## **IMPORTANT SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS**

- <u>Read Instructions</u>: All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the appliance is operated.
- <u>Retain Instructions</u>: The safety and operating instructions should be retained for future reference.
- <u>Heed Warnings</u>: All warnings on the appliance and in the operating instructions should be adhered to.
- Follow Instructions: All operating and use instructions should be followed.

#### Installation

Power Sources: This video product should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supply to your home, consult your appliance dealer or local power company. For video products intended to operate from battery power, or other sources, refer to the operating instructions.

Grounding or Polarization: This video product is equipped with a polarized alternatingcurrent line plug (a plug having one blade wider than the other). This plug will fit into the power outlet only one way. This is a safety feature. If you are unable to insert the plug fully into the outlet, try reversing the plug. If the plug should still fail to fit, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the polarized plug. Alternate Warnings: This video product is equipped with a three-wire grounding-type plug, a plug having a third (grounding) pin. This plug will only fit into a grounding-type power outlet. This is a safety feature. If you are unable to insert the plug into the outlet, contact your electrician to replace your obsolete outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the grounding type plug.




### For Your Safety

#### Antennas

#### EXAMPLE OF ANTENNA GROUNDING AS PER NATIONAL ELECTRICAL CODE

### Use




**Do not use the battery except as specified**. Load the battery as shown by the indicator.

Do not heat, change or take apart the battery. Do not drop or subject the battery to impacts. Do not store the battery with metallic products. Any of these actions can cause the battery to burst or leak and cause fire or injury as a result.

Use only the battery or AC power adapters specified for use with this camera. Do not use voltages other than the power supply voltage shown. The use of other power sources can cause a fire.

### The Battery and Power Supply

**Note:** Check the type of battery used in your camera and read the appropriate sections.

The following describes the proper use of batteries and how to prolong their life. Incorrect use can shorten battery life or cause leakage, overheating, fire, or explosion.

### Li-ion Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses a rechargeable Li-ion battery.

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use. Keep the battery in its case when not in use.

#### Notes on the Battery

The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

Battery life can be extended by turning the camera off when not in use.

Battery capacity decreases at low temperatures; a depleted battery may not function at when cold. Keep a fully charged spare battery in a warm place and exchange as necessary, or keep the battery in your pocket or other warm place and insert it in the camera only when shooting. Do not place the battery in direct contact with hand warmers or other heating devices.

#### Charging the Battery

Charge the battery in the supplied battery charger. Charging times will increase at ambient temperatures below +10°C (+50°F) or above +35°C (+95°F). Do not attempt to charge the battery at temperatures above 40°C (+104°F); at temperatures below 0°C (+32°F), the battery will not charge.

Do not attempt to recharge a fully charged battery. The battery does not however need to be fully discharged before charging.

The battery may be warm to the touch immediately after charging or use. This is normal.

#### Battery Life

At normal temperatures, the battery can be recharged about 300 times. A noticeable decrease in the length of time the battery will hold a charge indicates that it has reached the end of its service life and should be replaced.

#### Storage

Performance may be impaired if the battery is left unused for extended periods when fully charged. Run the battery flat before storing it.

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and store it in a dy place with an ambient temperature of from  $+15^{\circ}$ C to  $+25^{\circ}$ C ( $+59^{\circ}$ F to  $+77^{\circ}$ F). Do not store in locations exposed to extremes of temperature.

### Cautions: Handling the Battery

- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- · Do not expose to flame or heat.
- · Do not disassemble or modify.
- Use with designated chargers only.
- Do not drop or subject to strong physical shocks.
- · Do not expose to water.
- · Keep the terminals clean.
- The battery and camera body may become warm to the touch after extended use. This is normal.

### AA Alkaline/Rechargeable Ni-MH Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses AA alkaline or rechargeable AA Ni-MH batteries. Information on compatible battery types may be found elsewhere in the camera manual.

#### Cautions: Handling the Batteries

- Do not expose to water, flame, or heat, or store in warm or humid conditions.
- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not disassemble or modify the batteries or battery casing.
- · Do not subject to strong physical shocks.
- Do not use batteries that are leaking, deformed, or discolored.
- Keep out of reach of infants and small children.
- · Insert in the correct orientation.

- Do not mix old and new batteries, batteries with different charge levels, or batteries of different types.
- If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the batteries. Note that the camera clock will be reset.
- The batteries may be warm to the touch immediately after use. Turn the camera off and allow the batteries to cool before handling.
- Battery capacity tends to decrease at low temperatures. Keep spare batteries in a pocket or other warm place and exchange as necessary. Cold batteries may recover some of their charge when warmed.
- Fingerprints and other stains on the battery terminals can impair battery performance. Thoroughly clean the terminals with a soft, dry cloth before inserting them in the camera.



If the batteries leak, clean the battery compartment thoroughly before inserting new batteries.



If fluid from the battery comes into contact with skin or clothing, flush the affected area with water. If fluid enters your eyes, immediately flush the affected area with water and seek medical attention. Do not rub your eyes. Failure to observe this precaution could result in permanent visual impairment

#### Ni-MH Batteries

The capacity of NI-MH batteries may be temporarily reduced when new, after long periods of disuse, or if they are repeatedly recharged before being fully discharged. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction. Capacity can be increased by repeatedly discharging the batteries using the discharge option in the camera setup menu and recharging them using a battery charger (sold separately).

① CAUTION: Do not use the discharge option with alkaline batteries.

The camera draws a small amount of current even when off. Ni-MH batteries that have been left in the camera for an extended period may be drawn down to the point that they no longer hold a charge. Battery performance may also drop if the batteries are run down in a device such as a flashlight. Use the discharge option in the camera setup menu to discharge Ni-MH batteries. Batteries that no longer hold a charge even after repeatedly being discharged and recharged have reached the end of their service life and must be replaced.

Ni-MH batteries can be recharged in a battery charger (sold separately). Batteries may become warm to the touch after charging. Refer to the instructions provided with the charger for more information. Use the charger with compatible batteries only.

Ni-MH batteries gradually lose their charge when not in use.

### Disposal

Dispose of used batteries in accord with local regulations.

### AC Power Adapters (Available Separately)

This section applies to all camera models. Use only FUJIFILM AC power adapters designated for use with this camera. Other adapters could damage the camera.

- · The AC power adapter is for indoor use only.
- Be sure the DC plug is securely connected to the camera.
- Turn the camera off before disconnecting the adapter. Disconnect the adapter by the plug, not the cable.
- · Do not use with other devices.
- · Do not disassemble.
- · Do not expose to high heat and humidity.
- · Do not subject to strong physical shocks.
- The adapter may hum or become hot to the touch during use. This is normal.
- If the adapter causes radio interference, reorient or relocate the receiving antenna.

#### Using the Camera

Do not aim the camera at extremely bright light sources, such as the sun in a cloudless sky. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the camera image sensor.

### Take Test Shots

Before taking photographs on important occasions (such as at weddings or before taking the camera on a trip), take a test shot and view the result in the LCD monitor to ensure that the camera is functioning normally. FUJIFILM Corporation can not accept liability for damages or lost profits incurred as a result of product malfunction.

### Notes on Copyright

Unless intended solely for personal use, images recorded using your digital camera system cannot be used in ways that infringe copyright laws without the consent of the owner. Note that some restrictions apply to the photographing of stage performances, entertainments, and exhibits, even when intended purely for personal use. Users are also asked to note that the transfer of memory cards containing images or data protected under copyright laws is only permissible within the restrictions imposed by those copyright laws.

#### Handling

To ensure that images are recorded correctly, do not subject the camera to impact or physical shocks while images are being recorded.

### Liquid Crystal

In the event that the LCD monitor is damaged, care should be taken to avoid contact with liquid crystal. Take the urgent action indicated should any of the following situations arise:

- If liquid crystal comes in contact with your skin, clean the area with a cloth and then wash thoroughly with soap and running water.
- If liquid crystal enters your eyes, flush the affected eye with clean water for at least 15 minutes and then seek medical assistance.
- If liquid crystal is swallowed, rinse your mouth thoroughly with water. Drink large quantities of water and induce vomiting, then seek medical assistance.

Although the display is manufactured using extremely high-precision technology, it may contain pixels that are always lit or that do not light. This is not a malfunction, and images recorded with the product are unaffected.


## Inserting the Battery and a Memory Card

Insert the battery and memory card as described below.

## **1** Open the battery chamber cover.

Slide the battery-chamber cover latch and open the cover as shown.

- Be sure the camera is off before opening the battery-chamber cover.
- ① Do not open the battery-chamber cover when the camera is on. Failure to observe this precaution could result in damage to image files or memory cards.



 ${\scriptstyle \oplus}$  Do not use excessive force when handling the battery-chamber cover.

## 2 Insert the battery.

Align the orange stripe on the battery with Orange stripe the orange battery latch and slide the battery into the camera, keeping the battery

latch pressed to one side. When inserting the battery, be sure that the battery is secured by the orange battery latch. If the battery is not securely latched, the camera may not turn on or may turn off without warning.

The camera uses an NP-45A rechargeable battery.


① Insert the battery in the correct orientation. Do Not use force or attempt to insert the battery upside down or backwards. The battery will slide in easily in the correct orientation.


## 3 Insert the memory card.

Holding the memory card in the orientation shown at right, slide it in until it clicks into place at the back of the slot.

- ① SD/SDHC/SDXC memory cards can be locked, making it impossible to format the card or to record or delete images. Before inserting an SD/SDHC/SDXC memory card, slide the write-protect switch to the unlocked position.
- **4** Close the battery-chamber cover.

## Removing the Battery and Memory Card

Before removing the battery or memory card, *turn the camera off* and open the battery-chamber cover.

To remove the battery, press the battery latch to the side, and slide the battery out of the camera as shown.

To remove the memory card, press it in and release it slowly. The card can then be removed by hand. When a memory card is removed, the card could come out of the slot too quickly. Use your finger to hold it and gently release the card.



## Compatible Memory Cards

FUJIFILM and SanDisk SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards have been approved for use in the camera. A complete list of approved memory cards is available at *http://www.fujifilm.com/support/digital\_cameras/compatibility/*. Operation is not guaranteed with other cards. The camera can not be used with *xD-Picture Cards* or MultiMediaCard (MMC) devices.

- ① Memory Cards
- Do not turn the camera off or remove the memory card while the memory card is being formatted or data are being recorded to or deleted from the card. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the card.
- Format SD/SDHC/SDXC memory cards before first use, and be sure to reformat all memory cards after using them in a computer or other device. For more information on formatting memory cards, see " FORMAT" (
   73).
- Memory cards are small and can be swallowed; keep out of reach of children. If a child swallows a memory card, seek medical assistance immediately.
- miniSD or microSD adapters that are larger or smaller than the standard dimensions of an SD/SDHC/SDXC memory card may not eject normally; if the card does not eject, take the camera to an authorized service representative. Do not forcibly remove the card.
- Do not affix labels to memory cards. Peeling labels can cause camera malfunction.
- Movie recording may be interrupted with some types of SD/SDHC/SDXC memory card. Use a **CLASS** card or better when shooting HD.

- The data in internal memory may be erased or corrupted when the camera is repaired. Please note that the repairer will be able to view pictures in internal memory.
- Formatting a memory card in the camera creates a folder in which pictures are stored. Do not rename or delete this folder or use a computer or other device to edit, delete, or rename image files. Always use the camera to delete pictures; before editing or renaming files, copy them to a computer and edit or rename the copies, not the originals.


### ① Batteries

- Remove dirt from the battery terminals with a clean, dry cloth. Failure to observe this precaution could prevent the battery from charging.
- Do not affix stickers or other objects to the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could make it impossible to remove the battery from the camera.
- Do not short the battery terminals. The battery could overheat.
- Read the cautions in "The Battery and Power Supply" (🕮 vi).
- Use only battery chargers designated for use with the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could result in product malfunction.
- Do not remove the labels from the battery or attempt to split or peel the outer casing.
- The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

## Charging the Battery

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use. The camera charges the battery internally.

Connect the camera and AC power adapter using the included USB cable. Then plug the AC power adapter into an indoor power outlet.



## The Illuminator

The illuminator shows battery charge status as follows:



The camera operates in external power mode if the camera is turned on while plugged into AC power.

### Charging the Battery from a Computer

The battery will charge while the camera is connected to a computer via the supplied USB cable.

- ① The camera will only charge when off.
- ① Connect the camera directly to the computer. Do not connect the camera via a USB hub or keyboard.



- ① Charging will end if the computer enters sleep mode. To resume charging, reactivate the computer and reconnect the USB cable.
- ① Depending on their make, configuration, and status, some computers may fail to charge the battery.

## Turning the Camera on and Off

## Shooting Mode

To turn the camera on, open the lens cover fully. The camera turns off when the lens cover is closed.








## Playback Mode

If the lens cover is closed, the camera can be turned on in playback mode by pressing the **>** button for about a second.



To turn the camera off, press and hold the 🕨 button.

## Switching to Shooting Mode

To exit to shooting mode, press the shutter button halfway or the **D** button.

- ${f D}$  Fingerprints and other marks on the lens can affect pictures. Keep the lens clean.
- ${\rm \ensuremath{\mathbb T}}$  Turning the camera off does not completely end the supply of power to the camera.

### Auto Power Off

The camera will turn off automatically if no operations are performed for the length of time selected for 🗃 AUTO POWER OFF (🗐 76).

## **Basic Setup**

A language-selection dialog is displayed the first time the camera is turned on. Set up the camera as described below (you can reset the clock or change languages at any time using the **③ DATE/TIME** or **③** 言語/LANG. options in the setup menu; for information on displaying the setup menu, see page 72).

- 1 Highlight a language and press MENU/OK.
  - Press DISP/BACK to skip the current step. Any steps you skip will be displayed the next time the camera is turned on.
- 2 The date and time will be displayed. Press the selector left or right to highlight the year, month, day, hour, or minute and press up or down to change. To change the order in which the year, month, and day are displayed, highlight the date format and press the selector up or down. Press **MENU/OK** when settings are complete.

## The Camera Clock

If the battery is removed for an extended period, the camera clock will be reset and the language-selection dialog will be displayed when the camera is turned on.







## Taking Pictures in 🙈 (Scene Recognition) Mode

This section describes how to take pictures in 👪 (scene recognition) mode. The camera automatically analyzes the composition and adjusts settings appropriately.

## **1** Turn the camera on.

Fully open the lens cover. Reference shooting indicators will be displayed.



## 🖢 The 😫 Icon

This icon indicates that the camera continuously searches for faces to select the appropriate scene, increasing the drain on the battery.




## Scene Icon

The camera selects the scene according to shooting conditions and the type of subject: O PORTRAIT (portraits), O LANDSCAPE (landscapes), O NIGHT (poorly-lit landscapes), O MACRO (close ups), O NIGHT PORTRAIT (poorly-lit portraits), O BACKLIT PORTRAIT (backlit portraits), O AUTO (all other scenes)

## **2** Frame the picture.

Use the zoom control to frame the picture in the display.



### Holding the Camera

Hold the camera steady with both hands and brace your elbows against your sides. Shaking or unsteady hands can blur your shots.



To prevent pictures that are out of focus or too dark (underexposed), keep your fingers and other objects away from the lens and flash.

## 3 Focus.

Press the shutter button halfway to focus.

The lens may make a noise when the camera focuses; this is normal.

If the camera is able to focus, it will beep twice.

If the camera is unable to focus, the focus frame will turn red, **!AF** will be displayed. Change the composition or use focus lock (閏 25).

## 4 Shoot.

Smoothly press the shutter button the rest of the way down to take the picture.

## The Shutter Button

The shutter button has two positions. Pressing the shutter button halfway sets focus and exposure; to shoot, press the shutter button the rest of the way down.





## Viewing Pictures

Pictures can be viewed in the LCD monitor. When taking important photographs, take a test shot and check the results.







### 🛛 🕅 MOTION PANORAMA

In this mode, you can take up to three pictures and join them together to form a panorama. Use of a tripod is recommended to assist in composing overlapping shots.

- **1** Press the selector up to select a frame. Press the selector left or right to highlight a pan direction and press **MENU/OK**.
- **2** Take a photograph. Exposure and white balance for the panorama are set with the first shot.
- 3 Frame the next shot to overlap with the previous picture by superimposing ⊕ on + so that they form a solid circle (●). The camera will release the shutter automatically.

### 4 Take the last shot as described in Step 3.

To end shooting and create a panorama after the first or second shot, press the multi selector up after completing Step 2 or Step 3 and proceed to Step 5.

### 5 Press MENU/OK to save the picture.

- ① The desired results may not be achieved with moving subjects, subjects close to the camera, unvarying subjects such as the sky or a field of grass, subjects that are in constant motion, such as waves and waterfalls, or subjects that undergo marked changes in brightness. Panoramas may be blurred if the subject is poorly lit.

#### For Best Results

For best results, be careful not to tilt the camera backward or forward or to either side and try not to move the camera while  $\oplus$  and + are aligned to form a solid circle.

#### Printing Panoramas

Depending on the page size and the size of the panorama, panoramas may print with their edges cropped out or with wide margins at the top and bottom or at both sides.

## Focus Lock

To compose photographs with off-center subjects:

- **1** Focus: Position the subject in the focus frame (r[+]:) and press the shutter button halfway to lock focus and exposure. Focus and exposure will remain locked while the shutter button is pressed halfway (AF/AE lock).
- **2 Recompose**: Keep the button pressed halfway.

**3 Shoot**: Press the button all the way down.





# **Exposure Compensation**

To adjust exposure compensation when photographing very bright, very dark, or high-contrast subjects, press the selector up (2). Press the selector up or down to choose an exposure compensation value and then press **MENU/OK**.






- A ☑ icon and exposure indicator are displayed at settings other than ±0. Exposure compensation is not reset when the camera is turned off; to restore normal exposure control, choose a value of ±0.
- Turn the flash off when using exposure compensation.
- Exposure compensation is available only when P (PROGRAM AE) is selected for shooting mode.

# 🗱 Macro Mode (Close-ups)

For close-ups, press the selector left (♥) and select ♥. When macro mode is in effect, the camera focuses on subjects near the center of the frame. Use the zoom control to compose pictures (■ 17).

To exit macro mode, press the selector left ( $\clubsuit$ ) and select  $\clubsuit$ .

Use of a tripod is recommended to prevent blur caused by camera shake.






# 4 Using the Flash (Intelligent Flash)

When the flash is used, the camera's *Intelligent Flash* system instantly analyzes the scene based on such factors as the brightness of the subject, its position in the frame, and its distance from the camera. Flash output and sensitivity are adjusted to ensure that the main subject is correctly exposed while preserving the effects of ambient background lighting, even in dimly-lit indoor scenes. Use the flash when lighting is poor, for example when shooting at night or indoors under low light.

Press the selector right (\$) and choose from the following flash modes:

- If the flash will fire, i will be displayed when the shutter button is pressed halfway. At slow shutter speeds, i will appear in the display to warn that pictures may be blurred; use of a tripod is recommended.
- The flash may fire several times with each shot. Do not move the camera until shooting is complete.
- The flash may cause vignetting.





# 🛛 🖾 Intelligent Face Detection

Intelligent Face Detection sets focus and exposure for human faces anywhere in the frame, preventing the camera from focusing on the background in group portraits. Choose for shots that emphasize portrait subjects.

To use Intelligent Face Detection, press **MENU/OK** to display the shooting menu and select **ON** for **PACE DETECTION**. Faces can be detected with the camera in vertical or horizontal orientation; if a face is detected, it will be indicated by a green border. If there is more than one face in the frame, the camera will select the face closest to the center; other faces are indicated by white borders.



- ${\scriptstyle \oplus}\,$  In some modes, the camera may set exposure for the frame as a whole rather than the portrait subject.
- ① If the subject moves as the shutter button is pressed, their face may not be in the area indicated by the green border when the picture is taken.

# More on Playback

## Playback Options

To view the most recent picture in the LCD monitor, press the  $\blacktriangleright$  button.



Press the selector right to view pictures in the order recorded, left to view pictures in reverse order. Keep the selector pressed to scroll rapidly to the desired frame.

Pictures taken using other cameras are indicated by a # ("gift image") icon during playback.

### **★** Favorites: Rating Pictures

To rate the picture currently displayed in full-frame playback, press **DISP/BACK** and press the selector up and down to select from zero to five stars.

### Playback Zoom

Select [1] to zoom in on pictures displayed in single-frame playback; select i to zoom out. When the picture is zoomed in, the selector can be used to view areas of the image not currently visible in the display.



Zoom indicator



Press DISP/BACK to exit zoom.

The maximum zoom ratio varies with image size. Playback zoom is not available with cropped or resized copies saved at a size of M or smaller.

### Multi-Frame Playback

Selecting **…** when a picture is shown full-frame in the LCD monitor displays the current image with previous and following images in the background. Select **…** to increase the number of images displayed to two, nine, or one hundred, **…** to view fewer images.



When two or more images are displayed, use the selector to highlight images and press **MENU/OK** to view the highlighted image full frame. In the nine- and hundred-frame displays, use the selector to view more pictures.

## Deleting Pictures

To delete individual pictures, multiple selected pictures, or all pictures, press **MENU/OK**, select **IIII ERASE** (IIII 65), and choose from the options below. Note that deleted pictures can not be re-



covered. Copy important pictures to a computer or other storage device before proceeding.

FRAME	Press the selector left or right to scroll through pictures and press <b>MENU/OK</b> to delete the current picture (a confirmation dialog is not displayed).

  - SELECT BY IMAGE SEARCH: Choose from pictures matching selected search conditions (Ⅲ 37).
  - Neither photographs 💷 or smaller nor movies can be selected for photobooks.
- 2 Scroll through the images and press the selector up to select or deselect. To display the current image on the cover, press the selector down. Press MENU/OK to exit when the book is complete.
  - The first picture selected becomes the cover image. Press the selector down to select a different image for the cover.
- **3** Select **COMPLETE PHOTOBOOK** (to select all photos or all photos matching the specified search conditions for the book, choose **SELECT ALL**). The new book will be added to the list in the photobook assist menu.
- ① Books can contain up to 300 pictures.
- ① Books that contain no photos are automatically deleted.

### Viewing Photobooks

Highlight a book in the photobook assist menu and press **MENU/OK** to display the book, then press the selector left or right to scroll through the pictures.

### Editing and Deleting Photobooks

Display the photobook and press **MENU/OK**. The following options will be displayed; select the desired option and follow the on-screen instructions.

- EDIT: Edit the book as described in "Creating a PhotoBook" (🕮 38).
- ERASE: Delete the book.

1 Display a picture and select **FACE RETOUCH** in the **✓ EDIT** menu. If more than once face was detected in the picture, press the selector up or down to display the desired face and press **MENU/OK** to select.



2 Press the selector up or down to highlight one of the following options and press MENU/OK to select, then press the selector up or down to choose the amount and press MENU/OK again. Repeat this step until you have adjusted all the desired options.

Option	Description	
SMOOTHING	Soften details.	
BRIGHTEN	Brighten skin tones.	
ENLARGE EYES	Make eyes appear larger.	

To return to Step 1 and select another face, press the selector left.


### 3 Highlight PROCEED TO SAVE and press MENU/OK.

- **4** A confirmation dialog will be displayed; press **MENU/OK** to save the retouched copy. To exit without creating a retouched copy, press **DISP/BACK**.
  - Face retouch may not be available with all faces depending on their orientation and size.
  - Unexpected results may occur with faces that are too close together.


## Viewing Panoramas


If you press the selector down when a panorama is displayed full frame, the camera will play back the picture from left to right. To pause playback, press the selector down; press the selector down again to resume. To delete the panorama, press the selector up ( $\mathbf{t}$ ) when playback is paused. To exit to full-frame playback, press the selector up while panorama playback is in progress.



# Movies

## **Recording Movies**







To end recording, press the 📽 button again. Recording ends automatically when the movie reaches maximum length or memory is full.

- Zoom can be adjusted while recording is in progress. The type of zoom can be selected using the MOVIE ZOOM TYPE option in the setup menu (1) 77).
- Exposure and white balance are adjusted automatically throughout recording (and, if CONTINUOUS is selected for MOVIE AF MODE in the shooting menu, focus; 464). The color and brightness of the image may vary from that displayed before recording begins.
- Sounds made by the camera may be recorded.

- ${\rm \oplus}\,$  Do not open the battery-chamber cover during shooting or while data are being recorded. Failure to observe this precaution could prevent the movie being played back.
- ${\rm \oplus}$  The temperature of the camera may rise if it is used to record movies for an extended period or if the ambient temperature is high. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction.

#### Movie Frame Size

Before recording, select a frame size using the **MOVIE MODE** option in the shooting menu (**B** 64).

# Viewing Movies

During playback, movies are displayed in the LCD monitor as shown at right. The following operations can be performed while a movie is displayed:

## Editing Movies

Edit movies.

#### **MOVIE TRIMMING**

Remove opening or ending footage to create an edited copy of the current movie.

- 1 Display the desired movie.
- 2 Select MOVIE EDIT > MOVIE TRIMMING in the playback menu. To remove footage from the start of the copy, proceed to Step 3; otherwise, proceed to Step 4.
- **3** Press the selector down to begin playback and press it down again when the new opening frame is reached.
- **4** Press **MENU/OK**. To remove footage from the end of the copy, proceed to Step 5; otherwise, proceed to Step 6 (to exit without creating an edited copy, press **DISP/BACK**).
- **5** Press the selector down to begin playback and press it down again when the new closing frame is reached.
- 6 Press MENU/OK to save the copy.

### MOVIE JOIN

Add existing footage to the end of the current movie to create an edited copy.


- **1** Display the desired movie.
- 2 Select 🔀 MOVIE EDIT > MOVIE JOIN in the playback menu.
- **3** Press the selector left or right to highlight a movie.
- **4** Press **MENU/OK** to add the highlighted footage to the end of the current movie and save the resulting copy, or press **DISP/BACK** to exit without creating a copy.
- Both movies must have been recorded at the same frame size and frame rate and have a combined file size of no more than 2 GB.

# Connections

## Viewing Pictures on TV

Connect the camera to a TV to show pictures to a group.

1 Turn the camera off and connect an optional A/V cable as shown below.




- ${\scriptstyle \textcircled{O}}$  When connecting cables, be sure the connectors are fully inserted.
- Image quality may drop during movie playback.
- To view high definition movies on a high definition TV, the optional accessory is required ( P 79, 80).
- **2** Tune the television to the video input channel. See the documentation supplied with the television for details.
- 3 Press the ▶ button for about a second to turn the camera on. The camera monitor turns off and pictures and movies are played back on the TV. Note that the camera volume controls have no effect on sounds played on the TV; use the television volume controls to adjust the volume.

# **Printing Pictures via USB**

If the printer supports PictBridge, the camera can be connected directly to the printer as shown below and pictures can be printed without first being copied to a computer. Note that depending on **PictBridge** the printer, not all the functions described below may be supported.

1 Connect the supplied USB cable as shown and turn the printer on.



- **2** Turn the camera on.
- 3 Press the selector left or right to display a picture you wish to print.
- 4 Press the selector up or down to choose the number of copies (up to 99).
- **5** Repeat steps 3–4 to select additional pictures. Press **MENU/OK** to display a confirmation dialog when settings are complete.

- 6 Press MENU/OK to start printing. Printing can be interrupted by pressing **DISP/BACK**, but note that some printers may not respond immediately. If the printer stops before printing is complete, turn the camera off and then on again.
- **7** After confirming that **PRINTING** has cleared from the camera display, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.
- Pictures can be printed from a memory card that has been formatted in the camera.
- If no pictures are selected, the camera will print one copy of the current picture.
- Page size, print quality, and border selections are made using the printer.

#### Printing the Date of Recording

To print the date of recording on pictures, press **DISP/BACK** in the PictBridge display and select **PRINT WITH DATE** in the PictBridge menu (to print pictures without the date of recording, select **PRINT WITHOUT DATE**).

### Printing the DPOF Print Order

The PRINT ORDER (DPOF) option in the playback menu can be used to create a digital "print order" for PictBridge-compatible printers (🗐 79) or devices that support DPOF.

### DPOF

DPOF (Digital Print Order Format) is a standard that allows pictures to be printed from "print orders" stored on a memory card. The information in the order includes the pictures to be printed and the number of copies of each picture.

- **1** Select playback mode and press **MENU/OK** to display the playback menu.
- 2 Highlight PRINT ORDER (DPOF) and press MENU/OK.
- 3 Highlight one of the following options and press MENU/OK:
  - WITH DATE C: Print the date of recording on pictures.
  - WITHOUT DATE: Do not print the date of recording on pictures.
  - Some printers do not support date printing. See the printer manual for details.
- **4** Press the selector left or right to display a picture you wish to add to or remove from the print order.

- **5** Press the selector up or down to choose the number of copies (up to 99). To remove a picture from the print order, press the selector down until the number of copies is zero.
- **6** Repeat Steps 4–5 to complete the print order and press **MENU/OK** when settings are complete.
- **7** A confirmation dialog will be displayed. Press **MENU/OK** to save the print order.
  - Print orders can contain a maximum of 999 pictures.
  - If a memory card is inserted containing a print order created by another camera, a message will be displayed. Create a new print order as described above.

## Viewing Pictures on a Computer

The supplied software can be used to copy pictures to a computer, where they can be stored, viewed, organized, and printed. Before proceeding, install the software as described below. **Do NOT connect the camera to the computer until installation is complete**.

The installer will start automatically; click **Install MyFinePix Studio** and follow the on-screen instructions to install MyFinePix Studio.

#### If the Installer Does Not Start Automatically

If the installer does not start automatically, select **Computer** or **My Computer** from the Start menu, then double-click the **FINEPIX** CD icon to open the FINEPIX CD window and double-click **setup** or **SETUP.EXE**.

- **4** If prompted to install Windows Media Player or DirectX, follow the onscreen instructions to complete installation.
- **5** Remove the installer CD from the CD-ROM drive when installation is complete. Store the installer CD in a dry location out of direct sunlight in case you need to re-install the software.

Installation is now complete. Proceed to "Connecting the Camera" (🕮 57).



### **Connecting the Camera**

- 1 If the pictures you wish to copy are stored on a memory card, insert the card into the camera.
  - Windows users may require the Windows CD when starting the software for the first time.
  - ① Loss of power during transfer could result in loss of data or damage to the memory card. Charge the battery before connecting the camera.
- **2** Turn the camera off and connect the supplied USB cable as shown, making sure the connectors are fully inserted. Connect the camera directly to the computer; do not use a USB hub or keyboard.



**3** Press the **b** button for about a second to turn the camera on and follow the on-screen instructions to copy pictures to the computer. To exit without copying pictures, click **Cancel**.

For more information on using the supplied software, start the application and select the appropriate option from the **Help** menu.

- ① If a memory card containing a large number of images is inserted, there may be a delay before the software starts and you may be unable to import or save images. Use a memory card reader to transfer pictures.
- $\oplus$  Make sure that the computer does not display a message stating that copying is in progress before turning the camera off or disconnecting the USB cable. Failure to observe this precaution could result in loss of data or damage to the memory card.
- $\ensuremath{\mathbbm D}$  Disconnect the camera before inserting or removing memory cards.
- ${\rm I}$  In some cases, it may not be possible to access pictures saved to a network server using the supplied software in the same way as on a standalone computer.

#### Uninstalling the Supplied Software

Only uninstall the supplied software when it is no longer required or before beginning reinstallation. After quitting the software and disconnecting the camera, drag the "FinePixViewer" folder from "Applications" into the Trash and select **Empty Trash** in the **Finder** menu (Macintosh), or open the control panel and use "Programs and Features" (Windows 7/Windows Vista) or "Add or Remove Programs" (Windows XP) to uninstall MyFinePix Studio. Under Windows, one or more confirmation dialogs may be displayed; read the contents carefully before clicking **OK**.

# Caring for the Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of the product, observe the following precautions.

### Storage and Use

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and memory card. Do not store or use the camera in locations that are:

- exposed to rain, steam, or smoke
- very humid or extremely dusty
- exposed to direct sunlight or very high temperatures, such as in a closed vehicle on a sunny day
- extremely cold
- subject to strong vibration
- exposed to strong magnetic fields, such as near a broadcasting antenna, power line, radar emitter, motor, transformer, or magnet
- in contact with volatile chemicals such as pesticides
- next to rubber or vinyl products

### Water and Sand

Exposure to water and sand can also damage the camera and its internal circuitry and mechanisms. When using the camera at the beach or seaside, avoid exposing the camera to water or sand. Do not place the camera on a wet surface.

### Condensation

Sudden increases in temperature, such as occur when entering a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation inside the camera. If this occurs, turn the camera off and wait an hour before turning it on again. If condensation forms on the memory card, remove the card and wait for the condensation to dissipate.

# <u>Cleaning</u>

Use a blower to remove dust from the lens and LCD monitor, then gently wipe with a soft, dry cloth. Any remaining stains can be removed by wiping gently with a piece of FUJIFILM lens-cleaning paper to which a small amount of lens-cleaning fluid has been applied. Care should be taken to avoid scratching the lens or LCD monitor. The camera body can be cleaned with a soft, dry cloth. Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

# <u>Traveling</u>

Keep the camera in your carry-on baggage. Checked baggage may suffer violent shocks that could damage the camera.
