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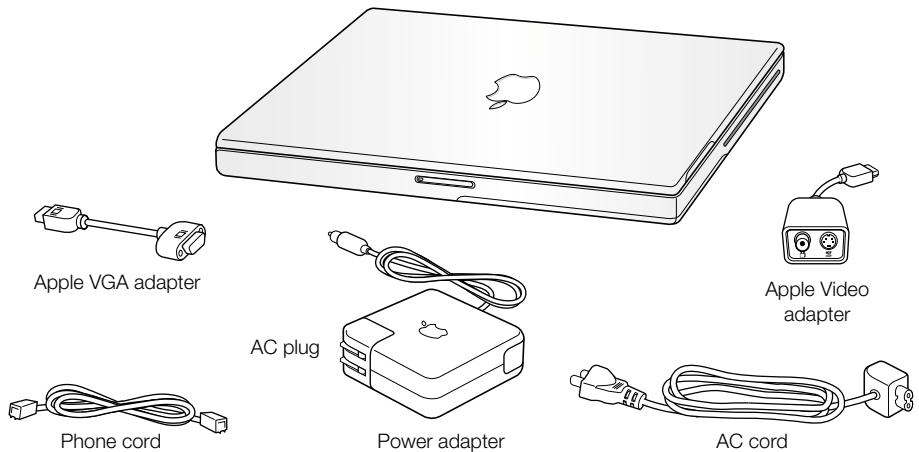
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Getting Started

Your PowerBook has been designed so that you can set it up quickly and start using it right away. If you have never used a PowerBook or are new to Macintosh computers, read this section for instructions on getting started and where to get more information.

If you are an experienced user, you may already know enough to get started. Be sure to look over the information in Chapter 2, “Getting to Know Your Computer,” to find out about the new features of this PowerBook.



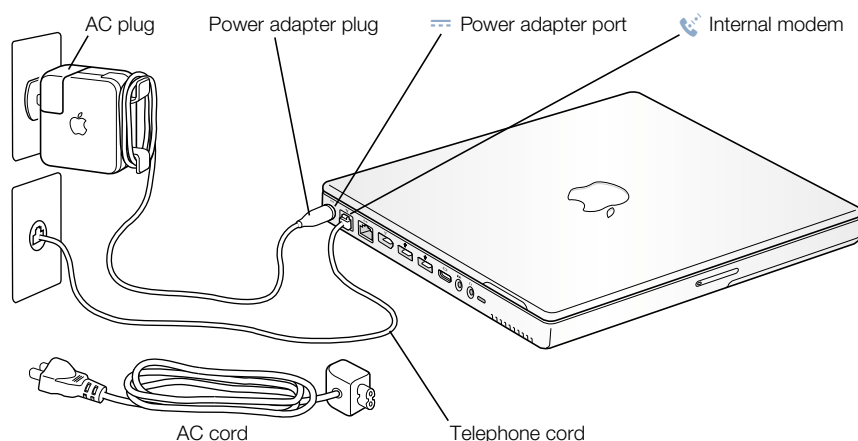
Important Read all the installation instructions and safety information (see page 81) carefully before you plug your computer into a wall socket.

Plugging In the Computer

Plugging in the power adapter provides AC power to the computer and recharges the computer's battery. You should plug in the power adapter in case the battery has been drained during shipping or storage.

Important For optimal performance, use only the power adapter that came with your computer.

- 1 Plug the AC plug on the power adapter into a wall outlet. If you want to extend the reach of your power adapter, remove the AC plug from the adapter and attach one end of the included AC cord to the adapter and the other end into a wall outlet. Use only the AC cord that came with your power adapter.



- 2 Plug the power adapter plug into the power adapter port (marked with the icon ) on the left side of the computer. Make sure to push the power plug snugly into the power adapter port to ensure it is engaged and power is flowing to the computer.

If connected properly, light appears on the power adapter plug. An amber light indicates that the battery is being charged. A green light indicates that the battery is fully charged. You can monitor the battery level using the battery icon in the menu bar, or by checking the charge lights on the bottom of the battery (see page 50).

You can wrap the extra adapter cable around the clips that open out from the power adapter. When disconnecting the power adapter from an outlet, pull the plug, not the cord.

Calibrating Your Battery for Best Performance

To get the longest running time from your PowerBook battery, let the battery run down completely during the first week you have your PowerBook. Then fully charge it one time. Follow these steps:

- 1 Plug in the power adapter and fully charge your PowerBook battery until the battery indicator lights and the onscreen meter indicate that the battery is fully charged. A green light on the power adapter plug also indicates that the battery is fully charged.
- 2 Disconnect the power adapter and use your PowerBook. When your battery gets low, you will see the first low battery warning dialog on the screen. Continue to use your PowerBook until it goes to sleep; at that point the battery has been sufficiently drained for calibration.
- 3 Connect the power adapter and leave it connected until the battery is fully charged again.

Important You have to fully discharge and then charge your battery only once to calibrate it. After that, you can connect and disconnect the power adapter when the battery is at any charge level.

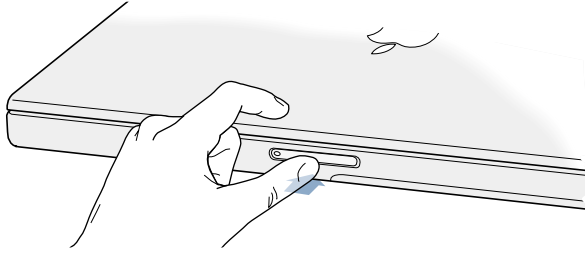
Connecting the Internal Modem

If you want to connect to the Internet right away, connect one end of the phone cord to the modem port (marked with the icon ) on the left side of the computer, and the other end to an analog telephone line (the type of telephone line found in most residences). When you turn on your PowerBook for the first time, a Setup Assistant walks you through the steps necessary for connecting to the Internet. For more detailed information, see Appendix C, “Connecting to the Internet.”

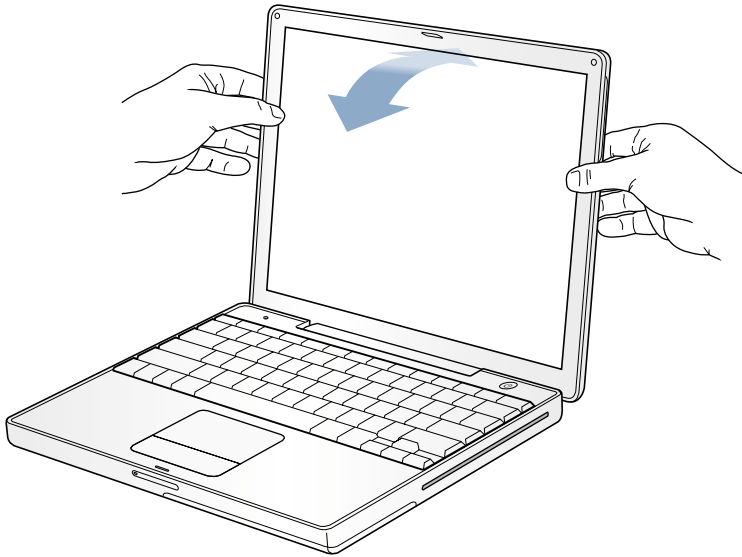
Warning Do not connect a digital telephone line to the modem; the wrong type of line could damage the modem. Contact your telephone service provider if you are unsure whether you have a digital telephone line.

Opening the Display

- 1 Push the display release button.

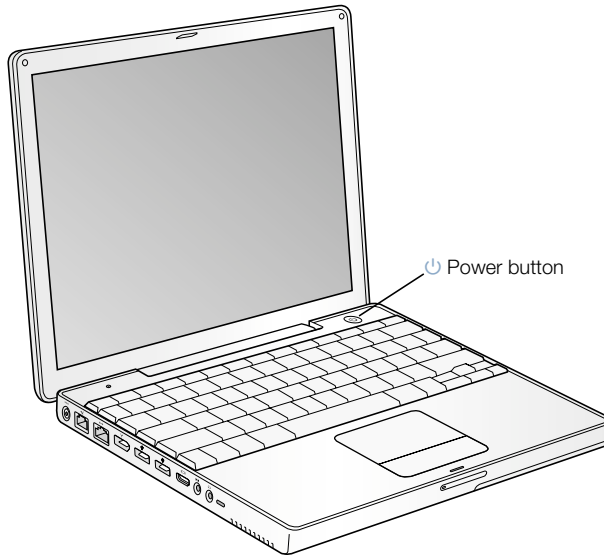


- 2 Open the display and position it at a comfortable viewing angle.



Turning the Computer On

To turn on the computer, press the Power button (⏻). You should hear a tone when you turn on the computer. It takes the computer a few moments to start up. This is normal. When you press the Power button, the PowerBook checks its memory before it starts up. The more memory installed, the longer the delay.



Problems Turning the Computer On?

Nothing happens when you press the Power button.

- Make sure the battery is properly installed. Push the silver button on the battery to check its charge. See “Battery” on page 50.
- The battery may be drained. Make sure that you plugged the power adapter firmly into both the computer and a power source.
- If the computer still doesn’t start up, see page 75 for more troubleshooting suggestions.

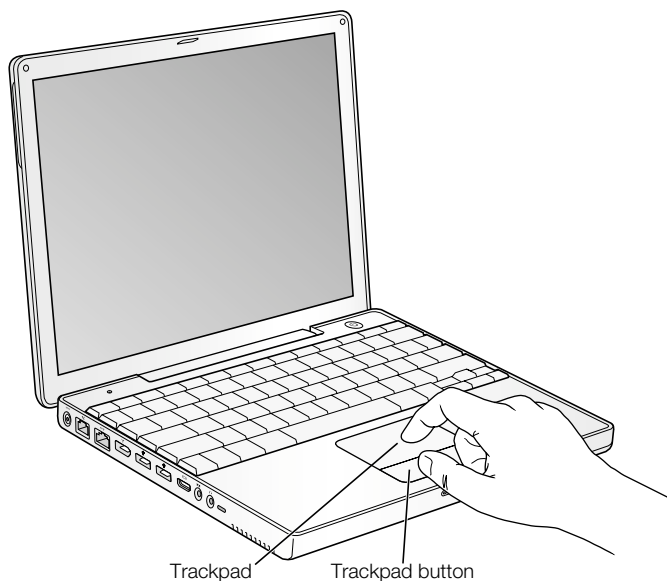
You see a picture of a disk or a folder with a blinking question mark.

- This icon usually means that the computer can’t find system software on the hard disk or any disks attached to the computer. You may need to reinstall system software. See page 75.

Moving Items on the Screen

You use your PowerBook trackpad to select and move items on the screen, much as you use a mouse with a desktop computer. To move the arrow pointer on the screen, slide your finger across the trackpad. To select, click, or double-click an item on the screen, use the trackpad button.

Note: Instead of using the trackpad button, you can click and double-click directly on the trackpad. You turn on this and other trackpad options in the Mouse pane of System Preferences.



The trackpad is sensitive to how quickly you move your finger. To move the pointer a short distance across the screen, move your finger slowly across the trackpad. The faster you move your finger, the farther the pointer moves on the screen.

Tips for Using the Trackpad

For best results when using the trackpad, keep in mind these tips:

- Use only one finger. Using more than one finger may cause erratic pointer behavior.
- Do not use a pen or any other object.
- Keep your finger and the trackpad dry. If the trackpad becomes moist from humidity or condensation, gently wipe it with a clean cloth before you use it.
- Never use any kind of cleaning solution on the trackpad.

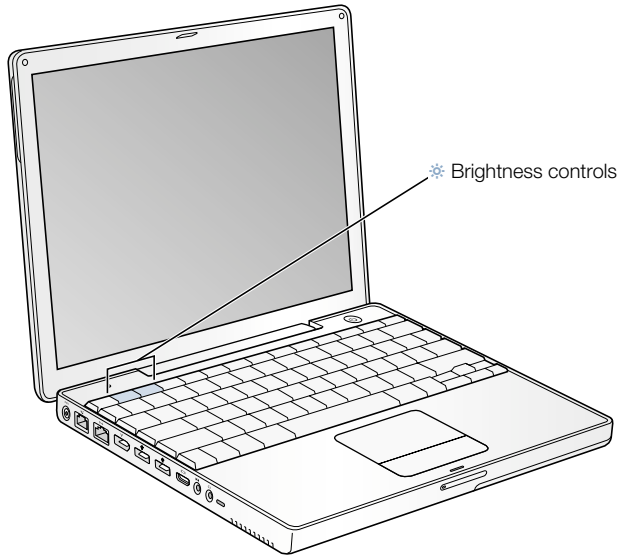

Adjusting the Internal Display

Once you begin working with your new PowerBook, you may need to adjust your display so that items on the screen are easier to see.

Adjusting the Brightness

Use the keys labeled with the  icon to adjust screen brightness.



Adjusting the Display Resolution

You can increase the size of images on your display by switching from the standard resolution to a scaled resolution. To adjust the resolutions on your display, open the Displays pane of System Preferences. To control your display settings using the Displays icon in the menu bar, click “Show displays in menu bar.”

Resolutions Supported by the Built-in Display

Your PowerBook has a 12.1" TFT XGA display with a default resolution of 1024 x 768.

You can choose a resolution of 800 x 600 or lower (called “scaled” resolutions) in the Displays pane of System Preferences. When you switch to a scaled resolution, items on the screen appear larger, making them easier to see. However, scaled resolutions may not be as sharp as the display’s default resolution.

Where to Go From Here

You’ve done everything you need to get your PowerBook up and running. The first time you turn your computer on, the Setup Assistant takes you through the process of configuring your computer and setting up for the Internet. Internet access usually requires an account with an Internet service provider (ISP). Fees may apply.

What to Do When You Are Finished Working

When you have finished working with your PowerBook, you have two options.

Put Your PowerBook to Sleep

If you will be away from your PowerBook for only a short time, put the computer to sleep. When the computer is in sleep, you can quickly wake it and bypass the startup process. When the computer is in sleep, its screen is dark and a small white light pulsates below the display release.

To put the computer to sleep quickly, do one of the following:

- Close the display.
- Choose Apple () > Sleep.

Warning Wait a few seconds until the sleep light starts pulsating (indicating that the computer is in sleep and the hard disk has stopped spinning) before you move your PowerBook. Moving your computer while the hard disk is spinning can damage the hard disk, causing loss of data or the inability to start up from the hard disk.

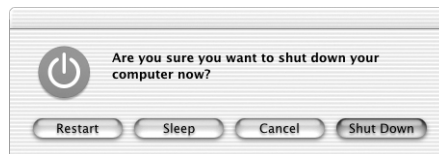
To wake the computer:

- *If the display is closed*, open it. Your PowerBook automatically wakes from sleep when you open the display.
- *If the display is already open*, press the Power button (⏻) or any key on the keyboard.

Shut Down Your PowerBook

If you will not use your PowerBook for a day or two, shut it down. Do one of the following:

- Choose Apple () > Shut Down.
- Press the Power button and click Shut Down in the dialog that appears on the screen.



- If you plan to store your PowerBook for an extended period of time, see “Storing Your PowerBook” on page 81 for additional steps to prevent your battery from draining completely.

Getting to Know Your Computer

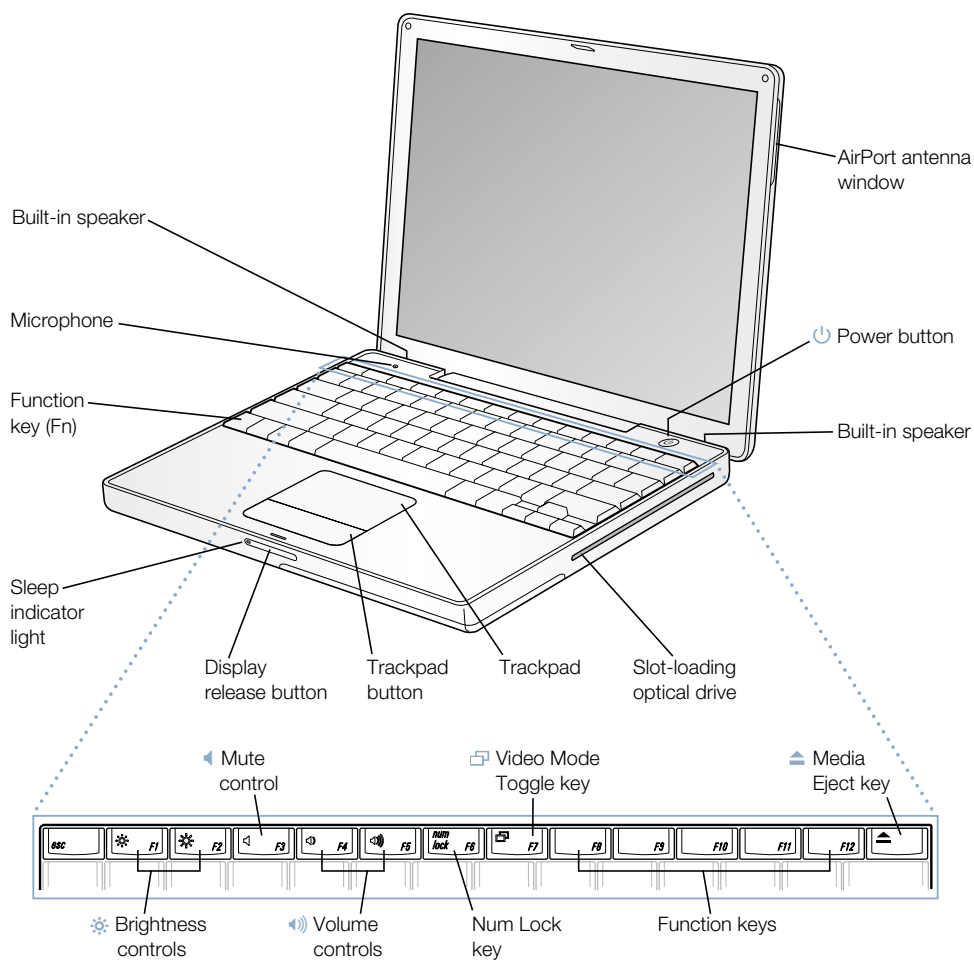
If you're eager to get started and want to try out a few things on your PowerBook, this chapter is for you. It provides an overview of your computer's hardware and software features along with the unique Internet services available to Mac owners.

Your PowerBook is a full-featured notebook computer. It includes the latest in computer technology such as a PowerPC G4 processor, FireWire and USB ports, Bluetooth wireless connectivity, and optional AirPort wireless Internet and networking. Along with this hardware comes the Mac OS X operating system, whose features enable you to use the Internet to watch video, research information, shop, and update your software automatically.

Your PowerBook comes with several software applications that let you do things like send email, surf the Internet, chat, organize music and digital photos, make movies, and much more. This chapter describes these applications and tells you where to find more information about using them. Read on to learn more.

Note: Because Apple frequently releases new versions and updates to its system software, applications, and Internet site, images shown in this book may be slightly different from what you see on your screen.

Basic Features of Your PowerBook



**Brightness controls**

Increase or decrease the brightness of your PowerBook display.

**Volume controls**

Increase or decrease the volume of the sound coming from the built-in speakers and sound output port.

Num Lock key

Activate the numeric keypad embedded in the PowerBook keyboard. When the numeric keypad is locked, the keyboard lock glows green.

**Video Mode Toggle key**

Use this key to toggle between dual display mode and video mirroring mode.

**Media Eject key**

Press and hold this key to eject a CD or DVD disc. You can also eject a disc by dragging its desktop icon to the Trash.

Built-in Speakers (2)

Listen to music, movies, games, and multimedia.

Microphone

Record sounds directly on your PowerBook hard disk with this built-in microphone.

Function (Fn) key

Press and hold this key to activate the function keys (F1 to F12).

Sleep indicator light

A white light pulsates when the PowerBook is in sleep.

Display release button

Push this button to release your display and open your PowerBook.

Trackpad

Move the pointer on the PowerBook display.

Slot-loading optical drive

Your optical drive can read CD-ROM discs, Photo CDs, standard audio discs, DVD-ROM and DVD-R discs, DVD movies, and other kinds of media. It can also write music, documents, and other digital files on CD-R and CD-RW discs. If you have a SuperDrive, you can also write to DVD-R discs.

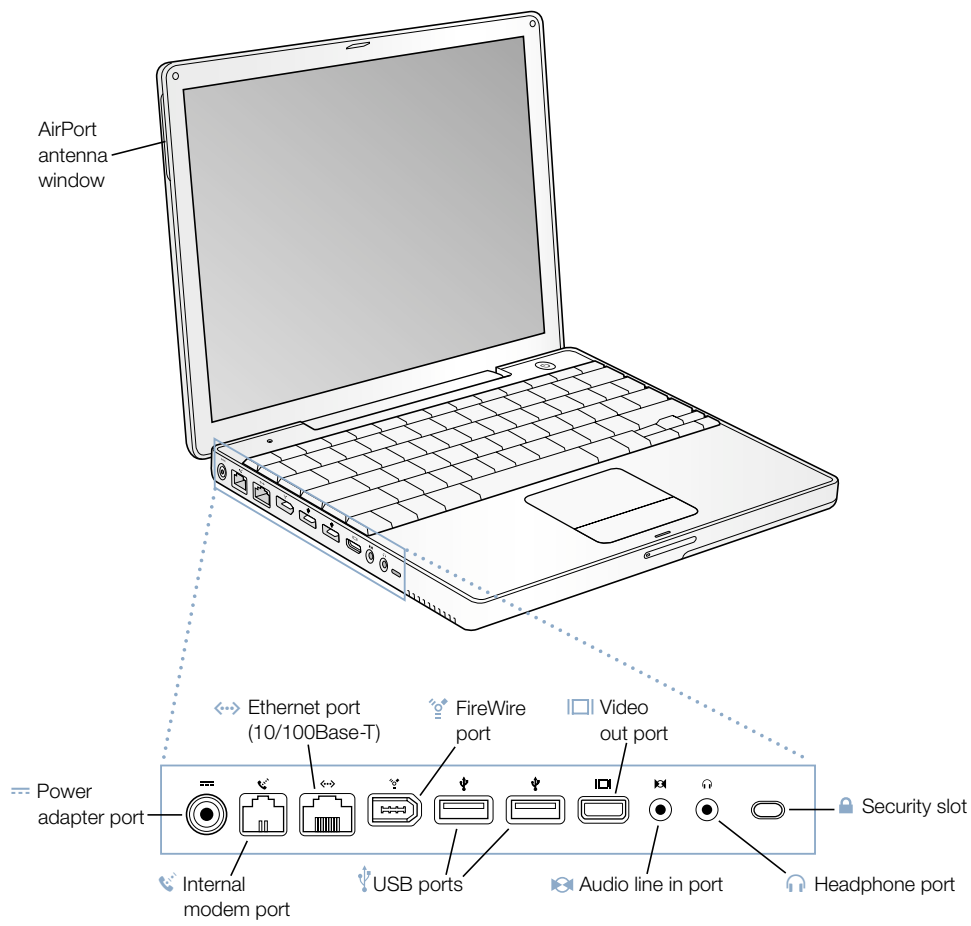
**Power button**

Turn your PowerBook on and off or put it to sleep.

AirPort antenna window

With the optional AirPort Extreme Card, you can connect to the Internet wirelessly.

Additional Features of Your PowerBook



**Power adapter port**

Plug in the power adapter (included) to recharge your PowerBook battery.

**Internal modem port**

Connect a standard phone line directly to the internal modem.

**Ethernet port (10/100Base-T)**

Connect to a high-speed 10/100Base-T Ethernet network or connect to another computer and transfer files. The Ethernet port auto-sensing feature detects other Ethernet devices. You don't need an Ethernet crossover cable to connect to other Ethernet devices.

**FireWire port**

Connect high-speed external devices, such as digital video cameras, printers, and external storage devices.

**Two USB (Universal Serial Bus) ports**

Connect additional equipment to your PowerBook, such as printers, external storage devices, digital cameras, modems, keyboards, and joysticks.

**Video out port**

Using the included VGA adapter, connect to an external monitor or projection device that uses a VGA connector. Using the included Apple Video Adapter, connect your PowerBook to a television, VCR, or another video device that uses an S-video or composite connector.

**Audio line in port**

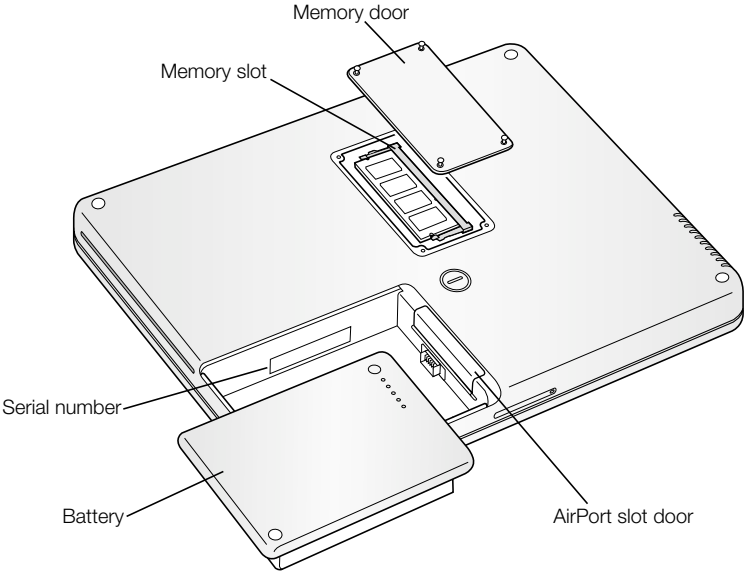
Connect your PowerBook to a line-level microphone or other audio equipment.

**Headphone/audio line out port**

Connect external speakers, headphones, or other sound output devices.

Security slot

Protect your PowerBook by connecting a security cable.



Memory slots

Your PowerBook comes with 256 megabytes (MB) of memory. A single 128 MB memory module is on the logic board and a single 128 MB memory module is in the memory slot. The maximum amount of RAM you can have in your PowerBook is 640 MB, using a 512 MB memory module in the slot. For instructions, see “Installing Additional Memory” on page 63.

AirPort Extreme Card

An AirPort Extreme Card in your computer allows access to a wireless network. Your PowerBook may have come with an AirPort Extreme Card already installed. If not, you can purchase an AirPort Extreme Card and install it yourself. See “Installing an AirPort Extreme Card” on page 69.

About Mac OS X



What You Can Do

Mac OS X provides a powerful and elegant user interface for your computer. With Mac OS X, you don't need to worry about how much memory to allot for an application to run efficiently or restarting your computer if there's a problem with one application. In addition to using Mac OS X software, you can still run Mac OS 9 versions of software in Mac OS X using the Classic environment. Chapter 4, "Working With Your Operating System," on page 61 explains the Classic environment in more detail. Mac OS X also supports Java and UNIX-based software.

System Preferences is your command center for all of your computer settings, from changing the appearance of your desktop to setting up network access information. The Finder and Dock provide easy access to folders, applications, documents, and other items on your computer and network.

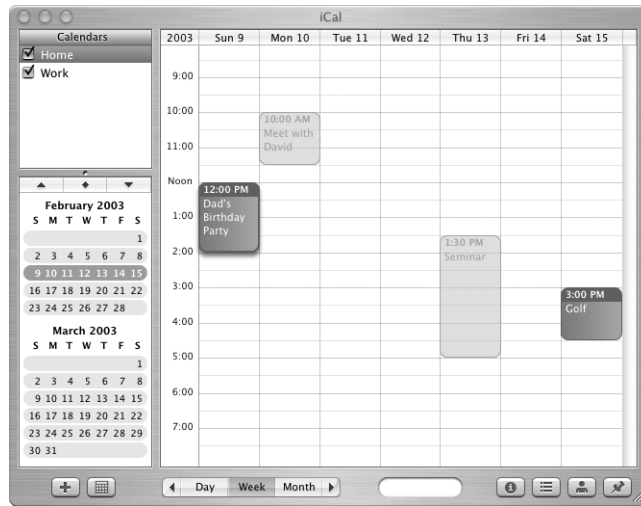

iCal—Organize and Share Your Calendars



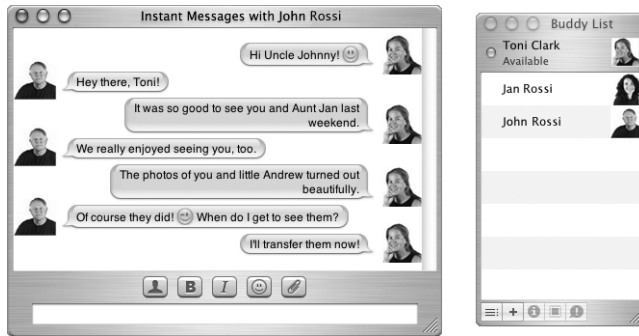
What You Can Do

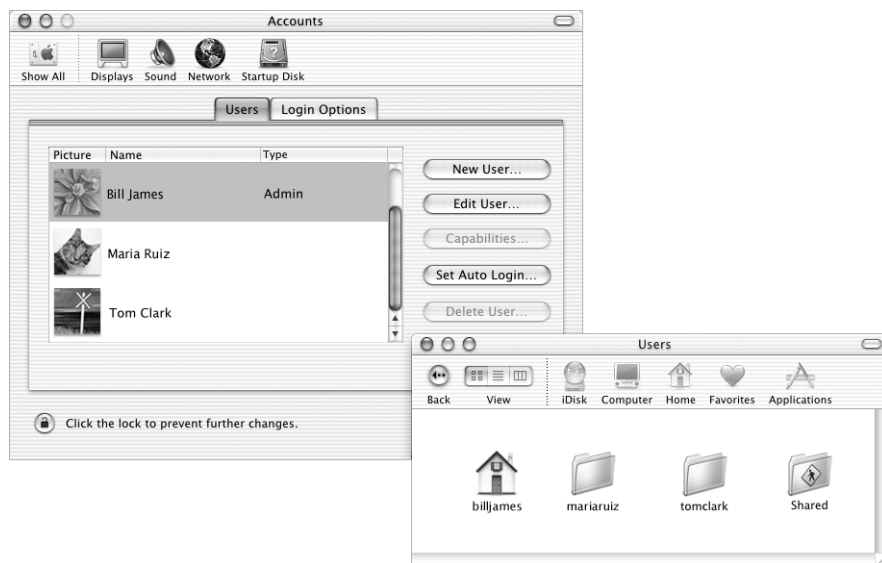
What You Can Do

Accounts—Turn One Mac Into Many



What You Can Do

Several people can share a single computer by logging in to their individual user accounts. Users can select their own customized settings, such as bookmarks and desktop views, and access their own private storage space, called “Home.” Users sharing the computer also have access to a common Shared folder.

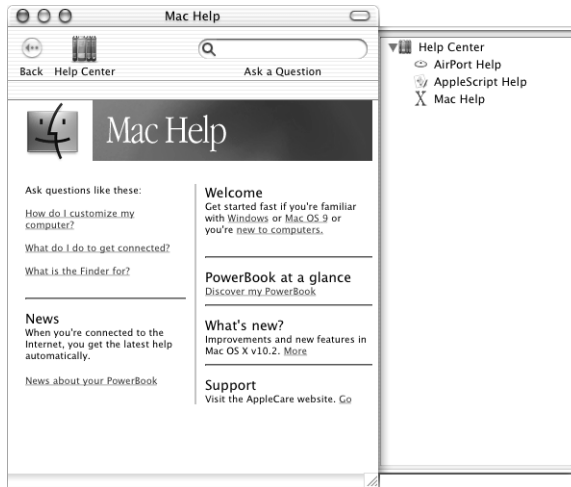
The first user account created on your computer is designated an administrator. Administrators are users with special privileges: they can give new users access to the computer, install software, and change general computer settings.

Note: If you forget the administrator password, you can reset it using the software installer disc that came with your computer. Start up from the software installer disc and choose Reset Password from the Installer menu. Because a user with the software installer disc can gain unrestricted access to the computer, you should keep the disc in a safe place.

Using Your Computer

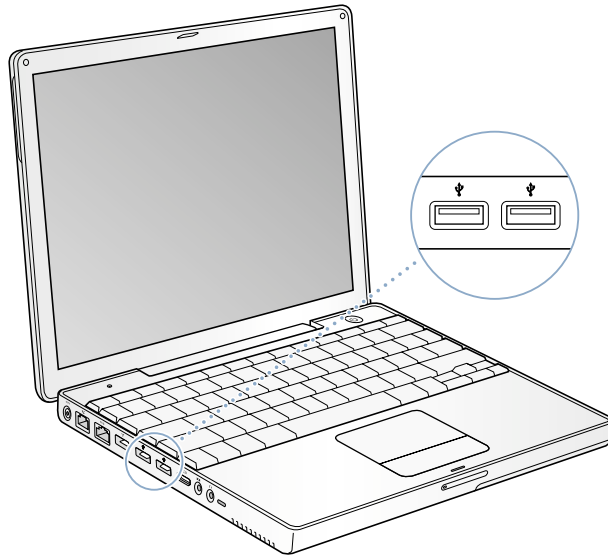
Your PowerBook has many built-in features and expansion capabilities you can use to customize and expand your computer to fit your needs. These include the following:

- Universal Serial Bus (USB) for connecting additional equipment to your PowerBook, such as printers, scanners, joysticks, keyboards, digital cameras, and floppy disk drives.
- FireWire for connecting high-speed equipment, such as digital video cameras and external hard drives.
- The latest in communications technologies, such as a 56K modem, 10/100Base-T Ethernet, Bluetooth wireless connectivity, and optional AirPort wireless Internet and networking.
- VGA output with the included Apple VGA adapter gives you the ability to use your PowerBook with an external monitor, video projector, or many digital flat panel displays, including support for video mirroring and extended desktop (dual display) modes. Use your PowerBook's video out port and the included Apple Video Adapter to play DVD discs on any television that supports composite or S-video.
- A long-lasting battery, audio line in port, headphone port, and more.

Universal Serial Bus (USB)

Your PowerBook comes with two USB ports (🔌), which you can use to connect many types of external devices, including printers, scanners, digital cameras, game pads, joysticks, keyboards, and floppy disk drives. USB makes it easy to connect external equipment. In most cases you can connect and disconnect a USB device while the computer is running. Once you connect the device, it is ready to use. You don't need to restart or reconfigure your computer.



Using USB Devices

To use a USB device with your computer, simply connect the device to the computer. Your computer automatically loads the correct software whenever you connect a new device.

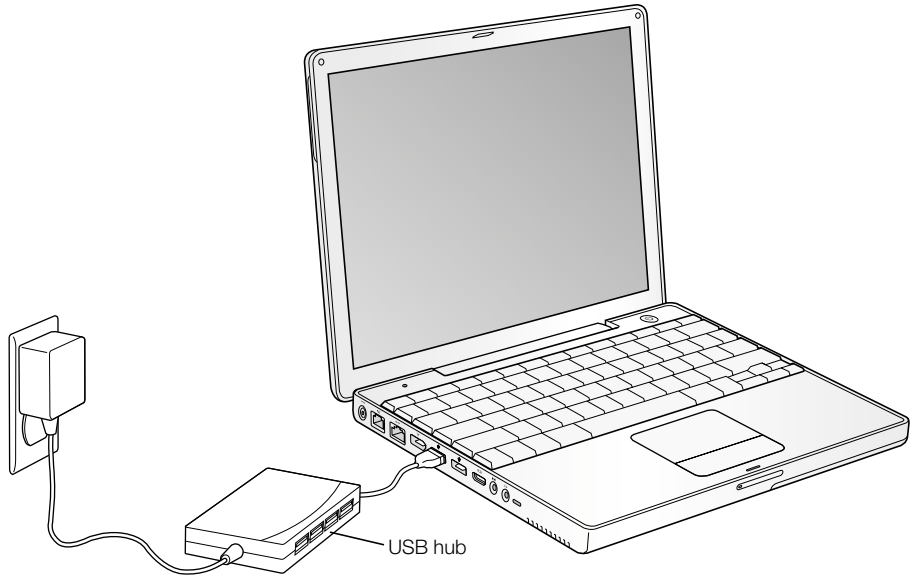
Note: Apple has already included software to work with many USB devices. When you connect a USB device, if your PowerBook cannot find the correct software, you can either install the software that came with the device or follow the onscreen prompts to use the Internet to locate, download, and install the correct software.

USB Devices and Battery Power

USB devices, such as joysticks and keyboards, that get power from the USB connection instead of a separate power adapter can be used with your PowerBook. However, these types of USB devices can cause your PowerBook battery to become depleted faster. If you are going to connect a device for an extended period, it is a good idea to plug the PowerBook into its power adapter.

Using Multiple USB Devices at the Same Time

If you want to use more than two USB devices at the same time, you can purchase a USB hub. The USB hub connects to an open USB port on your computer and provides additional USB ports (usually four or seven). Most USB hubs also have a power adapter and should be plugged into an outlet.



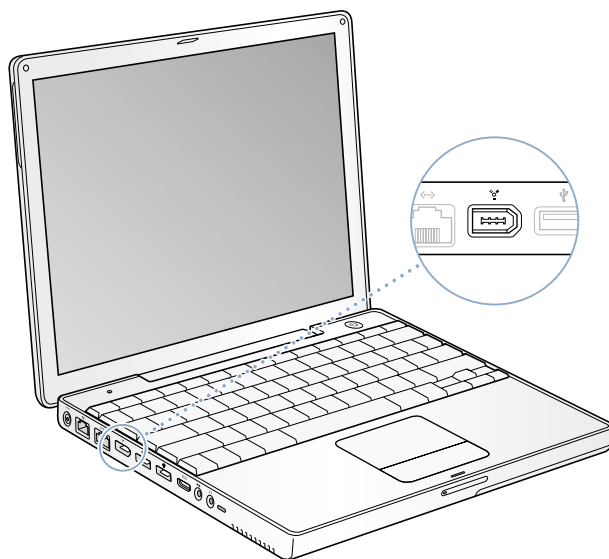

FireWire

Your computer has one FireWire port (). FireWire lets you easily connect and disconnect external high-speed devices—such as DV cameras, printers, scanners, and hard disks. You can connect and disconnect FireWire devices without restarting your computer.



These are some of the things you can do with FireWire:

- Connect a digital video camera and capture, transfer, and edit high-quality video directly on your computer using video-editing software such as iMovie or Final Cut Pro.
- Connect an external FireWire hard disk drive and use it to back up data or transfer files. A FireWire hard disk icon appears on your desktop after you connect the drive to your PowerBook.
- Start up from an external FireWire hard disk. Connect an external FireWire disk (with a valid operating system installed on it), open the Startup Disk pane of System Preferences, and click the FireWire disk. Restart your computer.

Using FireWire Devices

To use a FireWire device with your computer, connect the device to the computer and install any software that came with the device. Your computer automatically detects newly connected devices.

FireWire Devices and Battery Power

FireWire devices, such as certain external hard drives, that get power from the FireWire connection instead of a separate power adapter, can be used with your PowerBook. However, these types of FireWire devices can cause your PowerBook battery to become depleted faster. If a device will be connected for an extended period, it is a good idea to plug the PowerBook into its power adapter.

Note: The FireWire port is designed to support power for FireWire devices (up to 7 watts maximum). You can connect multiple devices to each other and connect the “daisy-chain” of devices to the FireWire port on your computer, but only one device should get power from the computer. The rest of the devices in the daisy-chain should be powered by separate power adapters. Connecting more than one FireWire device that gets power from the computer may cause problems. If a problem occurs, shut down the computer, remove the FireWire devices, and restart your computer.

FireWire Target Disk Mode

If you want to transfer files between your PowerBook and another FireWire-equipped computer, or you have a problem that prevents your computer from starting up, you can use FireWire Target Disk Mode to connect to another computer.

To connect your PowerBook in FireWire Target Disk Mode, follow these steps:

- 1 Make sure that your PowerBook is shut down.
- 2 Use a FireWire cable with a standard 6-pin connector on each end to connect your PowerBook to another FireWire-equipped computer.
- 3 Start up your PowerBook and immediately hold down the T key. Your PowerBook display shows the FireWire logo. The other computer's display shows the PowerBook internal hard disk icon and the icon of a CD or DVD disc in the PowerBook's optical drive.
- 4 When you are finished transferring files, drag the PowerBook hard disk icon and the CD or DVD disc icon to the Trash.
- 5 Press the Power button on the PowerBook to shut it down, and then disconnect the FireWire cable.

Using Bluetooth Devices

Bluetooth technology can help eliminate the need for the cables that traditionally connect devices together. Bluetooth-enabled devices can connect to each other wirelessly within a 10-meter (33-foot) range.

Bluetooth devices include:

- Computers (Mac to Mac)
- Cell phones
- Peripherals (keyboard, mouse, etc.)
- Personal Digital Assistants (PDAs)

With Bluetooth you can do the following:

- Communicate with your handheld PDA. You can perform a HotSync operation without cables or send your business card or calendar events directly to a colleague's PDA.
- Transfer files between computers, even Mac to PC, using the transfer utility. Apple still recommends the use of AirPort wireless networking, however, for anything but the smallest of files.
- Use your PowerBook to communicate with your Bluetooth-enabled mobile phone. You can also use your computer to respond to voice calls. Your phone can act as a modem to connect you to a wireless service provider, at speeds of up to 56Kbps, so you can use your mobile phone to access the Internet.

If your PowerBook did not come with Bluetooth installed, you can download Bluetooth software and connect an external third-party Bluetooth USB adapter to any available USB port on your computer.

For More Information on Bluetooth

You can get help using Bluetooth by opening the Bluetooth File Exchange application (located in the Utilities folder) and choosing Help > Bluetooth Help. You can also find information on the Apple Bluetooth website at www.apple.com/bluetooth.

If your PowerBook G4 did not come with a Bluetooth module installed, you can download Bluetooth software and plug a third-party Bluetooth USB adapter into any available USB port on your computer.

Important Bluetooth modules are not user installable. If you did not purchase your PowerBook G4 with a Bluetooth module installed, purchase a third-party Bluetooth USB adapter.

AirPort Wireless Internet and Networking

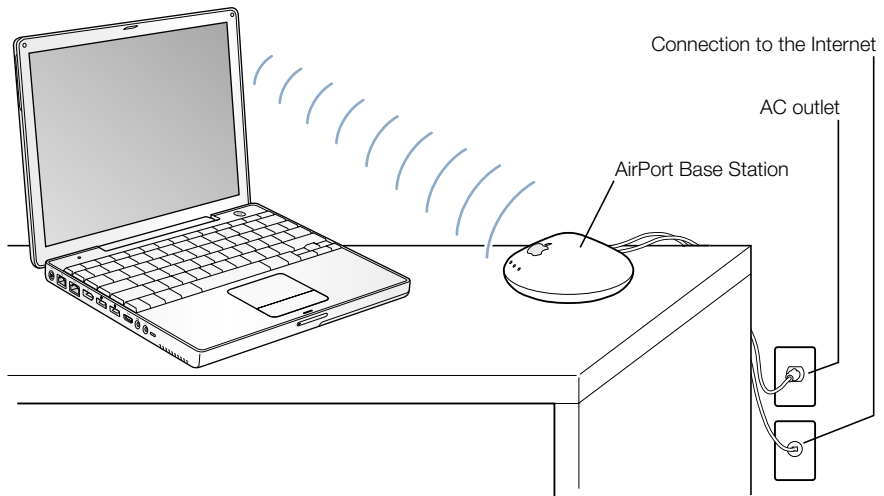
Your PowerBook is AirPort-ready. The computer has built-in antennas, and if you ordered an AirPort Extreme Card when you purchased your PowerBook, a card is already installed. If you do not have an AirPort Extreme Card installed and would like to install one, see page 69 for more information.

AirPort offers an easy and affordable way to provide wireless Internet access anywhere in the home, at work, or in the classroom. Instead of using traditional cables, AirPort uses wireless local area network (LAN) technology to provide wireless communication between multiple computers. Through a wireless network you can set up access to the Internet, transfer files, play multiplayer games, and more.

Note: Wireless Internet access requires an AirPort Extreme Card, AirPort Base Station, and Internet access (fees may apply). Some Internet service providers are not currently compatible with AirPort. Range may vary with site conditions.

How AirPort Provides Wireless Internet Access

With AirPort, you set up a wireless connection to a device known as a *base station*, which has a physical connection to the Internet. AirPort technology works like a cordless telephone. The AirPort Extreme Card in the computer makes a wireless connection to the base, which is connected to the telephone line or a DSL or cable modem.



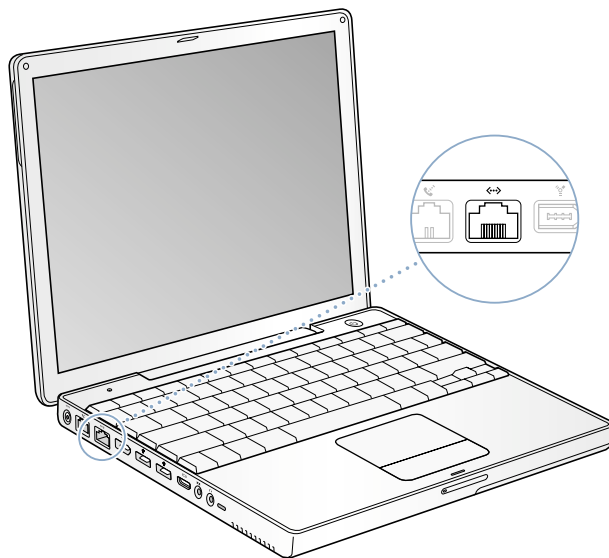

Ethernet (10/100Base-T)

Your computer comes with built-in 10/100 megabit per second (Mbps) Base-T (twisted-pair) Ethernet networking capability, which you can use to connect to a network or to a cable or DSL modem.



Connecting to a network gives you access to other computers. You may be able to store and retrieve information; use network printers, modems, and electronic mail; or connect to the Internet. You can also use Ethernet to share files between two computers or set up a small network. The Ethernet port on your PowerBook auto-detects other Ethernet devices. You don't need an Ethernet crossover cable when connecting to other Ethernet devices.

- Use 2-pair category 3 Ethernet cables to connect to a 10Base-T Ethernet network.
- Use 2-pair category 5 Ethernet cables to connect to a 100Base-T Ethernet network.

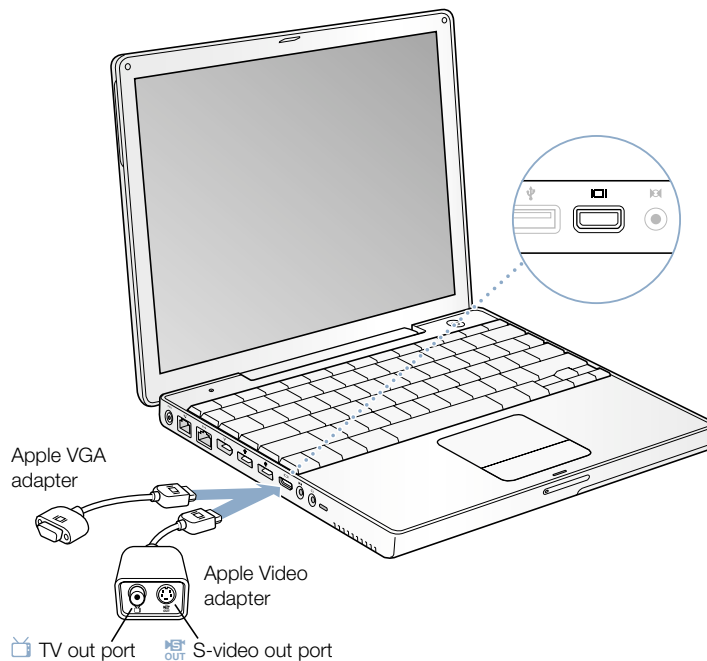

External Video Support (VGA, Composite, and S-Video)

Your computer has a video out port you can use to connect an external display (monitor), using the included Apple VGA Display Adapter.

You can also display or record computer images by connecting a TV, video projector, or videocassette recorder (VCR), using the included Apple Video Adapter.



Important For optimal performance, use only the Apple Video Adapter that came with your computer.

When an external monitor or television is connected, you can either have the same image appear on both the internal display and the external monitor (known as *video mirroring*) or use the external monitor to extend the size of the Mac OS desktop (known as *dual display mode*). By default, your PowerBook starts up in video mirroring mode. Press the F7 () key to switch between video mirroring and dual display modes.

Note: Because of the display limitations of most televisions, images displayed on the television screen will be of lower quality than those on the built-in display or external monitor.

Connecting an External Display or Projector

To connect an external monitor or projector to your computer with a VGA connection:

- 1 Turn on the external monitor or projector.
- 2 Connect the Apple VGA Adapter that came with your PowerBook to the VGA port on the external monitor or projector.
- 3 Connect the Apple VGA Adapter to your PowerBook. Your PowerBook automatically detects the external monitor.

Important To ensure that your PowerBook automatically detects the external monitor or projector, be sure the VGA adapter is plugged into the external monitor or projector first.

- 4 Use the Displays pane of System Preferences to adjust the resolution on the external monitor or projector.

Using Your PowerBook With the Display Closed

You can use your PowerBook with the display closed if the computer is connected to an external monitor, keyboard, and mouse, and the power adapter is plugged into the PowerBook and an outlet.

To operate your computer with an external monitor attached and the display closed, do the following:

- 1 Connect a USB keyboard and mouse to your PowerBook.
- 2 Close the PowerBook display to put the computer to sleep.
- 3 Follow the steps in the previous section to connect your PowerBook to an external monitor.
- 4 Wait a few seconds and then press any key on the external keyboard to wake the PowerBook.

Connecting a Television, VCR, or Other Video Device

To connect a TV, VCR, or other video device to the PowerBook:

- 1 Connect the single-plug end of the included Apple Video Adapter to the video out port on your PowerBook.
- 2 Connect the other end of the adapter to the composite video port or the S-video port on the TV or VCR.
- 3 Turn on the external device.
- 4 To adjust how the images are displayed on the device, use the Displays pane of System Preferences.

The image appears on both the PowerBook and the TV, except for DVD playback, which appears only on the TV.

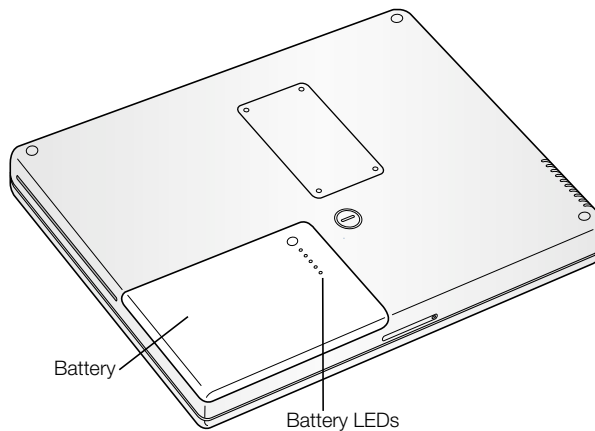

Battery

When the external power adapter is not connected, your computer draws power from its battery. You can determine the charge left in your battery by looking at the battery level indicator lights on the battery itself. Press the button next to the lights and the lights glow to show how much charge is left in the battery. The indicator lights remain lit for a few seconds after you press the button. You can check the charge with the battery in or out of your PowerBook.

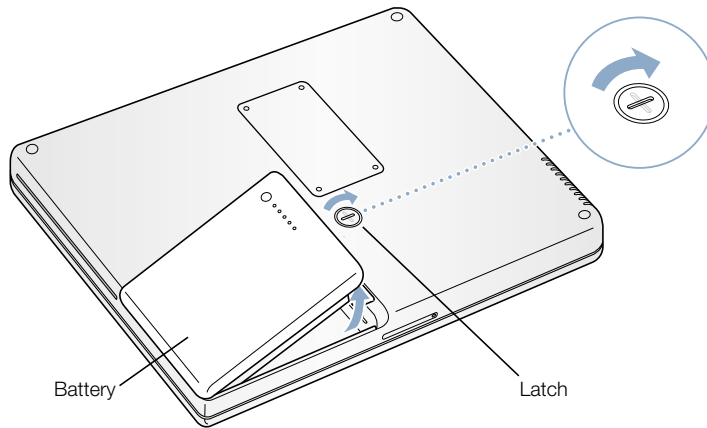
Important If only one flashing light is on, very little charge is left. If no lights are visible, the battery is completely drained and the computer will not start up unless the power adapter is connected. Plug in the power adapter for several hours to let the battery recharge, or replace the drained battery with a fully charged battery (see page 51).



Removing and Replacing the Battery

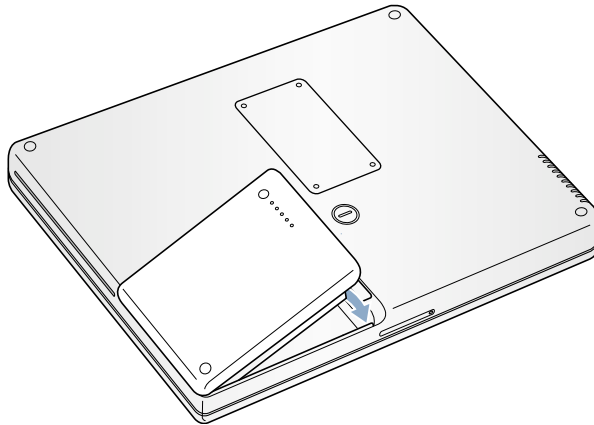
To remove the battery:

- Shut down your PowerBook. Turn it over and locate the battery latch. Use a coin to turn the latch 1/4 turn clockwise to unlock the battery, and gently remove it.



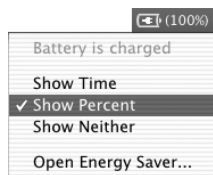
To replace the battery:

- Place the left side of the battery into the battery compartment. Gently press the right side of the battery down until the battery latch locks into place.



Charging a Battery

When the power adapter that came with your computer is connected, the battery is recharging whether the computer is off, on, or in sleep. However, the battery will recharge more quickly if the computer is off or in sleep. You can monitor the battery charge level using the battery status icon in the menu bar:



The battery charge level displayed is based on the amount of power left in the battery with the applications, peripheral devices, and system settings (display brightness, Energy Saver settings, and so on) you are currently using. To make more battery power available, close applications and disconnect peripheral devices not in use, and adjust your Energy Saver settings (see “Battery-Conservation Tips” on page 53).

Calibrating a New Battery for Best Performance

To get the longest running time from a new PowerBook battery, let the battery run down within the first week of use and then fully charge it one time. Follow these steps:

- 1 Plug in the power adapter and fully charge your PowerBook battery until the battery indicator lights and the onscreen meter indicate that the battery is fully charged. A green light on the power adapter plug also indicates that the battery is fully charged.
- 2 Disconnect the power adapter and use your PowerBook. When your battery gets low, you will see the first low battery warning dialog on the screen. Continue to use your PowerBook until it goes to sleep; at that point the battery has been sufficiently drained for calibration.
- 3 Connect the power adapter and leave it connected until the battery is fully charged again.

Important You have to fully discharge and then charge your battery only once to calibrate it. After that, you can connect and disconnect the power adapter when the battery is at any charge level.

Battery-Conservation Tips

The amount of work time your PowerBook battery can provide before you need to recharge depends on the applications and peripheral devices you're currently using and the steps you take to conserve power while you work.

For the best conservation of battery power, do the following:

- Disconnect bus-powered USB or FireWire devices when they are not in use.
- Quit open applications that you are not using.
- Remove CD and DVD discs when they are not in use.
- Reduce screen brightness using the brightness controls on the PowerBook keyboard.
- If you have an AirPort Card installed, turn AirPort off (use the AirPort status icon in the menu bar).
- Set the hard disk to spin down after a short time.
- Set your PowerBook to sleep after inactivity of five minutes or less.

To save battery power, select the following options in the Energy Saver pane of System Preferences:

- Choose Longest Battery Life from the Optimize Energy Settings pop-up menu, and then click More Options.
- Choose Battery Power from the “Settings for” pop-up menu, click the Options tab, and choose Reduced from the Processor Performance pop-up menu.

Using Your Optical Drive

You can install or use software from CDs using your optical drive. You can play multimedia on CD discs and music from audio CDs. Your optical drive can write music, documents, and other digital files on CD-R and CD-RW discs. You can also play DVD movies and use most DVD discs.

If you have a SuperDrive, you can also record information on blank DVD-R (recordable DVD) discs.

Important The optical drive on your PowerBook supports standard circular 12 cm discs. Irregularly shaped discs or discs smaller than 12 cm are not supported. Noncircular discs may become lodged in the drive.

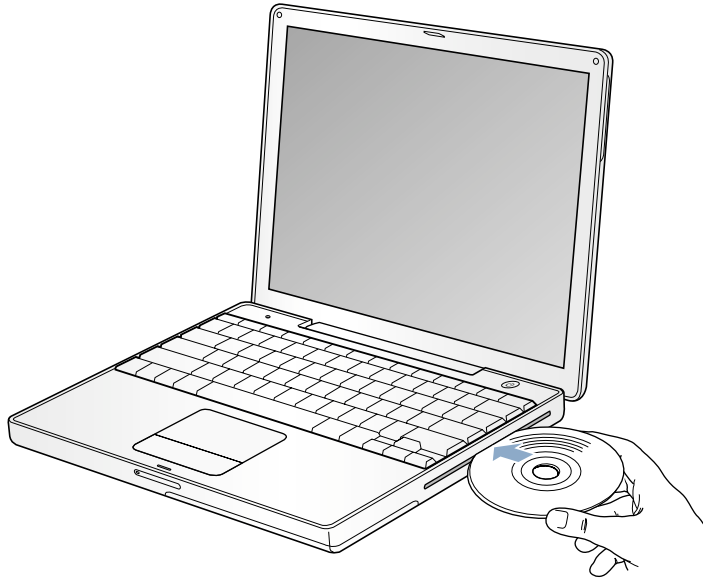
Note: If you have older software that comes on floppy disks, contact the software manufacturer to see if the software is available on a CD, or purchase an external USB floppy disk drive for your PowerBook G4 from your Apple dealer or the Apple Store (www.apple.com/store).

Inserting a CD or DVD Disc

To install or use programs from a CD or DVD disc, follow these steps:

- 1 With the computer turned on, insert the disc (with the label facing up) into the drive slot until you feel the drive catch the disc and take it the rest of the way in. The disc may need to be inserted nearly all the way in before the drive takes it in the rest of the way. This is normal.

Note: Some DVD discs are two-sided.



- 2 When the icon for the disc appears on the desktop, the disc is ready to use.

Ejecting a Disc

To eject a disc, do one of the following:

- Drag the disc icon to the Trash.
- Press and hold the Media Eject (⏏) key on the keyboard until the disc ejects.

Allow the disc to fully eject before removing or reinserting it.

If you can't eject the disc, quit any applications that may be using the disc and try again. If that doesn't work, restart the computer while holding down the trackpad button.

Playing DVD Discs

To play a DVD-Video disc on your PowerBook, insert the DVD disc. DVD Player opens automatically and starts playing the disc.

If your PowerBook is connected to a TV so that you can watch a DVD-Video on the TV screen, select 720 x 480 NTSC (in the United States) or 720 x 576 PAL (in Europe and other regions) in the Displays pane of System Preferences.

You can easily connect your PowerBook to your stereo system. Use a miniplug-to-RCA cable (not included) to connect the headphone port () on your PowerBook to the audio input ports on your stereo.

Recording CD-R and CD-RW Discs

You can record music on CD-R or CD-RW discs right from your iTunes library.

- 1 Click the iTunes icon in the Dock.
- 2 Select the playlist you want to record.
- 3 Insert a blank CD-R or CD-RW disc.
- 4 At the top of the iTunes window, click Burn CD.

You can also record data on CD-R and CD-RW discs with Disc Burner.

- 1 Insert a blank disc in the optical drive.
- 2 In the dialog that appears, enter a name for the disc. An icon for the CD appears on the desktop.
- 3 Drag files and folders to the disc icon.
- 4 Choose File > Burn Disc, or select the disc and drag it to the Burn Disc icon in the Dock.

Recording Information on a DVD

If you have the optional SuperDrive, you can record your own digital movies on a blank DVD-R (DVD-Recordable) disc. You can also record other kinds of digital data, such as backing up files onto DVD-R discs.

With applications like iDVD, you can create your own customized DVD, burn it on a blank DVD-R or DVD-RW disc, and play it on most standard DVD players.

To burn an iDVD project onto a blank DVD:

- 1 Open iDVD and open your completed DVD project.
- 2 Click the Burn button.
- 3 Insert a new blank DVD-R disc into the drive when prompted.
- 4 Click the Burn button again.

You can also record data on DVD-R discs with Disc Burner.

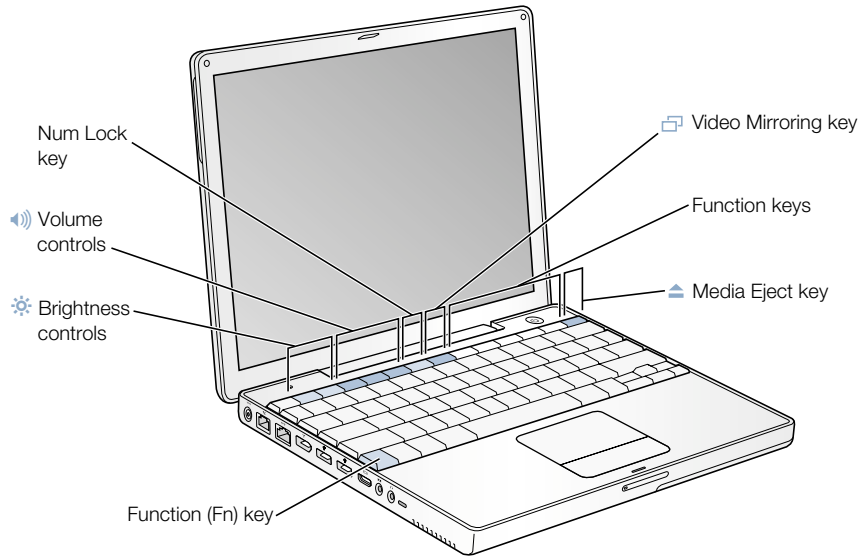
- 1 Insert a blank DVD-R disc in the drive.
- 2 In the dialog that appears, enter a name for the disc and select the format you want to create. An icon for the DVD appears on the desktop.
- 3 Double-click the DVD icon, then drag files and folders to it.
- 4 Choose File > Burn Disc or select the disc and drag it to the Burn Disc icon in the Dock.

For more information about how to use iDVD, see the onscreen help for iDVD in the Help Center.

Important If your battery runs down when you are burning a DVD, the burn may fail and the DVD disc will not be able to be used again. To avoid this, always use your power adapter when burning a DVD.

Keyboard Controls

You can quickly adjust settings, such as volume and screen brightness, and eject a CD or DVD disc using the keyboard controls.

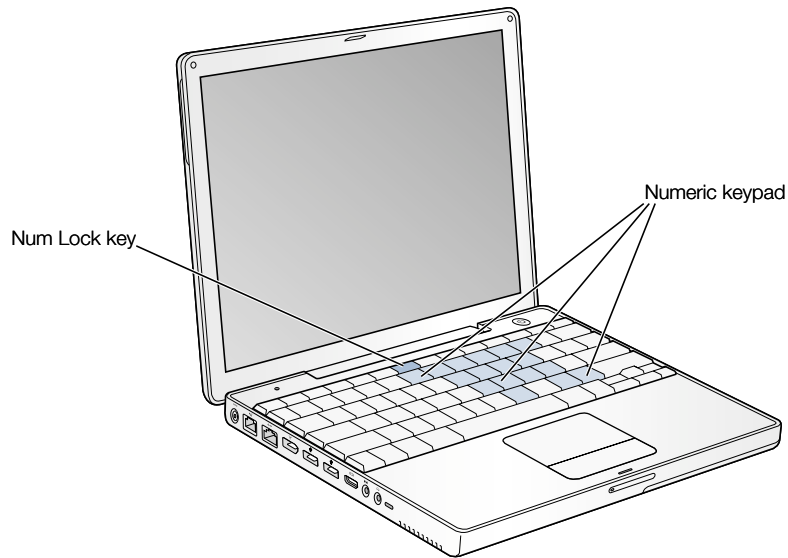


Using the Standard Function Keys

You can quickly change a key from a control key to a standard function key by pressing the Fn key while you press the other key. Use the Keyboard pane of System Preferences to control the function keys.

Using the Embedded Numeric Keypad

Most desktop computer keyboards have a numeric keypad in addition to the regular keyboard keys. Your PowerBook keyboard has a numeric keypad incorporated in the standard keyboard keys. Keys used for the numeric keypad have a smaller secondary label.



To use the numeric keypad, press the Num Lock key on the keyboard. The light next to the Num Lock key turns on, indicating that the keypad is active. When you're finished, press the Num Lock key again to turn it off.

Note: When the numeric keypad is active, other keys and keyboard equivalents for menu commands (such as ⌘ -Q to quit) are deactivated.

Use a locking cable and the built-in security slot to attach your PowerBook to a stationary object.

Working With Your Operating System

An operating system, or OS, is the environment that defines how the items on your computer's desktop are represented and how you interact with them.

Your computer comes with Mac OS X installed as the default operating system, and with Classic, an environment for using Mac OS 9 applications while the computer is running Mac OS X. Your computer cannot use Mac OS 9 as the primary operating system.

About Mac OS X

Mac OS X advanced technologies include an elegant user interface, incredible graphics capabilities, and added system stability and performance. Mac OS X manages your computer processes so you can concentrate on what you want to do. You don't need to restart your computer if something goes wrong with one software application—Mac OS X shuts down only that application so you can keep working without restarting the computer. The Mac OS X virtual memory manager allots the amount of memory your software applications need to operate efficiently.

When you're ready to learn more about Mac OS X, read the *Welcome to Mac OS X* PDF in Documents/Learn More About Your Mac on your computer's hard disk. This book introduces the features of Mac OS X and provides tips for using Mac OS X to perform common tasks. If you've used other computers but are new to the Macintosh, read *Switching to the Mac* in Documents/Learn More About Your Mac on your computer's hard disk. If you experience any problems while using Mac OS X, see the troubleshooting tips in the back of this book or choose Help > Mac Help.

Important Because Mac OS X is already installed on your computer, you don't need to follow the installation instructions in *Welcome to Mac OS X*. You need to follow the instructions in *Welcome to Mac OS X* only to log in and begin using Mac OS X.

Information About Software and Mac OS X

For information about the compatibility of software applications with Mac OS X, or to read more about Mac OS X, check the Apple website: guide.apple.com/macosex/.

Using Classic in Mac OS X

In addition to using Mac OS X applications, you can continue to use most Mac OS 9 applications in the Classic environment. When you start up Classic, Mac OS 9 software works in Mac OS X just as it did in Mac OS 9, but doesn't benefit from Mac OS X features such as the look of the new interface. Simply open a Mac OS 9 application or a document that requires Mac OS 9. If Classic isn't running, it starts up.

Once you start the Classic environment, it continues to run in the background, even if no Mac OS 9 applications are open. When Classic is running, Mac OS 9 applications and documents open faster. You can set up your computer to start Classic automatically when you log in to Mac OS X. Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences, click Classic, and select "Start Classic when you log in."

To quit the Classic environment, click Stop in the Classic pane of System Preferences.

Important Your computer will start up only in Mac OS X. Mac OS 9 is not available as a startup disk and previous versions of Mac OS 9 should not be installed on this computer.

Enhancing Your Computer

Warning Apple recommends that you have an Apple-certified technician install memory. Consult the service and support information that came with your computer for instructions on how to contact Apple for service. If you attempt to install memory and damage your equipment, such damage is not covered by the limited warranty on your computer.

Installing Additional Memory

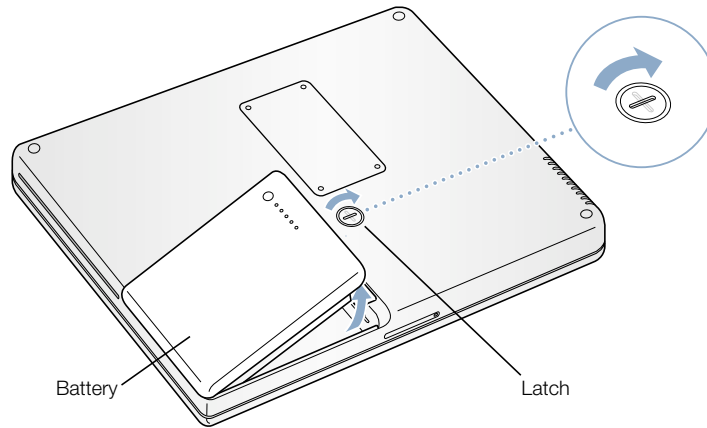
Your PowerBook comes with one memory slot that you access by removing the memory door on the bottom of the computer. Your PowerBook comes with 128 megabytes (MB) of Double Data Rate Random-Access Memory (DDR RAM) installed on the logic board and a 128 MB memory module in the memory slot. The memory slot can accept any memory module that meets the following specifications:

- Small Outline-Dual Inline Memory Module (SO-DIMM) format
- 1.25 inch or smaller
- 128, 256 or 512 MB
- 200-pin
- PC 2100 DDR 266 Type RAM

The maximum amount of RAM you can install in your PowerBook is 640 MB, using a single 512 MB SO-DIMM in the memory slot.

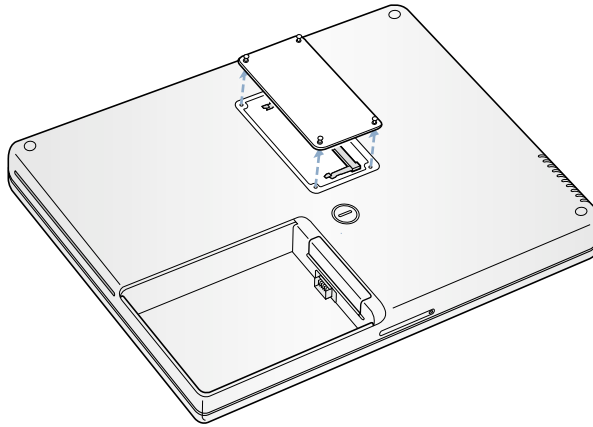
Installing Additional RAM

- 1 Shut down your computer. Disconnect the power adapter, phone cord, and any other cables connected to the computer. Turn the computer over and remove the battery.

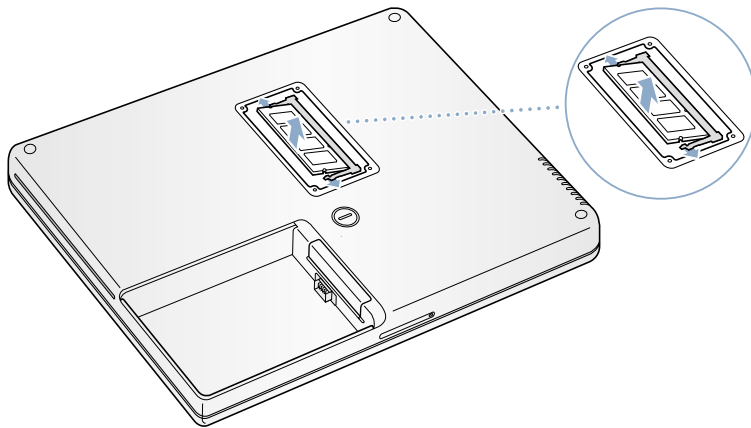


Warning The internal components of your PowerBook may be hot. If you have been using your PowerBook, wait 30 minutes after shutting down to let the internal components cool before continuing.

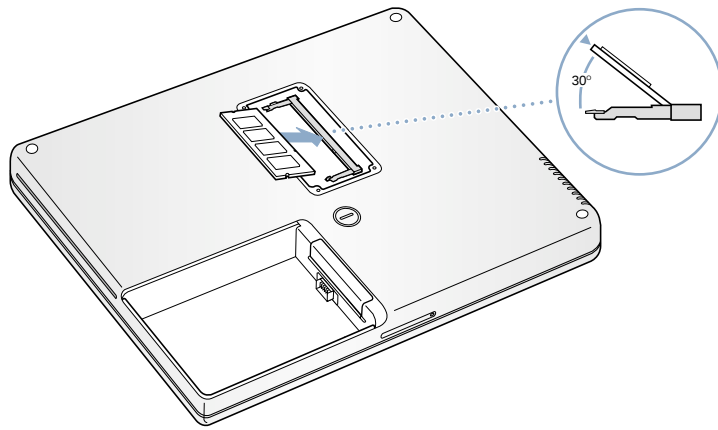
- 2 Using a Phillips size 00 screwdriver, unscrew the memory door and remove it from the bottom of your computer.



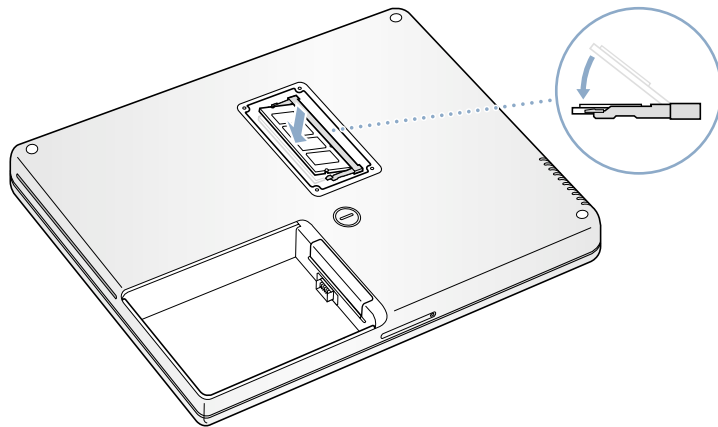
- 3 If you already have a memory card installed in the slot, remove it. Spread the tabs in the slot away from the notches in the memory card. The card should pop up slightly.



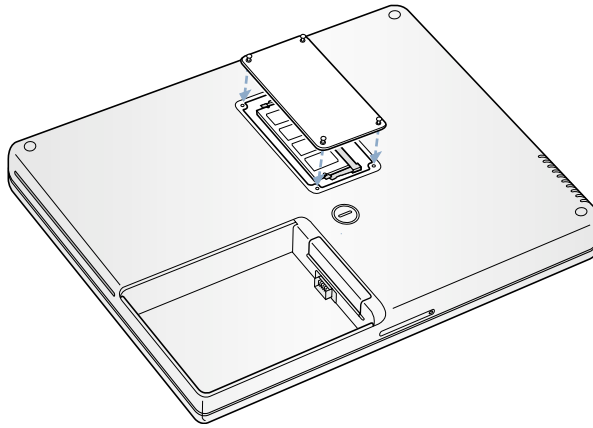
- 4 Insert the new memory card into the slot at a 30-degree angle.



- 5 Press down on the memory card to lock it in place.

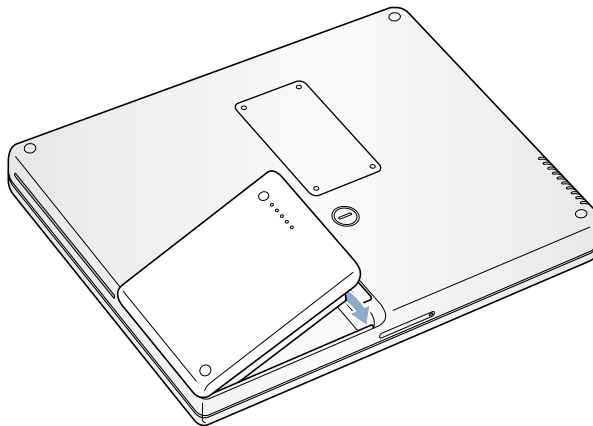


- 6 Replace the memory door and screw it into place.



Note: To avoid damage, be careful not to overtighten the screws.

- 7 Replace the battery. Place the left side of the battery into the battery compartment. Gently press the right side of the battery down until the battery latch locks into place.

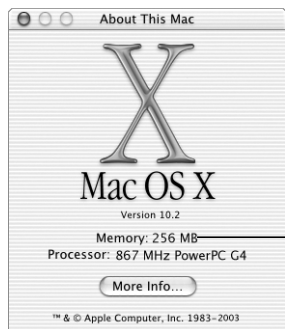


- 8 Reconnect the power adapter and any other cables that were attached.

Making Sure Your Computer Recognizes the New Memory

After installing additional memory in your PowerBook, check whether the computer recognizes the new memory. Do the following:

- 1 Start up your computer.
- 2 When you see the Mac OS desktop, choose Apple (🍏) > About This Mac.



Total memory installed
in your PowerBook

The total includes the amount of memory that originally came with the computer plus the new memory you added. For a more detailed breakdown of the amount of memory installed in your computer, open Apple System Profiler, located in Applications/Utilities.

If the memory is not recognized or your computer does not start up correctly, shut down your PowerBook and check the instructions again to make sure that the memory you installed is compatible with this PowerBook and that it is installed correctly. If you still have problems, remove the memory and consult the support information that came with the memory or contact the vendor who provided the memory.

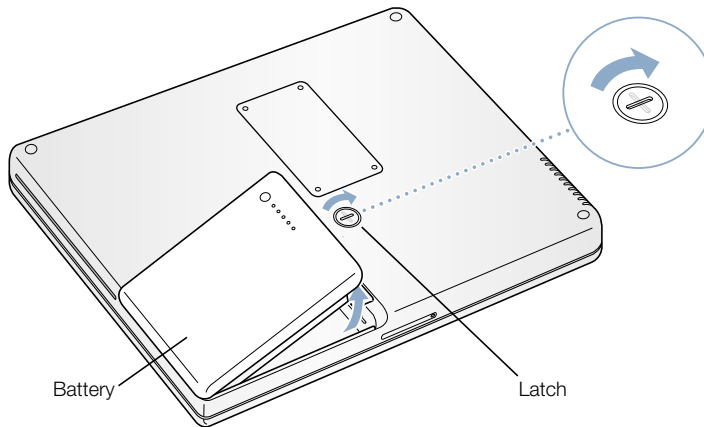
Installing an AirPort Extreme Card

If your computer did not come with an AirPort Extreme Card, you can purchase one from your Apple-authorized dealer or from the Apple Store at www.apple.com/store and install it yourself or have it installed by an Apple-authorized service provider.

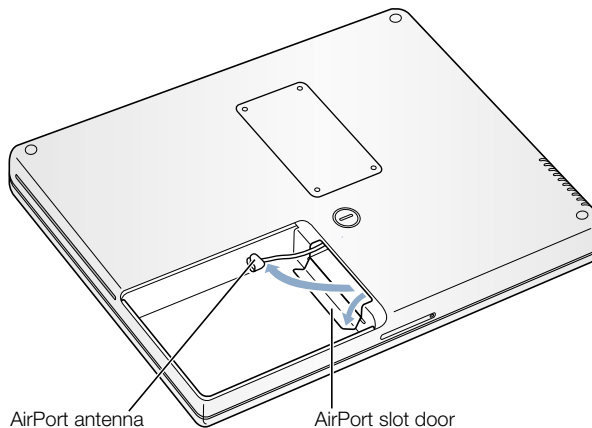
Note: Your PowerBook is not compatible with older AirPort Cards. Use only an AirPort Extreme Card.

To install an AirPort Extreme Card in your PowerBook:

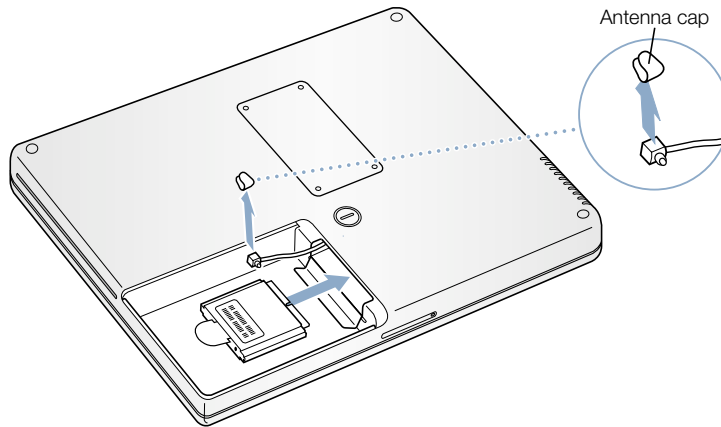
- 1 Shut down your computer. Disconnect the power adapter, phone cord, and any other cables connected to the computer. Turn the computer over and remove the battery.



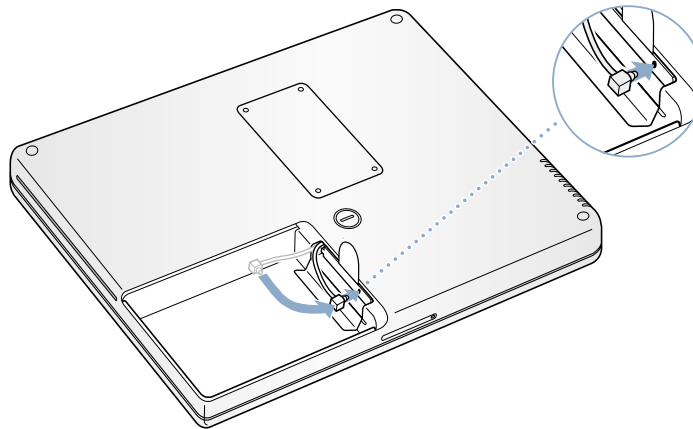
- 2 Open the AirPort slot door. Gently pull out the antenna so that it hangs out of the slot.



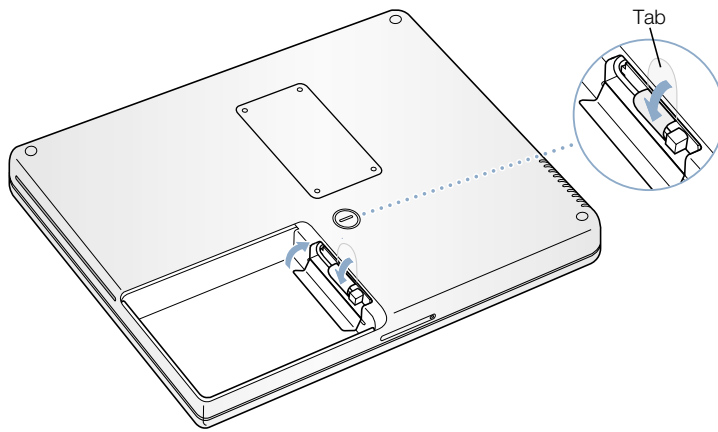
- 3 Remove the antenna cap. Touch a metal surface inside the computer to discharge any static electricity. Slide the Airport Extreme Card into the slot until you feel it snap into place.



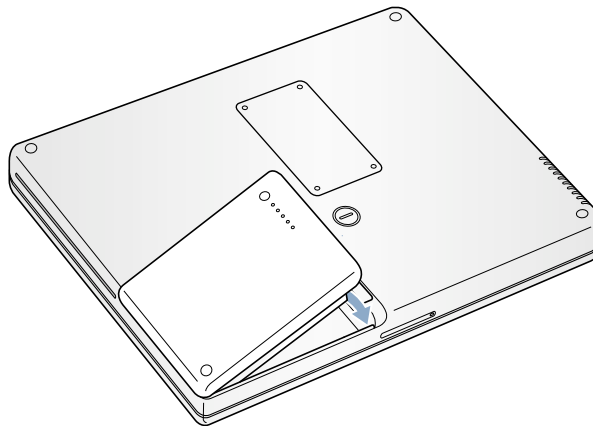
- 4 Connect the end of the antenna to the Airport Extreme Card.



- 5 Tuck the tab under the AirPort Extreme Card and close the slot door.



- 6 Replace the battery.



Troubleshooting

Occasionally you may have problems while working with your PowerBook. Usually it's because your software isn't properly configured or you're using applications or software extensions that are not compatible with the version of the Mac OS (system software) installed on your computer. Other less likely sources include problems with the Mac OS (usually fixed by reinstalling your computer's system software or through a software update) and problems with your computer's hardware, such as the memory or hard disk.

When you experience a problem with your computer, it is important to remember that there is usually a simple and quick solution. When you encounter a problem, be aware of the conditions that led up to the problem. Making a note of things you did before the problem occurred will help you narrow down the possible causes of the problem and then find the answers you need. Things to note include:

- the applications you were using when the problem occurred (Problems that occur only with a specific application may indicate that the application is not compatible with the version of the Mac OS installed on your computer.)
- any software that you recently installed, especially software that added items to the System folder (Certain applications install extensions that may not be compatible with the Classic environment.)
- any new hardware (such as additional memory or a peripheral) that you installed

Information in This Chapter

This chapter contains solutions to problems that prevent you from working with your computer, such as a system freeze or a computer that will not start up. You can find more troubleshooting information in Mac Help (see page 37), on the Apple Support website at www.apple.com/support, and in the Apple Knowledge Base at kbase.info.apple.com.

Problems That Prevent You From Using Your Computer

If the computer won't respond or the pointer won't move

- Press the Command (⌘) and period keys at the same time and, if a dialog appears, click Cancel.
- If that doesn't work, choose Apple () > Force Quit and select the application you would like to quit. If you are working in Classic, hold down the Option and Command (⌘) keys and then press the Esc key. If a dialog appears, click Force Quit. Then save your work in any open applications and restart the computer to be sure the problem is entirely cleared up.
- If you are unable to force the application to quit, press and hold the Power button (⏻) for a few seconds to shut down the computer.
- If the computer still doesn't respond, try to restart it by simultaneously pressing the Command (⌘) and Control keys on your keyboard and the Power button (⏻).

If the problem occurs frequently, choose Help > Mac Help. Look at the information on how to prevent and solve problems. You may need to check for extension conflicts or reinstall your computer's system software. If the problem occurs only when you use a particular program, check with the program's manufacturer to see if it is compatible with your computer.

If the computer freezes during startup or you see a flashing question mark

If you are using the Classic environment in Mac OS X, you might have an incompatible extension. Mac OS X does not use system extensions. To turn off extensions, open System Preferences, click Classic, click the Advanced tab, and choose Turn Off Extensions from the pop-up menu. Click Restart Classic.

If that does not help, start up your PowerBook while holding down the C key and at the same time insert the software installer disc that came with your computer. (Make sure the Caps Lock key is not engaged.)

If using your software installer disc is the only way you can start up your PowerBook, you need to reinstall your computer's system software. For instructions, see page 75, look in Mac Help, or open the software installation or restore program and follow the onscreen instructions.

If the computer won't turn on or start up

- Make sure the power adapter is plugged into the computer and into a functioning power outlet.
- Your battery may need to be recharged. Press the small button on the battery (see page 50). You should see one to five lights indicating the battery's level of charge.
- If that does not work, press the Power button (⏻) and immediately hold down the Command (⌘), Option, P, and R keys until you hear the startup sound a second time.
- If you recently installed additional memory, make sure that it is correctly installed and that it is compatible with your computer. See whether removing it allows the computer to start up (see page 68).
- If you are still unable to start up your computer, see the service and support information that came with your PowerBook for information on contacting Apple for service.

If the display suddenly goes black or if your system freezes while you are working

You will need to restart your system.

- 1 Unplug any devices that are connected to your PowerBook except the power adapter.
- 2 Hold down the Command (⌘) and Control keys and press the Power button (⏻) to restart the system.
- 3 Let the battery charge to at least 10 percent before plugging in any external devices and resuming your work. To see how much the battery has recharged, look at the battery status icon in the menu bar.

Restoring Your Computer's Software

Use the software installer disc that came with your computer to install Mac OS X, applications, and Classic support.

Installing Mac OS X

- 1 Back up essential files, if possible.
- 2 Insert the software installer disc that came with your computer.
- 3 Double-click the Install Mac OS X icon.
- 4 Follow the onscreen instructions.
- 5 After selecting the destination disk for installation, click Options and continue following the onscreen instructions.

Installing applications and classic support

- 1 Back up essential files, if possible.
- 2 Insert the software installer disc that came with your computer.
- 3 Double-click the “Install Applications and Classic Support” icon.
- 4 Follow the onscreen instructions.

Note: iCal, iChat, iMovie, iPhoto, and iTunes are part of Mac OS X. To install them you must follow the directions for installing Mac OS X.

Other Problems

If you have a problem with an application

- For problems with software from a manufacturer other than Apple, contact the manufacturer. Software manufacturers often provide updates to their software on their websites. You can configure your PowerBook to automatically check for and install the latest Apple software using the Software Update pane of System Preferences. For more information, choose Help > Mac Help and search for “software update.”

If you have trouble using AirPort wireless communication

- Make sure you have properly configured the software according to the instructions that came with your AirPort Extreme Card or AirPort Base Station.
- Make sure the computer or network you are trying to connect to is running and has a wireless access point.
- Make sure you are within antenna range of the other computer or the network’s access point. Nearby electronic devices or metal structures can interfere with wireless communication and reduce this range. Repositioning or rotating the computer may improve reception.
- Check the AirPort signal level:
 - In Mac OS X, up to four bars in the AirPort status icon in the menu bar.
 - In Classic, up to five green dots in the AirPort portion of the Control Strip.
- See AirPort Help (in the Help Center) and the instructions that came with the wireless device for more information.

If you have trouble ejecting a disc

- Quit any applications that may be using the disc and try again. If that doesn’t work, restart the computer while holding down the trackpad button.

If you have problems with your Internet connection

- Make sure your telephone line or network cable is connected and functioning properly.
- If you are using a dialup Internet connection, make sure that your telephone cord is plugged into the modem port (marked with the icon ) and not the Ethernet port (marked with the icon ).
- Choose Help > Mac Help. There you will find how to locate your Internet settings and the contact information for your Internet service provider (if you used the Setup Assistant to get your Internet account).

If you have a problem using your computer or working with the Mac OS

- If the answers to your questions are not in this manual, look in Mac Help for instructions and troubleshooting information.
- Check the Apple Support website at www.apple.com/support for the latest troubleshooting information and software updates.

If you suspect a problem with your computer hardware

- You can use the Apple Hardware Test CD to help determine if there is a problem with one of your computer's components, such as the memory or processor.

Locating Your Product Serial Number

The serial number for your PowerBook is located on the inside wall of the battery bay. For instructions on removing the battery, see “Removing and Replacing the Battery” on page 51. You can also see the serial number by opening Apple System Profiler (in Applications/Utilities) and clicking the System Profile tab.

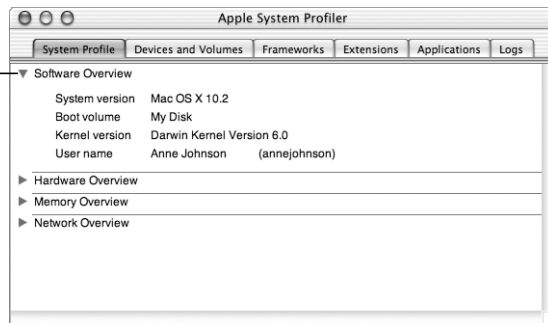

Care, Use, and Safety Information

Cleaning Your PowerBook

Follow these general rules when cleaning the outside of your computer and its components:

- Shut down your PowerBook and remove the battery.
- Use a damp, soft, lint-free cloth to clean the computer's exterior. Avoid getting moisture in any openings. Do not spray liquid directly on the computer.
- Don't use aerosol sprays, solvents, or abrasives.

Cleaning Your PowerBook Display

To clean your PowerBook screen, do the following:

- Shut down your PowerBook and remove the battery.
- Dampen a clean, soft, lint-free cloth or paper with water only and wipe the screen. Do not spray liquid directly on the screen.

Carrying Your PowerBook

If you carry your PowerBook in a bag or briefcase, make sure that there are no loose items (such as paper clips or coins) that could accidentally get inside the computer through an opening such as the optical drive slot.

Storing Your PowerBook

If you are going to store your PowerBook for an extended period of time, do one of the following to prevent your PowerBook battery from becoming completely depleted:

- Keep the power adapter connected.
- Fully charge your PowerBook battery before storing the computer.
- Fully charge and then remove your PowerBook battery when storing your computer (especially important when storing your computer for longer than 5 months).

Safety Instructions for Setting Up and Using Your Computer

Plugging in the Power Adapter

Always leave space around your power adapter. Do not use this equipment in a location where airflow around the power adapter or computer is confined. Always disconnect the power adapter and remove the battery before opening the computer to perform procedures such as installing memory or removing the hard disk.

Warning Use only the power adapter that came with your PowerBook computer. Adapters for other electronic devices (including other PowerBook models and other portable computers) may look similar, but they may damage your computer.

Connecting a Phone Line to the Internal Modem

Always disconnect the phone cord before opening the computer to perform procedures such as installing memory or removing the hard disk.

Warning Do not connect a digital telephone line to the modem, because the wrong type of line could damage the modem.

Using Your PowerBook

When using your PowerBook or when charging the battery, it is normal for the bottom of the case to get warm. For prolonged use, place your PowerBook on a flat, stable surface. The bottom of the PowerBook case functions as a cooling surface that transfers heat from inside the computer to the cooler air outside. The bottom of the case is raised slightly to allow airflow that keeps the unit within normal operating temperatures.

Warning Do not place your PowerBook on a pillow or other soft material when it is on, as the material may block the airflow vents and cause the computer to overheat. Never place anything over your keyboard before closing the display. This can cause your computer to cycle on and off which may create excessive heat and drain your battery. Never turn on your computer unless all of its internal and external parts are in place. Operating the computer when it is open or missing parts can be dangerous and can damage your computer.

Warning Permanent hearing loss may occur if earphones or headphones are used at high volume. You can adapt over time to a higher volume of sound, which may sound normal but can be damaging to your hearing.

General Safety Instructions

For your own safety and that of your equipment, always take the following precautions.

Disconnect the power plug (by pulling the plug, not the cord), remove the main battery, and disconnect the phone cord if any of the following conditions exists:

- You want to remove any parts
- The power cord or plug becomes frayed or otherwise damaged
- You spill something into the case
- Your computer is exposed to rain or any other excess moisture
- Your computer has been dropped or the case has been otherwise damaged
- You suspect that your computer needs service or repair
- You want to clean the case (use only the recommended procedure described earlier)

Important The only way to disconnect power completely is to unplug the power cord and phone cords, and remove the battery. Make sure at least one end of the power cord is within easy reach so that you can unplug the computer when you need to.

Warning Your AC cord came equipped with a three-wire grounding plug (a plug that has a third grounding pin). This plug will fit only a grounded AC outlet. If you are unable to insert the plug into an outlet because the outlet is not grounded, contact a licensed electrician to replace the outlet with a properly grounded outlet. Do not defeat the purpose of the grounding plug.

Be sure that you always do the following:

- Keep your computer away from sources of liquids, such as drinks, washbasins, bathtubs, shower stalls, and so on.
- Protect your computer from dampness or wet weather, such as rain, snow, and so on.
- Read all the installation instructions carefully before you plug your computer into a wall socket.
- Keep these instructions handy for reference by you and others.
- Follow all instructions and warnings dealing with your system.

Important Electrical equipment may be hazardous if misused. Operation of this product, or similar products, must always be supervised by an adult. Do not allow children access to the interior of any electrical product and do not permit them to handle any cables.

Warning Never push objects of any kind into this product through the openings in the case. Doing so may be dangerous and result in fire or a dangerous electric shock.

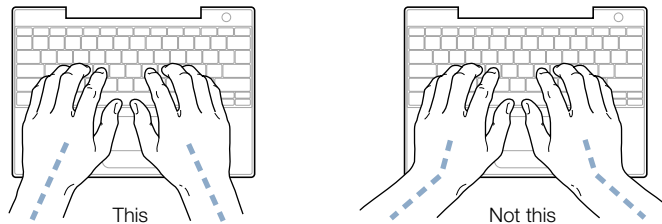

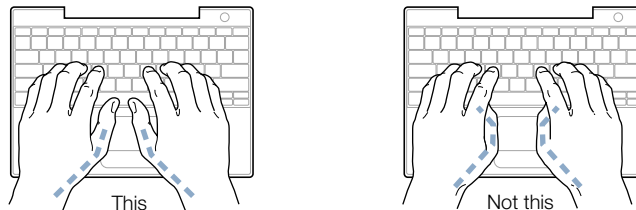
Ergonomics

Keyboard and trackpad

When you use the keyboard and trackpad, your shoulders should be relaxed. Your upper arm and forearm should form an angle that is slightly greater than a right angle, with your wrist and hand in roughly a straight line.



Use a light touch when typing or using the trackpad and keep your hands and fingers relaxed. Avoid rolling your thumbs under your palms.



Change hand positions often to avoid fatigue. Some computer users may develop discomfort in their hands, wrists, or arms after intensive work without breaks. If you begin to develop chronic pain or discomfort in your hands, wrists, or arms, consult a qualified health specialist.

Chair

An adjustable chair that provides firm, comfortable support is best. Adjust the height of the chair so your thighs are horizontal and your feet flat on the floor. The back of the chair should support your lower back (lumbar region). Follow the manufacturer's instructions for adjusting the backrest to fit your body properly.

You may have to raise your chair so your forearms and hands are at the proper angle to the keyboard. If this makes it impossible to rest your feet flat on the floor, you can use a footrest with adjustable height and tilt to make up for any gap between the floor and your feet. Or you may lower the desktop to eliminate the need for a footrest. Another option is to use a desk with a keyboard tray that's lower than the regular work surface.

External mouse

If you use an external mouse, position the mouse at the same height as your keyboard and within a comfortable reach.

Built-in display

Adjust the angle of the display to minimize glare and reflections from overhead lights and windows. Do not force the display if you meet resistance. The display is not meant to open past 140 degrees.

You can adjust the brightness of the screen when you take the computer from one work location to another, or if the lighting in your work area changes.

Connecting to the Internet

It's best to configure your network and Internet connection using Setup Assistant when you first set up Mac OS X. The assistant helps you enter your Internet configuration information, set up your networking software, and sign up for an Internet service provider (ISP) if you don't already have one.

If you did not already use the Setup Assistant to configure your Internet connection, you may be able to use it now. Open the Utilities folder (in the Applications folder) and double-click the Setup Assistant icon. If you don't want to use the Setup Assistant or if there is no Setup Assistant icon in the Utilities folder, you can use the information in this appendix to set up your connection.

Whether you connect through a dialup modem, cable modem, digital subscriber line (DSL), or an Ethernet local area network (LAN), you need specific setup information from your ISP or network administrator before you begin.

If you are connecting for the first time, changing your settings, or adding a new configuration, follow the steps that correspond to your connection method:

- Dialup modem with Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP) connection
- Cable modem, DSL, or LAN connection using these configurations:
 - Manual
 - DHCP
 - PPPoE

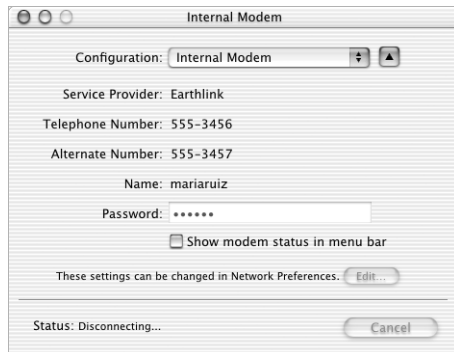
Important To set up your AirPort Base Station, use the AirPort Setup Assistant, located in Applications/Utilities.

Dialup (PPP) Connections

The most common way to connect to the Internet is through a dialup modem. You connect your modem to a phone line using a telephone cable (included with most Macintosh computers). Your modem uses Point-to-Point Protocol (PPP) to connect you to an ISP.

If you have an external modem, follow the setup instructions that came with your modem. If you have an internal modem, gather the following information from your ISP and have it available as you configure your network:

- Service provider name
- Account or user name
- Password
- Dialup telephone number
- Alternate dialup number



To set up your network preferences for the internal modem port:

- 1 Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences.
- 2 Click Network.
- 3 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Network Port Configurations and select Internal Modem.



- 4 Drag Internal Modem to the top of the Port Configurations list to make it the preferred, or primary, network interface.
- 5 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Internal Modem and click the PPP tab.

- 6 Enter the information from your ISP and click Apply Now.



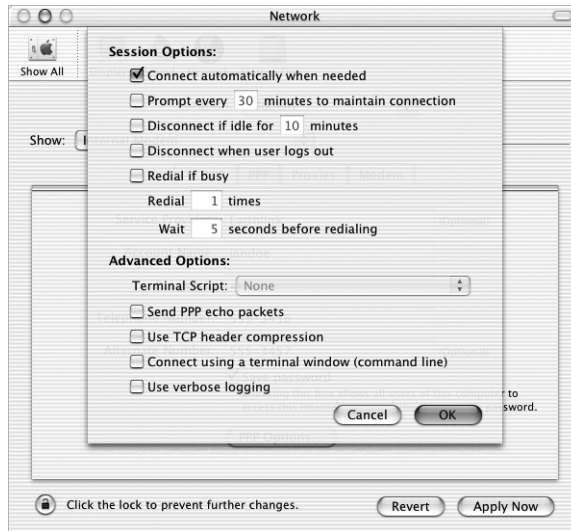
To test your Internet configuration, dial up your ISP and establish a connection:

- 1 Open the Internet Connect application (in the Applications folder).
- 2 Click Connect.

To connect automatically when you start a TCP/IP application, such as a web browser or email, do the following:

- 1 Click PPP Options (in the PPP pane of Network preferences).

- 2 Select the “Connect automatically when needed” checkbox.



- 3 Click OK and Apply Now.

DSL, Cable Modem, or LAN Internet Connections

If you connect to the Internet through a DSL, cable modem, or LAN, ask your ISP or network administrator whether you should

- configure your connection manually. With a manual configuration, your ISP or network administrator provides a static IP address and other information that you enter in Network preferences.
- use the Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP). With a DHCP configuration, the DHCP server automatically enters the information for you.
- use Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet (PPPoE). If you use a DSL modem and need a user name and password to connect to the Internet, you may need to configure your network to use PPPoE.

Obtain the following information and have it available as you configure your network:

- Domain name server (DNS) addresses, if necessary
- DHCP or manual IP address configuration
- IP address
- Router address
- Subnet mask

Note: If your ISP or local network does not provide DNS addresses, it may have a method of providing this information automatically.

First, set up your network preferences for the built-in Ethernet port:

- 1 Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences.
- 2 Click Network.
- 3 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Network Port Configurations.
- 4 Select Built-in Ethernet.



- 5 Drag Built-in Ethernet to the top of the Port Configurations list to make it the preferred, or primary, network interface.

Next, follow the instructions to configure your network manually, using DHCP, or using PPPoE, as instructed by your ISP or network administrator.

Manual Configuration

For a manual configuration, have your static IP address, router address, and subnet mask from your ISP ready as you do the following:

- 1 Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences.
- 2 Click Network.
- 3 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Built-in Ethernet.
- 4 Click the TCP/IP tab, if necessary.
- 5 In the Configure pop-up menu, choose Manually.



- 6 Type the other information into the corresponding fields.
- 7 Click Apply Now.

Once you configure your network, your connection is ready. Open your web browser (or another TCP/IP application) to test your Internet connection.

DHCP Configuration

After you set up a DHCP configuration, the DHCP server automatically provides your network information.

To set up a DHCP configuration:

- 1 Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences.
- 2 Click Network.
- 3 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Built-in Ethernet.
- 4 Click the TCP/IP tab, if necessary.

- 5 In the Configure pop-up menu, choose Using DHCP.



- 6 Click Apply Now.

Open your web browser (or another TCP/IP application) to test your Internet connection.

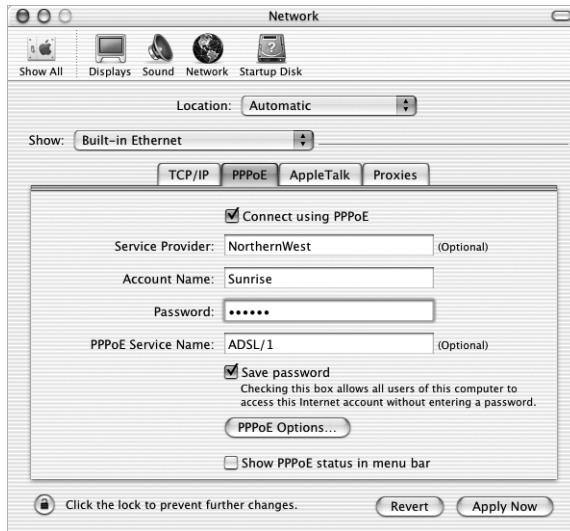

PPPoE Configuration

Some DSL-based ISPs use Point-to-Point Protocol over Ethernet (PPPoE). Check with your ISP to determine if you should connect using PPPoE. If you use a DSL modem and need a user name and password to connect to the Internet, follow these instructions.

- 1 Obtain this information from your ISP:
 - User name and password
 - Domain name server (DNS) address, if required.
- 2 Choose Apple (🍏) > System Preferences.
- 3 Click Network.
- 4 In the Show pop-up menu, choose Built-in Ethernet.

- 5 Click the PPPoE tab and select “Connect using PPPoE.”

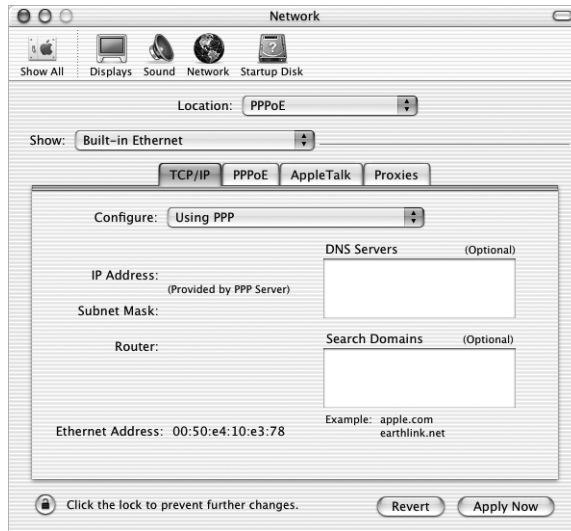


- 6 Type your user name in the Account Name field and your password in the Password field. If you want all users of your computer to use the same connection method, select “Save password.”

Note: To connect automatically when you start a TCP/IP application, such as a web browser or email, click PPPoE Options, then select “Connect automatically when needed.”

- 7 Click the TCP/IP tab and in the Configure pop-up menu, choose either PPP or Manually, as instructed by your ISP. If you have a static IP address from your ISP, choose Manually and type the address in the IP Address field.

- 8 Type the Domain Name Server (DNS) addresses in the corresponding field.

Once you configure your network, your Internet connection is ready. You can open your web browser or other TCP/IP application to test your connection.

Important If you did not select the option to automatically connect, then you will need to open the Internet Connect application, choose the correct configuration, and then click Connect. For more information, choose Help > Internet Connect Help.

Troubleshooting Your Connection

Cable Modem, DSL, and LAN Internet Connections

If you can't connect to the Internet using your cable modem, DSL, or local area network (LAN), see the following steps.

Important Instructions that refer to modems do not apply to LAN users. LAN users may have hubs, switches, routers, or connection pods that cable and DSL modem users do not. LAN users should contact their network administrator rather than an ISP.

Check the cables and power supplies

Make sure all modem cables are firmly plugged in, including the modem power cord, the cable from the modem to the computer, and the cable from the modem to the wall jack. Check the cables and power supplies to Ethernet hubs and routers.

Cycle the power and reset the modem hardware

Cycle the power on your DSL or cable modem by turning it off for a few minutes then turning it back on. Some ISPs recommend that you unplug the modem's power cord. If your modem has a reset button, you can press it either before or after cycling the power.

PPPoE Connections

If you are unable to connect to your Internet service provider using PPPoE, first check the cables and power supplies, then cycle the power and reset the modem hardware.

Check System Preferences settings

Use System Preferences in the Apple menu to verify that you've selected PPPoE and to verify your

- account information
- TCP/IP settings
- primary network interface is set to Built-in Ethernet

Next, follow these steps:

- 1** Choose Apple () > System Preferences.
- 2** Click Network.
- 3** In the Show pop-up menu, choose Network Port Configurations.
- 4** Drag Built-in Ethernet to the top of the Port Configurations list.
- 5** In the Show pop-up menu, choose Built-in Ethernet.
- 6** Click the PPPoE tab.
- 7** Select "Connect using PPPoE."
- 8** Check the Account Name field to be sure you have entered the correct information from your ISP.
- 9** Retype your password if you chose to save your password, to be sure it is correct.
- 10** Click the TCP/IP tab. Follow your ISP's instructions for setting up this pane.
- 11** Click Apply Now.

Network Connections

If you have two or more computers attempting to share an Internet connection, be sure that your network is set up properly. You need to know if your ISP provides only one IP address or if it provides multiple IP addresses.

If only one IP address is used, then you must have a router capable of sharing the connection, also known as network address translation (NAT) or “IP masquerading.” For setup information, check the documentation provided with your router or ask the person who set up your network. The AirPort Base Station may be used for this routing function. For information on using the AirPort Base Station, check the onscreen help or visit the Apple AirPort website at www.apple.com/airport.

If you cannot resolve the issue using these steps, contact your ISP.

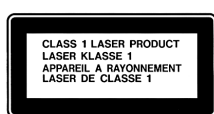

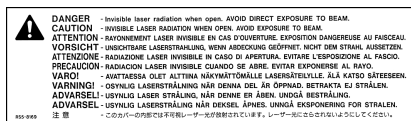

- *Telephone jack type:* USOC, RJ-11 An FCC-compliant telephone cord and modular plug are provided with this equipment. Telephone Line Problems

If your telephone doesn't work, there may be a problem with your telephone line. Disconnect the modem to see if the problem goes away. If it doesn't, report the problem either to your local telephone company or to your company's telecommunications people.

If disconnecting the modem eliminates the problem, the modem itself may need service. See the service and support information that came with your Apple product for instructions on how to contact Apple or an Apple-authorized service provider for assistance.

If you do not disconnect your modem when it is adversely affecting the telephone line, the telephone company has the right to disconnect your service temporarily until you correct the problem. The telephone company will notify you as soon as possible. Also, you will be informed of your right to file a complaint with the FCC.

The telephone company may make changes in its facilities, equipment, operations, or procedures that could affect the operation of your equipment. If this happens, the telephone company will provide advance notice in order for you to make the necessary modifications to maintain uninterrupted service.

The internal modem will not work with party lines, cannot be connected to a coin-operated telephone, and may not work with a private branch exchange (PBX).

Telephone Consumer Protection Act
