setting, press the Down navigation key to select Snooze. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to toggle the setting (Off, 1 Min, 3 Min, 5 Min, 7 Min, 10Min). Press the Down navigation key to select **Repeat** and use the Left and Right navigation keys to toggle the setting for the number of times to repeat the alarm (1, 2, 3, 5, 10).
- 12. Press the Save soft key to save the settings.

Note: The Alarm icon appears in the Icon area on the idle screen to show that an alarm has been set.

**Note:** To stop the alarm when it rings, open the phone and press any key. To use the snooze function to delay the alarm, press the Snooze soft key.

## Calendar

Using the Calendar feature (**Menu 2.5.5**), you can view any month, week or day. The current day is highlighted in the month and week views. You can also create Appointment, Anniversary, Miscellaneous and Task events on any day.

To view the Calendar:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- 2. Select Media and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 3. Select **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. The calendar opens in Month, week or day view, depending on the Default View setting (see below).

In **Month** view, the current date is highlighted by a box around the number. Appointments are indicated by a blue arrow at the lower right corner of the date, Anniversaries by a yellow arrow at the upper right corner, Miscellaneous events by a green arrow at the lower left corner and Tasks by a red arrow at the upper left. Icons across the bottom of the screen indicate the number of events of each type associated with the selected day.

Week view provides a grid with the days of the week across and daytime hours arranged vertically. The same arrow indicators as in Month view appear on the initial indicating the day and colored rectangles indicate the time slots where events are scheduled. To view the events on a specific day, use the navigation keys to highlight the day and press the 
key to open the day view.

**Day** view provides a list of the events associated with that day, the scheduled time and icons indicating the type of event, alarm indicator, etc.

In the Month and Week views, press the **Options** soft key or the **•** key to access the following options:

- View by: lets you change the view to one of the other options.
- Create: used to create a new event (Appointment, Anniversary, Miscellaneous or Task).
- Go to: lets you directly select the current day or a specific date.
- Event List: displays a list of specific type of event (Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous or Tasks).
- Delete: lets you delete events for the selected day, all events in a specific time period, all events in the selected month, or all events.
- Settings: allows you to select the calendar Starting Day (whether Sunday or Monday is the first day of the week) and Default View (whether the current month, week or day is displayed when the calendar is opened).

Note: The Start Date and End Date on event entry screens are automatically set to the date highlighted on the calendar when the screen is opened.

- Missed Alarm Events: provides a list of events with alarm time that has passed.
- Memory Status: Shows the number of Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous and Tasks saved on your phone. The phone holds a maximum of 400 events.

In Day view, press the **Options** soft key or the **•** key to access the following options:

- ◆ View: lets you view the details of the selected event.
- Create: used to create a new event (Appointment, Anniversary, Miscellaneous or Task).
- Send via: lets you send the information for the highlighted event to someone else via text message, MMS or Bluetooth.
- View by: lets you change the view to one of the other options.
- Event List: displays a list of specific type of event (Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous or Tasks).
- Delete: lets you delete events for the selected day, all events in a specific time period, all events in the selected month, or all events.
- Settings: allows you to select the calendar Starting Day (whether Sunday or Monday is the first day of the week) and Default View (whether the current month, week or day is displayed when the calendar is opened).
- Missed Alarm Events: provides a list of events with alarm time that has passed.

 Memory Status: Shows the number of Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous and Tasks saved on your phone. The phone holds a maximum of 400 events.

#### Creating an Appointment

To schedule an appointment reminder:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. If necessary, switch to Month view by selecting the Options soft key, View by, and then Month.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to select a date.
- 6. Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Create** using the navigation keys, and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 7. Highlight **Appointment** and press the **Select** soft key or the **(**key.

The following options are available:

- Subject: enter text describing the appointment.
- Details: enter any additional details of the appointment.
- Start Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.
- Start Time: use the numeric keypad to set the start time for the appointment.

- AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether the appointment starts in the AM or PM.
- End Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.
- End Time: use the numeric keypad to set the end time for the appointment.
- AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether the appointment ends in the AM or PM.
- ◆ Location: enter text detailing the location of the appointment.
- Alarm (before): allows you to set an alarm to remind you of this event and set the length of time before the event that the alarm should sound (number of minutes, hours, days or weeks).
- ◆ Alarm Tone: Press the key, choose one of the four available alarm tones and press the Select soft key.
- Repeat (until): allows you to repeat the same appointment daily, weekly or monthly until a specific date.
- When you have finished, press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key or the 
   key. The screen displays a list of appointments.
- 9. Select the **Back** soft key to return to the Calendar screen or the key to return to the Idle screen.

#### Creating an Anniversary

To schedule an anniversary reminder:

1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
key to access the menu mode.

- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. If necessary, switch to Month view by selecting the Options soft key, View by, and then Month.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to select a date.
- 6. Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Create** using the navigation keys, and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 7. Highlight Anniversary and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

The following options are available:

- Occasion: enter text describing the anniversary.
- Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.
- Alarm (before): lets you set an alarm to signal you a number of days or weeks before the anniversary.
- Alarm Time: use the numeric keypad to set a time for the alarm to sound.
- ♦ AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether to alarm in the AM or PM.
- ◆ Alarm Tone: Press the key, choose one of the four available alarm tones and press the Select soft key.
- Repeat Every Year: allows you to repeat the same reminder yearly.

- 8. When you have finished, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. The screen displays a list of anniversaries.
- Select the Back soft key to return to the Calendar screen or the key to return to the Idle screen.

#### Creating a Miscellaneous Reminder

To schedule a miscellaneous reminder:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. If necessary, switch to Month view by selecting the Options soft key, View by, and then Month.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to select a date.
- Press the Options soft key, highlight Create using the navigation keys, and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 7. Highlight Miscellaneous and press the Select soft key or the lever:

The following options are available:

- Subject: enter text describing the miscellaneous.
- Details: enter any additional details of the miscellaneous.
- Start Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.

- Start Time: use the numeric keypad to set the start time for the miscellaneous.
- AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether the miscellaneous starts in the AM or PM.
- End Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.
- End Time: use the numeric keypad to set the end time for the appointment.
- AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether the miscellaneous ends in the AM or PM.
- Alarm (before): allows you to set an alarm to remind you of this event and set the length of time before the event that the alarm occurs (number of minutes, hours, days or weeks).
- ◆ Alarm Tone: Press the key, choose one of the four available alarm tones and press the Select soft key.
- When you have finished, press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key or the 
   key. The screen displays a list of miscellaneous tasks.
- 9. Select the **Back** soft key to return to the Calendar screen or the key to return to the Idle screen.

#### Creating a Task

To schedule a task or 'to do' reminder:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. If necessary, switch to Month view by selecting the Options soft key, View by, and then Month.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to select a date.
- 6. Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Create** using the navigation keys, and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 7. Highlight Task and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

The following options are available:

- ◆ Task: enter text describing the task to be done.
- Start Date: if the displayed date is not correct, use the navigation keys and numeric keypad to enter the required date.
- Due Date: use the numeric keypad to set the due date for the task.
- Priority: use the Left or Right navigation key to select task priority (High, Normal, or Low).
- Alarm (before): allows you to set an alarm to remind you of this event and the length of time before the event that the alarm occurs (number of days or weeks).
- Alarm Time: allows you to set the time of day that the alarm occurs.
- AM/PM: use the left or right navigation key to select whether the alarm time is AM or PM.
- ◆ Alarm Tone: Press the key, choose one of the four available alarm tones and press the Select soft key.

- When you have finished, press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key or the 
   key. The screen displays a list of appointments.
- Select the Back soft key to return to the Calendar screen or the return to the Idle screen.

#### **Event Options**

The following options display when you press the **Options** soft key while setting an event.

- Save: saves the event in the corresponding event list (Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous, or Tasks).
- Select Language: allows you to enter text in English or Français (French).
- ◆ Cancel: this option cancels the event.

#### View an Event

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Calendar and press the Select soft key or the key. If necessary, switch to Month view by selecting the Options soft key, View by, and then Month.
- To view all events associated with a specific day, use the navigation keys to select a date and press the ● key.

To see all events of a particular type, press the **Options** soft key, select **Event List** and then the type of event: **Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous** or **Tasks**.

To see the details of a particular event in a list of events, highlight the event and press the  $\bigcirc$  key.

## Notes

Notes lets you create and save text files on your phone that can be viewed later. You can also send a note to someone else via text message, MMS or Bluetooth.

To create and save a note:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key.
- Highlight Notes and press the Select soft key or the key. A list of existing notes is displayed.
- Press the Options soft key, highlight Create and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 6. Type your note in the message window. For further information on entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 36.
- To save the note, press the 
   key or press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key.

While in the Notes screen, the following Options are available:

• View: allows you to view the contents of a note.

• Create: allows you to create a new note.

- Send Via: allows you to send the note to someone else. The options are Text Message, MMS or Bluetooth.
- Delete: allows you to delete a note or all notes.
- Memory Status: shows the number of notes on your phone and space left. The maximum number of notes is 100.

## Calculator

With this feature (**Menu 2.5.7**), you can use the phone as a calculator with basic arithmetic and mathematical functions. To use the calculator:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 4. Highlight Calculator and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 5. Enter the equation you want to solve.
  - Enter numbers using the numeric keys.
  - As shown in the diagram on the lower part of the screen, enter basic operators (+, -, × or ÷) using the navigation keys, decimal point using

```
the 💌 key, brackets using the 💷 key.
```

- To enter other operators, select the **Options** soft key, use the Up and Down navigation keys to highlight your selection and press the **Select** soft key. The menu choices are:
  - ^: logical conjunction
  - In: natural logarithm
  - $\sqrt{1}$  : square root

exp: exponent
X!: factorial
sin: trigonometric sine
cos: trigonometric cosine
tan: trigonometric tangent
∏: mathematical constant pi (3.14159...)
Go to Converter: opens the Converter (only available after you perform a calculation)

- ◆ To make corrections, use the ▲ and ▼ keys on the side of the phone to move left and right in the equation you have entered and press the c key to delete the character immediately to the left of the cursor.
- 6. To view the result, press the 
  key.

## Tip Calculator

The tip calculator (**Menu 2.5.8**) helps you calculate the tip on a meal or service and split the bill between the number of people paying. To use the calculator:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key.
- 4. Highlight Tip Calculator and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 5. Using the numeric keypad and the **\*** key (to enter the decimal point), enter the total amount of the bill in **Bill**.

- If you want a percentage other than the default 15%, use the Down navigation key to highlight Tip (%) and enter the new value using the numeric keypad.
- 7. If more than one person is paying, use the Down navigation key to highlight **# paying** and enter the number using the numeric keypad.

The total amount of the tip is shown in **Tip (\$)** and the amount each person pays in **You pay**.

## Converter

Using the Converter (**Menu 2.5.9**), you can easily determine many unit and currency conversions.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key.
- 4. Highlight **Converter** and press the **Select** soft key or the **(b)** key.
- Select the conversion type required (Currency, Length, Weight, Volume, Area or Temperature) and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 6. Press the Left or Right navigation key to select the original unit type and press the Down navigation key to select the amount field.
- Enter the amount to convert. Use the \*\* key to insert a decimal. Press the Down navigation key to select the next field.
- 8. Press the Left or Right navigation key to select the final unit type.
- 9. The converted value is displayed below the final unit type.

- ◆ To reverse the direction of the conversion, select the **Options** soft key, highlight **Reverse** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- To change the amount to be converted, press the Up navigation key until the amount field is highlighted and enter the new value using the numeric keypad.
- To perform a different conversion, use the Back soft key to return to the Converter menu.
- ◆ To change the preset currency conversion rates, press the Options soft key, highlight Currency Rates and press the Select soft key or the key. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to select the base rate to be used. Use the Down navigation key to select the value to be changed and enter the new value using the numeric keypad.

## Timer

The Timer (Menu 2.5.10) allows you to count down from a preset time to zero.

To start the timer:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **O** key.
- 4. Highlight **Timer** and press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key.
- 5. Press the Set soft key.
- 6. Using the numeric keys, enter the number of hours and minutes that you wish to count down and press the **OK** soft key.
- 7. Press the 
  key to start the timer.

To pause the countdown, press the 
key.

## Stopwatch

The Stopwatch (**Menu 2.5.11**) allows you to time an event and measure up to four separate sub-intervals, such as lap times. To use the stopwatch:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key.
- 4. Highlight **Stopwatch** and press the **Select** soft key or the **e** key.
- Press the key to start the stopwatch. You can measure up to four lap times by pressing the ● key.
- 6. Press the **Reset** soft key to erase the recorded times.

## World Time

World Time (**Menu 2.5.12**) allows you to view the time of day in two other parts of the world and graphically depicts the position of these time zones relative to the one you are in. Your current time zone is shown on the map by a white vertical line and house icon (see "Set Time & Date" on page 146 for information on setting you time zone).

To use World Time:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Tools** and press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key.

- 4. Highlight World Time and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 5. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to scroll to a time zone. The first selection box lists one or more well-known cities within the zone and the current time within that zone. The location of the zone is indicated on the map by a blue and white vertical line.
- 6. To see another time zone as well, press the Down navigation key to highlight the second selection area. Use the Left and Right navigation keys to scroll to the new time zone. This zone is indicated on the map by a red and white vertical line.

To choose which of the time zones to apply Daylight Savings Time in:

- press the Options soft key, highlight Set Daylight Saving Time and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- Use the Up and Down navigation keys to move through the list of cities and press the 
   key to add or remove check marks beside the names.

# **Other Files**

This folder allows you to store and access other types of files on your phone, such as Excel spreadsheets, text files, PowerPoint presentations, PDFs, HTML, JPEGs, GIFs, BMPs, and Word documents. You can send these files to others by message, email, or Bluetooth. You can also move or copy the files to your memory card. To open the Other Files folder:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Media and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

3. Highlight Other Files and press the Select soft key or the level.

If no memory card is in your phone, only the Other Files folder appears. If a memory card is in your phone, two folders appear. Highlight **Other Files** to access files stored on your phone or **Memory Card** to access files stores on a memory card and then press the **Select** soft key or the key.

While in the Other files folder, press the **Options** soft key to access the following options (availability depends on the type of file currently highlighted):

- Send via MMS: Lets you send the selected file to a recipient in an MMS.
- Delete: Lets you delete the selected file or multiple files.
- Rename: Lets you change the name of the selected file.
- Move to Memory Card: Lets you move the selected file to a microSD memory card inserted into your phone's card reader.
- Copy to Memory Card: Lets you copy the selected file to a microSD memory card inserted into your phone's card reader.
- Print via Bluetooth: allows printing the file to a Bluetooth-enabled printer. This option is available if you have highlighted a printable file, such as a picture.
- Lock: lets you lock the file to prevent accidental deletion.
- Properties: displays all the properties of the currently selected file.

# Memory Card

This menu displays the contents of a memory card in the phone, including folders, folder contents and file sizes. The phone automatically creates a series of folders on the card that can not be deleted or renamed (Images, Videos, Music, Sounds, Other Files). Other folders are created as required to hold files from the phone and can be deleted or renamed (Graphics, Record, Ring Tunes, Video, Voice List, etc.).

While viewing memory card contents, press the **Options** soft key to access various options (availability depends on the type of file or folder currently highlighted).

When a folder is highlighted:

- Open: opens the selected folder or subfolder.
- Create Folder: lets you create an additional folder at the same location.
- Delete Folder: lets you delete the selected folder.
- Rename Folder: lets you change the folder name.
- Sort by: allows you to sort the window contents by Date, Type, Name or Size.
- Properties: shows the folder name, size, contents (number of files and folders), Created Time and Last Modified Time.
- Memory Card Settings: Lets you view the card Properties (Capacity, Used Space, Free Space), and Format Card.

When a file is highlighted:

- View: allows you to view an image.
- Send via MMS: allows you to forward the file to someone else via MMS.
- Set as: allows you to use an image as Wallpaper or Caller ID.
- Play via: plays an audio file via Phone or Bluetooth Stereo.
- Add to Playlist: adds the highlighted audio file to your playlist.
- ◆ Delete: allows you to delete the selected file or multiple files. To delete multiple files, use the key to select the files to delete and press the Delete soft key.
- Rename: allows you to rename the selected file.
- Sort by: allows you to sort the music files.
- Move to: allows you to transfer one or more files between the phone and memory Card. Use the key to select the file(s) to copy and press the Move soft key.

- ◆ Copy to: allows you to copy one or more files to the phone or Memory Card. Use the ● key to select the file(s) to copy and press the Copy soft key.
- Print via Bluetooth: allows you to print an image via Bluetooth.
- Create Folder: creates a folder at the same location.
- Lock: lets you lock the file to prevent accidental deletion.
- Properties: displays the file properties, such as Name, Date, Format, Resolution, Size, Quality and Lock/Unlock.

Note: This menu item only appears when a memory card is inserted in your phone.

Note: This menu item also appears in the Ring Tune, Graphics, Video, Music and Other Files menus when there is a memory card in your phone.

# **Memory Status**

The Memory Status menu allows you to view the usage and available memory for different kinds of data in My Files (Graphics, Ring Tune, Videos, Music, Other Files, JAVA) and Calendar (Appointments, Anniversaries, Miscellaneous, Tasks). Use the navigation keys to scroll through the different types of data.

# Games & Apps

Using the Games & Apps menu (**Menu 3**) you can play games already stored on your phone, as well as download games and other applications from your service provider.

## **Download Games**

This option allows you to download games from your service provider. Follow the online instructions shown on your display screen. Once you have downloaded games, they are added to your phone's list of games.

# My Games & Apps

Using this menu (**Menu 3.2**), you can play games stored on your phone, delete games, lock games, display game properties and change network settings.

## Game Options

While in the **My Games & Apps** screen, you can access the following options by pressing the **Options** soft key:

- 1. **Start:** starts the game that was selected on the screen when you entered the Options menu.
- 2. **Delete:** lets you delete the game that was selected on the screen when you entered the Options menu.
- 3. Lock: locks the selected game so it can't be accidentally deleted.
- Properties: displays the properties of the selected game, including Size, Version, Vendor and Advanced.
- 5. **Network Settings:** Allows entry and changes to the APN, Login ID, Password, Proxy and Proxy Settings.

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## To start a game

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access the menu.
- 2. Highlight Games & Apps and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- Highlight My Games & Apps and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 4. Scroll to the game you want to play and press the 
  key.

While in any of the call lists, press the **Options** soft key to access the following functions:

- Details: view call details (phone number, date and time of call).
- Call Back: calls the number back. You can also dial the number by pressing the 
   key.
- Save to Contacts: saves the number to your Contact List.
- Send Message: lets you send a text message or MMS to the caller.
- Delete: lets you delete the selected call or all calls from the list.
- Reject List: takes you to the Reject List.
- Add to Reject List: adds the phone number the selected call was made from to the Reject List.

# All Calls

This menu (**Menu 4.1**) lets you view a list of calls made and received, including missed calls. Icons at the left of each listing indicate whether the call was made ( $\checkmark$ ), received ( $\checkmark$ ) or missed ( $\checkmark$ ). Use the navigation key to scroll through the list and press the  $\odot$  key to view call details. The number is displayed along with the time and date when the call was made.

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# Missed Calls

This menu (**Menu 4.2**) lets you view a list of the calls you received but did not answer. Use the navigation key to scroll through the list and press the key to view call details. The number is displayed along with the time and date when the call was made.

### Calls Made

This menu (**Menu 4.3**) lets you view a list of the numbers you dialed. Use the navigation key to scroll through the list and press the  $\bigcirc$  key to view call details. The number is displayed along with the time and date when the call was made.

## Calls Received

This menu (**Menu 4.4**) lets you view a list of calls you answered. Use the navigation key to scroll through the list and press the **•** key to view call details. The number is displayed along with the time and date when the call was made.

### Speed Dial List

This selection takes you to the **Speed Dial List** where you can add phone numbers to the list (see "Speed Dial List" on page 135 for further information).

#### Delete All

This menu (Menu 4.6) allows you to delete all of the records in each call record type. You can also delete all of your call records at one time.

- 2. Go to https: enter a URL and press the key or press the Options soft key and then Submit to access a secure Web page.
- Yahoo! Search: lets you search on Yahoo! for specific words or images.

### Music & Tones

This menu (**Menu 5.2**) allows you to download music and ring tunes from your service provider.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Rogers Mall** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. Highlight **Music & Tones** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. The available options are shown on your display screen.

Downloaded ring tunes are added to your phone's list of downloaded ring tunes (see "Downloaded Ring Tunes" on page 57).

### Games

This menu (Menu 5.3) allows you to download games from your service provider.

Downloaded graphics are added to your phone's list of downloaded graphics (see "Downloaded Graphics" on page 60).

# Email/Chat

This menu (**Menu 5.5**) allows you to view email and instant messages using a web-based client.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Rogers Mall and press the Select soft key or the ● key. Highlight Email/Chat and press the Select soft key or the ● key. The available options are shown on your display screen.

## TV/Video

This menu (**Menu 5.6**) allows you to download TV and video clips from your service provider.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Rogers Mall and press the Select soft key or the ● key. Highlight TV/Video and press the Select soft key or the ● key. The available options are shown on your display screen.

Selecting this menu (**Menu 5.7**) connects the phone to the network and loads an online homepage that provides news and information links such as Yahoo! Canada and the Weather Network.

- Use the navigation keys to highlight Rogers Mall and press the Select soft key or the 
   key. Highlight News & Info and press the Select soft

### Internet

Selecting this menu (**Menu 5.8**) connects the phone to the network and loads the Rogers online homepage. For more information, see "Home" on page 51.

# Messages

You can send and receive a range of different message types from your mobile phone, including:

- Instant Message: Instant Messenger (IM) lets you send and receive instant messages using Windows Live and Yahoo! communities.
- Text Message: Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send text messages to another text messaging-capable phone. Your phone also supports the Enhanced Messaging Service (EMS), which enables you to include simple pictures, melodies, and animated images in your messages. To use this feature, you must subscribe to your service provider's message service.
- MMS: Multimedia Messaging Service allows you to send messages containing text and graphics, video and audio attachments to another MMS capable phone or an email address.
- Broadcast Messages: messages received from your service provider containing information related to a specific area (cell).

You can also use your phone to access **Voice Mail** (recorded voice) messages.

### Send Text Message

Use the following procedures to compose and send new text messages.

- From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key or the 
   key to access
   Menu mode.
- 2. Use the Navigation keys to highlight **Messages** and press the **Select** soft key or the **•** key.
- Highlight Create New Message and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

- 4. Highlight Text Message and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 5. Type your message in the message window. For further information on entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 36.

While you are composing your text message, press the **Options** soft key to select any of the following:

- Insert: allows you to insert text from saved Text Templates, a contact name and number from the Contact List, or bookmarked URLs from Favorites.
- Add Media: allows you to add images and sound to your message.
  - •Picture: allows you to add a picture to your message.
  - •Animation: allows you to add an animation to your message. Select Emotions or My Animations.
  - •Melody: allows you to add a melody to your message. Select between Preset Melodies and My Melodies.

◆ Attach: allows you to attach the following to the message:

- •Business Card: allows you to attach your business card to the message (see "My Business Card" on page 137).
- Appointment: allows you to attach an appointment to the text message.
- •Anniversary: allows you to attach an anniversary reminder or note to the message.
- •Miscellaneous: allows you to attach a miscellaneous file to the message.
- •Task: allows you to insert an entry from your calendar tagged as a Task.
- Save to: allows you to save the text message to Drafts or My Folder.
- Select Language: allows you to temporarily change the input language used to create your message between English and Français (French).

- Input Method: allows you to change the input method for adding text, numbers and symbols to your message. For more information, see "Changing the Text Input Mode" on page 37.
- **Text Style:** allows you to set Text Size, Text Style, Bold, Italic, and Alignment for the text entered.
- When you finish entering your message, press the Send To soft key or the ● key. Either enter each recipient's number in the slots provided, press the ● key to access your Contact List, or press the Option soft key to access the following options:
  - ◆ Contact List: allows you to insert recipients from your Contact List. To find a specific name, begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry matching your input is highlighted. To select a different entry than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted. Press the ● key to place a check mark next to the entry. Use the same procedure to select any additional recipients. When you have selected all entries, press the Select soft key to add the recipients to the Send screen.
  - Recent Recipients: allows you to choose from a list of recently dialed phone numbers. Highlight a required entry and press the

6. To add a photo to the message, highlight Graphic or Video and press the ● key or the Option soft key. Highlight Add Graphic and press Select soft key or the ● key. Select Take Photo to take a new photo and attach it to the message, Camera Album to add an existing photo, or Downloaded Graphics to attach a graphic downloaded from the Internet. Press the Select soft key or ● key to add the selected photo to the message and return to the message screen.

The Graphics screen also provides access to the following options:

- •Change Graphic: allows you to create or select a different graphic file.
- •Add Video: allows you to add a video file to the message (see below for details).
- •Preview: allows you to preview your photo before sending.
- •Save to: allows you to save the message to Drafts or My Folder.
- •Add Page: allows you to add additional pages to your message.
- •Edit Page: allows you to change Duration (page timing), Move Page Forward, Move Page Backward.
- •Attach: allows you to attach a file to the message (Business Card, Appointment, Anniversary, Miscellaneous, Task, Notes, or Other Files).
- •Send settings: allows you to select Delivery Report, Read Reply, Priority, Expiry, and Delivery After.
- •Remove Media: removes the photo attached to the message.
- 7. To add a video clip to the message, highlight Graphic or Video and press the key or the Option soft key. Highlight Add Video and press Select soft key or the key. Select Record Video to take a new video and attach it to the message, My Video Clips to add an existing video, or Downloaded Videos to attach a video downloaded from the Web. - •Save to: allows you to save the message to Drafts or My Folder.

- •Edit Page: allows you to change Duration (page timing), Move Page Forward, Move Page Backward.

- •Attach: allows you to attach a file to the message (Business Card, Appointment, Anniversary, Miscellaneous, Task, Notes, or Other Files).
- •Send settings: allows you to select the Delivery Report, Read Reply, Priority, Expiry, and Delivery After.
- •Remove Media: removes the audio file attached to the message.
- 9. To add text, highlight Message and press the key or the Options soft key, highlight Add and press the Select soft key or the key. Enter the required text then press the Options soft key and Save to save the text in the message and return to the message screen. The **Options** soft key also provides access to the following options while in the Subject screen:

- Insert: allows you to insert text from saved Text Templates, a contact name and number from the Contact List, or bookmarked URLs from Favorites.
- •Select Language: allows you to choose whether to type the subject in English or Français.
- •Text Style: allows you to choose text color, text size, bold, italic and underline.
- 10. When you finish entering your message, press the Send To soft key or the ● key. Either enter each recipient's number in the slots provided, press the ● key to access your Contact List, or press the Option soft key to access the following options:
  - ◆ Contact List: allows you to insert recipients from your Contact List. To find a specific name, begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry matching your input is highlighted. To select a different entry than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted. Press the ● key to place a check mark next to

the entry. Use the same procedure to select any additional recipients. When you have selected all entries, press the **Select** soft key to add the recipients to the Send screen.

- ◆ Group: allows you to insert Group members from your Contact List. Highlight a Group and press the ● key or the Select soft key to open the Group. ### Message Folders

Your **Inbox** stores all your received messages, while your **Outbox** stores messages waiting to be sent. **Drafts** stores messages that you have saved to be completed later. **Sent** stores copies of messages that have been sent.

The text message icon is displays when you have received new text messages. The MMS icon is displays when you have received new MMS messages.

If the phone's memory is full, an error message displays and you cannot receive any new messages. Use the **Delete** option to delete obsolete messages in each message box.

#### View Messages

To view a message stored in your Inbox, Outbox, Drafts or Sent folder:

- From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key or the 
   key to access
   Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Messages and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 3. Highlight Inbox, Sent, Outbox, or Drafts and press the Select soft key or the key. The corresponding message list opens.

While viewing the message list, you can press the **Options** soft key to access a series of options (not all options are available in each menu):

View: allows you to view the message.

Reply: allows you to reply to the message via Text message.

Call Back: allows you to dial the originating message number.

Forward: allows you to forward the message to someone.

Delete: allows you to delete the message.

Move to My Folder: lets you move messages to the My Folder storage area.

**Move to Phone/Move to SIM:** If a message is stored in the SIM card, this option transfers it to the phone's memory. If a message is stored in the phone's memory, it is transferred to the SIM card.

**Sort by:** allows you to sort messages by Date, Read/Unread, Sender, Type, Size or Subject.

Lock: prevents the message from being deleted.

Send Again: allows you to send an unsent message.

Edit: allows you to modify the message.

 To access a message in the list, press the Up or Down navigation key to scroll through the message screen until the message is highlighted, then press the ● key.

While viewing the content of a message, you can press the **Options** soft key to access a series of options (not all options are available in each menu):

Reply: allows you to reply to the sender of message.

Call Back: allows you to dial the originating message number.

Forward: allows you to forward the message.

Delete: deletes the message.

Move to My Folder: lets you move messages to the My Folder storage area.

**Move to Phone/Move to SIM**: If the message is stored in your SIM card, this option transfers it to the phone's memory. If the message is stored in the phone's memory, it is transferred to your SIM card.

Add to Block List: adds the number the message was sent from to the blocked number list.

Extract Address: allows you to save the recipient or sender's number and URL, Email addresses or phone numbers from the message text.

Lock: allows you to lock the message to prevent deletion.

Before using instant messaging on your phone you must create a default community account. To access your default community session settings, use the following steps:

  - Send via: allows you to compose a text or MMS with the template content inserted into the body of the message. For further details on sending messages, see "Messages" on page 109.
  - Edit: allows you to edit the currently highlighted template text.
  - Delete: allows you to delete the highlighted template or select multiple templates for deletion. You are asked to confirm the deletion by pressing the Yes soft key.

Note: For further information on entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 36.

# Voice Mail

This menu allows you to access your voice mailbox, if your account supports this service.

Note: Voice mail is a network feature. Please contact your service provider for further details.

#### **Configure Your Voice Mail**

Before using your phone's Voice Mail feature, you must have a valid voice server number configured in your phone. If your service provider has not configured the number for you already or you need to change the number, use the following procedure to enter the voice server number obtained from your service provider.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the Navigation keys to highlight Messages and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 3. Highlight Voice Mail and press the Select soft key or the level.
- Highlight Voice Mail Number and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 5. Press the key (or the **Options** soft key, highlight **Edit**, then press the **Select** soft key) to access the number entry screen.

   message folders list opens.
- Use the Up and Down keys to navigate through the list and press the
   key to check/uncheck categories of text messages.
- 5. Press the **Delete** soft key. You are asked to confirm the deletion by pressing the **Yes** soft key.

# **Messages Settings**

This menu lets you set up various options for using text and multimedia messaging services. To access the **Settings** menu:

1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the ● key to access Menu mode.

#### Text Message

The following Text Message (SMS) settings are available:

- 1. Send Settings:
  - Reply Path (SIM Dependent): allows the recipient of your message to send you a reply through your message center, if your network supports this service.
  - Delivery Report (SIM Dependent): allows you to activate or deactivate the report function. When this function is activated, the network informs you whether or not your message has been delivered.
  - Validity Period (SIM Dependent): you can select the length of time your messages are stored in the message center after they are sent. The actual expiry date is determined by your service provider's configuration.
  - Message Type (SIM Dependent): set the default type to either Text, FAX, Voice, ERMES, X.400 or E-Mail.
  - Service Center: allows you to enter the number of your service center.
- 2. Block Number: allows you to block a number from being received on your phone.

#### MMS

The following MMS settings are available:

- 1. Send Settings:
  - **Delivery Report:** when this option is enabled, the network informs you whether or not your message has been delivered.

- Read Reply: when this option is enabled, your phone sends a request for a reply along with your message to the recipient.
- Priority: you can select the priority level of your messages (High, Normal, Low).
- Expiry: select the length of time you wish the message to remain on the MMS server (1 Hour, 6 Hours, 1 Day, 1 Week, Maximum).
- Delivery After: you can set a time delay before the phone sends your messages (Immediately, 1 Hour, 6 Hours, 12 Hours, 1 Day, 3 Days, 1 Week, 1 Month).
- Receive Settings: you can specify the category of messages you want to retrieve.
  - Anonymous Reject: automatically rejects messages with a category of anonymous.
  - ◆ Ads allowed: allows messages with a category of advertisement.
  - Report Allowed: allows network to report to the sender who requested the report.
  - Send Read Report: sends a read report to the message sender.
  - Message Reception: allows you to set the message receipt options. Choose from Manual, Automatic, or Reject.
- 3. **Profiles:** you can select a connection profile to be used for sending and receiving MMS.
  - Current Profile: allows you to select a profile for sending a message. The default profile is RogersMedia and there is space for four additional profiles.
  - Profile Settings: The default profile is RogersMedia and there is space for four additional profiles.
- Block Number: allows you to enter numbers to be blocked from your phone.

- Message Class: allows you to set the message class default for your messages. Choose from Text Only, Small Imaging, Moderate Imaging, Small Video, or Moderate Video.
- 6. **Creation Mode:** allows you to set the creation mode for the message. Choose from Warning, Free, or Restricted.

#### Rogers IM

This menu lets you set the default profile used for MMS access. Your initial default setting is **GoRogers**. For more information, see "Profile Setting" on page 55.

The following IM settings are available:

- 1. Default Community: allows you to select Windows Live or Yahoo!
- 2. **Favorite IDs:** stores a list of IDs. Press the Create soft key and enter the Sign in as, Email Address and Password information.
- 3. **Power On Sign In:** allows automatic sign in to Windows Live or Yahoo! when the phone is switched on.
- Community Settings: allows you to turn automatic sign-in on or off; change sound settings for Receive Message, Contact Alert and System Message (Melody, Vibration, Vibration then Melody, Silent); and set Repetition (once, Every 1 Min, Every 2 Min).
- 5. **IM Profiles:** lets you set the Current Profile and Profile Settings for sending and receiving IM messages.

#### **Push Messages**

This setting selects whether or not to receive push messages. The settings are: Never, Always and Text Message-C Specific (which also enables entry of the Service Center number).

#### **Broadcast Messages**

Broadcast messages are transmitted to all phones within the area.

The following options are available:

- 1. **Read**: allows you to view broadcast messages stored in the Archive or Temporary folder.
- Activation: allows you to enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.
- Channel List: allows you to indicate the channels from which you wish to receive broadcast messages. You can enable all channels or enter individual channels on the My Channels screen.
- Language: allows you to select your preferred language for display of cell broadcast messages. The choices are All, English or Français (French). Please contact your service provider for further details.


# **Memory Status**

For each type of message (Text Message, MMS, Push Message), you can check the total memory space available and the amount remaining. You can also view the amount of space currently occupied by each message box (Inbox, Sent, Outbox, Drafts, My Folder).

# **Rogers Music Player**

The Rogers Music PLayer menu (**Menu 7**) launches the Java-powered Rogers Music Player, which lets you lets you play music you have downloaded from your service provider or loaded from your PC to your phone or Micro SD memory card. This feature also lets you buy new songs, manage your playlists and customize the Music Player settings.

- From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key or the 
   key to access
   Menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Rogers Music Player** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. Rogers Music Player loads.
- 3. Use the navigation keys corresponding to the screen icons to access the Search, Download, Library and Settings menus. Press to play.



4. Press the Options soft key to access additional music player functions, including online Help.

See your service provider for further details.

# Shopping for Music

When shopping for music, use the navigation keys to browse, and follow the online instructions to download songs. In most cases a fee is associated with each song you download.

# Contacts

The Contacts menu (**Menu 8**) is used to manage your contact list. You can store names and phone numbers in both your SIM card and your phone's memory, which are physically separate but both used to create the contact list. You can also create contact groups and assign speed dial numbers to your numeric keypad.

Note: When you change phones, numbers stored in your SIM card memory are automatically available with the new phone, whereas numbers stored in the phone's memory must be reentered or transferred using a data kit accessory. However, contacts stored on the phone may include additional details not available on the SIM card.

## Add New Contact

Use the following procedures to store a new contact to your phone or SIM card.

#### Storing a Number in the Phone's Memory

Note: The default mode for saving contacts saves to your SIM Card. To set it to Phone or Ask on Saving, see "Management" on page 139.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Contacts** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Add New Contact and press the Select soft key or the key.
- If the saving mode is set to Ask on Saving, the Save to screen appears. Highlight Phone and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

- 5. In the Create Contact screen, enter the information you want to save for this contact. The following fields are available for input:
  - First Name: For recording the contact's first name
  - ◆ Last Name: For recording the contact's last name
  - ◆ Mobile: for recording a mobile phone number
  - Home: for recording a home number
  - Office: for recording a business number
  - FAX: for recording a Fax number
  - Other: for recording one additional number
  - E-Mail: for recording an e-mail address
  - ◆ Graphic ID: lets you choose a graphic Caller ID for this contact. Highlight the Graphic ID icon and press the ● key to enter the Graphic ID screen. Choose Create New to activate the camera to take a photo, Camera Album or Downloaded Graphics to access stored images, Default Image to select from a series of icons, or Not Assigned to assign no image. Press the Select soft key or the ● key to make a selection.
  - ◆ Ring Tune: allows you to choose a ring tune that plays when this contact calls. Highlight the Ring Tune icon and press the key to open the Ring Tune screen. Choose from Default Ring Tunes, Recorded Audio, Downloaded Ring Tunes or Not Assigned. Press the Select soft key or the key to make a selection.
  - ◆ Group: allows you to assign this contact to group. Highlight Group and press the ● key to open the Group Setting screen. Choose from Family, Office, Friends or Not Assigned (the default setting). Press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
  - Notes: lets you add any other information you wish to record with this contact.

For information on text and numeric entry, see "Entering Text" on page 36.

- 6. To save the information, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 7. To return to the Idle screen, press the 💿 key.

#### Storing a Number in the SIM Card

Note: The default mode for saving contacts saves to your SIM Card. To set it to Phone or Ask on Saving, see "Management" on page 139.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Contacts and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- Highlight Add New Contact and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 4. If the saving mode is set to Ask on Saving, the Save to screen appears. Highlight **SIM Card** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Enter the contact's name and number. You can select a location in the SIM memory or accept the default of the next available space. For information on text and numeric entry, see "Entering Text" on page 36.
- Press the Save soft key to save. To return to the Idle screen, press the 

   key.

The following options also appear in the SIM Card menu, however selecting any of them requires saving the information to your phone rather than the SIM Card. When you highlight any of these options and press the **exercises** key, the message Copy to Phone is displayed. Press the **Yes** soft key

Contacts 131 to transfer the contact information to the contact list in your phone and enable these options.

- ◆ Graphic ID: lets you choose a graphic Caller ID for this contact. Highlight the Graphic ID icon and press the ● key to enter the Graphic ID screen. Choose Create New to activate the camera to take a photo, Camera Album or Downloaded Graphics to access stored images, Default Image to select from a series of icons, or Not Assigned to assign no image. Press the Select soft key or the ● key to make a selection.
- ◆ Ring Tune: allows you to choose a ring tune that plays when this contact calls. Highlight the Ring Tune icon and press the key to open the Ring Tune screen. Choose from Default Ring Tunes, Recorded Audio, Downloaded Ring Tunes or Not Assigned. Press the Select soft key or the key to make a selection.
- ◆ Group: allows you to assign this contact to group. Highlight Group and press the ● key to open the Group Setting screen. Choose from Family, Office, Friends or Not Assigned (the default setting). Press the Options soft key, highlight Save and press the Select soft key or the ● key.

# Find Contact Information

To view the stored information for a contact:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Contacts** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 3. Highlight Contact List and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 4. Begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry matching your input is highlighted.

To select a different entry than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted.

5. Press to dial the number or the key to view the contact information.

#### **Contact List Options**

While accessing the Contact List, press the **Options** soft key to use any of the following options:

- View: lets you view the information for the highlighted contact.
- ◆ Edit: allows you to edit the name, number, and settings for Graphic ID, Ring Tune, and Group. Press the ● key to save the changes.
- Send Message: allows you to send a text message or an MMS to this contact.
- Add New Contact: lets you add a new contact to the Contact List in the phone or SIM Card.
- ◆ Call: allows you to place a call to the highlighted contact.
- Copy to Phone/SIM: allows you to copy contact information from one storage location to the other.
- Send Business Card via: allows you to send your business card information via text message, MMS or Bluetooth.
- Assign Speed Dial: allows you to set a speed dial key for this entry.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected Contact List entry or all entries.
- Select Language: lets you select the display language. The choices are English and Français (French).

# Group

Using Group you can organize your contacts into groups such as Family, Office, and Friends. You can also assign a unique Caller ID or ring tune to members of the group.

#### Adding Contacts to the Group

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu.
- 2. Select Contacts and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 3. Select **Group** and press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key.
- Using the Up and Down navigation keys, scroll to the group that you wish to add the contact(s) to and press the ● key.
- Press the Options soft key, highlight Add New Group and press the Select soft key or the 
   key. The Contact List opens.
- Using the Up and Down navigation keys, scroll to each name to be added to the Group and press the ● key to place a check mark beside the name.
- To find a specific name, begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry matching your input is highlighted. To select a different entry than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted.
- When you are finished selecting names, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Add New Group** and press the **Select** soft key or the 
   e key. The selected contacts are added to the group.
- 9. Press the **Back** soft key to exit to the Group screen or the return to the Idle screen.

#### Group Settings

From the Group screen, you can access the following options for each group by highlighting the group name and pressing the **Options** soft key:

- View: Opens the group list.
- Add New Group: allows you to create a new group.
- Edit: allows you to change the name of the group, graphic ID or ringtone.
- Send Message: allows you to send a text message or MMS to one or more members of the group.
- Delete Group: allows you to delete the selected group.

Note: Deleting a group does not delete individual Contact entries.

# Speed Dial List

You can assign up to eight phone numbers from your Contact List to number keys 2 to 9 and dial them whenever you want simply by pressing and holding the associated number key.

#### Setting up Speed-dial Entries

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access the menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Contacts and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight **Speed Dial List** and press the **Select** soft key or the **•** key.
- Highlight the number key to be assigned a speed-dialing number (key 2 to 9). Press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Add** and press the **Select** soft key or the 
   expected key to select **Add**, and choose **Contact** or **FDN** Contact. The Contact List opens.

Note: Speed dial key 1 is reserved for your Voice Mail server number.

5. Begin entering the letters of the name. As you type, the first Contact List entry matching your input is highlighted.

To select a different entry than the one that is highlighted, press the Up or Down key until the entry you want is highlighted.

 Press the 
 key or the Options soft key then Select soft key to save the speed dial number. The name associated with this phone number appears on the Speed Dial List screen immediately below the speed dial number.

#### View, Change or Delete a Speed-dial Entry

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Contacts and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Speed Dial List and press the Select soft key or the list key.
- 4. Highlight the entry you wish to change and press the **Options** soft key. Choose from the following options:
  - View: allows you to view the contact information for the phone number assigned to this speed dial key.
  - Change: allows you to change phone number assigned to this speed dial key. It takes you to the Contact List to make a new selection.
  - ◆ Call: calls the phone number assigned to this speed dial key.
  - Remove: allows you to remove the phone number assigned to this speed dial key.

5. When you are finished, press the **Back** soft key to return to the Contacts screen or e key to return to Idle mode.

# My Business Card

This menu allows you to create a Business Card file containing your contact information that can be sent to others for addition to their contact list.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access the menu.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Contacts** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight My Business Card and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 4. Enter the information you want to save for your Business Card. The following fields are available for input:
  - First Name: for recording your first name
  - Last Name: for recording your last name
  - Mobile: for recording a mobile phone number
  - ◆ Home: for recording a home number
  - ◆ Office: for recording a business number
  - Fax: for recording a Fax number
  - Other: for recording one additional number
  - Email: for recording an e-mail address
  - Notes: for adding any other information

For information on text and numeric entry, see "Entering Text" on page 36.

To change the type of field in a specific location, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Change Type** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. Highlight the required field type and press the **Select** soft key.

5. When you are finished entering information, press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key or the ● key.

# **Own Number**

This function is a memory aid that you can use to check your own phone number.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Contacts** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 3. Highlight **Own Number** and press the **Select** soft key or **O** key.
- 4. Highlight the name of the number you want to view. The number is displayed below the name.

### FDN List

FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict outgoing calls to the phone numbers in this list, which is stored in the SIM card. Use of the FDN List requires a PIN2 access number, which is available from your service provider.

When entering contacts into the FDN list, the following options are available:

- ♦ A full length number with a specific contact name can be entered into the FDN list.
- Wildcard entries allow a range of numbers to be dialed with a single entry: ex. 555 – All dialed numbers that begin with 555 will be allowed.

Note: You do not need to enter asterisks (\*) in wild card entries.

# Management

The Management menu provides access to several default settings and management functions for your phone.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access the menu.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Contacts** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 3. Highlight Management and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 4. Choose from the following options:
  - Default Saving: selects whether contact entries are automatically stored to your phone or SIM card or you are asked where to store each entry. Highlight a selection and press the Select soft key or the
     key.
  - ◆ Copy All to: lets you copy all contact entries to either the phone or SIM card. Duplicate entries are created in the Contact List. Highlight a selection and press the Select soft key or the key.
  - ◆ Sort by Contacts: lets you choose whether to sort contacts by first or last name. Highlight a selection and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
  - ◆ Delete All: lets you delete all contact entries, all entries on the phone or SIM card, or all entries in the FDN list on the SIM card. Highlight a selection and press the key to place a check mark in the selection box. Press the Delete soft key or the key to delete the entries.
  - Memory Status: displays the available memory space on your phone and SIM card and the amount currently in use.

Note: The use of Copy All to creates duplicate entries in the Contact List.

Note: Deleting all entries in the FDN list requires entry of the PIN2 password.

Note: Once contact entries have been deleted, they cannot be recovered.

# Service Number

You can view the list of Service Dialing Numbers (SDN) assigned by your service provider. These numbers can include emergency numbers, directory enquiries and voice mail numbers.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key or the 
  key.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Contacts and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Service Number and press the Select soft key or the level.
- Scroll through the numbers using the Up or Down navigation key until the required number is highlighted.
- 5. To dial the number displayed, press the **Dial** soft key.

Note: This option is available only when your SIM card supports Service Dialing Numbers.

# Settings

This menu (Menu 9) allows you to customize numerous phone settings to suit your preferences.

# Set Sound

You can use the Set Sound menu to customize various sound settings, such as:

- ring melody, volume and type
- sounds made when you press a key, receive a message, or switch your phone on or off
- alert tone made every minute during a call, or when your call is connected

To access the Set Sound menu:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Set Sound and press the Select soft key or the level.

# Incoming Call

This menu allows you to make a selection from the following categories:

- Download Ring Tunes: allows you to access the Internet to download a new ring tune.
- ◆ Alert Type: allows you to set the alert default. Choose from Melody, Vibration, Vibration then Melody or Vibration and Melody.
- Ring Tune: allows you to select from the preloaded ring tunes.

 Volume: allows you to set the default volume for your ringer to sound when receiving an incoming call.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

## Keypad Tone

This menu allows you to select the tone and volume when you press the keypad, or turn the sound off.

- On/Off: turns the keypad tone on or off.
- ◆ Key Tone: Selects the type of tone (Beep or Xylophone).
- Volume: This option allows you to adjust the keypad volume to one of seven levels.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

## Message Tone

This menu allows you to control how the phone informs you that a new text message or multimedia message has been received. You can select a different type of tone for different kinds of messages.

For each message tone, the following options are available:

- Message Tone: you can select a message tone.
- ◆ Alert Type: you can select the type of message alert.
  - •Off: the phone does not use a message tone.
  - •Melody: the phone sounds the selected message tone.
  - •Vibration: the phone vibrates.
  - •Vibration Then Melody: the phone vibrates then plays the message tone.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

# Power On/Off Tone

This menu allows you to enable or disable the melody that the phone plays when it is switched on and off.

Press the Up or Down navigation key to make a selection (Off, Tone 1 or Tone 2). Press the **Save** soft key or the  $\bigcirc$  key to save changes.

# Silent Mode

This menu item allows you to select how your phone will respond to calls, messages or alarms when it is in Silent mode. You can choose:

• Vibration: your phone will only vibrate.

• Mute: your phone will not make a sound or vibrate.

Press the Up or Down navigation key to make selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the 
key to save changes.

# Set Display

In this menu you can change settings for both the Main Display and Front Display.

To access the Set Display menu:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Set Display and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

# Main Display

The following options are available:

- Wallpaper: allows you to select from the preloaded wallpapers. You can also set the Wallpaper as your menu background and change the transparency of the image.
- Info Display: allows you select the settings for the following:
  - •Text Position: allows you to change the position of the text displayed on the Idle screen (Top, Bottom, or Off).
  - •Text Style: allows you to choose normal, outline or shadow text.
  - •Text Color: allows you to select the color of the text to be displayed on the Idle screen.
- Theme: allows you to choose from two patterns for your phone's theme.
- Menu Style: allows you to choose Grid Menu or List Menu style for the main menu.
- Pop up List Menu: allows you to enable or disable pop-up menus for options with multiple sub-menus.
- Dialing Display: Allows you to set the Font Size, Font Color and Background Color.
- Calendar: allows you to display the calendar on the main display.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

# Front Display

This item selects the image to display in the centre of the front LCD. The choices are:

- Clock: displays a digital clock with AM/PM indicator and date.
- My Image: lets you choose one of a series of preset icons (happy face, star, heart, etc.).

• Screen Slogan: lets you enter a line of text to display.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the • key to save changes.

## **Light Settings**

#### Brightness

You can adjust the LCD brightness to help readability in different lighting conditions.

Press the Left or Right navigation key or press the Volume keys to adjust the brightness. Press the Save soft key or the 
key to save selection.

#### **Backlight Time**

In this menu, you can select the length of time that the Main Display remains on at full brightness and dimmed when the phone is idle. The selection includes:

- Main Display On: 15 Seconds, 30 Seconds, 1 Minute, 3 Minutes, and 10 Minutes.
- Main Display Dim: 15 Seconds, 30 Seconds, 1 Minute, 3 Minutes, and Off.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

#### Front LCD Contrast

You can adjust the Front LCD contrast to help readability in different lighting conditions. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to change the setting. Press the **Save** soft key or the **●** key to save changes.

# Set Time & Date

Use this menu to configure the settings for the time and date display.

 Time Zone Updating: allows you to choose Automatic, Manual Only, or Prompt First for time zone updates.

If Manual Only is selected, the following options are enabled:

- Home Zone: allows you to set your time zone for the phone.
- Time: allows you to enter the current time using your keypad.
- **AM/PM**: selects AM or PM setting when operating in 12 hour time format (see below).
- Date: allows you to enter the current date using your keypad.
- Time Format: allows you to change the time format to 12 hours or 24 hours.
- Date Format: allows you to select the date format you wish to use when the date is displayed. The choices are MM/DD/YYYY, DD/MM/YYYY or YYYY/MM/DD.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Save** soft key or the **●** key to save changes.

# Set Phone

Use this menu to configure various operational settings for your phone.

To change your phone's settings:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Set Phone and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

# Language

You can select the display language. The choices are:

- Automatic: language is automatically selected according to the language of the SIM card in the phone.
- English
- Français (French)

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the 
key to save changes.

# Shortcuts

The Shortcuts menu allows you to change the shortcuts assigned to the navigation keys. To change a shortcut:

- 1. Press the navigation key you want to change. The key icon changes from black and white to color.
- To change a shortcut, press the **Options** soft key and select **Change**. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the ● key to save the change.

To delete the selected shortcut or all shortcuts select **Remove** or **Remove All**. Press the **Yes** soft key to confirm the deletion.

# Security

The Security menu lets you restrict the use of your phone by others. Various codes and passwords are used to protect the features of your phone. They are described in the following sections and in "Access Codes" on page 33.

To access the Security menu:

1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.

- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Settings** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Set Phone and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 4. Highlight Security and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

#### Lock Phone

When the Lock Phone feature is set to On, the phone is locked and you must enter the 4 to 8-digit phone password each time the phone is switched on. Once the correct password has been entered, you can use the phone until you switch it off.

If the Lock Phone feature is set to Off, you are not asked to enter the phone password when you switch on the phone.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key to save changes.

#### Lock SIM Card

When the Lock SIM Card feature is set to On, your phone only works with the current SIM. In order to unlock the SIM and allow use of a different SIM card in the phone, you must enter the SIM lock code and your password.

When the Lock SIM Card feature is set to Off, your phone accepts other SIM cards.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Select** soft key or the **()** key to save changes.

#### Check PIN Code

When the Check PIN Code feature is set to On, you must enter your PIN each time you switch on the phone. Consequently, any person who does not have your PIN cannot use your phone without your approval.

Settings 148 When the Check PIN Code feature is set to Off, the phone connects directly to the network when you switch it on.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection and press the **Select** soft key or the **•** key. Enter your PIN and press the **OK** soft key to confirm the setting.

#### Lock Applications

Using this menu, you can lock specific applications on your phone. Once you have locked an application, you must enter the phone's password to access the associated menus. The applications that can be locked are:

- ♦ All
- Messages
- Call History
- Ring Tunes
- Graphics
- Videos
- Music
- Other Files
- Memory Card
- Contacts

For each selection you want to make, highlight it and press the **•** key to place a check mark in the selection box. When you are finished, press the **Save** soft key, enter your password, and press the **OK** soft key.

#### Set FDN Mode

Set FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict your outgoing calls to phone numbers stored in the FDN List. To set this mode you must enter your PIN2. For more information, see "FDN List" on page 138.

Note: Not all SIM cards have a PIN2. If your SIM card does not, this menu does not display.

#### Change Phone Password

The Change Phone Password feature allows you to change your current phone password to a new one. You must enter the current password before you can specify a new one.

Once you have entered a new password, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

#### Change PIN Code

This feature allows you to change your current PIN to a new one, provided that the PIN Check feature is enabled. You must enter the current PIN before you can specify a new one. Once you have entered a new PIN, you are required to confirm it by entering it again.

#### Change PIN2 Code

The Change PIN2 Code feature allows you to change your current PIN2 to a new one. You must enter the current PIN2 before you can specify a new one. Once you have entered a new PIN2, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

## **Greeting Message**

This menu allows you to set a greeting to be displayed briefly when the phone is switched on. Enter the text you want to display and press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key.

For information on entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 36.

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## **Network Selection**

This menu lets you choose whether to automatically or manually select the network used when roaming outside of your home area. If you select Automatic, you are connected to the first available network when roaming.

## Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode makes your phone incapable of placing or receiving calls while turned on. This lets you use the other functions of the phone, such as the camera, when in an area that does not allow the use of cellular phones.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the • key to save changes.

# Select USB Mode

This menu allows you to set how your phone is recognized by a PC when a USB connection is made. The options are

- Ask on Connection: When the phone is connected to a PC, a selection window appears that allows you to choose either PC Studio or Mass Storage connection.
- PC Studio: the phone is automatically recognized by Samsung PC Studio, a Windows-based PC programme package that you can use to manage personal data and multimedia files or access the Internet using the phone as a modem.
- Mass Storage: the PC recognizes a microSD card in your phone as a storage drive, allowing you to transfer files to and from the card. The card name is used as the drive name in the list of disk drives in My Computer on the PC.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the **●** key to save changes.

# Set Calls

This menu provides options for answering a call, displaying a number, alerts and notifications.

## General

#### Show My Number

If the network you are on allows it, you can prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person being called.

The following options are available:

- Set by Network: the default setting provided by the network is used.
- Hide Number: your number does not display on the other person's phone.
- Show Number: your number is sent each time you make a call.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the • key to save changes.

#### Call Answer

The following options are available to answer a call on your phone.

- Flip Open: allows you to answer the call when you open the phone.
- Any Key: allows you to answer the call when you press any key.

For each selection you want to make, highlight it and press the  $\bigcirc$  key to place a check mark in the selection box. When you are finished, press the **Save** soft key or the  $\bigcirc$  key to save changes.

#### **Call Status Tones**

Call Status Tones provide audible signals during a call. The options are:

Call Connect Tone: alert tone when your call is connected.

Settings 152 Minute Minder: alert tone made every minute during a call.

For each selection you want to make, highlight it and press the  $\bigcirc$  key to place a check mark in the selection box. When you are finished, press the **Save** soft key or the  $\bigcirc$  key to save changes.

#### Alerts on Call

Use this option to choose whether or not the phone informs you when you receive a new message or the time for an alarm is reached during a call. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the **•** key to save changes.

## Voice Call

#### Call Forwarding

This network service enables rerouting of incoming calls to a number that you specify, for example, forward your business calls to a colleague while you are on vacation.

To access the call forwarding options:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Settings** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- 3. Highlight Set Calls and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 4. Highlight Voice Call and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 5. Highlight Call Forwarding and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.

The following options are available:

• Forward always: forwards all voice calls and/or data calls.

- Busy: forwards Voice Calls and/or Data Calls to another number instead of your voice mail number if you are on another phone call.
- No Reply: forwards Voice Calls and/or Data Calls to the designated number instead of your voicemail number when there is no answer on your phone.
- Unreachable: calls are forwarded when you are not in an area covered by your service provider or when your phone is switched off.
- Cancel All: all call forwarding options are canceled.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key to save changes.

#### Call Barring

The Call Barring network service allows you to restrict different types of calls from being made or received. For example, you can prevent voice calls from being made to international phone numbers. This option is SIM dependent and requires a subscription. For more information, contact your service provider.

The following call-barring options are possible:

- All Outgoing Calls: bars this phone from making outgoing calls.
- Outgoing International Calls: bars this phone from making calls to international numbers.
- International Calls: bars all international calls. Not available from Rogers, contact your service provider for information on adding this service.
- ◆ All Receiving Calls: bars all incoming calls.
- Receiving Calls while Abroad: bars all incoming calls when abroad. Not available from Rogers, contact your service provider for information on adding this service.
- Cancel All: clears your call barring options.

 Change Barring Password: allows you to change the password used to set your call barring options.

Use the navigation keys to make selections and change settings. Press the **Select** soft key or the **●** key to save changes.

#### **Call Waiting**

The Call Waiting service informs you when someone is trying to reach you during another call. You can specify individual call waiting option for voice calls and/or data calls.

To access the call waiting options:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Set Calls and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 4. Highlight Voice Call and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 5. Highlight Call Waiting and press the Select soft key or the level.
- 6. Using the Up or Down navigation key, select the call type to which the call waiting option is to be applied (Voice Calls or Data Calls) and then press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Using the Up or Down navigation key, select Activate or Deactivate as necessary.
- 8. Press the Select soft key or 
  key to save the selection.

You can also deactivate all call waiting settings by selecting the **Cancel All** option.

#### Auto Redial

This option allows you to enable or disable the Auto Redial function for your phone. When you activate Auto Redial, the phone automatically redials up to ten times when a call is not answered or someone is already on the phone.

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the 
key to save changes.

Note: For carriers that automatically divert unanswered calls to voice mail, the Auto redial feature will not provide useful service.

# Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection.

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth. If the devices are within range of one another, you can exchange information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

The Bluetooth wireless technology settings menu provides the ability to view and change the device name, show the visibility, and set the security for the device.

# Turn Bluetooth On/Off

To turn Bluetooth on or off:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Use the navigation keys to highlight **Settings** and press the **Select** soft key or the key.

Settings 156

- 3. Highlight **Bluetooth** and press the **Select** soft key or the key. If Bluetooth is currently on the first menu selection is Turn Bluetooth Off, if it is currently off the menu reads Turn Bluetooth On.
- Using the Up or Down navigation key, select Turn Bluetooth On or Turn Bluetooth Off, as required, and then press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 5. Press the **Cancel** soft key to return to the previous screen or the key to return to the Idle screen.

Note: Turn off Bluetooth when it is not required to save battery life and in situations where Bluetooth use is prohibited, such as on airplanes.

# My Devices

This menu provides a list of Bluetooth wireless technology devices within range of your phone and lets you pair the phone with one or more devices.

#### **Finding Bluetooth Devices**

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the 
   key.
- 3. Highlight **Bluetooth** and press the **Select** soft key or the **e** key.
- 4. Using the Up or Down navigation key, select **My Devices** and then press the **Select** soft key or the key.
- Highlight Search New Device and press the Select soft key or the 
  key to search for Bluetooth devices.

After searching, the phone displays a list of devices to which it can connect. The colour of the icon indicates the status of the device:

- Gray for devices that are not paired or connected to your phone
- Blue for paired devices
- Red for devices that are currently connected to your phone

#### Connecting to a Bluetooth Device

- Find Bluetooth devices within range (see above). On the device list, highlight the device you want to connect to and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- Enter the Bluetooth PIN for the device and press the OK soft key. If connecting to a Bluetooth wireless device, consult your Bluetooth device user manual for your assigned PIN. If connecting to another phone, enter the same user-defined PIN on both phones.

If you are unable to pair with the device a message appears in the display. Press the **Yes** soft key to retry.

## My Phone's Visibility

This menu allows you to turn your phone's visibility to other Bluetooth devices on and off. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Select** soft key or the  $\bigcirc$  key to save changes.

## My Phone's Name

This menu allows you to change the identifying name for your phone. Enter the text you want to display and press the 
key or press the **Options** soft key, highlight **Save** and press the **Select** soft key.

Note: The default name for your phone is SGH-A516, the model code.

## Secure Mode

This menu allows you to turn Bluetooth secure mode on and off. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Select** soft key or the  $\bullet$  key to save changes.

## **Bluetooth Services**

The Bluetooth specification is a protocol that describes how the short-range wireless technology works, whereas individual profiles describe the services supported by individual devices. Profiles reduce the chance that different devices will not work together.

This menu provides a list of the service profiles supported by your phone:

- Headset
- Handsfree
- A/V Headset
- File Transfer
- Object Push
- Basic Printing
- Dial-up Networking
- Serial Port

To view the details of a specific profile, highlight it and press the **Select** soft key or the  $\bullet$  key.

# **Set Applications**

This menu provides a convenient way to access all of the settings menus for phone functions from one list. All of these menus can be accessed from their respective applications as well.

The choices are:

- Rogers IM Settings
- Messages Settings
- Browser Settings
- Camera Settings
- Camcorder Settings
- Record Audio Settings
- Calendar Settings
- Contacts Settings

Use the Up and Down navigation keys to make a selection. Press the **Save** soft key or the 
 key to save changes.

# **Reset Settings**

This menu allows you to reset some or all of your phone settings to their default value. To reset phone settings:

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the **•** key to access Menu mode.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight Settings and press the Select soft key or the ● key.
- 3. Highlight Reset Settings and press the Select soft key or the 
  key.
- 4. Choose the settings to be reset. The choices are
  - All
  - Sound Settings
  - Display Settings
  - Phone Settings

For each selection you want to make, highlight it and press the 
key to place a check mark in the selection box.

- 5. When you are finished, press the Reset soft key.
- 6. At the "Reset Settings?" prompt, press the Yes soft key to reset.
- Enter the 4 to 8-digit phone password and press the OK soft key or the
   key.

# **Memory Status**

This menu allows you to check the amount of memory being used to store various types of data.

- 1. From the Idle screen, press the **Menu** soft key or the 
  key to access Menu mode.
- 2. Select Settings and press the Select soft key or the key.
- 3. Select **Memory Status** and press the Select soft key or the **•** key.
- 4. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to highlight one of the following types of files:
  - Shared Memory
  - Messages
  - Media
  - Contacts

Press the Select soft key or the 
key.

# Solving Problems

If you are experiencing problems with your phone, perform the following simple checks before contacting a service professional. This may save you the time and expense of an unnecessary service call.

# When you switch your phone on, one of the following messages appears

#### Insert SIM Card

Check that the SIM card is correctly installed.

#### Phone Lock

The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.

#### Enter PIN

- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the Personal Identification Number (PIN) supplied with the SIM card.
- The PIN Check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered. To disable this feature, use the Check PIN Code menu (see "Check PIN Code" on page 148).

#### Enter PUK

The PIN code was entered incorrectly three times in succession and the phone is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider. Phones use both PIN1 and PIN2 codes, which require PUK1 and PUK2 codes to unblock. Make sure you know which PIN code is locked and apply the correct PUK code.

## "No service," "Network failure" or "Not done" displays

- The network connection was lost. You may be in a weak signal area (in a tunnel or surrounded by buildings). Change location and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have not taken out a subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.

### You have entered a number but it was not dialed

- Have you pressed the key?
- Are you accessing the right cellular network?
- Is Call Barring turned on? (see "Call Barring" on page 154 for more details).

#### Your correspondent cannot reach you

- Is your phone switched on (the key pressed for more than one second)?
- Are you accessing the right cellular network?
- Is Call Barring turned on? (see "Call Barring" on page 154 for more details).
- Has your phone been call forwarded to another number?

### Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Have you switched off the microphone?
- Are you holding the phone close enough to your mouth? The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

# The phone starts beeping and "Battery Low" flashes on the display

Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.

## The audio quality of the call is poor

- Check the signal strength indicator on the display (Yull); the number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong (Yull) to weak (Y).
- Try moving the phone slightly or move closer to a window if you are in a building.

## No number is dialed when you recall a Contact List entry

- Check that the number has been stored correctly, by using the Contact List Search feature.
- Store the number again, if necessary.

If the above guidelines do not help you to solve the problem, take note of:

- the model and serial numbers of your phone
- your warranty details
- a clear description of the problem

Then contact your local dealer or Samsung after-sales service.

# Health and Safety Information

# Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on the safety standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies.

The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the FCC is 1.6W/kg.\*

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the phone.

\*. In the U.S. and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified by the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of http:// www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid after searching on FCC ID printed in the label on the phone.

# For Body Operation

For body worn operation, this model phone has been tested and meets the FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with a Samsung-supplied or approved accessory designated for this product or when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the phone a minimum from the body.

The minimum distance from the body for this model phone is written in the FCC certification information. Non-compliance with the above conditions may violate FCC RF exposure guidelines.

# Precautions When Using Batteries

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source.
- Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is

fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0  $^\circ$  C (32  $^\circ$  F).

- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Shortcircuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.

# **Operating Environment**

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.

When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

# **Electronic Devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

# Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

# Audio Shock

At very high volumes, prolonged listening to a headset can damage your hearing.

# Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this

information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

# Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

# **Posted Facilities**

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

# Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include the areas below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

# **Emergency Calls**

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press the 🗖 key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

# Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember air bag inflates with great force. Do not place installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed, and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phones in aircraft is illegal unless permitted and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, legal action, or both.

# Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow enjoy this product for many years:

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of reach of small children.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation and humidity contain minerals that may corrode electronic circuits.

- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty or dirty areas. Moving parts may become damaged or clogged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Do not put the phone in or on heating devices, such as a microwave oven, a stove or a radiator. The phone may explode when overheated.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas or modified accessories may damage the phone and violate regulations governing radio devices.
- If the phone, battery, charger or any accessory is not working properly, take it to your nearest qualified service facility. The personnel there will assist you, and if necessary, arrange for service.

# Appendix A: CERTIFICATION INFORMATION (SAR)

THIS MODEL PHONE MEETS THE GOVERNMENT'S REQUIREMENTS FOR EXPOSURE TO RADIO WAVES.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on safety standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg<sup>\*</sup>. SAR Tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the

\*. In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements. SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified by the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations(e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The highest SAR values of this model phone as reported to FCC are:

### GSM850

- Head: 1.27 W/kg (ch. 190, left head)
- Body:1.07 W/kg (ch. 128, without holster)

### GSM1900

- Head:1.06 W/kg (ch. 661, right head)
- Body: 0.646 W/kg (ch. 661, without holster)

Body-worn operations are restricted to Samsung-supplied, approved or non-Samsung designated accessories that have no metal and must provide at least 1.5cm separation between the device, including its antenna whether extended or retracted, and the user's body. Non-compliance to the above restrictions may violate FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. ## Appendix B: Safe and Responsible Wireless Phone Use

### A Guide to Safe and Responsible Wireless Phone Use

Tens of millions of people in North America today take advantage of the unique combination of convenience, safety and value delivered by the wireless telephone. Quite simply, the wireless phone gives people the powerful ability to communicate by voice-almost anywhere, anytime with the boss, with a client, with the kids, with emergency personnel or even with the police. Each year, North Americans make billions of calls from their wireless phones, and the numbers are rapidly growing.

But an important responsibility accompanies those benefits, one that every wireless phone user must uphold. When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. A wireless phone can be an invaluable tool, but good judgment must be exercised at all times while driving a motor vehicle whether on the phone or not.

The basic lessons are ones we all learned as teenagers. Driving requires alertness, caution and courtesy. It requires a heavy dose of basic common sense-keep your head up, keep your eyes on the road, check your mirrors frequently and watch out for other drivers. It requires obeying all traffic signs and signals and staying within the speed limit. It means using seat belts and requiring other passengers to do the same.

But with wireless phone use, driving safely means a little more. This brochure is a call to wireless phone users everywhere to make safety their first priority when behind the wheel of a car. Wireless telecommunications is keeping us in touch, simplifying our lives, protecting us in emergencies and providing opportunities to help others in need. When it comes to the use of wireless phones, safety is your most important call.

### Wireless Phone "Safety Tips"

Below are safety tips to follow while driving and using a wireless phone which should be easy to remember:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer, including automatic redial and memory. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands free device. A number of hands free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to you.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can grab it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- 4. Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
- 5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an Contact list or business card, or writing a to do list while driving a car, you are not watching where you are going. It's common sense. Don't get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.

- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip-dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- 7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix-they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel of a car. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations-with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard or medical emergency. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a Good Samaritan in your community. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non emergency assistance number when necessary. Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not urgent enough to merit a call for emergency services. But you still can use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.

Careless, distracted individuals and people driving irresponsibly represent a hazard to everyone on the road. Since 1984, the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association and the wireless industry have conducted an educational outreach program to inform wireless phone users of their responsibilities as safe drivers and good citizens. As we approach a new century, more and more of us will take advantage of the benefits of wireless telephones. And, as we take to the roads, we all have a responsibility to drive safely.

The wireless industry reminds you to use your phone safely when driving.

# Appendix C: Consumer Update on Wireless Phones

U.S. Food and Drug Administration

1. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called cell, mobile, or PCS phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user s head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

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2. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

3. What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and

 Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration
- The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

4. What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies

are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

5. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products—and at this point we do not know that there is—it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

6. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

7. Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are

used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

8. Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

9. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI.

FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard

specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

10. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, gioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term

exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

11. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but 10 or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.
