## Setting the language and date/time



Language: to change. OK to accept.

Date/Time: At the prompt, press OK. to change current field. for previous/next field. OK to accept.

*Sharing Destinations:* You can tell the camera which sharing sites to offer when it's time to share pictures/videos.

to highlight a site.OK to check/uncheck the site.

NOTE: To change language in the future, use the Settings menu (see page 51).

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## Storing pictures on an accessory SD/SDHC Card

Your camera has internal memory. We recommend purchasing a SD or SDHC Card (Class 4 or higher) to conveniently store more pictures/videos.

#### **CAUTION:** A card can only be inserted one way; forcing it may cause damage. Inserting or removing a card while the camera is on may damage the pictures, the card, or the camera.



**IMPORTANT:** When you turn on the camera, it checks to see if a card is inserted. If so, new pictures/videos are stored on the card. If no card is inserted, new pictures/videos are stored in the camera's internal memory. If pictures/videos are detected in internal memory and a card is inserted, the camera prompts you to move the pictures to the card (and erase those in internal memory).

# 2 Taking pictures/videos

## Taking pictures in Smart Capture mode

- 1 Turn the Mode dial to Smart Capture 👩.
- **2** Use the LCD or EVF to compose the picture. *Press the EVF/LCD button and use the electronic viewfinder to conserve battery power and improve visibility outdoors.*



- **3** Press the Shutter button **halfway** to focus and set exposure. Framing marks indicate the camera focus area. If the camera is not focusing on the desired subject, release the Shutter button and recompose the scene.
- **4** Press the Shutter button **completely down**. The new picture is briefly displayed. If you don't like it, press the Delete button, then follow the prompts. (To delete a picture later, see page 30.) To take a picture while recording a video, see page 10.

**IMPORTANT:** Press the Share button to share anytime. To learn more, see page 28.

#### Other picture-taking features



- To view available tools, press the Display button DISP. Press ◆ to choose a tool, then press OK.
- To review, tag, and edit pictures and videos, press the Review button (see page 28).
- To change camera settings, see page 50.
- If it's hard to see the LCD, you can adjust the brightness (see page 51).

## Your camera, the way you want it

Sometimes, you want to see everything available! (Other times, you want everything out of your way.) Press the Display button Disp. to change between Clean view and Tools view.



Note: If you're in a PASM mode, Liveview Histogram and Framing Grid view\* are also available.

\* To enable Liveview Histogram and/or Framing Grid, see page 51.

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In Liveview, press to move between Tools and the most recent picture.

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## Understanding the picture-taking icons

## Watch the battery level

Don't miss out on great pictures and videos-keep your batteries fully charged.



## Taking a video

The camera is always ready to take a video—just press the Video Record button!



- **1** Use the LCD or EVF to compose the video.
- 2 To start recording, press and release the Video Record button **1**. To stop recording, press and release the button again.

The first frame of the new video and the play button are displayed for a few seconds.

- To play/pause the video, press the OK button.
- If you don't like the video, press the Delete button, then follow the prompts. (To delete a video later, see page 30.)

NOTE: Longer recording times may raise camera temperature (see page 56).

#### Take a picture while recording a video

While recording a video, press the Shutter button completely down.

The camera takes a picture and continues recording video until you press the Video Record button again. The picture size matches the video size. (For example, if the Video Size is set to 1920 x 1080, the picture size is also 1920 x 1080.)

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### Using the zoom

Use optical zoom to get up to 30X closer to your subject.



- **1** Use the LCD or EVF to frame your subject. (For focus distances, see Specifications, page 61.)
- 2 Press Telephoto (T) to zoom in. Press Wide Angle (W) to zoom out.
- **3** Take the picture or video.
- NOTE: To get a focused picture every time, use the framing marks (page 6).

#### Using digital zoom

Digital zoom is not available in Smart Capture mode.

NOTE: You may notice decreased image quality when using digital zoom.

## Using the flash

Use the flash when you take pictures at night, indoors, or outdoors in heavy shadows. Flash settings are limited in some capture modes.



Press the Flash button repeatedly to scroll through flash modes. The current flash mode appears on the LCD or EVF.

## Using HDR mode

Use HDR (high dynamic range) mode to capture high-contrast scenes—those with both bright highlights and dark shadows. (Example: The bark of a shaded tree against a bright sky.)

**1** Turn the Mode dial to HDR.

Resolution is set at 12 MP.

- **2** Compose the picture. Important tips:
  - Hold the camera steady or use a tripod—the camera will be taking multiple pictures.
  - For best results, photograph stationary subjects.
  - Avoid fluorescent lights, which may produce horizontal bands.
- **3** Press the Shutter button halfway down, then completely down.

The camera takes 3 pictures, then combines them into 1, with shadows and highlights at their best exposure.

**4** When finished, turn the Mode dial to another mode.



## Using SCN (Scene) modes

- **1** Turn the Mode dial to SCN (Scene).
- 2 Press **()** and **()** to read Scene mode descriptions.
- **3** Press OK to choose the Scene mode that you've highlighted.

SCN mode	For
Landscape	Distant scenes.
Flower	Close range. Use available light instead of flash, if possible.
Sunset	Subjects at dusk.
Backlight	Subjects that are in shadow or "backlit."
Candle Light	Subjects illuminated by candle light.
Children	Action pictures of children in bright light.
Bright	Bright beach or snow scenes.
Fireworks	Fireworks. For best results, place the camera on a steady surface or tripod.
Self-Portrait	Close-ups of yourself. Assures proper focus and minimizes red eye.
Night Portrait	Reduces red eye of people in night scenes or low-light conditions.
Night Landscape	Distant scenery at night. Flash does not fire.
Stage	People on a lit stage. Fast shutter speed, high ISO. Flash and sounds are off. (Flash setting can be changed.)
High ISO	People indoors, in low-light scenes.
Panorama R-L, L-R	"Stitching" 2 or 3 pictures into 1 panoramic scene. (See page 16.)

## Using Panorama in SCN mode

Use panorama to "stitch" up to 3 pictures into a panoramic scene.



IMPORTANT: In Panorama SCN mode, you take 2 or 3 pictures which the camera "stitches" together in a panorama. In Automatic Panorama mode—found in Creative mode SC (see page 18)—you "sweep" the camera in a continuous arc. The camera then creates a panorama.

- NOTE: For best results, use a tripod. Only the panoramic picture is saved; individual pictures are not. (Exposure and white balance are set with the first picture. The flash is set to Off.)
- 1 Turn the Mode dial to SCN.
- 3 Take the first picture.

After a quickview, the LCD displays the liveview and an "overlay" from the first picture.

- **4** Compose the second picture. Make the overlay from the first picture cover the same portion in the new picture.
- **5** If you are taking/stitching only 2 pictures, press OK to stitch them together. *After you take 3 pictures, the pictures are automatically stitched together.*

Take 2 or 3 pictures.

Get 1 panoramic picture.



NOTE: To use the self-timer 10-second or 2-second setting, see page 21.



## **Using Creative modes**

- 1 Turn the Mode dial to Creative mode 3.
- 2 Press **()** and **(xv**) to read Creative mode descriptions.
- **3** Press OK to choose the Creative mode that you've highlighted.

Creative mode	For
Night SceneFor night photos that contain moving objects. Gives the impressiLong Exposuremotion. Resolution is set at 12 MP.	
<b>Dramatic</b> Highly saturated, vibrant color. The camera takes and merges 2 pict produce one of rich tone and detail. Resolution is set at 12 MP.	
Intelligent Portrait Mode	Close-ups of faces. The camera takes multiple pictures, then chooses the one with the best focus, most smiles, and most eyes open. Resolution is set at 12 MP.
Photo Booth	Taking 4 pictures and combining them into single strip, like a vintage photobooth. For best results, place the camera on a tripod or steady surface.
Automatic Panorama (See page 18.)	Press and hold the Shutter button while vertically or horizontally panning a scene (Left to Right, Right to Left, Bottom to Top, and Top to Bottom). The camera "stitches" the pictures together.

## Using Automatic Panorama in Creative mode

Pan up to 180 degrees horizontally or up to 120 degrees vertically. The camera takes several pictures, then "stitches" them into a single, wide image.

#### Choose the direction of panning

- 1 Turn the Mode dial to Creative mode 3.
- 2 Press **()** and **()** to highlight Automatic Panorama, then press OK.
- **3** The default panning direction is Left-to-Right. To change it:
  - Press to highlight the Automatic Panorama icon, then press OK.
  - Press **4** for Right-to-Left, Bottom-to-Top, or Top-to-Bottom. Then press OK.

#### Take the picture

For best results, set the lens to wide angle (no zoom). Choose stationary subjects.

- 1 At your starting point, press the Shutter button halfway down to focus and set the exposure, then press completely down **and hold it**.
- **2** Keeping the Shutter button pressed, slowly pan or tilt in the direction you selected.



- Cover the entire sweep in about 5 seconds.
- If you pan or tilt too quickly or too slowly, the LCD displays an error.
  - Experiment until you get the timing right.
- 3 Release the Shutter button when the LCD displays "Processing."

The camera automatically stops recording images when a certain number of pixels is reached. This equates to approximately 180 degrees horizontally or 120 degrees vertically. (You might capture more or less, depending on scene content.)

- NOTE: If the scene contains an uninterrupted expanse of similar pixels—such as a plain, white wall—the camera may interpret this as the same group of pixels and abbreviate the wall in the final image.
- **4** When finished, turn the Mode dial to another mode.



## P, A, S, and M modes

Use these modes when you want more control over your camera and pictures.



Mode	When to use	Press Jog dial to control
Ρ	<b>Program</b> mode offers the ease of auto shooting with full access to all menu options. The camera automatically sets the shutter speed and aperture (f-stop) based on the scene lighting.	Exposure compensation (how much light enters the camera), flash compensation, and ISO speed
Α	<b>Aperture Priority</b> mode controls depth of field (the range of sharpness). The aperture setting may be affected by optical zoom.	Aperture, exposure compensation, flash compensation, and ISO speed
S	<b>Shutter Priority</b> mode controls shutter speed. The camera automatically sets the aperture for proper exposure. (To prevent blur, use a tripod for slow shutter speeds.)	Shutter speed, exposure compensation, and flash compensation
Μ	<b>Manual</b> mode offers a high level of control. (To prevent blur, use a tripod for slow shutter speeds.)	Aperture, shutter speed, flash compensation, and ISO speed

NOTE: Settings you change in P, A, S, or M modes apply only to pictures taken in those modes. The settings, including Flash, are maintained for P, A, S, and M modes—even when you change modes or turn off the camera. Use Reset Camera (see page 51) to reset P, A, S, or M modes to their default settings.

#### Changing P, A, S, or M mode settings

PASM modes control the aperture (f-number, also known as f-stop), shutter speed, exposure compensation, flash compensation, and ISO.

- **1** Turn the Mode dial to P, A, S, or M.
- 2 Press the Display button DISP.
- 3 Turn the Jog dial **↓** to choose a setting, then press it to edit the setting. Turn the Jog dial **↓** to change a setting, then press it to save it.



**ISO**—adjust the camera's sensitivity to light. Higher ISO indicates greater sensitivity. NOTE: A higher ISO may produce unwanted "noise" in a picture.

Flash Compensation—adjust flash brightness.

**Exposure Compensation**—adjust the exposure. If the scene is too light, decrease the setting; if it's too dark, increase the setting.

**Shutter speed**—control how long the shutter stays open. (Use a tripod for slow shutter speeds.)

**Aperture**—(also known as f-stop) control the size of the lens opening, which determines the depth of field.

- Smaller aperture numbers indicate a larger lens opening; good for low-light.
- Larger aperture numbers indicate a smaller lens opening; keeps the main subject sharp; good for landscapes and well-lit conditions.



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## Using the Self-timer button



Press the Self-timer button 👏 repeatedly to scroll through self-timer modes. The current self-timer mode appears on the LCD or EVF.

Use the self-timer when you want to be included in a picture, or to ensure a steady Shutter button press. Place the camera on a tripod or flat surface.

1 Press the Self-timer button until the desired self-timer icon is displayed on the LCD.

**10 seconds**—10 A picture is taken after a 10-second delay (so you have time to get into the scene).

**2 seconds**— 2 A picture is taken after a 2-second delay (for a steady, shutter release on a tripod).

**2** shot— $_{2x}$  The first picture is taken after a 10-second delay. A second picture is taken 8 seconds later.

2 Press the Shutter button **halfway** to focus and set exposure, then **completely down** to take the pictures.

The camera takes the picture(s) after the delay.

Use the same procedure to take a 2- or 10-second self-timer video, but press the Shutter button **completely down**.

## Using the Focus button



Press the Focus button repeatedly to scroll through focus modes. The current focus mode appears on the LCD or EVF.

**IMPORTANT:** Focus mode availability varies by picture-taking mode.

**1** Press the Focus button until the desired focus icon is displayed on the LCD.

Normal AF	No icon	Normal picture taking.	
Infinity AF		Distant scenery or for taking pictures through a window. (Turn off the flash when taking pictures through glass. See page 12.)	
Macro AF	Ÿ	Subjects that are 10-80 cm (3.9-31.5 in.) from the lens.	
Super Macro AF	<b>*</b>	Subjects that are 1–20 cm (0.4–7.9 in.) from the lens.

2 Press the Shutter button **halfway** to focus and set exposure, then **completely down** to take the picture.

## Using focus/exposure zones

Focus/Exposure Zone settings let you decide what portion of your subject receives focus and exposure priority.

**1** Turn the Mode dial to P, A, S, or M. Set the focus to Auto, Macro, or Super Macro.

**IMPORTANT:** The camera must be in P, A, S, or M mode while in Auto, Macro, or Super Macro focus mode (see page 22).

- 2 If the toolbar is not displayed at the top of the LCD, press the Display button DISP.
- **3** Press **()** to choose More Tools **()**, then press OK.
- **4** Press **4 b** to choose Focus/Exposure Zone, then press OK.
- **5** Press **4** to choose a zone, then press OK.
  - **Face Priority:** Faces are given focus/exposure priority.
  - Multi-zone: Several zones are evaluated to give an even picture focus.
  - **Center:** A small area centered in the LCD is given focus/exposure priority.
  - **Selectable:** Press **Selec**

The camera enters the Focus/Exposure Zone setting that you chose.

## Using the Burst button



Press the Burst button Dependent repeatedly to scroll through burst modes. The current burst mode appears on the LCD or EVF.

**1** Press the Burst button until the desired burst icon is displayed on the LCD.

Burst mode	Available in	When you press and hold the Shutter button	
Endless Burst	P, A, S, M, and Smart Capture	Take pictures until there is no more storage space. (Burst rate varies by mode, picture quality, and picture size. Burst rate slows down after 10 pictures are in the burst buffer.)	
High Speed	P, A, S, M	Take up to 4 pictures @ approximately 4 fps (frames per second).(Picture size varies by mode.)	
Burst L	Smart Capture	Take up to 3 pictures @ approximately 2 fps. (Picture size varies by mode.)	
High Speed Burst H	P, A, S, M	Take up to 4 pictures @ approximately 9 fps. (Picture size varies by mode.)	
High Speed HD Burst	P, A, S, M	Take up to 20 pictures @ approximately 60 fps. (Picture size is 1920 x 1080 pixels.)	

2 Press the Shutter button **halfway** to focus and set exposure, then **press and hold it completely down** to take the pictures.

The camera stops taking pictures when you release the Shutter button, when the pictures are taken, or when there is no more storage space.

NOTE: The flash is disabled in Burst modes. During quickview, you can delete all pictures in the burst series. Burst is unavailable in Portrait, Night Portrait, Night Landscape, Backlight, Fireworks, and Panorama modes, and when taking pictures in the RAW format.

## **Using the Effects button**

To take pictures/videos using different effects:



1 Press the Effects button 👯.

2 Press **()** to choose a film effect.

Each effect shows an example of what your picture/videos will look like.

## Using the histogram to view picture brightness

Use the histogram to evaluate the distribution of light before or after you take a picture. Optimal exposure is achieved when the peak is in the middle of the histogram. The flash may affect a picture's light and shadow.

In P, A, S, M modes, press the Display button DISP. until the Histogram appears.

## Using exposure compensation to adjust brightness

In P, A, S, and Panorama modes, you can adjust exposure compensation before you take a picture to make your pictures darker or lighter. Only the first picture in Panorama mode can be adjusted—that adjustment is applied to the remaining pictures. (For more about the Jog dial and Exposure Compensation, see page 20.)

- Turn the Jog dial ◆ to choose Exposure Compensation, then press it to edit the setting. Turn the Jog dial ◆ to change the setting, then press it to save it.
   An exposure compensation level is shown on the LCD or EVF, and the image gets darker or lighter.
- **2** Take the picture when you are satisfied with the exposure compensation level.

#### Using exposure compensation with exposure bracketing

You can use exposure compensation in conjunction with exposure bracketing to get the best exposure.

# **3** Reviewing and editing

## **Reviewing pictures/videos**



 Press the Review button to enter/exit Review.
 Press to choose All, People, Date, Keywords, or Videos, then press OK.



Use **()** to access Keywords and Videos.

3 If you chose People, Date, or Keywords, highlight a name, date, or keyword, then press **OK**.

You can also review pictures/videos by pressing:

- OK in Liveview, when the most recent picture is highlight (bottom left of the LCD), or
- D during Quickview, while reviewing a new picture

**IMPORTANT:** Press the Share button to share anytime.





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### Other things you can do in Review

- Press 
   to see previous/next picture/video.
- Press OK to play videos.
- Press **DISP.** to show/hide tools.
- Press 💼 to delete pictures/videos.



## **Playing a video**

When a video is displayed, the Play button is offered. Press OK to play the video. During playback:



- To play/pause the video, press the OK button.
- To fast forward/rewind, press ◀ ▶ while the video is playing. To change the speed, press ◀ ▶ again. To return to 1X speed, press the OK button.
- To forward/rewind one frame at a time, press while the video is paused.

# **Deleting pictures/videos**

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, Keywords, or Videos), then press OK.

If you chose All, People, Date, or Keywords, press **()** to find a picture/video to delete. (If you chose Videos, thumbnails are displayed.)

**3** Press the Delete button, then **T** to choose Picture/Video or All, then press OK.

To delete other pictures, press **()** and repeat this step. When finished, press **()** to choose Exit, then press OK.



## Viewing pictures/videos in different ways

### Magnifying a picture

You can magnify a picture while in review.



- **1** Press the Review button **•**, then locate a picture.
- 2 Press Telephoto (T) to magnify 2X-8X.
- **3** Press **4 b a v** to view other parts of a picture.
  - Press OK to return to 1X.

## Viewing as thumbnails

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, Keywords, or Videos), then press OK.

If you chose All, People, Date, or Keywords, a single-up picture is shown. (If you chose Videos, multi-up is already displayed.)

- **3** Press the Display button **DISP** until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- 4 Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\triangleleft$  to choose Multi-up  $\blacksquare$ , then press OK.

Thumbnails are shown.

To select multiple pictures/videos, see page 40.

## A smarter way to find and enjoy your pictures

Tag pictures—by people or keywords—to make them easy to find, later. For example, the camera can find all pictures that contain "Mary" or "Dad's 60th Birthday." (See Tagging people, page 46 or Tagging with keywords, page 48.)

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to see All pictures/videos or those sorted by Date, People, Keywords or Videos.

If you chose All, People, Date, or Keywords, a single-up picture is shown. (If you chose Videos, thumbnails are displayed.) If you press OK while a video is highlighted, the video plays.)

To return to picture-taking mode, press the Shutter button halfway down.



Tip: For best results, make sure the camera date/time is current (see page 51).

# Understanding the review icons



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## **Cropping a picture**

You can crop a picture so that only the desired portion of the picture remains.

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, or Keywords), then press OK.

A single-up picture is shown. Press **()** to choose a different picture.

- **3** Press the Display button **DISP** until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- 4 Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacklozenge$  to choose Edit  $\aleph$ , then press OK.
- 5 Press  $\triangleleft$  to choose Crop  $\square$ , then press OK.
- **6** Follow the prompts to crop the picture.



## Using the RAW Develop feature

In P, A, S, M, Sport, Portrait, and SCN modes, you can take pictures as the RAW file type. A RAW file is not compressed, offers greater dynamic range, and contains more color information. The RAW Develop feature lets you develop, edit (picture size, quality, exposure compensation, color mode, sharpness, and white balance), and save RAW files as a Fine, Standard, or Basic jpeg. (The original RAW file is preserved.) You can edit RAW files in KODAK EASYSHARE Software.

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, or Keywords), then press OK.

A single-up picture is shown. Press **()** to choose a different picture.

- **3** Press the Display button **DISP.** until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- 4 Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacklozenge$  to choose Edit  $\aleph$ , then press OK.
- 5 Press **4** to choose RAW File Develop, then press OK.
- 7 When finished, press  $\checkmark$  to choose Develop RAW File, then press OK.

# Adding a border to a picture

You can enhance a picture by adding a border.

- 1 Press the Review button **▶**, then **▲▼ ↓** to locate a picture.
- 2 Press the Effects button 👯.
- 3 Press **∢** ► to choose Borders, then press OK.
- 4 Press **∢ ▶** to choose a border style, then press OK.
- **5** Press **>** to choose Cancel or Apply, then follow the prompts.
- To return to picture-taking mode, press the Shutter button halfway down.

# Using photo effects to change a picture's tint

You can enhance a picture by tinting it.

- 1 Press the Review button  $\square$ , then  $\blacksquare \blacksquare$  to locate a picture.
- 2 Press the Effects button 👯 .
- **3** Press **↓** to choose Tint, then press OK.
- **4** Press **↓** to choose a tint effect, then press OK.
- **5** Press **>** to choose Cancel or Apply, then follow the prompts.
- To return to picture-taking mode, press the Shutter button halfway down.



## Trimming a video

You can remove the start or end from a video, saving only the desired portion.

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose Videos, then press OK. *Thumbnails are displayed.*
- 3 Press ▲ and ◀ ► to choose Select Images, then press OK.
- 4 Press  $\checkmark$  and  $\checkmark$  to choose a video, then press OK.
- **5** Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to choose the Edit icon **X**.
- 6 Press **↓** to choose Trim **X**, then press OK.
- 7 Press ▲ to choose the Start trim mark X, then press OK. Press ◀ ► to move the Start position. When you're satisfied, press OK to lock it.

Press  $\blacktriangleright$  to choose the End trim mark  $\aleph$ , then press OK. Press  $\blacktriangleleft \triangleright$  to move the End position. When you're satisfied, press OK to lock it.

8 Press 🛦 to choose Done, then press the OK button. Follow the prompts to Save as New, Cancel, or Replace Original.

## Making a picture from a video

You can choose a single frame from a video, then make a picture suitable for a  $4 \times 6$ -inch (10 x 15 cm) print.

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose Videos, then press OK. *Thumbnails are displayed.*
- **3** Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacklozenge$  to choose Select Images, then press OK.
- 4 Press  $\checkmark$  and  $\checkmark$  to choose a video, then press OK.
- **5** Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to choose the Edit icon **X**.
- 6 Press  $\triangleleft$  to choose Make Picture  $\mathbf{E}_{\Delta}$ , then press the OK button.
- 7 Press **I** to play/pause the video, or to forward/rewind frame-by-frame.
- 8 When you reach the desired frame, press ▲ and ◀ ► to choose Make Picture
   Image: Imag

The picture is created. (The original video is saved.)

## Making an action print from a video

From a video, you can make a 9-up picture, suitable for a 4 x 6-inch (10 x 15 cm) print.

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose Videos, then press OK. *Thumbnails are displayed.*
- **3** Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to choose Select Images, then press OK.
- 4 Press  $\checkmark$  and  $\checkmark$  to choose a video, then press OK.
- **5** Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\triangleleft \triangleright$  to choose the Edit icon **X**.
- 6 Choose Action Print 📠, then press OK.

A 9-up picture is created.



## Selecting multiple pictures/videos

Use the multi-select feature when you have two or more pictures to print, share, delete, protect/unprotect, tag with keyword, etc. Multi-select is only available in thumbnail view (see page 31).



- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, Keywords, or Videos), then press OK.
- 3 If you chose All, People, Date, or Keywords, a single-up picture is shown. Press ▲ and ◀▶ to choose Multi-up 📆, then press OK. (If you chose Videos, multi-up is already displayed.)
- 4 Press ▲ and ◀ ► to choose Select Images, then press OK.
- 5 Press **T** to choose a picture/video. Press OK to select it.

A check mark appears on the picture. (Press OK again to remove a check mark.) Repeat this step to select other pictures/videos.

**6** You can now share, delete, choose a tool, etc. and apply it to the selected pictures/videos.

NOTE: You can also share multiple pictures/videos using the Share button (see page 44).



## Displaying pictures/videos on a television

You can display pictures/videos on a television, computer monitor, or any device equipped with a composite video input. To connect the camera directly to a television, use a composite cable (may be sold separately). Use the camera controls to navigate through pictures/videos on the television. If you have an HD television, use an HDMI cable (may be sold separately) and get the richest playback experience.





# Creating a slide show

Use Slide Show to display your pictures/videos on the LCD. You can play all pictures/videos, or select pictures to include in the slide show.

### Make a slide show that you can save

- 1 Press the Review button ►. Select pictures (see page 40). If you choose no pictures, all are shown in the slide show.
- 2 Press the Display button DISP until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- 3 Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacklozenge$  to choose Multimedia Slide Show, then press OK.
- 4 Press **A** to choose Preview Slide Show, then press OK.

Each picture/video is displayed once. To interrupt the slide show, press OK. After the slide show plays, you may save or modify it.

# Adding a date stamp

You can add a stamp—showing the date taken—to a picture.

NOTE: Once a date stamp is applied, it cannot be removed on the camera.

- 1 Press the Review button 🗈.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, Keywords, or Videos), then press OK.
- 3 Press ▲ and ◀ ► to choose the Edit icon **X**.then choose Date Stamp. *Follow the prompts to add the date/time to the picture.*



## Using the optional remote control

Use the optional remote control to start/stop recording and to review videos and pictures. Go to www.kodak.com/go/accessories.



Take a picture: Press the OK button.

Take a video: Press the Video button to start/stop recording.

# Sharing through email and social networks

It's never been easier to share pictures on your favorite social networking sites. As new sites become available, they'll be offered when you connect the camera to a networked computer.

**IMPORTANT:** To use the sharing and social networking features, you must install the KODAK Share Button App. (See page 53)

**1** Press the Share button to share anytime: In Liveview

- **3** Press  $\blacktriangle$  **4** b to choose Settings  $\checkmark$ , then press the OK button.
- 4 Press  $\frown$  to choose Edit Share Settings, then press OK.
- **6** When finished, press  $\mathbf{A} \mathbf{V} \mathbf{A} \mathbf{V}$  to choose Done or Next, then press OK.

# **Tagging pictures**

Tag pictures to make them easy to find, later. You can tag pictures in 2 ways:

- **People**, and then find all pictures of "Mary."
- **Keywords**, and then find all pictures from "Dad's 60th Birthday."

## Tagging people

When you tag faces, you're helping your camera to recognize people by name. Then it matches names and faces in pictures you've taken—and those you take in the future!

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, or Keywords), then press OK.

A single-up picture is shown. Press **\** to choose a different picture.

- **3** Press the Display button **DISP** until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- 4 Press **∢ ▶** to choose Tags **≜**, then press the OK button.
- **5** Press **4 b** to choose Tag People, then press OK.
- 6 Press To choose an existing name or Enter New Name to add a new one (see page 48), then press OK.

If more than one face is detected, a name or question mark is assigned to each detected face. To resolve an incorrect name or a question mark, press  $\checkmark$  to select a face, then press OK.



7 If prompted to Update People Tags, press ▲ to choose Yes, then press OK.
 Other pictures are scanned and updated with the name(s) you applied here.
 Press ▲ to add names to other pictures. When finished, press ▲ to choose Done, then press OK.



#### Need to update a name?

If you meet a new friend—James—but you already have pictures tagged with your old friend, James, you can:

- Tag the new James with "James Smith" and/or
- Update the old James to "James Monroe"

Here's how:

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.
- 2 Press  $\blacktriangle$   $\blacklozenge$  to choose Settings  $\checkmark$ , then press the OK button.
- 3 Press To choose People Tag Settings (or Keyword Tag for videos), then press OK.
- 4 Press **A** to choose Modify Names List, then press OK.
- **5** Press **T** to choose the name you want to modify, then press OK. (The keyboard appears when you need to type. See page 48.)
- 6 Edit the name, press ▲▼ to choose OK, then press OK. (If prompted to Update People Tags, press ▲▼ to choose Yes, then press OK.)

NOTE: You can have up to 20 names.

## Tagging with keywords

Tag pictures to make them easy to find, later.

- 1 Press the Review button **D**.
- 2 Press ◀▶ to choose a stack of pictures (All, or sorted by People, Date, or Keywords), then press OK.

A single-up picture is shown. Press **\** b to choose a different picture.

- **3** Press the Display button **DISP** until tools appear at the top of the LCD.
- **4** Press **∢ ▶** to choose Tags **≜**, then press the OK button.
- 5 Press **4** to choose Keyword Tag, then press OK.
- 6 Press ▲▼ to choose a tag (or ▲ and ▶ to add a tag using the "+" sign), then press OK.
- 7 Press  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacktriangleright$  to choose Done, then press OK.

## Using the keyboard

The keyboard appears when you need to type.

- **1** Press  $\blacksquare$  **\blacksquare \blacksquare \blacksquare \blacksquare** to choose a letter, then press OK.
- 2 When finished, press **a** to choose Done, then press OK.



## Marking pictures/videos as favorites

Mark pictures as favorites to make them easy to find, later.

- 1 Press the Review button **•**.

**IMPORTANT:** To use the sharing and social networking features, you must install the KODAK Share Button App.

Make sure the computer is connected to the Internet. When you connect the camera to the computer, the KODAK Camera Setup App automatically runs. Follow the prompts to install the KODAK Share Button App.



- 1 Turn off the camera.
- **2** Use the KODAK Camera USB Cable, Micro B / 5-Pin to connect the camera to the computer. Use only the cable included with this camera.
- 3 Turn on the camera.
- **4** After the software is installed, follow the prompts to transfer pictures and videos to your computer.

- MAC OS: on your Desktop

## Direct printing with a KODAK All-in-One Printer

**IMPORTANT:** To print using PICTBRIDGE Technology, you must change the Computer Connection setting (in the Settings menu) to Other Application (see page 52).

You need a camera, a PICTBRIDGE enabled Printer, and a USB cable.

#### Connecting the camera to a KODAK All-in-One Printer

- 1 Turn off the camera and printer.
- **2** Use the KODAK Camera USB Cable, Micro B / 5-Pin (included with the camera) to connect the camera to the printer.

### Printing from a KODAK All-in-One Printer

**1** Turn on the printer. Turn on the camera.

The PictBridge logo is displayed, followed by the current picture and menu. (If no pictures are found, a message is displayed.) If the menu turns off, press any button to redisplay it.

2 Choose a printing option, then press OK.

**Current Picture**—Press **()** to choose a picture.

**Tagged Pictures**—If your printer is capable, print pictures that you marked for printing.

**Index Print**—Print thumbnails of all pictures. (This option requires one or more sheets of paper.)

All Pictures—Print all pictures in internal memory or on a card.

NOTE: During direct printing, pictures are not permanently transferred or saved to the printer. To transfer pictures to your computer, see page 53.
