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Introduction

Thank you for purchasing the Sonica Theater by M-Audio. Sonica Theater is your audio upgrade for any PC or Macintosh computer,* utilizing the convenience of your computer's USB port—no tools, computer disassembly, or additional power source is needed. The Sonica Theater brings you true 24-bit, 96kHz audio and the highest-quality stereo, virtual surround, and multi-channel surround sound available today.

Please take the time to read this User Guide. It will tell you how to install the Sonica Theater on your particular computer and instruct you on how to get the most from your Sonica Theater audio interface.

Software Installation

Your Sonica Theater comes with driver software that allows it to communicate with your computer's operating system, Windows or Mac OS. Please skip to your computer's operating system in this section and follow those instructions. The Sonica Theater's driver software, which includes SRS Circle Surround II and TruSurround XT, will load during this installation. You will also want to install the DVD playback software provided on the additional included CDs.

Your Sonica Theater uses a standard USB cable, which is supplied with the unit. Before connecting the Sonica Theater to your computer, you should first install the software drivers as described below. After installing the included drivers, plug the "computer end" of the cable into your computer's USB port. When you are asked to connect your Sonica Theater during driver software installation, simply plug the "device end" of the USB cable into your Sonica Theater. The "computer end" and "device end" will be easily identifiable by their size and shape.

Windows XP

1. Place the Sonica Theater Software CD into your CD-ROM Drive.
2. Launch the Sonica Theater Installer.exe program.
3. The Sonica Theater install screen will appear. Click “Next” to continue.



4. On the next screen that appears, click “Continue.” The CD performance enhancements page will then appear. Click “Next.”



5. The installation program will inform you of a successful hardware installation. Click “Next.”



6. Click “Finish” on the next screen that appears. This will cause Windows to restart your computer.
7. You may now connect the Sonica Theater to your computer (refer to the Hardware Installation section of this manual for instructions).
8. After your Sonica Theater has been connected and your computer has finished restarting, Windows will tell you that your hardware has not passed Windows Logo testing. Click “Continue” to complete the installation process.



Windows 2000

1. Place the Sonica Theater Software CD into your CD-ROM Drive.
2. Launch the Sonica Theater Installer.exe program.
3. The Sonica Theater install screen will appear. Click “Next” to continue.



4. Click “Yes” to continue.



5. Click “Next” twice.



Click “Finish” on the next screen that appears. This will cause Windows to restart your computer.




- 6. You may now connect the Sonica Theater to your computer (refer to the Hardware Installation section of this manual for instructions).
- 7. After your computer restarts, you will be prompted with a note about “Digital Signature not found.” Click “Yes.”



- 8. In the final screen, Windows will ask you to restart your computer. Click “Finish,” then restart your computer to complete the installation process.

Windows Me

1. Place the Sonica Theater Software CD into your CD-ROM Drive.
2. Launch the Sonica Theater Installer.exe program.
3. The Sonica Theater install screen will appear. Click “Next” to continue.



4. A screen appears that displays checked boxes for Digital Audio and DMA transfer. Click “Next”.



5. The installation program will inform you of a successful hardware installation. Click “Next.”



- This next screen explains that your computer now needs to be restarted. Make sure that the box labeled “Yes, . . .” is checked, then click “Finish” to continue restarting.



NOTE: If you un-check the box labeled “Yes, restart my computer now,” you will again, with a new screen, be prompted to restart. This is because DMA Mode has been enabled.

- You may now connect the Sonica Theater to your computer (refer to the Hardware Installation section of this manual for instructions).
- After your Sonica Theater has been connected and your computer has finished restarting, installation will have been completed.

Windows 98SE

- Insert the Sonic Theater CD into your CD-ROM drive and double-click on the file named “Sonica Theater Installer.exe”.
- Close all running applications, as directed by the first screen that appears. and click “Next,” to continue.

Direct X 8.1 must be installed on your computer. If this has not been previously done, the installer program will do this for you now.



3. The next screen will allow notify you that the necessary parameters for Digital Audio CD and DVD playback need to be set in your operating system. Leave these boxes checked and click “Next.”



4. The next screen shows that the drivers have been successfully installed. Click “Next.”



5. Windows will now tell you that your computer needs to be restarted. Make sure that the “Yes” box is checked, and click “Finish.”



6. Once the computer has restarted and returned to the the desktop, connect the Sonica Theater to your computer (refer to the Hardware Installation section of this manual for instructions). Click “Next,” in the screen that will appears after this connection is made.



7. Make sure “Search for the best driver for your device. (Recommended)” is selected and click “Next” to continue.



8. None of the option-boxes in the next screen need to be selected. Click “Next,” to continue.



9. Make sure that the box for “The updated driver (Recommended) USB Composite Device” is selected and click “Next,” to continue.



10. Windows should have now found a driver. Click “Next,” to continue.



11. Windows now will inform you that driver installation has been completed. Click “Finish,” to complete the installation process.



You should now be able to find in your taskbar which displays a little black “M.” The existence of this button confirms that installation has been completed, and the button also serves as a shortcut to the Sonica Theater control panel.

Sonica Theater and the Windows Sound System

The Sonica Theater's Windows Multimedia drivers will allow you to use the Sonica Theater as your Windows system sound device. If the Sonica Theater is the only audio device installed in your computer, then Windows will "select" it automatically. Otherwise, you may need to tell Windows to use the Sonica Theater. To check your Windows Audio setting and select the Sonica Theater:

1. Go to the Start menu, and then choose Control Panel.
2. Open "Sounds and Audio Devices," then click the "Audio" tab.
3. Under "Sound Playback," the default device should say "Sonica Theater." If it does not say Sonica Theater, then drop down the list of devices and select "Sonica Theater."
4. Click "Apply," then click "Okay." Close your Control Panel—you're done!

Mac OS 9

1. Insert the Sonica Theater Software CD into your CD-ROM drive. AutoRun will open the CD and allow you to view its contents.
2. Double-click on the "Sonica Theater Installer."
3. Click "Continue" at the M-Powered Screen.
4. Read the "Instructions for Using M-Audio Sonica Theater." Click "Continue."
5. Select your install location, or simply choose the OS 9 boot drive (which is the default). Click "Install" to continue.
6. Installation requires a restart of the computer. Click "Continue" to restart.
7. The next prompt gives a similar message. Click "Restart" to reboot the computer.
8. Plug the Sonica Theater into your computer's USB Port.
9. Once the computer has restarted, select "Sound" in "Control Panels," then select the "Output" tab. Click on "M-Audio Sonica Theater" to choose the Sonica Theater as your default output device.

Mac OS 9.2.2 Installation is now complete. Proceed to the next section, "Hardware Installation."

Sonica Theater and the Macintosh Sound Manager

The Macintosh Sound Manager in OS 9 will allow you to select the Sonica Theater as the system's audio output device. To check your computer's audio output setting and select the Sonica Theater:

1. Open the Apple menu, then select "Sound" from the Control Panels list.
2. Under Output, select the "Sonica Theater" from the list of available devices.
3. Close the Sound control panel and you're done!

Mac OS X

1. Insert the Sonica Theater Software CD into your CD-ROM Drive and open the CD to view its contents.
2. Double click "M-Audio Sonica Theater Installer.dmg" file. An icon will appear on your desktop marked "Sonica Theater."
3. Double click the "Sonica Theater" icon on your desktop.
4. Now double click on the "M-Audio Sonica Theater Installer.mpkg."
5. You will need your Administrator Password for the next step. To continue, click the lock icon in the lower left corner of the window that states, "Click The Lock To Make Changes."
6. Enter your password and click "OK."
7. The next window "Welcomes You..." to the installation process. Click "Continue."
8. Select your OS X hard drive. Click "Continue."
9. When prompted, click "Upgrade" to continue.
10. When prompted, click "Continue Installation."
11. When prompted, click "Restart" to finish the installation.
12. After the computer has restarted, plug the Sonica Theater into your computer's USB Port.
13. Go to "System Preferences" in the Apple Menu. Select the "Sound" preference panel, and click the "Output" tab. Select "M-Audio Sonica Theater" to choose the Sonica Theater as your default output device.


Mac OS X Installation is now complete. Proceed to the next section, "Hardware Installation."

Sonica Theater and Mac OS X

Mac OS X will allow you to select the Sonica Theater as the system's audio output device. To check your computer's audio output setting and select the Sonica Theater:

1. Go to "System Preferences" in the Apple Menu.
2. Select the "Sound" preference panel, and click the "Output" tab.
3. Select "M-Audio Sonica Theater" to choose the Sonica Theater as your default output device.

Physical Connections



The rear panel of the Sonica Theater has the following input and output jacks:

1. **USB Jack** - This jack connects the Sonica Theater to your computer using USB version 1.1 .
2. **Digital Out Jack** - This Digital Output jack is a S/PDIF Coaxial output. You may use an RCA cable (sold separately) to connect to the input of a digital recorder, mixer or surround receiver. A 75 Ohm digital coax cable is required.
3. **Surround Center L/R Jack** (black) - This speaker output connects to the surround Center Left and Right channel speakers. These speakers should be located directly behind you as you are looking at your computer monitor.
4. **Center/Subwoofer Jack** (orange) - This speaker output connects to the Center and Subwoofer speakers. The Center channel should be directly above or below your monitor and the subwoofer can go just about anywhere you have room.
5. **Surround L/R Jack** (black) - This speaker output should be connected to the Surround Left and Right speakers. They should be located to your left and right sides, just behind your head.
6. **Front L/R (Headphone) Jack** (green) - This jack should connect to the Left and Right speakers, located to the left and right of your computer monitor. You can also plug a pair of stereo headphones into this jack.
7. **Line In Jack** (blue) - This is a stereo input that can be used to record into a digital audio recording program.

USB Jack

The Sonica Theater both communicates with your computer and receives power through connection to the computer's USB port. Because of this, we recommend that you plug the Sonica Theater into one of the built-in USB ports on your computer, not a keyboard connection or USB hub.


NOTE: For the easiest setup, you should install the software drivers on the included CD-ROM before connecting the USB cable to your computer. This procedure is explained in the next chapter, "Software Installation."

To connect your Sonica Theater, find an unused USB port jack on your computer and connect it to your Sonica Theater's USB jack, using the included USB Cable. This jack, usually located on the computer's rear panel, will probably be marked with a symbol which looks something like the one in the following diagram.



Speaker Output Jacks

The rear panel of your Sonica Theater has four 1/8" stereo jacks that connect to powered speakers or the inputs on a surround sound receiver. These jacks are designed to combine two speaker outputs into one jack, saving on space and simplifying installation (for example, the Center/Subwoofer output is actually the output for both the Center and Subwoofer channels). Most multimedia speakers use 1/8" stereo input jacks. If your speaker or receiver jacks are of the RCA type instead, you can purchase a converter like the one depicted following, at a local electronics store, such as Radio Shack, etc..




The White RCA jack connects to the first listed channel, while the Red jack connects to the second. For example, using the Front L/R output, the White jack connects to the Left speaker while the Red jack connects to the Right speaker.

Note that the Sonica Theater outputs produce a Line Level signal and can therefore be connected directly to powered speaker inputs. However, if your speakers are not self-powered, you will need to connect the Sonica Theater's outputs to the inputs of a power amplifier or surround receiver and its outputs to the speaker inputs.

Using the diagram below as a guide for placing the speakers around your computer, make the following speaker connections, as applicable to your setup:

- Connect the Front L/R to the Left and Right speakers.
- Connect the Center/Subwoofer jack to the Center and Subwoofer (LFE) speakers.
- Connect the Surround L/R jack to the Left and Right Surround speakers.
- Connect the Surround Center L/R jack to the two Surround Center speakers.



Make sure that any speakers that you use near a CRT Computer Monitor are shielded speakers. If your monitor's image begins to become discolored in one of the corners or otherwise appears distorted, move the speaker further away to avoid damage to your monitor.


Line Input Jack

The Sonica Theater has a stereo line input. This input allows you to record CDs, videos, instruments or virtually anything else, with audiophile-quality 96kHz/24-bit sampling. You can set the Input level of the Line Inputs in the Sonica Theater Control Panel's Input/Other tab (see this manual's Control Panel section for more details).


Explanation of Surround Formats

You run into several surround formats when playing DVDs, some of which include 2.0, 4.1, 5.1, 6.1 and 7.1. This section is meant to provide a quick explanation of some of these formats.

2.0 - This is a stereo soundtrack. This soundtrack can be expanded to 7.1 channel playback with a Dolby Pro Logic® or Circle Surround II decoder. It will play out of the left and right speakers without decoding. Headphones are generally stereo or 2.0 devices.




2.1 - This is a stereo soundtrack with a separate subwoofer. Sometimes this soundtrack can be expanded to surround playback with a Dolby Pro Logic® or Circle Surround® decoder. It will play out of the left, right and subwoofer speakers.




4.0 - This signal is the same as 4.1 (description following), only without the subwoofer channel.

4.1 - This is how most feature films from 1970-1980 were mixed. It will play back from the left, center and right speakers with a mono signal going to all of the surrounds. An additional “point one” signal gets sent to the subwoofer in all of the following formats, called .1 because it only uses up 1/10th of the data of the other channels.




5.0 - This signal is the same as 5.1 (description following), only without the subwoofer channel.


5.1 - This is how most current DVDs are released. Dolby Digital® and DTS® soundtracks can have up to 5.1 channels. This signal plays back from the left, center, and right speakers, plus two surrounds, left and right.



6.1 - This signal sends three channels to the front: left, center and right. There are also two surround channels, left and right, which get decoded into three surround channels: left surround, center surround and right surround. This is the format used by Dolby Digital EX® and DTS ES®.



7.1 - This is a further refinement of the 6.1 system described above, where the surround center channel is played back on two center surround speakers in order to provide better diffusion of the center surround audio. Some technologies, such as Microsoft's Windows Media 9, also provide the possibility of playing back content encoded with 7.1 discrete channels of audio.



You need specialized software to play back surround audio formats above two channels. Much of this software is included in the drivers or the software bundle for Sonica Theater. See the installation CD that came with your Sonica Theater for more information, or check the M-Audio website.

Sonica Theater Control Panel


Once setup is complete, you can control most aspects of the Sonica Theater using its control panel. To launch the control panel:

Windows - Following the driver software installation in Windows 98Se, Me, 2000, and XP, you will find an M-Audio logo "M" installed on the right side of your Windows taskbar. Double click on this logo, and you will launch the M-Audio Sonica Theater Control Panel.

Mac OS 9 - Following the driver software installation in Mac OS 9 and subsequent restart if your computer, the M-Audio Sonica Theater Control Panel will be placed in your Apple Control Panels folder. Open your Applications folder and select “M-Audio Sonica Theater Settings.” This will launch the control panel.

Mac OS X - Follow the driver software installation for Mac OS X and restart. Open your Applications folder and double-click “M-Audio Sonica Theater” to launch the M-Audio Sonica Theater Preference Panel.

When you launch the control panel, you will notice the Speaker Set pull-down menu and five tabs at the top of the screen.



The Current Speaker Set pull-down menu includes presets for many popular models, such as the M-Audio BX-Series and Klipsch Promedia 5.1 speakers. Click and hold on this menu to see if your speaker models are included in the list for the recommended settings for your speakers.

The Current Speaker Set pulldown menu also allows you to set the number of output channels, such as stereo, 5.1, 6.1 or 7.1. It's important for this control to reflect the actual number of speakers you are using, so that the drivers aren't sending audio to non-existent speakers. For example, if you set this to 5.1 when you only have two speakers connected, you won't hear any of the dialog when you play a DVD movie. You can also use the “Quick Set” buttons at the top of the panel.

The Master Volume slider at the bottom of the panel controls the overall volume of the Sonica Theater's outputs. The Mute button mutes all of the outputs, handy for answering the phone or pretending you're hard at work.

The tabs near the top of the control panel allow you to change the size, volume and surround settings of the Sonica Theater's output. From left to right, the tab titles are: "Speaker Setup", "Output Mixer", "Surround Sound", "Input/Other" and "About". Use the Speaker Setup tab to set the size and distance of your speakers and the Output Mixer tab to balance the volumes of each speaker output. The Surround Sound tab controls aspects of SRS Circle Surround II or TruSurround XT (depending on whether your speaker set is stereo or multi-channel). The Input/Other tab controls the input and sample rate settings. Lastly, the About tab gives you information about the software version of your Sonica Theater Drivers.

The following paragraphs explain, in detail, the settings within each of these tabs.

Speaker Setup Tab

This tab sets the size and volume of the main speakers. First, check the Speaker Set menu to see if your speakers are included in the manufacturer's presets. If not, the settings in this tab will ensure the best performance from your speaker system.

Speaker Bass Management - This function enables Bass Management for the Sonica Theater Control Panel. The Sonica Theater Control Panel incorporates the Bass Management system to get the best sonic performance from your speakers. This means that if you have large monitor speakers, the Sonica Theater will output the full frequency-range that the speakers are capable of handling. Conversely, if you have small cube speakers, they probably can't reproduce the strong bass found in many DVD soundtracks, so the Sonica Theater Control Panel automatically routes the bass to the subwoofer.

Front Speaker Size - This setting tells the driver software what size your speakers are. Select the speaker size that best describes your left and right speakers: Large (5" or larger woofer), Medium (3"-5" woofer), or small (woofer smaller than 3"). There are also settings for Cube or Flat Panel speakers.

Crossover - If you want to manually change the frequency where bass frequencies get routed to the subwoofer, use this menu. You can choose between 40Hz and 120Hz. Check the manual that came with your speaker system or the manufacturer's website for recommendations.

Link Stereo Output Levels - This links the left and right output level controls, so that if you change one the other follows.

Left and Right Levels - These controls change the volumes of the left and right speaker outputs independent of the other speakers. Move it to the right, towards 0dB, for more volume or down towards -32dB for less volume.

Distance - This control sets the distance from your head to the left and right speakers, from 1 to 99 feet. Sonica Theater's software can intelligently compensate for differences in speaker placement using this setting, and can make your speakers sound much better.

Solo - By pressing this button, you will only send sound to the selected channel. The Solo function is useful if you think the left and right speakers are reversed, for example. You can solo more than one channel at a time, if you wish.

Mute - Use this button to stop audio from going to this speaker.

Test - This button sends an audio tone to the selected speaker. This is can be useful in determining information such as the speaker's location and volume, relative to other speakers.

Output Mixer Tab

This tab provides level controls for each of the speaker outputs on the Sonica Theater. Use these controls to change the balance between speakers in your system.



Level - Move the level fader up or down to change the volume of any of the eight speaker outputs. For proper DVD playback, each of the surround speakers should play back at the same volume, but you may need to adjust them for distance or to taste. Each level control has a level meter next to it, so you can see how much signal is going to each of the outputs.

Solo - By pressing this button, you will only send sound to the selected channel. The Solo function is useful if you think the left and right speakers are reversed, for example. You can solo more than one channel at a time, if you wish.

Mute - Use this button to stop audio from going to this speaker.

Surround Sound Tab

This tab controls the surround sound features of the Sonica Theater. There are two SRS Labs technologies included with the control panel, TruSurround XT and Circle Surround II. TruSurround XT takes a multi-channel source and plays it through two speakers in a way that makes it sound like you're playing it back through multiple speakers. Circle Surround II takes a stereo source and processes that so that it plays through multiple speakers.

Here's a suggested guide to playing surround sources through your Sonica Theater:

- If you're playing a 5.1 DVD with WinDVD 4 (Windows only), and you have multiple speakers attached, Circle Surround II should be unchecked.
- If you're playing a 5.1 DVD and you only have two speakers connected, turn on TruSurround XT.
- If you're playing a stereo MP3, CD, or DVD and want to hear it through multiple surround channels, turn on Circle Surround II.

The TruSurround XT settings only appear if your Current Speaker Set is set to "Stereo", "Stereo w/Integrated Subwoofer", or "Headphones". The Circle Surround II settings only appear if your Current Speaker Set is set to three or more channels.

SRS TruSurround XT Enable - This control turns on the TruSurround XT feature. TruSurround XT "virtually" places individual surround channels where they are supposed to be, as though you have speakers all around you. Use this feature to turn 5.1 or 6.1 multi-channel sources, such as Dolby Digital or DTS encoded DVDs, into "virtual" surround from your stereo speakers.

NOTE: Circle Surround II will not work at 96kHz, when using this feature the Sampling Rate must be set to 48000Hz or lower. (See the section following.)

SRS Circle Surround II Enable - This control turns on the Circle Surround II feature. Circle Surround II is a patented SRS technology that solves the problem of playing 5.1 multi-channel content from a two channel source. It delivers a compelling, virtual surround sound experience through any multi-channel playback system. It is fully compatible with all multi-channel formats up to 6.1 channels. Use this feature to turn stereo sources, such as CDs, MP3s or Dolby Pro Logic encoded DVDs, into 6.1 multi-channel surround. You'll want to turn this feature off if you're listening to a source that's already playing back in 5.1 or 6.1, such as Windows Media or a DVD movie.

SRS TruSurround XT/Circle Surround II Mode - There are three modes to the Circle Surround II feature. Use Cinema when watching films or television programs. Select Music to listen to stereo music sources in surround. Choose Mono to spread out a mono source like an old movie or some internet radio stations.

SRS Dialog Enhancement - This feature is designed to make dialog more intelligible. Click the Enable checkbox to enable this feature, and use the Level slider to control the clarity amount of enhancement applied to the dialog.

SRS TruBass® - This feature takes the low bass from big-theater soundtracks and turns it into frequencies that home speakers can reproduce. When you use this feature, you don't need to worry about missing out on the big bass rumbles of submarine missile launches or spacecraft flybys just because you're using small computer speakers. Click the Enable checkbox to turn on the TruBass feature, and use the Level slider to add more bass.

Input/Other Tab

The Input/Other tab controls the input levels and sampling frequency of the Sonica Theater. You don't need to worry about the settings on this page unless you're recording audio with the Sonica Theater.

Link Stereo Input Levels - When you check this box, the left and right input levels will always follow each other.

Left/Right Input Level - These controls set the input level for the Sonica Theater's inputs. Watch the meters above these level controls to set the input level. For the best sound quality, you usually want to record at the highest level you can without distorting.

At the end of each of the meter stripes is a Clip indicator. The purpose of this indicator is to inform you that an incoming signal is too loud, thereby producing distortion. The Clip indicator will turn red when the input is too loud. Adjust your audio source to reduce the input level so it is into the yellow region yet not into the red. To reset the Clip indicators, click on each one with your mouse to reset the indicators to their normal state.

Sample Rate - This control selects the sample rate of the audio to be recorded. This is a bit like the "SP/EP" control on a VCR. A higher sample rate will sound better, but will take up more memory. 44100Hz is the standard CD sampling rate and is usually your best choice. Higher sampling

rates such as 96000Hz will cause certain features to be disabled, such as Circle Surround II.

NOTE: Some features of the Sonica Theater may not be available at higher sampling frequencies. For example, 96kHz playback is only possible with two channels at a time; when playing back multi-channel audio the sampling rate is lowered to 48kHz. This is due to the bandwidth limitations of USB. If you experience problems when playing audio at 96000Hz, try lowering the sampling rate to 48000Hz or 44100Hz.

To operate your Sonica Theater using the MME drivers and a music program, follow the instructions in the previous section, then enable the “M-Audio Sonica Theater Line” as your input and output device within your music program’s audio setup page, and/or run your program’s audio device profiling utility to analyze the new audio device in your system.

Enable Monitoring - When this box is checked, the signal input into the Line Input jack is routed directly to the Front Left and Right outputs. This feature allows you to hear exactly what is going to be recorded, both before recording is begun and during the actual recording process.

Many recording programs also have this feature, which may be labeled “Auto Input Monitoring” or something similar. If your recording application has Input Monitoring enabled, you should uncheck the Enable Monitoring checkbox in the Sonica Theater control panel.

About Tab

This tab provides information about the software version of the control panel, driver software and internal Sonica Theater firmware. This information can be useful to customer support personnel when troubleshooting problems with your Sonica Theater.

Sonica Theater Applications

Now that we’ve finished connecting speakers and setting levels, you’re probably interested in getting started right away. This chapter should help you through some typical uses of the Sonica Theater.

DVD Playback

The Sonica Theater will work with any software DVD player. The type of signal your DVD player sends to the Sonica Theater is determined by the

settings in the player's software. A DVD player software will usually provide a series of audio-setup options or preferences and the exact location of such settings varies—check your DVD player's documentation for more information on where to find them. Once you locate these options, you will be able to direct and change the audio, output from your DVD player, into the Sonica Theater.

NOTE: You're DVD player software may not support Dolby Digital or DTS playback—check the documentation that came with the player for more information.

In Win DVD 4 for Windows, click on the “Subpanel” button, which looks like an arrow pointing right. Choose “Audio Mode” and then click on the “Setup” button, which looks like a wrench. Click on the “Audio” tab, and select the desired output format (6-channel, etc.).

Stereo - When the Sonica Theater is chosen as your computer's audio device (see the previous chapter, “Software Setup”), this setting will send a stereo signal to the Sonica Theater's Front L/R outputs. You may want to turn on the Circle Surround II feature when playing a stereo movie, see the previous section for details.

Digital Out - When you have the Sonica Theater's digital output connected to the digital input of a surround sound receiver, choose this setting to send the encoded surround signal (Dolby Digital, DTS) to the receiver. This selection is called “Use S/PDIF” in WinDVD 4.

NOTE: Macintosh OS 9 will not allow you to send a digitally encoded surround signal, such as Dolby Digital (AC3) or DTS, from a digital audio port such as the Sonica Theater's optical digital output. There is currently no DVD player for Mac OS 9 or X that supports software decode of Dolby Digital or DTS, but Sonica Theater's CircleSurround II technology does a remarkable job of generating a real surround soundtrack from the Apple DVD Player application.

5.1 or 6.1 - If your DVD player (such as WinDVD 4) is capable of decoding a surround sound signal such as Dolby Digital and DTS, select this option. If you have only stereo speakers connected, you may want to turn on TruSurround XT to provide the best surround sound simulation from stereo speakers. If you have multi-channel speakers connected, make sure to turn off Circle Surround II.

Music Playback

The Sonica Theater can expand music CD and MP3 playback into a surround sound room-filling experience.

For surround playback for your music, open the Sonica Theater Control Panel, and select the Surround Sound tab, then turn on SRS Circle Surround II. Lastly, choose the Mode setting “Music,” for best music playback (for additional information, refer to the section in this manual on the Sonica Theater Control Panel, Surround Sound Tab).

Windows Media Player Setup

Microsoft’s Windows Media Player 9 and later allow you to play 5.1 or 7.1 music and movies through the Sonica Theater. As long as the Sonica Theater is selected as your default audio device, Media Player will play surround recordings through the Sonica Theater’s outputs.

At the time of this writing, Microsoft has announced that it plans to ship a Macintosh version of Windows Media Player, but it is currently only for Windows.

Gaming

The Sonica Theater brings gameplay to life through surround sound playback.

For surround playback of stereo games, open the Sonica Theater control panel, select the Surround Sound tab, and turn on SRS Circle Surround II. Select the Cinema mode for game playback. For more information on the Sonica Theater control panel, check the previous section.

If you find that your game slows down when Circle Surround II is turned on, you may want to turn off some of the graphic details or reduce the screen resolution to speed things up.

Recording

The Sonica Theater includes a pair of audio inputs for recording. You can set the input level of the inputs by launching the Sonica Theater Control Panel, selecting the Input/Other tab and changing the level within the tab’s page. If your recording application doesn’t see audio from the Sonica Theater’s inputs, check that program’s audio preferences, check your cable connections, or review the Software Setup chapter for potential problems.

For Macintosh Users - The Sonica Theater ships with ASIO drivers for multitrack playback from recording applications. Copy the “Sonica Theater ASIO” driver into your application’s “ASIO Drivers” folder to use the Sonica Theater as an ASIO device.

Note: When recording audio at 96kHz/24-bit, all of the outputs are muted to provide enough bandwidth for the USB recording driver. You can monitor while recording through your mixer if necessary.

Troubleshooting

M-Audio's website, which is found at www.m-audio.com, contains the most up-to-date troubleshooting information. This should be your first stop for all the latest drivers, FAQ files and extensive how-to guides, as well as additional information on contacting M-Audio technical support.

If you are having problems with your Sonica Theater, you may wish to try the following quick troubleshooting tricks:

- When things don't seem to be working properly, try restarting the computer. This solves the majority of computer problems.
- If you haven't been able to get your Sonica Theater to work at all, or if it worked for awhile and then stopped working altogether, reinstall the driver software.
- If the unit stopped working after you installed a new program or system software update, check the M-Audio website for more recently updated drivers. If a major system software update that has been recently released, you may need to search for beta version software drivers which provide increased support for the new software.
- A few features do not function when a 96kHz sampling rate is selected. If a feature isn't working properly, try opening the control panel, selecting Input/Other, and setting the sampling rate to 48kHz.
