

- 1. About the setting of "Hyper Threading Technology", please check page 30.
- This motherboard supports Untied Overclocking Technology. Please read "Untied Overclocking Technology" on page 25 for details.
- Although this motherboard offers stepless control, it is not recommended to perform over-clocking. Frequencies other than the recommended CPU bus frequencies may cause the instability of the system or damage the CPU.
- 4. While CPU overheat is detected, the system will automatically shutdown. Before you resume the system, please check if the CPU fan on the motherboard functions properly and unplug the power cord, then plug it back again. To improve heat dissipation, remember to spray thermal grease between the CPU and the heatsink when you install the PC system.
- For microphone input, this motherboard supports both stereo and mono modes. For audio output, this motherboard supports 2-channel, 4-channel, 6-channel, and 8-channel modes. Please check the table on page 10 for proper connection.
- Power Management for USB 2.0 works fine under Microsoft® Windows® XP SP1 or SP2 / 2000 SP4.



Chapter 2 Installation

775Twins-HDTV is a Micro ATX form factor $(9.6" \times 9.6", 24.4 \times 24.4 \text{ cm})$ motherboard. Before you install the motherboard, study the configuration of your chassis to ensure that the motherboard fits into it.



Make sure to unplug the power cord before installing or removing the motherboard. Failure to do so may cause physical injuries to you and damages to motherboard components.

2.1 Screw Holes

Place screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.



Do not over-tighten the screws! Doing so may damage the motherboard.

2.2 Pre-installation Precautions

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.

- 1. Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- To avoid damaging the motherboard components due to static electricity, NEVER place your motherboard directly on the carpet or the like. Also remember to use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safety grounded object before you handle components.
- 3. Hold components by the edges and do not touch the ICs.
- 4. Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that comes with the component.



Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the power is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, and/or components.

2.3 775-LAND CPU Installation

For the installation of Intel 775-LAND CPU, please follow the steps below.



775-Pin Socket Overview



Before you insert the 775-LAND CPU into the socket, please check if the CPU surface is unclean or if there is any bent pin on the socket. Do not force to insert the CPU into the socket if above situation is found. Otherwise, the CPU will be seriously damaged.

Step 1. Open the socket:

Step 1-1. Disengaging the lever by depressing down and out on the hook to clear retention tab.



- Step 1-2. Rotate the load lever to fully open position at approximately 135 degrees.
- Step 1-3. Rotate the load plate to fully open position at approximately 100 degrees.





Step 2. Insert the 775-LAND CPU:

Step 2-1. Hold the CPU by the edges where are marked with black lines.



Step 2-2. Orient the CPU with IHS (Integrated Heat Sink) up. Locate Pin1 and the two orientation key notches.







For proper inserting, please ensure to match the two orientation key notches of the CPU with the two alignment keys of the socket.

- Step 2-3. Carefully place the CPU into the socket by using a purely vertical motion.
- Step 2-4. Verify that the CPU is within the socket and properly mated to the orient keys.



Step 3. Remove PnP Cap (Pick and Place Cap):

Use your left hand index finger and thumb to support the load plate edge, engage PnP cap with right hand thumb and peel the cap from the socket while pressing on center of PnP cap to assist in removal.





- It is recommended to use the cap tab to handle and avoid kicking off the PnP cap.
- This cap must be placed if returning the motherboard for after service.

Step 4. Close the socket:

- Step 4-1. Rotate the load plate onto the IHS.
- Step 4-2. While pressing down lightly on load plate, engage the load lever.
- Step 4-3. Secure load lever with load plate tab under retention tab of load lever.



2.4 Installation of CPU Fan and Heatsink

This motherboard is equipped with 775-Pin socket that supports Intel 775-LAND CPU. Please adopt the type of heatsink and cooling fan compliant with Intel 775-LAND CPU to dissipate heat. Before you installed the heatsink, you need to spray thermal interface material between the CPU and the heatsink to improve heat dissipation. Ensure that the CPU and the heatsink are securely fastened and in good contact with each other. Then connect the CPU fan to the CPU_FAN connector (CPU_FAN1, see page 9, No. 5).



For proper installation, please kindly refer to the instruction manuals of your CPU fan and heatsink.

Below is an example to illustrate the installation of the heatsink for 775-LAND CPU

Step 1. Apply thermal interface material onto center of IHS on the socket surface.



- Step 2. Place the heatsink onto the socket. Ensure fan cables are oriented on side closest to the CPU fan connector on the motherboard (CPU_FAN1, see page 9, No. 5).
- Step 3. Align fasteners with the motherboard throughholes.
- Step 4. Rotate the fastener clockwise, then press down on fastener caps with thumb to install and lock. Repeat with remaining fasteners.







If you press down the fasteners without rotating them clockwise, the heatsink cannot be secured on the motherboard.

- Step 5. Connect fan header with the CPU fan connector on the motherboard.
- Step 6. Secure excess cable with tie-wrap to ensure cable does not interfere with fan operation or contact other components.

2.5 Installation of Memory Modules (DIMM)

This motherboard is equipped with two 184-pin DDR (Double Data Rate) DIMM slots and two 240-pin DDRII (Double Data Rate) DIMM slots.




- It is not allowed to install DDR into DDRII slot or DDRII into DDR slot; otherwise, this motherboard and DIMM may be damaged.
- It is not allowed to install both DDR and DDRII to this motherboard at the same time; otherwise, this motherboard and DIMM may be damaged.



Please make sure to disconnect power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or the system components.

- Step 1. Unlock a DIMM slot by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Step 2. Align a DIMM on the slot such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the slot.





The DIMM only fits in one correct orientation. It will cause permanent damage to the motherboard and the DIMM if you force the DIMM into the slot at incorrect orientation.

Step 3. Firmly insert the DIMM into the slot until the retaining clips at both ends fully snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.

2.6 Expansion Slots (PCI, AMR, and PCI Express Slots)

There are 2 PCI slots, 1 AMR slot and 2 PCI Express slot on this motherboard.

PCI slots: PCI slots are used to install expansion cards that have the 32-bit PCI interface.

AMR slot: AMR slot is used to insert an ASRock MR card (optional) with v.92 Modem functionality.

PCIE Slots: PCIE1 (PCIE x16 slot) is used for PCI Express cards with x16 lane width graphics cards.

PCIE2 (PCIE x1 slot) is used for PCI Express cards, such as Gigabit LAN card, SATA2 card, etc.

Installing an expansion card

- Step 1. Before installing the expansion card, please make sure that the power supply is switched off or the power cord is unplugged. Please read the documentation of the expansion card and make necessary hardware settings for the card before you start the installation.
- Step 2. Remove the system unit cover (if your motherboard is already installed in a chassis).
- Step 3. Remove the bracket facing the slot that you intend to use. Keep the screws for later use.
- Step 4. Align the card connector with the slot and press firmly until the card is completely seated on the slot.
- Step 5. Fasten the card to the chassis with screws.
- Step 6. Replace the system cover.

2.7 Jumpers Setup

The illustration shows how jumpers are setup. When the jumper cap is placed on pins, the jumper is "Short". If no jumper cap is placed on pins, the jumper is "Open". The illustration shows a 3-pin jumper whose pin1 and pin2 are "Short" when jumper cap is placed on these 2 pins.

Note: CLRCMOS1 allows you to clear the data in CMOS. The data in CMOS includes system setup information such as system password, date, time, and system setup parameters. To clear and reset the system parameters to default setup, please turn off the computer and unplug the power cord from the power supply. After waiting for 15 seconds, use a jumper cap to short pin2 and pin3 on CLRCMOS1 for 5 seconds. However, please do not clear the CMOS right after you update the BIOS. If you need to clear the CMOS when you just finish updating the BIOS, you must boot up the system first, and then shut it down before you do the clear-CMOS action.

2.8 Onboard Headers and Connectors



Onboard headers and connectors are NOT jumpers. Do NOT place jumper caps over these headers and connectors. Placing jumper caps over the headers and connectors will cause permanent damage of the motherboard!








2.9 Installing VGA_HDTV Panel to Enjoy HDTV (High-Definition TV) / TV Support Function

Additional VGA_HDTV panel with VGA and 3 RCA-type component video output, that allows PC to connect to all high-definition TV with component video input capability (YPbPr) or TV with AV input capability.

Installing VGA_HDTV Panel

- Step 1. Either end of the VGA_2X8 cable can be connected to the J1 jumper of VGA_HDTV panel or the VGA1 header of this motherboard.
- Step 2. Either end of the AV/S_2X3 cable can be connected to the J2 jumper of VGA_HDTV panel or the TV-OUT header of this motherboard.
- Step 3. Connect the output connectors to all high-definition TV with component video input capability (YPbPr) or TV with AV input capability.
- Step 4. Secure the VGA_HDTV panel with the bracket to the chassis.



- You must have a monitor attached to your computer to install the VGA driver correctly in advance.
- 2. After installing the VGA driver to the computer, this motherboard supports static "Auto Sensing" feature. That is, if you install the stand alone HDTV, TV, or VGA monitor before your computer boots, the system can display correctly on the output device you use. Therefore, if you only install HDTV or TV instead of VGA monitor, it is not necessary for you to enable the TV display setting in Windows control panel or change BIOS setup, and you can enjoy the HDTV or TV display function directly.


2.9.1 HDTV (High-Definition TV) Support Function

View computer output directly on your High Definition Television (HDTV) or other devices with component video input capability. Provide a big-screen experience for your computer that is ideal for playing games, giving presentations, watching movies, and browsing the Internet.

HDTV uses YPbPr connectors to receive input. The HDTV Component Video Adapter can be used in place of the standard AV Output cable to connect to an HDTV or other component video input devices, using component video cables.

Connecting to HDTV With Component Video (YPbPr) Output Capability

Step 1. Connect the Male/Male RCA patch cables to the Typical HDTV component Video Input connectors and the RCA-type component video connectors (Y-CON1, PB-CON1, and PR-CON1) (Y-CON1, see page 21, No. 1; PB-CON1, see page 21, No. 2; PR-CON1, see page 21, No. 3) of the VGA_HDTV panel.



Typical HDTV Video Input Connectors

Male/Male RCA Patch Cables available from consumer electronics dealer



Please correctly connect the Male/Male RCA patch cables to both HDTV Video Input connectors and RCA-type component video connectors according to the functions of the connectors distinguished by the same color (green, blue, and red). For example, you need to connect the red Male/Male RCA patch cable to the red port (PR) of HDTV and the red port (PR-CON1) of VGA_HDTV panel. Please see your HDTV and Male/Male RCA patch cables manuals for configuration information specific to your device.

Step 2. Turn on your computer and wait system to boot into OS.

Step 3. Change HDTV display settings.



For maximum performance when you watch DVD movies or play computer games on your HDTV, you should find the mode and screen resolution that provide the best result on your TV, and use those settings exclusively.

B. Double-click the **Display** icon, click the **Settings** tab, and use the Screen Area slider to select the resolution you want.



If the resolution you select is not related to a specific timing, the system will reduce the resolution to the closest supported timing.

- C. Click the **Advanced** button, then click the **Displays** tab.
- D. Click the **YPbPr** tab.
- E. Click OK.
- F. Click the Advanced button.
- G. Click the **Adapter** tab, then click the **List All Modes** button.
- You can only choose 480i and 480p modes (640 x 480; 704 x 480; 720 x 480), 720p modes (960 x 720; 1280 x 720), or 1080i modes (1920 x 1080). Click the mode according to your HDTV screen.
 - 60Hz = Progressive
 - 30Hz = Interlaced



In DOS mode, only 480p is supported for HDTV output.

Connecting to VGA Monitor and HDTV With Component Video (YPbPr) Output Capability

When you install both VGA monitor cable and Male/Male RCA patch cables to VGA_HDTV panel at the same time, the default enabled screen is the VGA monitor. You are able to switch the monitor display to HDTV display by following the below instruction.

- Step 1. Connect one end of the VGA monitor cable to your monitor, and the other end to the VGA port (VGA1, see page 21, No. 4) of VGA_HDTV panel.
- Step 2. Connect the Male/Male RCA patch cables to the Typical HDTV component Video Input connectors and the RCA-type component video connectors (Y-CON1, PB-CON1, and PR-CON1) (Y-CON1, see page 21, No. 1; PB-CON1, see page 21, No. 2; PR-CON1, see page 21, No. 3) of the VGA_HDTV panel.
- Step 3. Turn on your computer and wait system to boot into OS.
- Step 4. Enable the TV display. Please follow the below steps:
 - A. Access the Windows Control Panel. Double-click Display.
 - B. Click the **Settings** tab and then the **Advanced** button.
 - C. Click the ATI Displays tab. Click the TV button.

- E. Click **OK** or **Apply** to save the changes or use hot key to do fast switching between CRT and YPbPr. (Default hot key is **Alt-F5**.)
- F. Your HDTV will start to display.
- Step 5. Change HDTV display settings. (Please refer to Step 3 on page 20 for details.)

2.9.2 TV Support Function

Connecting to TV With AV Output Capability

- Step 1. Connect the AV video cable to the Typical TV Video Input connector (yellow) and the RCA-type component video connector (blue) / AV (composite) signal connector (PB-CON1, see page 21, No. 2) of the VGA_HDTV panel.
- Step 2. Turn on your computer and wait system to boot into OS.

Connecting to VGA Monitor and TV With AV Output Capability

When you install both VGA monitor cable and AV video cable to VGA_HDTV panel at the same time, the default enabled screen is the VGA monitor. You are able to switch the monitor display to TV display by following the below instruction.

- Step 1. Connect one end of the VGA monitor cable to your monitor, and the other end to the VGA port (VGA1, see page 21, No. 4) of VGA_HDTV panel.
- Step 2. Connect the AV video cable to the Typical TV Video Input connector (yellow) and the RCA-type component video connector (blue) / AV (composite) signal connector (PB-CON1, see page 21, No. 2) of the VGA HDTV panel.
- Step 3. Turn on your computer and wait system to boot into OS.
- Step 4. Switch the monitor display to TV display and select proper TV format. For selecting proper TV format, please follow the below steps:
 - A. Click the Windows **Start** button, point at **Settings**, and then click **Control Panel**.
 - B. Double-click the **Display** icon, click the **Settings** tab, and use the Screen Area slider to select the resolution you want.
 - C. Click the **Advanced** button, then click the **Displays** tab.
 - D. Click the **TV** tab, and select **NTSC**, **PAL**.
 - E. Your TV will start to display.

2.10 Untied Overclocking Technology

This motherboard supports Untied Overclocing Technology, which means during overclocking, FSB enjoys better margin due to fixed PCI / PCIE buses. Before you enable Untied Overclocking function, please enter "Overclock Mode" option of BIOS setup to set the selection from [Auto] to [CPU, PCIE, Async.]. Therefore, CPU FSB is untied during overclocking, but PCI and PCIE buses are in the fixed mode so that FSB can operate under a more stable overclocking environment.

2.11 Serial ATA (SATA) Hard Disks Installation

This motherboard adopts ULi 1573 southbridge chipset that supports Serial ATA (SATA) hard disks and RAID functions (RAID 0, 1, JBOD). You may install SATA hard disks on this motherboard for internal storage devices. This section will guide you to install the SATA hard disks.

STEP 1: Install the SATA hard disks into the drive bays of your chassis.

STEP 2: Connect the SATA power cable to the SATA hard disk.

STEP 3: Connect one end of the SATA data cable to the motherboard's SATA

STEP4: Connect the other end of the SATA data cable to the SATA hard disk.

If you plan to use RAID 0, RAID 1, or JBOD functions on SATA, SATA HDDs must not operate in ATA Combination Mode enabled. Please refer to page 34 for details.

2.12 Making a SATA Driver Diskette For Windows 2000 /XP / XP 64-bit Installation

If you want to install Windows 2000, Windows XP, or Windows XP 64-bit OS on your SATA HDDs, you will need to make a SATA driver before you start the OS installation.

- STEP 1: Insert the ASRock Support CD into your optical drive to boot your system.

 (Do NOT insert any floppy diskette into the floppy drive at this moment!)
- STEP 2: During POST at the beginning of system boot-up, press <F11> key, and then a window for boot devices selection appears. Please select CD-ROM as the boot device.
- STEP 3: When you see the message on the screen, "Do you want to generate Serial ATA driver diskette [YN]?", press <Y>.
- STEP 4: Then you will see these messages,

STEP5: The system will start to format the floppy diskette and copy SATA drivers into the floppy diskette.

Once you have the SATA driver diskette ready, you may start to install Windows 2000 / Windows XP / Windows XP 64-bit on your system directly without setting the RAID configuration on your system, or you may start to use "RAID Installation Guide" to set RAID 0 / RAID 1 / JBOD configuration before you install the OS. Before you start to configure the RAID function, you need to check the installation guide in the Support CD for proper configuration. Please find the document, "Guide to SATA Hard Disks Installation and RAID Configuration", at the following path in the Support CD:

Chapter 3 BIOS SETUP UTILITY

3.1 Introduction

This section explains how to use the BIOS SETUP UTILITY to configure your system. The BIOS FWH chip on the motherboard stores the BIOS SETUP UTILITY. You may run the BIOS SETUP UTILITY when you start up the computer. Please press <F2> during the Power-On-Self-Test (POST) to enter the BIOS SETUP UTILITY, otherwise, POST will continue with its test routines.

If you wish to enter the BIOS SETUP UTILITY after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctl> + <Alt> + <Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You may also restart by turning the system off and then back on.



Because the BIOS software is constantly being updated, the following BIOS setup screens and descriptions are for reference purpose only, and they may not exactly match what you see on your screen.







3.3.1 CPU Configuration



Overclock Mode

Use this to select Overclock Mode. The default value is [Auto]. Configuration options: [Auto], [CPU, PCIE, Sync.] and [CPU, PCIE, Async.]. If Overclock Mode is set to [Auto], you are not allowed to select PCI Frequency; if you select [CPU, PCIE, Sync.] or [CPU, PCIE, Async.], then PCI Frequency can be selected as [sync with CPU], [33.33 MHz], [33.80 MHz], [34.28 MHz], [34.78 MHz], [35.29 MHz], [35.82 MHz], [36.36 MHz], [36.92 MHz], or [37.50 MHz]. The default value of PCI Frequency is [33.33 MHz].

Boot Failure Guard

Enable or disable the feature of Boot Failure Guard.

Spread Spectrum

The default value of this option is [Auto].

Ratio Status

This is a read-only item, which displays whether the ratio status of this motherboard is "Locked" or "Unlocked". If it shows "Unlocked", you will find an item **Ratio CMOS Setting** appears to allow you changing the ratio value of this motherboard. If it shows "Locked", then the item **Ratio CMOS Setting** will be hidden. If you use the ratio value to time the CPU frequency, it will be equal to the core speed of the installed processor.

Ratio Actual Value

This is a read-only item, which displays the ratio actual value of this motherboard.

CPU Thermal Throttling

You may select [Enabled] to enable P4 CPU internal thermal control mechanism to keep the CPU from overheated.


Hyper Threading Technology

To enable this feature, it requires a computer system with an Intel Pentium®4 processor that supports Hyper-Threading technology and an operating system that includes optimization for this technology, such as Microsoft® Windows® XP. Set to [Auto] if using Microsoft® Windows® XP, or Linux kernel version 2.4.18 or higher. This option will be hidden if the installed CPU does not support Hyper-Threading technology.

Max CPUID Value Limit

For Prescott CPU only, some OSes (ex. NT4.0) cannot handle the function with disable. This should be enabled in order to boot legacy OSes that cannot support CPUs with extended CPUID functions.

3.3.2 Chipset Configuration



Performance Configuration

DRAM Frequency

If [Auto] is selected, the motherboard will detect the memory module (s) inserted and assigns appropriate frequency automatically. You may also select other value as operating frequency: [Auto], [Sync with CPU], [133MHz (DDR 266)], [166MHz (DDR 333)], [200MHz (DDR 400)]. If DDRII DIMM is inserted to DDRII slot, you may select [Auto], [Sync with CPU], [200MHz (DDRII 400)], [266MHz (DDRII 533)], [333MHz (DDRII 667)] as operating frequency.

Overclock DRAM Speed

Use this to select overclock DRAM speed. The default value is [None].

Flexibility Option

The default value of this option is [Disabled]. It will allow better tolerance for memory compatibility when it is set to [Enabled].

CAS Latency (CL)

Use this item to adjust the latency time for memory accessing. Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [2.0], [3.0], and [2.5]. Configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [3.0], [4.0], and [5.0]. The default value is [Auto].

Cycle time (TRAS)

Use this to adjust TRAS values. Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [2CLK] to [8CLK]. configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [2CLK] to [128CLK]. The default value is [Auto].

RAS# to CAS# Delay (TRCD)

This controls the latency between the DRAM active command and the read / write command. Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [2 DRAM Clocks] to [4 DRAM Clocks]. Configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [2 DRAM Clocks] to [15 DRAM Clocks]. The default value is [Auto].

RAS# Precharge Time (TRP)

Use this to adjust TRP values. Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [1CLK], [2CLK], [3CLK]. Configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [1CLK] to [15CLK]. The default value is [Auto].

MA Timing

Use this to adjust values for MA timing. Configuration options: [Auto], [2T], [1T], [1.5T]. The default value is [Auto].

Write to Write Turn Around

Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [0CLK] to [3CLK]. Configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [0CLK] to [7CLK]. The default value is [Auto].

Read to Write Turn Around

Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [0CLK] to [3CLK]. Configuration options for DDRII: [Auto], [0CLK] to [7CLK]. The default value is [Auto].

Write to Read Turn Around

Configuration options for DDR: [Auto], [0CLK] to [3CLK]. Configuration op-

tions for DDRII: [Auto], [0CLK] to [7CLK]. The default value is [Auto].

DRAM Voltage

Use this to select DRAM voltage. Configuration options: [Auto], [High], [Normal], and [Low]. The default value is [Auto].

NB Core Voltage

Use this to select NB core voltage. Configuration options: [Auto], [High], [Normal], and [Low]. The default value is [Auto].

NorthBridge Configuration

Share Memory

This allows you to set share memory feature. The default value is [Auto]. Configuration options: [Auto], [16MB], [32MB], [64MB], and [128MB].

Primary Graphics Adapter

This item will switch the PCI Bus scanning order while searching for video card. It allows you to select the type of Primary VGA in case of multiple video controllers. The default value of this feature is [PCI]. Configuration options: [Onboard], [PCI] and [PCI Express].

Surround View Function

This allows you to disable or enable surround view function. The default value is [Disabled].

Video Display Devices

This allows you to select video display devices. The default value is [Auto]. Configuration options: [CRT], and [TV].

TV Standard

This allows you to set TV standard feature. The default value is [NTSC]. Configuration options: [NTSC], [PAL], [PAL-M], [PAL-60], [NTSC-JAP], [PAL-CN], [PAL-N].

SouthBridge Configuration

OnBoard LAN

This allows you to enable or disable the "OnBoard LAN" feature.

OnBoard AC'97 Audio

Select [Auto], [Enabled] or [Disabled] for the onboard AC'97 Audio feature.

OnBoard MC'97 Modem

Select [Auto] or [Disabled] for the onboard MC'97 Modem feature.

Thermal Throttling Temperature

To select the temperature to generate the thermal override event. Configuration options: [Auto], [Disabled], [30° C], [35° C], [40° C], [45° C], [50° C],

Thermal Throttling Duty Cycle

To select duty cycle of the STPCLK# signal when the thermal override event is generated. Configuration options: [Auto], [12.5%], [25.00%], [37.50%], [50.00%], [62.50%], [75.00%], [87.50%]. The default value is [Auto].

3.3.3 ACPI Configuration



Suspend to RAM

This field allows you to select whether to auto-detect or disable the Sus pend-to-RAM feature. Select [Auto] will enable this feature if the system supports it. The default value is [Disabled].

Restore on AC/Power Loss

This allows you to set the power state after an unexpected AC/ Power loss. If [Power Off] is selected, the AC/Power remains off when the power recovers. If [Power On] is selected, the AC/Power resumes and the system starts to boot up when the power recovers.

Ring-In Power On

Use this item to enable or disable Ring-In signals to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

PCI Devices Power On

Use this item to enable or disable PCI devices to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

PS/2 Keyboard Power On

Use this item to enable or disable PS/2 keyboard to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.


RTC Alarm Power On

Use this item to enable or disable RTC (Real Time Clock) to power on the system.

ACPI HPET Table

Use this item to enable or disable ACPI HPET table feature. It will include ACPI High Precision Event Timer Table for OS if you set this option to [Enabled].

3.3.4 IDE Configuration



ATA Combination Mode

The default value is [Disabled]. If you set this option as [Enabled], the options OnBoard IDE Controller, OnBoard SATA Controller, and SATA Class Code will not appear. Then, PATA devices will only connect to secondary channel, SATA devices will only connect to SATA1 and it will work as primary channel.

OnBoard IDE Controller

You may enable either the primary IDE channel or the secondary IDE channel. Or you may enable both the primary and the secondary IDE channels by selecting [Both]. Set to [Disabled] will disable the both. Configuration options: [Disabled], [Primary], [Secondary], [Both].

OnBoard SATA Controller

Use this item to enable or disable the "OnBoard SATA Controller" feature. The default value is [Enabled].

SATA Class Code


Use this to programe SATA controller's class code. Configuration options: [AHCI], [RAID]. The default value is [AHCI].

IDE Device Configuration

You may set the IDE configuration for the device that you specify. We will use the "Primary IDE Master" as the example in the following instruction, which can be applied to the configurations of "Primary IDE Slave", "Secondary IDE Master", and "Secondary IDE Slave" as well.

IDE Device Configuration

TYPE

Use this item to configure the type of the IDE device that you specify. Configuration options: [Not Installed], [Auto], [CD/DVD], and [ARMD]. [Not Installed]: Select [Not Installed] to disable the use of IDE device. [Auto]: Select [Auto] to automatically detect the hard disk drive.



After selecting the hard disk information into BIOS, use a disk utility, such as FDISK, to partition and format the new IDE hard disk drives. This is necessary so that you can write or read data from the hard disk. Make sure to set the partition of the Primary IDE hard disk drives to active.

[CD/DVD]: This is used for IDE CD/DVD drives.

[ARMD]: This is used for IDE ARMD (ATAPI Removable Media Device), such as MO.

LBA/Large Mode

Use this item to select the LBA/Large mode for a hard disk > 512 MB under DOS and Windows; for Netware and UNIX user, select [Disabled] to disable the LBA/Large mode.

Block (Multi-Sector Transfer)

The default value of this item is [Auto]. If this feature is enabled, it will enhance hard disk performance by reading or writing more data during each transfer.

PIO Mode

Use this item to set the PIO mode to enhance hard disk performance by optimizing the hard disk timing.

DMA Mode

DMA capability allows the improved transfer-speed and data-integrity for compatible IDE devices.







Use this item to set the ECP mode DMA channel. Configuration options: [DMA0], [DMA1], and [DMA3].

Parallel Port IRQ

Use this item to set the IRQ for the parallel port. Configuration options: [IRQ5] and [IRQ7].

OnBoard Game Port

Use this item to enable the Game Port or disable it.

OnBoard MIDI Port

Use this itme to select the address for the MIDI Port or disable it. Configuration options: [Disabled], [300], and [330].

3.3.8 USB Configuration



USB Controller

Use this item to enable or disable the use of USB controller.

USB 2.0 Support


