



Macintosh User's Guide Update: **The *Utilities* Floppy Disk and Using Internal HD Format**

Your Macintosh Performa user's guide refers to the *Utilities* floppy disk. If your computer came with a CD-ROM drive, you may have either a *Utilities* floppy disk or a *Macintosh Performa CD*. If you do not have a *Utilities* disk, you can find the same programs on the *Macintosh Performa CD*.

This update describes how to use Internal HD Format, a program that is either on your *Utilities* disk or your *Macintosh Performa CD*. You should locate this program and make a note of where it is, in case you need it someday.

IMPORTANT Chapter 11 in your Macintosh Performa user's guide tells how to initialize a hard disk using the Apple HD SC Setup program. Your computer has an internal IDE hard disk rather than an internal SCSI hard disk. Follow the instructions in your Macintosh Performa user's guide only if you want to initialize or reinitialize an external Apple SCSI hard disk. Follow the instructions in this update if you ever need to reinitialize your computer's internal hard disk.

Checking for damage on the disk

You can use the Internal HD Format program at any time to check for damaged blocks (segments of the hard disk that cannot reliably be used to store information). To do this, choose Scan All Blocks in the Functions menu. (When the program finds damaged blocks, it marks them so the computer will know not to store information in them. This process does not harm any data on the hard disk.)

If you ever need to reinitialize your computer's internal hard disk...

Your computer's internal hard disk has already been initialized. If you ever need to reinitialize it, follow the instructions below. (Remember that when you reinitialize a hard disk, you erase all the information on it.)

- 1 Make sure your computer is off.**
- 2 Insert the *Utilities* floppy disk into the disk drive, or the *Macintosh Performa CD* into the CD drive.**

Whether you use the *Utilities* disk or the *Macintosh Performa CD* depends on where the Internal HD Format program is located.

- 3 Turn on your computer.**
- 4 Locate the Internal HD Format icon.**
- 5 Open the Internal HD Format icon by double-clicking it.**
- 6 Type a name for your disk in the name box.**
- 7 If you want to make sure that none of the hard disk's original data is recognizable after reinitialization, choose Zero Data in the Options menu.**

If you choose Zero Data, initialization may take a few minutes. (If you don't choose Zero Data, initialization will take less than 30 seconds.)

- 8 Click Initialize.**

A message informs you that initializing the disk erases all information on it.

- 9 Click OK.**

- 10 When the initialization is complete, click Done.**

If a message reports that initialization failed, try again. If initialization fails a second time, call your Apple-authorized service provider. (See the service and support information that came with your computer.)
